- CONTENT: The purpose of this Information Memorandum (IM) is to transmit the enclosed publication to vocational rehabilitation (VR) professionals, advocates, and other stakeholders in the public VR program. This publication was developed by individuals representing various State VR programs, the Regional Rehabilitation Continuing Education Programs (RRCEP), Rehabilitation Services Administration (RSA), and other professionals interested in the development and use of distance education in vocational rehabilitation. Dr. Donald W. Dew, the Director of the RRCEP III at The George Washington University, served as the university coordinator for the study group.

This document is meant to be a user's guide for developing, initiating, and participating in distance education in rehabilitation. The developments and trends described in this document identify the potential opportunities, challenges, and implications regarding the effective use and application of distance education in public vocational rehabilitation programs.

Distance education offers several advantages for preservice, in-service, continuing education, and certification training. These advantages include a learner-focus format, flexibility regarding the time and place of study, as well as the ease-of-access to useful resources. Clearly, distance education offers the public vocational rehabilitation profession a unique tool to train and teach VR counselors the skills necessary to provide high-quality services to consumers.

IRI publications are widely used by VR counselors and supervisors, human resource development specialists, consumers, community-based rehabilitation service providers, administrators, researchers, educators and policy analysts in fulfilling the purposes of the Rehabilitation Act, as amended, particularly, "... to empower individuals with disabilities to maximize employment, economic self-sufficiency, independence, inclusion, and integration into society...."

An important part of RSA's mission is to provide training and technical assistance to State VR agencies on the problems facing rehabilitation service providers, and to disseminate and promote the utilization of knowledge resulting from current research. Through the IRI, high priority training needs are responded to expeditiously, and the study findings on a specific topic are quickly transposed into useful and usable training materials and publications.
