NOAA SHIP OKEANOS EXPLORER

Today the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration commissions *Okeanos Explorer*, the first federal ship dedicated to systematically exploring the largely unknown ocean for the purpose of discovery and the advancement of knowledge. The commissioning ceremony is a maritime tradition in which the ship enters national service and is turned over to her commanding officer. Once commissioned, *Okeanos Explorer* will begin a period of crew training and field testing of exploration systems in the Pacific before embarking on its first operational field season in 2009.

Okeanos Explorer will systematically survey areas of the largely unknown ocean. When something unusual is detected, the ship will stop to deploy remotely-operated vehicles (ROVs), attached by a tether and capable of operating in depths to 6,000 meters. These and other sensors and systems will investigate the seafloor and characterize the water column. Together with shore-based exploration teams, scientists and technicians at sea will investigate an anomaly or discovery and develop enough data before moving on, to allow other scientists to plan for subsequent missions.

Okeanos Explorer will use telepresence – satellite and high-speed Internet-based technology – to enable scientists on shore at any of five Exploration Command Centers to participate in and even direct real-time exploration while viewing live images from the seafloor and accessing other ocean data. Those scientists, and others on call if a discovery is made at sea, will add their expertise to missions no matter where in the world the ship is located. Using satellite and standard Internet pathways, the ship will also share the excitement of discovery in real time with news reporters, students, and members of the general public.

As part of the NOAA fleet of research and survey ships and aircraft, *Okeanos Explorer* will be operated, managed, and maintained by officers of the NOAA Corps, one of the nation's seven uniformed services, and by wage mariners and civilians under the Office of Marine and Aviation Operations. The ship's exploration systems will be operated by NOAA's Office of Ocean Exploration and Research. Explore with us at
