- The Navy Reserve is an honorable profession that provides opportunities for meaningful service and a rewarding career.
- Continuum of service initiatives are meant to facilitate a lifetime of service and ease transition between AC and RC with a 72-hour transition goal between components.
- The Navy is committed to easing transition between active duty and the Navy Reserve to increase Reserve affiliation among qualified Sailors leaving active duty.
- The Navy Reserve gives Sailors options that allow them to achieve a true life/work balance.
 - Navy Reserve works to make it easier for Sailors to change lanes between active duty and Reserve duty.
 - Flex drilling provides the Navy and the Sailor more productive opportunities to serve.
 - Educational and training opportunities enhance both Navy and civilian job skills.
- These options allow the Sailor to "Stay Navy" and continue contributing to our warfighting effectiveness.
- Current and prospective Sailors regard the Navy Reserve as one of the nation's great workplaces.

Perform to Serve (PTS) with SELRES Option

- Perform to Serve with SELRES option became functional in October 2009 and now includes an option to obtain a quota in the SELRES as an enlisted drilling Reservist.
- With retention rates in all zones already well over FY10 goals, the Reserve option allows us to keep great Sailors and give those who might be separated a way to stay with our Navy.
- AC/FTS enlisted Sailors can simultaneously apply for active reenlistment and a SELRES enlistment quota.
- Approval for a SELRES quota does not cancel the AC/FTS approval, but serves as an additional option at a Sailor's end of active obligated service.

CMS/ID With SELRES Option Helping Continuum of Service by providing ease of transition

- Career Management System Interactive Detailing (CMS/ID) allows enlisted Sailors to view Navy Operational Support center locations
- CMS/ID allows the Sailor to submit an application to drill at the center closest to the desired locations upon leaving active enlistment.
- Once the application is submitted in CMS/ID for a particular location, the Career Transition Office will contact the Sailor to discuss Reserve programs and benefits.
- Actual billet assignment in a Reserve unit is independent of their preferred location. Billets are assigned after the Sailor is affiliated into the reserve at the approved NOSC.
