Dear Stakeholders,

With our Terra Nova Standardized Testing coming up in March for Grades 3, 4 and 5 I wanted to make note of the new schedule that we will be implementing at Feltwell Elementary School. In the past we have tested in one week on five consecutive days. The order we followed was Reading on Monday, Language Arts on Tuesday, Mathematics on Wednesday, Science on Thursday and Social Studies on Friday. Our new schedule will be as follows: Tuesday March 12-0845-1045-Science Wednesday March 13-0845-1045-Mathematics Thursday March 14-0845-1045-Social Studies Tuesday March19-0845-1045-Reading Wednesday March 20-0845-1045-Language Arts

As a faculty and staff we have developed a testing schedule that is more relaxed, we think it may reduce test anxiety and fatigue for our students and it will separate the harder parts of the test so that they are not given on back to back days. We believe that this new schedule will give our students the absolute best chance of success and achieving at their highest level.

In a newspaper article written several years ago, David Morgan claimed that he had the only snowman lost to enemy action during the war. In November of 1941, when he was 4 years old, he was visiting his father, Clifford Morgan, an Air Force officer at the control tower. Men from his father's unit had built a snowman for him, but during an air raid the snowman was destroyed. Mr. Morgan thought his snowman deserved some recognition for his sacrifice and suggested the DSM (Distinguished Snowman's Medal).

Finally, after over 70 years the Snowman got his due! The class will try to contact Mr. Morgan to give him the good news.





I have been discussing the upcoming Terra Nova test with all the 3rd-5th grade students during our counseling lessons. We are making changes to the testing schedule this year. We will begin on Monday March 11th with the practice test and will continue testing on Tuesday – Thursday (March 12-14). The next week, we will test on Tues. and Wed. (March 19-20). We begin testing at 8:45 a.m., so it is very important that all children are present and arrive at school on time each morning for this test.

\*\*\*Please mark these dates on your family calendar so you'll be able to avoid making appointments for mornings of these 2 weeks.

The Terra Nova is a standardized test that measures student achievement in the areas of Reading, Language Arts, Math, Social Studies, and Science. It gives us a "snap shot" of the skills and knowledge your child has acquired at this point, as well as identifying academic areas that need improvement. Teachers use this information to help shape their instruction.

Whenever bringing your child to school after the school day begins or if you are picking them up early, please be sure to sign them in or out at the Main Office.


If you are picking your child up after school, please arrange to meet them on the playground by the wooden fence which is next to the parent parking lot.

## Dressing for the Winter

Recess and outdoor play are important for our children throughout all the seasons – even winter. But we also want our children to be safe and that means making sure they are dressed appropriately for the weather. Here are some guidelines we have established here at Feltwell Elementary School for the well being of your children:

Above 60(F)/16(C) degrees – No coat is needed but make sure your child is dressed in layers.

Between 32(F)/0(C) to 59(F)/15(C) degrees – Your child must have a coat and must take it to the playground.

Below 32(F)/0(C) degrees – Your child must wear a coat, hat and gloves.

It is always a good idea for you to put your child's name inside of his/her coat, hat and gloves just in case an item gets left outside!
