HQ supply gears up for competition

Stocking supplies may not be the most glamorous job the Army offers.

But when done well, it deserves recognition.

That's why U.S. Army Europe recognized supply Soldiers from U.S. Army Africa's Headquarters Support Company – selecting the unit for the 2010 Supply Excellence Award (SEA). The Soldiers will receive the USAREUR award in March.

Before that, they face a Department of the Army evaluation team from Fort Lee, Va., who will conduct a stringent inspection in mid-December for Army-level award consideration.

Soldiers have put in long hours preparing for the competition, said Staff Sgt. Tasha Ramos, 23, of

Medicine abuse on the rise among local teens

Over the last several months an increase in the abuse of over the counter and prescription medications has been noticed among teens in Vicenza.

Many over the counter as well as prescription medicines are being used by teenagers for recreational purposes. Misuse of these medications, even over the counter medicines, can have serious side effects, to include delirium, heart problems, trouble breathing, coma and even death.

"Medicine misuse is not extremely uncommon. It happens in schools across the nation, in every town, no matter how small, and it happens in DoDDS," said Command Sgt. Maj. Jeffrey Hartless. "It is each family's responsibility to be aware of what it has in its medicine cabinet. Secure prescription medications and turn in unused medicine to the health center for proper disposal."

Hartless said because of the potential for misuse, OTC cold medicines are not longer sold to minors at the commissary.

Ham addresses Obama's Afghanistan initiative

SAREUR team members, last week our president laid out the way ahead in Afghanistan, which includes sending 30,000 additional troops to seize the initiative and build the Afghan capacity to allow for a responsible transition of our forces.

Our nation counts on the Army to organize, train and equip forces that can deploy and achieve the

strategic objectives the president sets forth. That is why we exist.

You are all volunteers and patriots; however, I know you also wonder how the president's initiative will affect your unit, your post, your family.

We do expect some additional USAREUR units to deploy as part of this initiative, and we will notify the units, families and communities affected as soon as the secretary of defense approves the deployment orders.

Because of the growth of the Army over the past five years and the responsible drawdown in Iraq, the Army will be able to execute this increase while ending stop-loss and continuing to provide units at least 12 months at home after every 12 months of deployment.

Assuming the drawdown in Iraq continues, we will also continue to make progress toward our goal of at least two years at home station for every year deployed. Even with the increased forces in Afghanistan ordered by the president, we estimate that more than two-thirds of the active component

will reach these goals within the next two years.

USAREUR Soldiers, families and civilians, like those everywhere, are experiencing the stress of repeated deployments. Over the past two years, more than one-third of USAREUR forces were deployed at any given time.

Currently, elements of V
Corps headquarters, 21st Theater
Sustainment Command, 5th Signal
Command, 12th Combat Aviation
Brigade and others are deployed,
while the 172nd Brigade and

the 16th Sustainment Brigade have just returned. Furthermore, the 1st Armored Division headquarters, 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Stryker Cavalry Regiment, 12th CAB and significant portions of 21st TSC and others are preparing to deploy.

As the president noted, this burden is not ours alone to bear. This is not just America's war, and our European Allies are engaged and are even increasing their own troop contributions.

Just last week another iteration of the continuing partnership between 1st Battalion, 4th Infantry Regiment and Romanian soldiers began training in Hohenfels for deployment to Afghanistan.

I share your concerns for our Army families. You have carried an enormous burden in this war, and I am committed to providing a level of care and support that is commensurate with your service and sacrifice.

Our Army has never failed to answer the nation's call. The American people expect nothing less. They thank you, and I thank you for your service and sacrifice.

Signs that your teen may be using OTC or prescription medicine inappropriately

include missing medications, refills of prescription medications needed more frequently than planned, teens with abnormal mood alterations and declining social functioning.

Commonly abused prescription medicines include Vicodin, OxyContin, codeine, Percocet, and various anti-anxiety medicines.

Over-the-counter medicines which are sometimes abused include several cold and cough medications that contain dextromethorphan or pseudoephedrine.

Houston, Texas, who leads the supply office team.

"At the end of the day, this job is about helping Soldiers get what they need to get their missions done," Ramos said. "That's what motivates us."

Much of their work preparing for DA inspectors was dressing up what was already a neat and organized supply room, said Sgt. Joseph Hernandez, as he straightened a dry-erase board listing pre-inspection tasks ahead.

Command involvement has set the pace in the months leading up to the inspections, he said.

"That keeps us on our toes, Hernandez said.

Inspectors often look for demonstrated success in supervisory and managerial responsibilities, plus compliance with Army supply policies and procedures. They may also look at the company's ability to manage supply distribution and its efforts to improve performance.

For supply troops, the SEA is a mark of excellence for professional development, during evaluations, promotions or warrant officer selection, said Sgt. 1st Class Jeremy Newman, who oversees supply and maintenance for the company.

"In the logistics world, it's the one award that distinguishes Soldiers from their peers," Newman said.

Winners get trophies next year at the annual Army Supply Excellence Award ceremony in Washington D.C.

Being selected is a sign of excellence, said Chief command warrant Officer 4 Jessica Lee, a quartermaster expert from the USARAF G-4 supply and logistics division. Lee also approximately command the USARAF G-4 supply and logistics division.

Barcode technology helps USARAF supply troops track unit equipment, aided in netting excellence award

Using a handheld scanner, not unlike those found at a supermarket checkout, Sgt. 1st Class Jeremy Newman can sign out gear to Soldiers.

In mid-2009, USARAF supply Soldiers began using the Smartrack system - first used to inventory weapons in the company arms room – to account for military property, said Newman, 31, a South Dakota-native who oversees HSC supply and maintenance programs.

In an innovative twist, they began applying bar codes to all the company's equipment and scanning those items into the system – creating an electronic database that one day may those codes numbers.

"Now, if I the system publishes a item I scan.

replace shelves of thick binders holding paper lists.

"We decided to do this as a test or pilot effort," Newman said. "It may be the future of property accountability."

Adapting the system is just one of the efforts that helped Headquarters Support Company, U.S. Army Africa, to recently earn U.S. Army Europe's Supply Excellence Award

Soldiers stick barcodes on everything, an ongoing process that could be done in early 2010. The system's database matches those codes to equipment serial numbers.

"Now, if I sign out equipment, the system automatically publishes a hand receipt for the item I scan."
