ARTISAVON Cooperative	2005-2010	\$239,293	Manufacturing (Natural Soap Products): This 14-member cooperative produces export-quality, natural soap products. USADF funds are being used to scale up production which will enable ARTISAVON to compete in regional and international markets, resulting in higher sales revenues.
Coopérative des Vulgarisateurs du Soja et des Foyers Améliorés (CVSFEB)	2005-2010	\$247,898	Food Processing (Soy Products): This cooperative is engaged in the production and marketing of soy-based foods throughout Benin. The USADF investment is enabling CVSFEB to upgrade its production and transportation capabilities so that it can expand its share of domestic and regional export markets.
Association pour la Promotion et l'Appui au Développement de Micro Entreprises (PADME)	2008-2013	\$249,591	Microfinance: PADME provides accessible services to low-income individuals and microenterprises in urban and rural Benin. The USADF grant will be used to expand a successful pilot program which combines microfinance services with health education for rural clients.
ADJIDO Economic Interest Group	2008-2013	\$153,927	Livestock (Rabbits): The members of ADJIDO raise rabbits to meet local demand for meat following the outbreak of avian flu in Benin. The USADF investment will allow ADJIDO to increase its breeding stock and infrastructure, and to scale up its provision of rabbit breeding extension services to local youth.
Société Pleine Vie Bénin (SPVB)	2008-2010	\$92,957	Agriculture (Rice and Vegetables): SPVB operates a small outgrower business which works with village farmer cooperatives to produce and market rice and fresh produce. The company will use the USADF investment to construct an irrigation system for its new production site, and to provide agricultural inputs and training to its partner cooperatives.
La Perle d'Atacora	2009-2012	\$219,017	Tourism (Lodge): La Perle d'Atacora is an association of tourism service providers in a village known for its unique traditional "Tata Somba" architecture. The USADF grant will finance the construction of an ecotourism lodge in a Tata Somba building, and the provision of technical assistance and training in hospitality and tourism service management to the association.
L'Union Communale des Producteurs d'Ouidah (UCP Ouidah)	2009-2011	\$99,520	Agriculture (Vegetables): UCP Ouidah is a union of 226 smallholder vegetable farmers. The grant will enable the union to acquire irrigation equipment for its members, and to complete a technical and business training program designed to improve the professionalism of vegetable production and marketing.

Union Communale des Organisations Professionnelles des Eleveurs de Ruminants d'Abomey (UCOPER Abomey)	2009-2012	\$186,010	Livestock (Cattle Market): UCOPER Abomey is a cooperative association of low-income village livestock herding groups that manages the Abomey livestock market. The association will use the USADF grant to upgrade the market facilities, increasing revenue generated by attracting greater numbers of livestock traders to the market.
Union Communale des Organisations Professionnelles des Eleveurs de Ruminants de Bassila (UCOPER Bassila)	2009-2012	\$188,803	Livestock (Cattle Market): UCOPER Bassila will use the USADF grant to equip its livestock market with the basic facilities needed to attract traders from outside the commune, foster additional growth of the livestock market, and increase its members' incomes.
Union Communale des Producteurs de Coton (UCPC) de Djidja	2009-2011	\$100,722	Agriculture (Corn and Soybeans): UCPC Djidja is an association of cotton producers working to address the environmental problems associated with cotton cultivation and the steady decline of world cotton prices. The association will use USADF funds to procure extension services to its members to facilitate a transition to diversified corn and soybean cultivation.
Union Communale des Producteurs de Zogbodomey (UCP Zogbodomey)	2009-2012	\$168,609	Agriculture (Corn and Soybeans): UCP Zogbodomey, a large association of smallholder corn and soybean farmers, will use the USADF grant to establish a warrantage credit facility in partnership with a local bank. The warrantage facility will help UCP Zogbodomey members store their production to take advantage of the market opportunity to get higher prices later in the season
Conseil Regional des Riziculteurs du Mono-Couffo (CRR)	2009-2011	\$74,249	Agriculture (Rice): This union of rice farmers will use the USADF investment to purchase a set of rice hulling machines and train its members on rice processing techniques, facilitating production of higher-value hulled white rice.
