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Ribbon cut on new obstacle course

The ribbon was cut on the Caserma Ederle Conditioning Obstacle Course Aug. 14 by the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, the Vicenza Corps of Engineers Office, and Regional Training Support Division Italy. The obstacle course is an \$85,000 Joint Multinational Training Command funded Range and Training Land Program project which provides a new Live Training facility for Soldiers and units stationed in Vicenza.

The JMTC RTLP program is managed by means of a Range Develop Planning process which incorporates input from all stakeholders in creating a plan to build and maintain US Army standard ranges and Live Training facilities for units stationed in U.S. Army Europe. The obstacle course project was first proposed in the RDP by Lt. Col. Matt MacFarlane when he was the commander of 1-503rd Infantry Battalion. MacFarlane's intent in making the proposal was to create a training option aligned with the August 2010 change to Army fitness training doctrine which established an Army Physical Readiness Training System. From Training Circular 3-22.20, the Army Physical Readiness Training System "includes all aspects of physical performance and requires training well above that of simple preparation for the

Army Physical Fitness Test."

The Caserma Ederle Conditioning Obstacle Course consists of a series of 10 obstacles that test upper and lower body strength, flexibility, agility and balance. The biggest challenge to constructing an effective obstacle course on Caserma Ederle was space. Corps of Engineers Project Manager Howard Mosley, RTSD Italy RTLP Program Officers Dave Andrews and Jim Sweatman, and DPW Master Planner Bill Delozier worked together to overcome the space challenge by creating an "island" concept for the project.

The course was constructed as 10 separate obstacle islands scattered in and around the other live training facilities on the north end of Caserma Ederle. Soldiers complete the obstacles in numerical order starting with Obstacle 1 next to the Airborne Refresher Training facility and running from island to island completing each obstacle until they finish with Obstacle 10 located next to the Ederle MOUT Training Facility. By ending the course at the MOUT Training Facility, the course design allows noncommissioned officers training their Soldiers to add the approximately 800-meter ring road around the Eco Center and synthetic soccer field as a sprinting option at the end of the formal obstacle course. Negotiating 10 obstacles and an 800-meter run is certain to challenge even the most fit of our Soldier-Athletes.

USARAF fields Command Contingency Post for 1st time in Africa

THEBEPHATSHWA AIR BASE, The Republic of Botswana – Southern Accord 12, a bilateral training operation designed to enhance military capabilities and interoperability between U.S. Forces and the Botswana Defense Force, presented the first opportunity for United States Army Africa to field a Command Contingency Post in Africa.

The CCP acts as the military liaison between U.S. Forces and the U.S. State Department, represented by the Embassy of that particular country. This provides an on-site, governmental voice to guide

the military operation.

"When units from multiple organizations and multiple countries come in to accomplish a mission, we provide the overarching command platform that allows us to communicate with those organizations and provide the most timely, accurate and relevant information possible to the Joint Task

Force," said Lt. Col. David Timothy Williams, USARAF CCP commander.

USARAF assists and enhances partner nation security forces so those forces contribute to security, stability and peace in their own nations. Southern Accord 2012 is a U.S. Africa Command-sponsored, U.S. Army Africa-led See CCP, page 2

combined, joint exercise designed to enhance military capabilities and interoperability between U.S. military forces and the BDF.

Deploying the CCP to Africa went off without a hitch, thanks in large part to the training conducted beforehand, said Williams.

"The CCP's communications were up in 45 minutes, and the CCP was fully operational within four hours," said Maj. Mark W. Anders, the operations officer for USARAF CCP.

The main focus of the CCP was confirming their communication package, which allows them to execute the command and control mission from the USARAF command, said Williams. Once communication was confirmed, the CCP's mission to Botswana became both a successful and historic one.

Immunizations needed to ensure health, readiness

The month of August has been designated as National Immunization and Influenza Vaccination Awareness Month. It is critically important that every Soldier, Family member, DA civilian and health beneficiary receive all required immunizations and obtain their influenza vaccinations to ensure the Army is a healthy and mission ready force.

