- * Transformation of NATO should continue,

 - Defence against **terrorism**,
 - Strengthen capabilities to defend against **cyber attacks**,
 - Augment and improve **CBRN** defence capabilities,
 - Examine options for addressing the increasing **missile threat**.

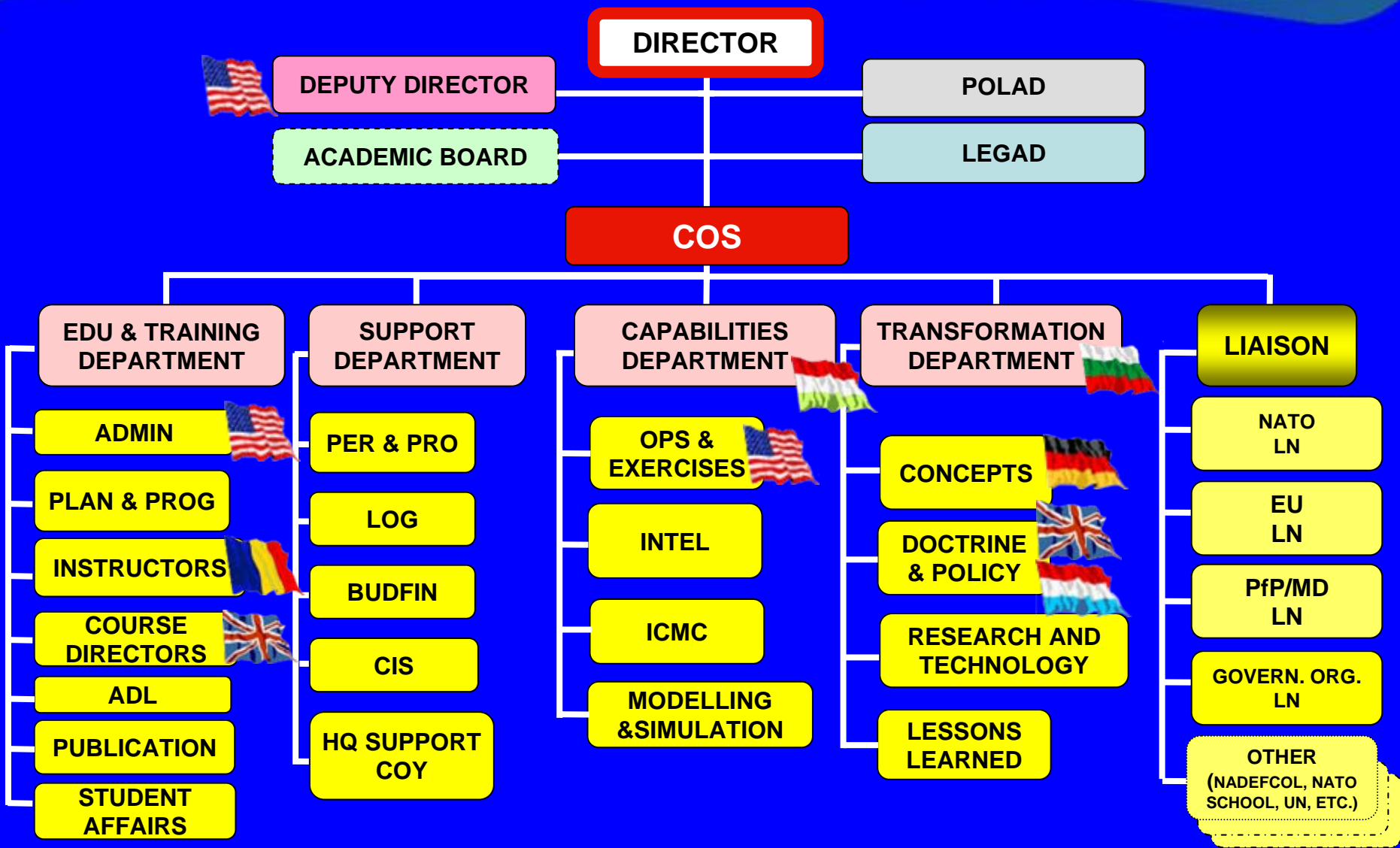
Mission
