# Sky Soldiers lend support for **Operation Saber Junction in Germany**

**GERMANY** – The 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team sent a contingent of Sky Soldiers from Vicenza to Germany in support of exercise Saber Junction 2012 as augmentees performing Observer Coach Trainer duties to facilitate the 2nd Cavalry Regiment as U.S. and 18 partner nations train on joint, multinational operations.

About 6,000 participants took part in supporting, observing, shooting, moving and communicating, giving United States Army Europe and 18 of its allied partners from armies from around the world the chance to conduct tough, realistic training that pushed the envelope and exposed the participants to everything from tactical, strategic and operational challenges to combating criminals and engaging with the media. According to Observer-Coach Trainer leaders, this massive exercise was unique, as what they experienced in pre-rotation Situational Training Exercises carried over and impacted how they were evaluated throughout the entire spectrum of this exercise; the 2nd Cavalry Regiment will be picking up where the 173rd left off in last year's rotation; so the transition of left seat right seat is to simulate 2CR having taken over the reigns from the 173rd ABCT who just cleared the Area of Operation two weeks prior, according to the Operations Order.

"I am excited to be here," said Staff Sgt. James Jenkins, a 16-year veteran of the Army who is performing as a Military Intelligence Observer Coach Trainer for this exercise, which is heralded as covering the most expansive training area in decades. "It's a huge operation and being an augmentee here gives me and my fellow Sky Soldiers a chance to bring our experience to the table and I expect to learn a whole lot while we are here."

The amount of real estate (space) and wide array of military personnel involved required the Joint Multinational Readiness Center's OCT teams to need additional support. Units like the 173rd were contacted throughout Europe and tasked to assist

# **DoDDS-Europe director visits**

DoDDS-Europe director Dr. Nancy Bresell visited Vicenza last week for meetings with school principals and labor union representatives.

Packing an iPad and a laptop in her travel gear, Bresell participated in instructional leadership training for all 18 principals in the Mediterranean District (which includes all three Vicenza community schools), joint training with labor union representatives and a meeting with the head of the labor organization.

"The Vicenza community is a great place. I can tell you that our teachers love it here. You have really good students, really good children. You've got a command structure that's devoted to making things good for families. I think they're doing a fantastic job," she said.

Top items on Bresell's educational agenda for the current school year are the Department of Defense Education Activity-wide adoption of Common Core State Standards, training teachers with the necessary skills sets to set the pace for the classroom of the future and building a 100 percent wireless teaching environment for students, she said.

"Probably the number one initiative in our system is the adoption of the Common Core State Standards," said Bresell. CCSS is a set of educational standards for language arts and mathematics instruction that have been adopted by 45 states, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and DoDEA.

An advantage for DoD students comes if they return to one of these 45 states.

"Parents will know what to expect because they will see the same curriculum standards," said Bresell.

"We are in the process now of looking at our current standards for those subject areas and comparing them to the Common Core standards, and then seeing what we have to do differently," she said.

The major differences with DoDEA's current standards are not so much with content, but rather with synthesizing and applying them across the curriculum, Bresell said. DoDDS-Europe will first roll the program out on a pilot basis probably during the 2013-2014 school year.

"It's going to be a little bit different," she said. "This year is a year of awareness, so next school year we may roll it out in certain areas or we may begin systemwide," she said.

Her second main focus is on ensuring that DoDDS teachers have the requisite set of skills to prepare students to meet the challenges of the digitally connected

"We're already using a lot of the strategies, but we want to do some professional development for our teachers. We are building new schools to 21stcentury design standards. Here, Vicenza High School will be one," she said.

DoDDS-Europe is evaluating its present infrastructure with an eye toward making the necessary changes to configure the digital learning environment.

"We started at a very basic level with eight high schools, giving all of their students their own laptop computers and it was pretty successful," Bresell said.

While students may clamor for iPads of their own, they are receiving laptops, she said.

"For our purposes right now, the laptop is the better vehicle. We can load textbooks on it, the kids can actually do a lot of work on it. I mean, programs that you can't get on the iPad that our students use in school," Bresell said.

To that end DoDDS-Europe has already increased bandwidth across all its schools in Europe, she said.

"That was huge. We have our own Internet service provider. And we purchased the increased bandwidth and then went about doing the things that had to be done to get it in place," said Bresell.

A second major infrastructure goal is to have all schools wirelessly connected by the end of the current calendar year. Vicenza Elementary and Middle Schools, opened for the 2011-2012 school year, are already 100 percent wireless.

