### CAC ENFORCEMENT – KEEPING YOU AND YOUR NAVY SAFE

To comply with Navy security rules, Common Access Card (CAC) authentication is required to access the private side of the Navy Reserve SharePoint Web site.

A benefit of CAC authentication in the new SharePoint Web site is single sign-on access.

CAC users will no longer need to have a separate username and password when accessing Navy Reserve applications.

If you have a CAC, you will need it to login for authentication on the Navy Reserve SharePoint Web site.

If you do not have a CAC reader for your home computer, request one through your NOSC.

All NOSCs can provide CAC readers and software for Windows and Mac operating systems.

CAC readers are easy to install and use.

There is new ActivClient software on the CAC/PKI page of the CNRFC N64 page on NRWS.

Mac users should ask for the SCR331 reader, not the ActivCard reader. Software installation is not required for the MAC reader.

CAC users also get free security software. The latest Symantec and McAfee versions of anti-virus, anti-spyware and firewall software are available for download on the INFOSEC page of the Navy Reserve Web site.