ONG Agbenyigan	2009-2012	\$101,704	Agriculture (Corn, Cassava and Cowpeas): This rural nonprofit association will use USADF funds to provide extension services and equipment needed to upgrade members' post-harvest processing and storage capabilities, increasing incomes by making their products more competitive.
Groupement Maraîcher PAHA-PATI de Kaki-Koka	2009-2011	\$60,783	Agriculture (Vegetables): This small vegetable farmers' cooperative will use a USADF grant to upgrade its irrigation system and acquire business training needed to expand production and sales.
Association Communale des Producteurs de Pomme de Terre de Pehunco (ACPPT)	2010-2012	\$ 80,734	Agriculture (Potatoes): ACPPT develops the potato production sector in the commune of Pehunco, located in the poorest department of Benin. ADF funds will increase GFTPAK production of peanuts for oil extraction; increase its production capacity through mechanization of the operations of shelling and pressing; establish a working capital fund to purchase a larger quantity of raw material; and build the capacity of its members in financial management, literacy, and cooperative association management.
Cercle de Recherche et d'Appui pour un Développement Durable (CRADD)	2010-2012	\$ 88,112	Food Processing (Locust Beans): CRADD supports local groups by providing training in processing and marketing of local agricultural products. ADF funds will provide labor-saving processing equipment, fuel-efficient ovens, working capital and a warehouse. These inputs will allow five women's groups to increase the profitability of their afitin production activities by reducing the costs of raw material, fuel and labor.
Groupement villageois d'éleveurs de lapin Houénoussou	2010-2013	\$ 104,250	Livestock (Rabbits): Houénoussou was established to improve members' incomes by promoting rabbit production. ADF funds will improve their production facilities with the construction of production sheds, a well, a warehouse, a small slaughterhouse, and provide training in rabbit production, veterinary care, and small business management. This will allow Houénoussou to be more responsive to member needs, improve services, and position it for further growth.
Association Union Fait la Force des Personnes Handicapées de Bohicon	2010-2012	\$ 91,144	Agriculture (Vegetables): This association advances the interests of persons with physical disabilities in Bohicon. ADF funds will build a well and irrigation system to irrigate a new vegetable garden; construct an office on the new site; and provide training in vegetable production, water management, fertilization and advocacy. This will allow members with disabilities to combat poverty by engaging in revenue-generating activities.
Groupement Féminin Kpondéhou de Zakpota	2010-2012	\$ 72,989	Storage (Maize and Peanuts): Kpondéhou provides savings and credit services, and coordinates group production of palm and peanut oil. ADF funds will enable them to purchase and store reserves of peanuts at harvest time and provide improved processing facilities and equipment. This will enable the group to improve their productivity and the overall quality of their products.
Union Communale des Producteurs d'Agbangnizoun	2010-2015	\$ 179,241	Agriculture (Maize): UCP Agbangnizoun advances the interests of agricultural producers in Agbangnizoun Commune. ADF funds will develop a network of model farmers using improved cultural techniques and facilitate members' access to lower cost production and guarantee loans that will help members reduce their production costs and enable them to hold their produce until prices improve after the harvest season.
Association pour le Développement Economique Social Culturel et l'Autopromotion (ADESCA)	2010-2013	\$ 237,650	Agriculture (Vegetables): ADESCA provides extension and training services to smallholder farmers and women's groups in Kalalé Commune. ADF funds will install solar-powered drip irrigation systems on the groups' vegetable plots, purchase high-yielding seeds and fertilizer, and provide technical assistance in vegetable cultivation best practices. This will substantially increase the groups' vegetable production capacity and generate higher cash incomes for the members' households.

