# NAVY RESERVE: READY NOW. ANYTIME, ANYWHERE Monthly Communication Priority: Strategic Depth

- Strategic depth provides our Navy with the ability to surge capability in a rapidly changing environment. It comes from trained and ready forces that are available when they are needed.
- By properly balancing strategic depth with operational elements, the Navy is able to execute our Maritime Strategy around the world, year after year, with confidence that it has the capability and capacity to handle emergent military or humanitarian crisis, or even a global conflict.
- Strategic depth is <u>not</u> a concept exclusive to the Reserve Component. A Navy that operates continuously and persistently has both strategic and operational elements in service all the time.
- On any given day about two-thirds of AC and about one-third of RC Sailors are providing operational support. Conversely about one-third of AC and about two-thirds of RC Sailors are providing strategic depth. This gives our nation the ability to surge forces to successfully meet unforeseen and/or unfolding events requiring America's Navy.
- Approximately 62,000 of the 90,000 Individual Augmentees serving in the CENTCOM AOR since 9/11 have been RC Sailors. Our Navy Reserve forces trained, available and ready have since been called to serve in combat from Vietnam to Desert Storm, Bosnia, Iraq and Afghanistan. We were ready then, and we are ready now.
- Even as we fight our Nation's wars, we are also providing strategic depth. The Navy Reserve's force structure is largely based on scenarios and requirements established by the Joint Chiefs of Staff and driven by Operations Plans, or OPLANS, drafted by Combatant Commanders for the conduct of military operations in hostile environments.
- Navy Reserve Sailors are part of these plans. This is why we value the contributions of each and every reservist, recognizing service can and does vary from a few days per year to full-time service – our Nation is counting on you.
- You provide the Navy with strategic depth by maintaining individual readiness, which drives unit and force readiness. When you are trained and ready to transition to operational roles as needed, you are providing strategic depth. Being ready doesn't mean you are waiting for the mission. Being ready is a mission!
- We are ready now to surge forward anytime, anywhere from peace to war.