Army clinics across Europe expect to begin offering influenza vaccinations in September to coincide with the start of the school year. As students return to school after travelling during the summer, their proximity in the school setting makes them more likely to come into contact with the flu virus and then carry it home to their families, said Col. Carlheinz Stokes, Europe Regional Medical Command Force Health Protection director.

The dominant strain of influenza during the upcoming flu

season is still expected to be the H1N1 strain from the 2009 pandemic. Col. Richard Looney, director of the Army's Military Vaccination Program said, "H1N1 is still circulating, but due to outstanding efforts and immunization campaigns of the past few years, people are more aware and likely to be adequately protected during the height of flu season. Influenza immunization rates have gone up every year, and there's no reason to expect they won't go up again during the 2012-13 season.

Immunizations are really the best protection against disease and have saved more lives than any other medical measure in history.

"Immunizations have prevented approximately 42,000 army.mil.

deaths and 20 million cases of disease over the past decade," Looney said. "Those preventive efforts have also saved billions of dollars in related healthcare costs and total societal costs. Morbidity from vaccine-preventable diseases has fallen 90 percent or more for most diseases since the 20th century."

A majority of disease outbreaks in the U.S. occur in unvaccinated or inadequately vaccinated populations. Measles made a comeback in the U.S. partly because unvaccinated people traveled to Europe, contracted the disease and returned home. Incidence of pertussis (whooping cough) have increased largely due to vaccination coverage rates going down, resulting in a recommendation from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that everyone receive one lifetime booster dose of a pertussis-containing vaccine. Other vaccine-preventable diseases include polio, mumps, rubella, chickenpox, meningococcal disease, pneumonia, tetanus, diphtheria, human papillomavirus, shingles and Haemophilus influenza B (hib).

A common misconception is that vaccinations are just for kids. Everyone over the age of six months should receive a seasonal flu shot every year. Infection from influenza viruses can result in illness ranging from mild to severe and may cause life-threatening complications. Persons with existing medical conditions should consult their health care provider before receiving the influenza vaccine.

Tips on registering children for bus routes

The first step is for the parents/sponsors to register their children at http://www.eu.dodea.edu/enrollment in school.

Before parents/sponsors lease or rent any type of housing, they should contact the Student Transportation Office to determine whether bus service is provided. If the parent/sponsor choose to live outside the commuting zone, they will be responsible for transporting their child to and from the nearest active bus stop on a scheduled route.

Both the parent and all students needing transportation should be present to register for transportation, receive a bus pass, and to receive information or briefings on the route(s) stops and schedule, bus safety, and behavior standards and discipline rules.

The bus office currently works out of two locations; Vicenza Middle School in Villaggio, Room 18, and Vicenza High School on Caserma Ederle, Room 21A.

The Vicenza School Bus Office is open daily from 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Mondays-Fridays. The office is closed on federal holidays. You may contact them at 634-8132 or 634-6345. Community honors memory of Victor Mallia, longtime employee

Family, friends and community members gathered at the Caserma Ederle Chapel Aug. 17 to attend a funeral mass for Victor J. Mallia and offer their condolences. Father (Lt. Col.) Wieslaw Dynek said it was a time for people to express gratitude for their moments in life shared with Vic, as Mallia was called by those who knew him.

Mallia, who was 86 when he passed away, was born in Malta and served in the British Army during World War II. He immigrated to the U.S. and joined the Army in 1948. During the 27-year-long military career that followed, he was stationed in Guam, Korea, Vietnam, Germany and Vicenza, Italy, among other duty stations.

"I met Vic in 1969 when he was working on the command staff in Vicenza," said long-time friend Ron Reynolds. "I remember him as being one of the last Spec. 7s (the equivalent of today's Sgt. 1st Class) and always very active in the community. He would bring Italians and Americans to the Officers Club, and everyone felt very comfortable in his presence."

After retiring from the Army, Mallia became the protocol officer at SETAF, where he served as a federal employee for 23 years.

"With his language skills, exceptional attention to detail, reliability, absolute planning ability — protocol was a perfect fit for him in his civilian career," said his son-in-law Daniel Sacks. "At work he was a hard man who drove his team to excel, but every guest felt warmly received and cared for because of his personal touch."

"He was a pillar at SETAF, always going out of his way to help; he was always work, work, work," said long-time friend Joe Manetti.

