Smooth move tour teaches teens about Vicenza

A gaggle of teenagers took a trip downtown to learn a little something about Italian history and cuisine, Garibaldi and gelato: there's a lot of it and it comes in an endless assortment of flavors.

The dozen teens, incoming middle-schoolers, were participating in the Smooth Move Workshop and Tour program, a daylong outing that provides an informal introduction to life on and off post.

The group met at Davis Hall June 26 for introductions and snacks accompanied by information about life in the Vicenza community, including volunteer opportunities, school sports programs and off-post athletic team opportunities.

Under the supervision of U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza's Relocation Readiness Manager Julia Sibilla, and Child, Youth and Schools Services Schools Liaison Officer Norie McCall, and the leadership of a half dozen Vicenza High School students, the Smooth Movers rode the No. 1 bus downtown to the main train station for some practical experience on how to buy tickets, decipher schedules and locate tracks.

The group proceeded on foot into town with pauses along the way for short discussions about renowned Vicentine figures Antonio Pigafetta and Andrea di Pietro della Gondola — known around the world as Palladio, and the modern national hero, Giuseppe Garibaldi.

A quick tour of the Duomo and a stop along the way for ice cream was followed by a stroll through the weekly market in and around la Piazza dei Signori and a tour of the Teatro Olimpico.

"It has a lot of history and it's really nice," said Kaekoa Gill, an incoming sixth-grader.

While Gill was spooning up a banana gelato, her sister, Katie, enjoyed a flavor whose name she didn't quite know, but was enjoying just the same.

"They don't know Garibaldi, but they know gelato. I love it," said Sibilla.

After lunch at a local restaurant where the teens picked up a few essential phrases, the group returned to Caserma Ederle for a windshield tour of the Villaggio housing area, school complex, teen center

West Point cadets work with USARAF, train with Italian Alpini

Some college students travel to Europe for summer fun and excitement. For two West Point Cadets, they found fun and adventure while working for U.S. Army Africa recently.

Cadets Zachary Bell, 20, and Wesley Mathews, 19, are headed into their junior year at the U.S. Military Academy. Bell and Mathews, both system engineering majors, assisted with a command modified and digitized assessment survey and other organizational tools.

Bell and Mathews took part in an Academic

Individual Advanced Development program, where climbing training. Additionally, Bell and Mathew's cadets work with military or civilian organizations in trained in areas of marksmanship, chemical warfare various capacities during the summer. The program can lead to academic credit and lasts for up to four

Bell and Mathews worked together for three weeks, transforming a USARAF document into a PDF format to be used to build an assessment data base. Additionally, the two cadets took time to travel to Rome and work with the Italian Army Alpini.

While training with Soldiers of the 7th Alpini Regiment, the cadets had the opportunity to learn the 'ropes' by taking part in rappelling and mountain defense, night reconnaissance and patrolling.

For Mathews, a native of Dallas, Ga., his trip to Italy was the most significant summer job he has ever had. "This has been the opportunity of a lifetime," Mathews said. "I was continually impressed with the professionalism of USARAF team members and the Italian Alpini." His Alpini training was an eye-opening experience.

"The Alpini training know what they are doing at all times. They're very adaptive and make things happen, See CADETS, page 8

even if they have limited resources. The Alpini have a very diverse set of training skills and I was amazed where one minute we are rappelling off a cliff and the next moment checking out ski equipment or training in chemical warfare defense," Mathews said. "The Alpini are very proficient in warrior tasks and drills."

Pittsburgh native Bell said the experience with the Alpini was significantly challenging and different from other forms of military training he has previously experienced.

"Working with Soldiers from another culture is part of the challenge. We were honored to train with the Alpini. They're an elite group and considered the world's oldest active mountain infantry troops.

"But, what is most interesting to me is that it's not all that different from how the U.S. Army conducts training; there are many similarities," Bell said. "The way the Alpini conduct briefings, tactics and their graphic representation of different units is very similar to the U.S. Army's way of doing things," Bell said. "The training emphasized working hard and smart."

