SUBJECT : Call for Topics – Thirty-First Institute on Rehabilitation Issues (2004-2005)

CONTENT : This Information Memorandum (IM) is to request your assistance in identifying topics for the Thirty-First Institute on Rehabilitation Issues (IRI). The IRI originated as the Guidance, Training and Placement (GTP) workshop in 1947 and since that time has evolved to be an activity unique to the State-Federal vocational rehabilitation (VR) program, in which rehabilitation professionals and others with special expertise on the topics selected for study, come together to discuss the issues and to develop current and innovative training materials to improve the skills of VR professionals. In this manner, the VR program is able to develop timely publications containing cutting-edge solutions to some of the most pressing challenges facing the rehabilitation field.

> The basic purposes of the IRI are to identify and discuss current issues of importance to the State-Federal VR program, and to publish materials which can be used by persons responsible for staff development in the State VR agencies, Regional Rehabilitation Continuing Education Programs (RRCEP), Rehabilitation Counselor Long-Term Training Programs, and by others concerned about staff development in rehabilitation. For many years, the IRI topics have been of great importance as a technical assistance resource to the rehabilitation community. The publications resulting from the IRI are widely distributed to the State VR agencies, State Rehabilitation Councils, RRCEPs, university rehabilitation counselor degree programs and consumer groups.

On May 2, 2004, members of the IRI Planning Committee will discuss the topics considered to be most relevant for study. This meeting occurs immediately prior to the National IRI Forum, which will be held on May 3-4, 2004, at the Key Bridge Marriott Hotel in Roslyn, Virginia. The topics selected for study during the next IRI cycle will be announced at the opening session of the Forum on Monday, May 3.

The criteria used by the IRI Planning Committee to select the topics for study are:

- 1. The topic is currently one of concern to a large number of State VR agencies.
- 2. It is a topic that can be completed within a year.
- 3. There are recognized experts or a body of literature that will be available to the primary study group.

Clearly, wide dissemination and utilization of the products resulting from the IRI are the goals of all concerned. Approximately 3,500 copies of each publication are printed, depending upon the level of interest expressed. IRI publications are also placed on the university coordinators' web sites, and are available from the National Clearing House on Rehabilitation Training Materials. It is the goal of the IRI Planning Committee to improve and enhance the use of the IRI publications by VR practitioners in all rehabilitation settings, and to ensure that the documents are meeting current training needs.

Attached is a list containing some of the IRI topics developed in recent years. Also attached is the form which you may use when submitting topics. Please submit suggested topics no later than February 29, 2004, to Charles Sadler, the RSA IRI Coordinator.

When submitting topics, please be sure that you have included sufficient information on the form so that appropriate decisions on the selection of topics can be made. After selecting the topics for study, the Commissioner will assign one to each of the two university coordinators.

Membership on an IRI study group is both a privilege and an honor, and we appreciate your continued interest and support of the IRI process.