After the funeral mass, Mallia was laid to rest next to his wife of 36 years, Giulia, at the nearby Cimitero di Casale. Mallia is survived by his sons, Frank and Paul, of Verona; his daughter, Patrizia, of Vicenza; and two brothers, Peter in New York and Philip in Australia.

Book closes on Summer Reading Program at Camp Darby

Camp Darby children were put on a pedestal Aug. 14 during a small awards ceremony marking the end of the Camp Darby Military Community Library Summer Reading program "Reading is so Delicious." Certificates and gift bags were given to all participating children in attendance. Twenty children registered, filled out and returned their book logs, which demonstrated their participation in the program.

The Department of Defense sponsored reading program, designed for children ages six to 12 was from July 9-Aug. 11. Children under age six were also able to take part in the program with the assistance of their parents, who read to them.

Several young readers completely filled their book logs, with a total of 22 books read during the six week program.

"One of the good things about it is Summer Reading Lost Syndrome. A lot of studies have shown that kids who do read in the summer usually outperform, sometimes by two months, those who didn't read. In other words, if kids don't do anything in the summer and just play, then when they get back to school they are behind," said Michael McDaniel, librarian. "Kids who do read, it really doesn't matter so much what they read as long as they read something, can usually stay on the same level and are usually two months ahead of other kids in the same class."

Research spanning 100 years also shows that students typically score lower on standardized tests at the end of summer vacation than they do on the same tests at the beginning of the summer.

The Department of Defense summer reading program with content developed by iREAD, returned this summer to more than 250 installation libraries, with a goal to encourage and support a love of reading among military children.

Participants could choose any book on any subject in the library. The goal of this program was to not only increase reading during the summer, but also encourage a year-long hunger for reading and knowledge.

"The reading program will return again next summer. Two books, 10 books, it doesn't so much matter what they read but the fact that they read," said McDaniel. "It can be fun, let's make it fun so that it is not hard."

During the regular school year, the Library offers a regular Tuesday reading program in conjunction with the Child Development Center from 10-11 a.m, according to Lead Library Technician Debora Lomi.

The Library also offers a wide assortment of books, audio books, music CDs, graphic novels, games and DVDs for CDMC youth. New children's books are added throughout the year on all subjects, according to Lomi. For more information on programs and other resources available, visit the library or call 633-7000.

Volterra Medieval Festival: a step back to Middle Ages



Every summer Volterra celebrates its origins by recreating the atmosphere of the middle ages, more precisely, the year 1398, the whole city will jump back to the 14th century and recreate a festive day in a Tuscan city.

If visiting Volterra is a blast, visiting Volterra during the medieval fest is just a unique experience.

Volterra is an Etruscan town completely built of stones located about a one and half hour drive from Camp Darby. It really is an open air museum. Built on the top of a hill, the town is completely surrounded by ancient walls and the narrow streets in the center of town are still in cobblestones.

"Volterra is incredible and just the ride to it is awesome," said Master Sgt. John Davis.

Every summer Volterra celebrates its origins by recreating the atmosphere of the middle ages, more precisely, the year 1398.

On Aug. 19 and 26, the whole city will jump back to the 14th century and recreate a festive day in a Tuscan city.

Everyone in Volterra is dressed in typical medieval costume, and the ancient town handicraft stalls of typical "mestieri" like leather goods, wooden carvings, silk stringing, cloth making and of course alabaster handicrafts are everywhere.

"We were there on Sunday and it was a lot of fun," said Angela Malleis. "Besides the costumes and the parade, there were many activities and games for the kids."

The "Grosso", the currency of the middle ages is the only currency in circulation Aug. 19 and 26 during "the Day of the 1398 festival;" crafts, food and wine may only be purchased with this currency which is available at "the old Exchange office." Excess money may be converted back into Euro at the Tourist Information

"I suggest everyone to go, this is a fantastic way of absorbing a taste of history," said Davis.

Food booths are open all day with grilled meats and local pecorino cheese.

Historical crossbow shooting tournament, flag throwers and knight duels are among the main attractions.

This is a unique opportunity to experience the enchanting atmosphere of the Middle Ages in one of the most beautiful cities of Tuscany.