"Even Vicenza High School was almost wireless. That's how they got the laptops last year, because we'd already started the wireless install and they were at 50 percent," she said.

students and teachers with rich educational resources, said Bresell, while noting that teachers and schools are engaged in a delicate balancing act in terms of overseeing appropriate Internet use at school while refraining from policing students' online behavior in their private lives.

"We wouldn't have the ability to, but certainly when things come to our attention, most likely school-level attention, then they deal with it," said Bresell. "But then you are on a line here, the same with other The digital classroom connects activities kids do outside of school, that

have no connection to school."

Educators realize that parents in any given community possess different degrees of familiarity with the online world, but are willing to help parents exercise the oversight and control that young people need, she said.

"It varies greatly. My advice would be if you are a parent: you have to make yourself aware. Your kid can't be on the computer and tell you that you can't see what he's doing," Bresell said. "And there are dangers, even if it's just dangers of influence."

assist with contingencies of Soldiers from their respective commands for the purposes of coaching, mentoring and advising 2CR In the exercise scenario, 2CR will be providing security, stability and communication assistance to the fictitious country of Atropia, bolstering its government and military capabilities to aid them in dealing with the precise kinds of tactical operations that USAREUR and its partners forecast might be scenarios they could potentially face in future real world operations.

According to OC leaders, these are all situations that in the course of the next 10-15 years, these warriors might have to deal with.

"They are definitely going to be working outside their comfort zones," said Staff Sgt. Emmanuel Olascoaga of Chosen Company, of the 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment, 173rd ABCT. As an Observer Controller, we are here to help them work through their various challenges, and while we cannot solve any

problems for them, we can help support sharpening their tactical skills." them, enforce the rules out here, enforce safety guidelines and aid them with doctrine and method options that they can draw from to have a successful experience here. We want them to succeed. It's not about criticizing these warriors; it boils down to telling them what they are doing right, as well as making them aware of some opportunities that they may have missed along the way to prepare them for what they may be facing in the near

"No one can do it alone," said Olascoaga, an infantryman, who was part of the contingent of Sky Soldiers here, supporting Saber Junction. "In terms of being able to shoot, move and communicate, what better ways to communicate here in Europe, as part of USAREUR than to do so in real time, right beside your brothers in Arms from a number of different partner nation armies? It forces us to understand each other's styles and methods of doing things and the Soldiers are getting a great crash course in international relations, while

Saber Junction's tasking of these Sky Soldiers has given these members of the "Herd" a chance to share their expertise from a wide array of Military Occupational Specialties (MOS's) in a training scenario that is more vast and complex than anything they have ever seen before. The Paratroopers from the 173rd agreed that this was an excellent chance to see the true, core mission of USAREUR come to fruition.

"I expected long days and lots of challenges," said Army Staff Sgt. Michael Ford, who works in the military intelligence section, at the 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment, 173rd ABCT. "The permanent personnel staff here at the OCT schoolhouse did a great job of bringing us up to speed. When you think about it, this is where the rubber meets the road for a noncommissioned officer training troops and working side by side these warriors — giving them the tools they will need to handle whatever they will encounter."

# Soldiers become resilient through creating artwork

difficulties and challenges they face.

Developing resiliency or one's ability to adapt to adversity is an important function for Soldiers returning from deployments. Supervisory Arts Specialist Michelle Sterkowicz introduced a "Resiliency through Art" program at the Family and MWR Arts and Crafts Center in Vicenza in order to help Soldiers with the

"Art therapy can assist with the transition of moving to a new country, help one cope with post-traumatic stress disorder and strongly benefit Soldiers and Families within military installations in dealing with everyday military life challenges," said Sterkowicz.

The program is based on art therapy techniques Sterkowicz studied through the *Scuole di Specializzazione in Arteterapia* (Specialized School of Art Therapy) in Pordenone. She stresses that the program is not about becoming an artist, but it is about trying something new and learning the endless creative possibilities in the world of art to find a medium that is comfortable and inviting whether it be making a collage, decorating a cane with images and words or working with clay.

"Many first timers to Resiliency through Art will immediately admit that they haven't used a colored pencil or worked with clay since kindergarten; this is often a way of them expressing their lack of confidence in the arts as well as their lack of interest," said Sterkowicz.