Overview: Country program established 1989. Two programs in Small and Medium Enterprise development and in Participatory Development Methodologies - Community Initiatives. SME Program focus is on the development of small and medium-sized enterprises, including a recent focus on the San, a traditionally marginalized group in Botswana. PDM program focus is the use of participatory methodologies to promote broad based community development. Support is provided to community level interest groups to help groups determine needs and methods for overcoming constraints. Both programs are strengthened through a strategic partnership with the Government of Botswana. Current portfolio comprises 24 investment projects, including one cooperative agreement. Total commitment is US\$ 3.12 million.

San Arts & Crafts (SAAC)	2005-2010	\$218,208	Manufacturing (Traditional Arts & Handmade Home Décor): SAAC represents over 800 San artisans. USADF funds are being used to purchase necessary equipment, acquire storage space and expand marketing activities. This will increase SAAC's operational capacity and improve the services provided to artisans.
Sankuyo Tshwaragano Management Trust (STMT)	2007-2012	\$246,838	Services (Eco-tourism): STMT manages the Santawani Eco-tourism Lodge, one of the oldest camps in Botswana. After receiving an EDI, STMT has been selected for an EEI grant to help secure a joint venture partner, Lodges of Botswana. USADF funds will support the trust in reconstructing and expanding the lodge facilities; this investment will be complimented by training and management assistance provided by Lodges of Botswana.
Mmadinare Multipurpose Cooperative Society (MMCS)	2008-2013	\$249,986	Livestock (Dairy Products): Located in the town of Selebi-Phikwe, Mmadinare Multipurpose Cooperative Society, Limited (MMCSL) is a unique dairy processing facility which not only purchases milk from its farmer members, but also has its own herd and dairy ranch which provides a steady supply of milk. As a follow-up to the successful completion of an EDI grant, this EEI grant will enable the Cooperative to enhance and fully utilize existing productive assets and meet the expanding market demand.
Kgagodi Development Association (KDA)	2008-2013	\$86,609	PDM Program - Agriculture (Vegetable Farming): KDA was formed with the objective to involve Kgagodi village community members in the discussion of issues affecting their well being and to mobilize the community in mapping the way forward. Members will undertake income generation farming that will not only create income but also improve community access to fresh vegetables.
Mosema Conservation Trust	2008-2011	\$74,167	PDM Program - Manufacturing (Traditional Leatherworks and Handicrafts): The Mosema Conservation Trust is an independent public interest organization committed to promoting natural resource conservation and sustainable development in the Moiyabana Village. The project aims to build the capacity of two interest groups, one producing leatherwork products and one handicraft products.
Diloro Development Association	2008-2011	\$103,442	PDM Program - Manufacturing (Grain Milling): Diloro Development Association was formed as a community initiative to help residents of Diloro village engage in development initiatives to reduce poverty levels in the village. This USADF funded project will establish a milling plant in the Diloro village where the Association will offer subsistence farmers in the area a market for grain produced, employment opportunities to its members, and access to milling facilities and milled products in the village.
Mogapinyana Youth Association	2008-2011	\$97,791	PDM Program - Manufacturing (Small Metal Work): Community members determined that the core problem facing the village was youth unemployment, which is a result of low exposure to training, low skills, low initial capital and low capital investment. With USADF financial assistance, the Association will address this core problem by producing mesh wire for fencing, door and window frames and steel gates for sale, and further expanding production once technical skills are improved.

Tamasane Development Association	2008-2011	\$129,279	PDM Program - Livestock (Goats and Chickens): With the help of USADF funds, the Association will establish a community farm to raise sheep, goats and poultry in sufficient quantities to sell live animals and eggs at the local market. The project will provide jobs for the members of the Association and income from the sale of goats, chickens and eggs.
Babina Tshipa Development Association	2009-2011	\$99,872	PDM Program - Livestock (Sheep, Goats, and Pigs): The Babina Tshipa Development Association (BTDA) was formed as a community initiative to help residents in Mabuo engage in development initiatives to reduce poverty levels in their village. BTDA is establishing a community farm in Mabuo to raise sheep, goats, and pigs to meet the local market need for small stock. The proceeds from the sale of livestock will be shared by the 56 participants in the BTDA project.
