

■ K through Grade 8 students will be on bus routes numbered in the 100s

Grades 9-12 students will be on routes numbered in the 200s

"This means parents will see two school buses servicing a single stop," said Ephraim Wertz, the installation's Transportation Operations Specialist.

Wertz said while the school bus drivers and monitors will continue to check student IDs as they board the bus, parents should pay special attention to bus passes to make sure children get on the right bus.

This wasn't as much of an issue last year," said Wertz. "If a child boarded the wrong bus in the past, he or she would still arrive at the right school. This year, if a middle school student boards a high school bus, they'll end up on the wrong installation."

In addition to ensuring students board the correct bus, Wertz encourages families who live off post to use the school bus service, whenever feasible. He said more students using the bus means less traffic in and out of Villaggio and less congestion at the school.

"We'll be trying to fit a large amount of pedestrian

and vehicle traffic into a small space on Villaggio," said Wertz, "and there are things the community can do to help make things smoother and safer for everyone."

Riding the school bus may also save families money.

"It's a great solution for families who don't want to pay child care fees for only a few minutes. Let them ride the bus and we'll supervise them for free," urged Wertz.

Parents who have not already done so should visit the school bus office, located in Bldg. 309 on Caserma Ederle and in the new middle school on Villaggio, to sign students up for a bus stop near their house.

"In addition to helping us lower traffic congestion during pick-up and drop-off times, using the school bus system allows many parents to get their child to school and still make it to work on time. We're happy to have your child on board," he said.

For kindergarten through eighth grade students who live on Villaggio and will walk to school, the following safety tips should be observed:

1. Stay on the sidewalks as much as possible and only cross the street at marked crosswalks.

2. Stay out of the school bus zone – no shortcuts!

3. In the afternoon, leave the school area as soon as possible and cross Via Thomas Edison or Via Cesare Augusto before buses exit the loading zone at 1455.

4. Take directions from military police and school or garrison officials who are out there to keep everyone safe as the school year begins.

"Our school buses will be exiting Villaggio by way of Via Thomas Edison and Via Leonardo Da Vinci, so these four points will help keep you and your children safe on the way to and from school each day," said Wertz.

He noted that most of the school bus routes from last year have been reworked and asked parents and students to remain flexible and understand if adjustments are made throughout the year.

"Plans and times on paper have a way of changing when things actually get started," he explained. "This year we have a separate elementary, middle, and high school for the first time in Vicenza and we're all excited about the opportunities that brings for our students. There will be initial challenges, but it's going to be an excellent year."

Those were the shouts from community youth, ages 3-11, as they guess how many books had been read by participants in this year's Summer Reading Program hosted by the post library.

In keeping with the island theme, for each book they read, the children dropped a white bean representing a grain of sand in the Beach Jar, explained Michelle Krewson, the post librarian.

"Twenty-two teens registered and 16 were able to attend the reward party where they enjoyed breaking in the library's new PS3 with Rock Band, DJ Hero and Tony Hawk's Ride," said Krewson. "The program was such a success that everyone is already looking forward to next year's Midsummer Knight's Read,"

USARAF, 36 African nations, international parters test commo exchange, abilities

A major military communications exercise involving 36 African nations, U.S. Army Africa and a range of African and international partners drew to a close in Accra, Ghana, Friday.

Training and exercise scenarios centered around interoperability of communications systems, and included land-to-sea and satellite communications between the African Union's Peace Support Operations Center in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia and multinational forces in Ghana.

"Future operations in Africa depend on the combined multinational militaries of the nations represented here today in order to effectively communicate amongst themselves," said Maj. Gen. David R. Hogg, U.S. Army Africa commanding general.

"We are fighting for unity and interoperability with our partners to establish high levels of efficiency," said Lt. Gen. Peter Blay, Chief, Defense Staff of the Ghana Armed Forces.

"The outcome of Africa Endeavor 2010 has given assurance that we are on track to achieve the ultimate goal of interoperability between our forces," said Blay.

"By taking part in this event we have demonstrated a commitment to harness the power of communication technology for ensuring the long-term peace, stability, and prosperity of the African continent," said Hogg.




