## **Online Resources**

Technology provides Sailors access to online career tools, which enable them to take an active role in their professional development and support a successful career from anywhere in the world.

#### Validate Personnel Information

<u>Electronic Service Record (ESR)</u> replaces the paper service record and allows updating and generating of documents to reflect a Sailor's current status and career achievements. <u>Electronic Leave</u>, now in testing, will also reside in the ESR.

The <u>Official Military Personnel File</u> (OMPF) and the <u>Electronic Training Jacket</u> (ETJ) include documents such as accession training, education performance, discipline, decorations and awards, assignments and duties.

The <u>Web Enabled Record Review</u> (WERR) allows Sailors to review, download and print service record documents, which are reviewed by advancement and special program selection board members.

Physical Readiness Information Management System (PRIMS) allows Sailors to view Physical Fitness Assessment results as well as complete the Physical Activity Risk Factor Questionnaire.

Bupers On-Line (BOL) provides access to OMPF; WERR; PRIMS; latest orders, fitreps and evaluations; duty swap options; individual medical readiness and Selective Reenlistment Bonus (SRB) information.

### **Enhance Professional Growth**

The <u>Navy eLearning (NeL)</u> catalog contains thousands of courses ranging from GMT to language programs.

Navy Credentialing Opportunities On-Line (Navy COOL) explains how Sailors can earn civilian certifications related to their rating, job or designator.

The <u>United Services Military</u> <u>Apprenticeship Program (USMAP)</u> provides the opportunity to complete civilian apprenticeship requirements and earn the U.S. Department of Labor Certification of Completion.
