All Participating States

CSFP is currently funded under a Continuing Resolution (CR) at a funding level prorated to \$171.409 million. The current CR funds the program through March 4, 2011. Although it remains to be seen what level of funding Congress will ultimately provide for the program for the full Fiscal Year (FY), FNS is making a tentative national caseload allocation of 604.931 slots, equal to last year's national total caseload level. This tentative national caseload allocation is contingent upon projected levels of recoveries and USDA donated foods being available to the program in 2011. Final caseload and administrative grants will be allocated once Congress takes final action on the FY 2011 appropriation, and may be higher or lower than these tentative assignments.

Tentative Caseload Assignments

As determined per CSFP regulations at 7 CFR Part 247, each State which participated in CSFP during 2010 is tentatively receiving base caseload, at a minimum, for the 2011 caseload cycle (January 1 through December 31). Additional tentative caseload is also being allocated to eligible State agencies which did not significantly exceed their 2010 caseload assignment on an average monthly basis. Under the current CR, FNS does not have sufficient funding to support the six States which submitted State Plans in 2010. Therefore, no new States are being added to the program at this time. Final caseload assignments may differ from these tentative assignments. The process for determining tentative caseload assignments is described below.

Base Caseload

CSFP regulations, at 7 CFR Part 247, determine how base caseload is calculated should sufficient resources be available. At this time, resources appear to be adequate to support each State's base caseload; however, FNS cannot guarantee caseload assignments until final FY 2011 appropriations are enacted.

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The seven States which began CSFP operations in 2010 – Arkansas, Delaware, Georgia, New Jersey, Oklahoma, and Utah – receive base caseload equal to their 2010 caseload assignments

To the extent resources are available, State agencies which were already participating in CSFP before 2010 may receive base caseload up to the total number of caseload slots assigned for the previous caseload cycle. For these States, base caseload for the 2011 caseload cycle equals the greater of:

(l) average monthly participation for FY 2010 (October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010); or

(2) average monthly participation for the last quarter of FY 2010 (July 1, 2010 through September 30, 2010).

However, base caseload for 2011 cannot be greater than total assigned caseload for 2010. Therefore, a State may receive fewer assigned base caseload slots in 2011 than its highest participation level in 2010, if the State's participation levels during the year exceeded its 2010 total caseload assignment.

Additional Caseload

Given large caseload increases during the 2010 caseload cycle, several States did not fully use their 2010 assigned caseload. As a result, 22,558 caseload slots are available for allocation as additional caseload at this time. This additional caseload is being allocated to those eligible State agencies which can most efficiently use it without significantly exceeding their caseload assignments, as demonstrated by past performance. Both States which began CSFP operations in 2010, and those which operated programs before, may be eligible for additional caseload, if they qualify.

Each State agency which used over 95 percent of its assigned caseload on an average monthly basis during either FY 2010 or the last quarter of FY 2010 is receiving additional caseload for 2011, if the State agency did not exceed 101 percent of its assigned caseload on an average monthly basis for FY 2010. Each of these States is being allocated a share of the total additional caseload slots available proportional to its base caseload, up to its total additional caseload request. Where a proportional share exceeds any State's additional caseload request, the remaining caseload is being allocated proportionally to the remaining States.

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Caseload Use in 2011

The State agencies are responsible for ensuring that program participation does not exceed their caseload assignment on an average monthly basis. At the same time, State agencies must attempt to fully use their 2011 caseload assignment.

In order to efficiently use caseload in this manner, States must monitor participation carefully each month. Per CSFP regulations at 7 CFR Part 247, base caseload and additional caseload allocations for 2012, to the extent resources permit, will be contingent on each State's caseload use in FY 2011.

Because base and additional caseload in 2012 are contingent on FY 2011 participation, States receiving additional caseload during 2011 should work to use available caseload as early as possible during 2011, while keeping in mind that they are responsible for ensuring that program participation does not exceed the State's caseload assignment on an average monthly basis.

Administrative Grant per Assigned Caseload Slot

The Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973, as amended, mandates an annualized grant per assigned caseload slot to be adjusted each year to reflect inflation. The mandatory grant per assigned caseload slot for FY 2011 is \$68.28.

The attached chart displays tentative caseload assignments and administrative grants. Administrative resources for use over the remainder of the FY are subject to apportionment by the Office of Management and Budget. We will keep you informed regarding the availability of administrative funds.