Maj. Brad Kinser of USARAF's Analysis and Assessments branch of Operations, Movement and Maneuver Division, managed most of the training and project work for the cadets. He praised the assessment project the cadets performed for USARAF. "Cadets Mathews and Bell put a project into effect that would have required other USARAF staff members an investment of nearly 120 hours of straight, uninterrupted work that would have taken away from other higher priority projects. We appreciate that concentrated work," Kinser said.

"I think they had the self-awareness light go on while they were here and they will be better Soldiers and leaders because of it. It was their first U.S. Army experience away from U.S. Military Academy and they have a better understanding of how the U.S. Army works and how our NATO allies tackle some of the same challenges," Kinser said.


Next summer, Bell and Mathews with take part in Cadet Troop Leadership Training known as CTLT, where they will shadow an active duty platoon leader for several weeks.

The tour is student-led and adult supervised, said McCall. As conducted in Vicenza, the Smooth Move is a team effort with input and support from the Youth Center, Student-to-Student, School Support Services and Army Community Service. Camp Darby celebrates Fourth of July

On July 4, 1776, the United States claimed their independence from England, and a new nation was born. Ever since, each year on July 4, Americans celebrate that freedom and independence with barbecues, picnics, family gathering and last, but not least, fireworks.

Redentore (Our Savior) Festival:

Hoga Zait - Cimbrian Festival:

Landscapers 'give back' to vets, fallen at Arlington

ARLINGTON, Va. — More than 400 volunteers from children to adults descended on the grounds of Arlington National Cemetery Monday for the 16th annual Renewal and Remembrance, to honor the nation's veterans and fallen servicemembers by sprucing up the landmark's grounds.

Professional Landcare Network, brought out 82 professional lawn care and landscape companies from around the country for this year's Renewal and Remembrance. They lent their hands and donated materials and equipment to mulch, prune, aerate, irrigate, plant, spread lime, and cable some of the trees for lightning protection on 150 of the cemetery's more than 560 acres.

Since the annual Renewal and Remembrance landscaping event began, more than \$2 million has been contributed to the care of the national cemetery, according to a PLANET news

The cemetery's 8,400 trees are maintained on a four-year pruning cycle. Some are more than 200 years old, cemetery officials said.

John Gibson of Swingle Lawn, Tree and Landscape Care traveled from Denver with his daughters Taylor, 17, and Marissa, 15, to join a six-person crew that spread 400 bags of lime to balance the soil's nutritional levels. This is his twelfth year of working with Renewal and Remembrance at the cemetery, and his daughters' first, he said.

"The very first year," John Gibson said, "I realized what an impact it would Members of PLANET, the nonprofit make on those people who made an impact for us. It's pretty emotional every year to have a chance to give back. All we do is lawn and tree care, and these guys (sacrificed their lives) for us."

"It's nice to give back to the people who gave everything," Taylor Gibson said, adding that she and her sister would come back next year.

About 25 of the volunteers' children, ranging in age from 3 to 12, pitched in on the beautification project. But before they planted milkweed, they received a lesson in the importance of how the plants attract the caterpillars of the endangered and migratory Monarch butterfly, and how the caterpillars feed only on that particular plant.

Roger Phelps, promotional communications manager for Stihl equipment, has worked with the

children at Arlington's Renewal and Remembrance for 10 years.

"It's my passion," Phelps said of his work with the project. "These kids are our future, and creating this experience is important."

And volunteers bringing their children, he added, is especially meaningful.

Phelps said many of the children return from year to year and see the fruits of their labor as the vegetation they planted grows and matures.

"We take the kids around to all the different areas they've worked on over the years, so they can point to the things they've worked on and planted," he said. "The opportunity for us is to give them an understanding of what it means to serve, and what service means. What they learn here is by working with the plants, they have an opportunity to serve the families and visitors by creating an environment that is pleasant and respectful."

Phelps, a former Navy lieutenant commander, said Arlington National Cemetery is a special place to him.

"I've got some shipmates and friends in here," he said, adding that many of the landscape volunteers also know someone who is buried at the national cemetery. "It's a personal thing, too."