Ghantsi Craft Trust	2009-2011	\$99,536	Manufacturing (Traditional Arts & Crafts): Ghantsi Craft Trust is a community-based organization set up for the benefit of residents of 15 rural settlements in Ghantsi and Kgalagadi Districts, which are inhabited by the San. The primary goal of Ghantsi Craft Trust is to contribute to the socio-economic empowerment of the San to help them take charge of their own development by providing income-generating opportunities in the form of craft production, raising awareness of the San identity, and re-engineering production systems.
Thobaaxaa Community Trust	2009-2011	\$99,702	PDM Program - Agriculture (Vegetable Farming and Pigs): The Thobaaxaa Community Trust was formed as a community initiative to help the residents of Sehunou village to reduce poverty levels. Having identified lack of financial resources, drought, and poor nutrition as the community's major challenges, the trust decided to start a piggyery and a horticulture project to address these issues. The project will supply Sehunou residents with access to commercial land, technical assistance, financial management skills, marketing, project management, and planning skills.
Chobe Enclave Conservation Trust	2009-2014	\$242,129	Services (Eco-tourism): After completing an EDI grant for organizational development and planning, Chobe Enclave Conservation Trust (CECT) was awarded an EEI grant to establish the upmarket Ngoma Lodge through a joint venture arrangement. Through the joint venture, the community will benefit from direct job creation, as jobs will go directly to community members from a range of projects related to the lodge, including airport transport, freelance guides, and village tours.
Gojwane Youth Poultry (GYP)	2009-2011	\$99,574	PDM Program - Livestock (Chickens) Acute unemployment among youth in the San village of Gojwane prompted the village to form GYP. The project prepares GYP for expansion in the poultry production business: The grant provides funds for an office so that management can prepare financial documents, coordinate member activities, and facilitate training sessions. The project also helps GYP build and equip a new poultry shed to increase and diversify its stock of chicks.
Mowana Trust	2009-2011	\$99,564	PDM Program - Agriculture (Vegetables and Chickens) Village members formed Mowana Trust (MT) to promote social, cultural, and economic development in Mokokwana and Mosweu villages. After community consultation, MT identified horticulture and poultry production as the most promising development activities. The project helps MT to manage and grow its horticulture and poultry production by establishing an office and engaging a consultant for assistance establishing the Trust.

Robelela Youth Poultry	2009-2011	\$101,730	PDM Program - Livestock (Chickens) In the San village of Robelela, a poultry production enterprise will create employment opportunities for village members. A preliminary market analysis showed several potential buyers for RYP's products, but RYP lacked the capacity to grow into a viable business. The project will train project participants in enterprise administration and business planning. The project will also fund infrastructure improvement for RYP's poultry production facilities, and train members in effective marketing practices.
Serule Community Resources Development Trust	2009-2011	\$101,286	PDM Program - Manufacturing (Handmade Pottery) The women's group in SCRDT seek to turn local clay into high quality pottery products for sale in the local market. The project will help SCRDT enter the pottery business by improving business management and technical production capacity, outfitting SCRDT with an office, and helping SCRDT construct and equip a work shed, show room, and storage space for the women to paint, glaze, and showcase their pottery.
Huiku Community-Based Natural Resources Conservation Trust	2009-2010	\$99,448	Services (Eco-tourism): Huiku Trust is a community-based organization composed of 800 inhabitants living in Qabo and Grootlaagte villages in western Botswana. Huiku Trust seeks to capitalize on Botswana's growing tourism industry by establishing an ecotourism campsite. The project will build Huiku Trust's capacity to manage a sustainable tourism business by creating a management team trained in accounting, business practices, and governance.
Komku Trust	2009-2011	\$96,127	Livestock (Beef): Komku Trust has helped seven San communities in western Botswana to organize into five cattle groups. The project will include training and exposure of members to modern ranch and livestock management training, and training of Komku Trust and cattle group leaders in governance and strategic planning. The project will result in a livestock management plan to guide members in the application of modern livestock care.