Spc. Kevin Taylor, Warrior Transition Unit, said when he first heard about the course that he thought

he was not an arts and crafts type person, but once Sterkowicz introduced him to clay, he was hooked.

"Once I gave it a chance, I realized I loved making things with my hands," said Taylor. "Growing up, my older brother was the engineer type and my younger brother was the artist type — I was the sports type."

Taylor joked that when he was a young child and living in Arizona, the closest thing he got to being artistic with clay was when it rained in the desert he would cover himself with mud.

"Working with the clay reminds me of the simple feeling of playing in the mud," said Taylor. "It's amazing that you can do small stuff like this program that makes you feel better and that you can carry that good feeling with you throughout the day."

The program received a \$1,000 donation from Vicenza Community Club to go towards funding art materials, Sterkowicz said.

"The goal is for the Arts & Crafts Center to continue Resiliency through Art programs using art therapy techniques as long as the community continues to support the program and become a model program for other Army installations to follow," said Sterkowicz.

A formalized Resiliency through Art program will especially benefit redeploying Soldiers as they adjust to life after their combat experiences, according to Sterkowicz.

# JAG offers assistance when considering a divorce

The process of obtaining a divorce, especially while stationed overseas, can be long and traumatic, and can affect spouses, children, and coworkers in different ways. Before making any drastic decisions, you should consider counseling. Counseling can not only help you save your marriage (as long as both parties want to work at the relationship), but counseling can also help you avoid the same problems should you enter into another marriage in the future. Most important, counseling may enable you to work with your spouse to minimize the trauma to your children. If your marriage, however, is beyond repair, Army legal assistance offices provide advice and assistance in divorce cases to Soldiers, retirees, civilian employees (overseas), and their Family members.

There are no American courts in Italy where a divorce can be processed, so obtaining a divorce in Italy can be a bit more complicated than in the U.S. Most couples will not use the Italian courts to get divorces unless one of them is an Italian citizen. Divorce in Italy is a lengthy and expensive procedure.

It can take as long as five years to obtain a divorce in Italy and requires hiring a private attorney. Most persons file for divorce in the U.S., in a state where one of the parties is a legal resident. The divorce process will usually require hiring a private attorney and taking a trip back to the U.S. to attend the divorce proceeding.

If you have already separated from your spouse, it is important to point out Army Regulation 608-99, which imposes a support requirement on Soldiers separated from Family members. While compliance with the regulation is mandatory, Army commanders can also issue an order to a Soldier to comply with the regulatory support requirement.

Much of our assistance in divorce cases involves negotiating separation agreements. A separation agreement is a contract between the husband and the wife and establishes the rights, obligations, and responsibilities from your marriage. A separation agreement can resolve many of the same issues addressed by a divorce decree — division of marital property, spousal and child support, child custody and visitation, and allocation of martial debts. No one can be forced to sign a separation agreement. The husband and wife must enter into the agreement voluntarily, and the husband and wife must agree to all the terms in the agreement.

Army legal assistance attorneys can advise you about the issues and procedures in your case and prepare a separation agreement, if one is desired. Legal assistance attorneys, however, are prohibited from representing you in any civilian court or drafting documents on your behalf which will be submitted to a civilian court. Their office can also assist you in obtaining a private attorney. Since the JAG office can only advise one party to a dispute, the other spouse often obtains legal advice from the Camp Darby legal assistance office or a private attorney.

**U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza Child Supervision Policy:** Children in the ages of newborn to 4 years old must be supervised at all times. Children in the ages of 5 years old through 10 years old may be left to play in a park/yard with immediate access to adult




supervision (i.e. sight and hearing distance) Children in the grades first
through fifth grade may walk to and from DoD sanctioned events alone. Parents must consider the
distance to the event and the maturity of the child. Children in these ages may not walk between
Villaggio and post or to off post quarters. Children in the ages of 9 years old to 10 years may
be left unattended in a vehicle with the vehicle off (no keys inside) and the hand brake applied.
(i.e. When picking up the mail or paying for gasoline). Children in the ages of 11 years old and
12 years old may be left home alone for up to six hours in a 24-hour period; with ready access

12 years old may be left home alone for up to six hours in a 24-hour period; with ready access to adult supervision (i.e. at minimum telephone access and telephone number of additional adult supervisors.) Children in the age of 11 years old may babysit siblings for up to 3 hours with ready access to adult supervision and with CYSS and Red Cross babysitting training. Children in the age of 12 years old may babysit for up to 6 hours, but not over night.
