

## Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement Issues Second Call for Nominations for Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation

The Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement (OSM) is issuing is a second call for nominations for the bureau's 2012 Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Awards.

Abandoned Mine Land projects funded wholly or in part and completed by approved state or tribal programs are eligible for an award. This includes all types of reclamation, including coal, non-coal, high-priority, and emergency projects. Abandoned mine reclamation completed by citizen groups or other non-state/nontribal organizations are not eligible for these awards. One project may be submitted by each state or tribal program each year.

State and tribal Abandoned Mine Land programs must provide nominations directly to OSM Headquarters in Washington, D.C., by March 30, 2012.