Kgagodi Remmogo Basadi Association (KRBA)	2009-2014	\$99,369	PDM Program - Manufacturing (Honey) KRBA is a women's group in eastern Botswana, where drought, unemployment, and illiteracy cause severe marginalization of the population. KRBA intends to commence beekeeping operations in order to tap into growing demand for honey. The project improves KRBA's management capacity by equipping an office and providing training and financial management, funding community-wide workshops, and providing materials and training in beekeeping operations.
Boravast Community Resource Management Trust	2009-2011	\$99,530	Livestock (Sheep and Goats): Boravast is a community-based organization composed of 1,500 San residents in four remote villages in southwestern Botswana. Many residents of Boravast own small stock, but individually struggle to reach regional markets for mutton and wool. The project seeks to improve members' income from mutton and wool sales by helping them procure more small stock, improve husbandry skills, and coordinate marketing activities.
Modise Development Society (MDS)	2009-2011	\$97,690	PDM Program - Livestock (Poultry and Piggery): MDS is a community based organization in Lerala village, where poverty, illiteracy, and unemployment levels are high, especially among youth and women. Several participatory development workshops helped community members to identify poultry and piggery as potentially strong income generating activities for the community. The two year grant will fund improvements to financial systems, training, a pig shelter, day old chicks and a chicken house.
Fate Hood Association	2009-2011	\$98,304	PDM Program - Agriculture (Fodder): FHA helps youth, women, small scale farmers, and other marginalized people engage in income generating activities by mobilizing human resources, organizing training sessions, and forging connections with outside groups. A group of small scale farmers identified fodder production as a means to secure stable incomes. The project enables FHA to become an effective fodder supplier by improving its financial management, installing a management team, and procuring seeds, fertilizers, and equipment.
Botswelole Centre (trading as Thamaga Pottery)	2009-2014	\$237,447	Manufacturing (Handmade Pottery): Thamaga Pottery is known for producing high-quality ceramic tableware that is dishwasher and microwave-safe. However, Thamaga Pottery does not currently have the capacity to meet market demand. This expansion grant will help Thamaga Pottery increase its production capacity to meet market demand in Botswana and the regional export market.

Kuru Community Trust	2009-2011	\$149,092	<p>Agriculture (Vegetables) and Manufacturing (Crafts): KCT supports economic self-sufficiency among the San by training members in income generating activities, supplying electricity, water and maintenance to community projects, and supporting market access. The project helps KCT learn community support skills through training and practical experience running a horticulture project and a leatherworking project, which will involve youth of D'kar village. The youth will be organized around sports teams, and then trained in entrepreneurial skills and leatherworking techniques. Finally, KCT will create business advisory and counseling services to advise community members, develop community governance standards, and establish formal financial management procedures.</p>

Ponssomtenga Women Traditional Cloth Weavers Association (AFEPO)	2009-2011	\$98,362	Cooperative (Artisans): AFEPO is an association of 25 women cloth weavers who wish to build capacities in technical and managerial skills in order to generate income and improve their livelihoods. The women weave a wide assortment of market products: table cloths, bed sheets, bed covers, scarves, and pillows. USADF funds will provide equipment and training, expand market opportunities, build administrative and financial capacity, and create a stronger structure for the group.
ECLA Cashew Nut Processing and Export	2009-2012	\$94,048	Food Processing (Cashew Nuts): ECLA employs 182 processors from the rural community of Toussiana in cashew nut processing. USADF funds will provide equipment, training and assistance in technical and management skills, and allow ECLA to expand to meet market demands. Funding will also help create several micro businesses for rural women.
Association for the Promotion of Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, and Water Supply (APAEH)	2009-2014	\$94,048	Food Production (Organic Sesame): APAEH represents 4,116 sesame farmers and pastoralists in the Sebba township.
