

SETAF troops jump into Normandy, D-Day remembered

ST MERE EGLISE, France — More than 250 paratroopers from four counties filled the skies above the fields of Normandy June 7 as part of the week-long commemoration of the 64th Anniversary of D-Day and the liberation of France.

Five aircraft were used to deliver the British, French, German and U.S. paratroopers to the Iron Mike drop zone located four kilometers outside the historical town of St. Mere Eglise.

Maj. Gen. David Morris, U.S. Army senior mission commander for this operation, was honored to have the chance to jump into Normandy for this event.

"We are very fortunate to have this unique opportunity," said Morris. "On June 6th, 1944, all the French had was hope... paratroopers brought that hope, and our veterans expect us to carry on the airborne tradition."

"Anytime you are able to conduct an airborne operation on the same soil as your predecessors did while in combat is always something special," agreed Sgt. Maj. Matthew West, the SETAF operations sergeant major. "It was a great honor to conduct this joint operation with the French, British and German soldiers, and the amount of people that showed up to view the jump was amazing."

A wing exchange ceremony was held following the jump. This ceremony allowed paratroopers from each country to exchange their jump wings with one another.

During this ceremony Sgt. 1st Class Billy Vetten,

the SETAF air operations officer, received his master parachutist's badge, which was pinned on by WWII veteran Julius Eisner, who had jumped into Normandy during the D-Day invasion 64 years prior.

"It was an honor and a privilege to receive my master parachutists badge in Normandy by a D-Day veteran," said Vetten. "Most people receive [their wings] at their home station, so it really sets it apart from others."

After the exchange, all the paratroopers from each country paraded into St. Mere Eglise where a large audience welcomed the paratroopers into their city with cheers and waving flags.

"I think it is great for countries involved with the liberation of France to have this opportunity to come together and celebrate, said Vetten. "Paratroopers have an excellent history and one of the most important parts of our past is D-Day. I think it is fitting that we celebrate the accomplishments of the veterans and those of the allies. After all, they are the reason that the world is free and we honor them by continuing to ensure that the world can remain free."





Traffic rerouting for cable laying on 9th Street

Normal traffic flow on Caserma Ederle along 9th Street and parts of Olson Avenue will be temporarily changed so the contractor for the Enhanced Health Services Clinic can install electrical cable.

In the first phase of this work, the contractor blocked off the right turn off Olson Avenue into the parking lot by the library.

The contractor will continue laying cable down 9th Street toward the clinic in 75-meter phases. The work will require one-way traffic along Olson Avenue by the post office toward the school. Vehicles returning from the direction of the school will be required to turn right at Pino's coffee kiosk and drive through the movie theater parking lot and enter 9th Street by Club Veneto. Sections of 9th Street will temporarily become one-way as the work progresses. Traffic lights are scheduled to be installed Friday afternoon, June 13; one-way will go into effect Monday, June 16 on 9th Street.




Darby Airmen serve Italian vets

The magnificent historic spectacle of thousands of lit candles known as La Luminara di San Ranieri takes place in Pisa June 16.

This annual event dates back to 1688 when the body of San Ranieri, the patron saint of Pisa, was put to rest inside the cathedral. In memory of this event, every year all the palaces along the banks of the Arno River in Pisa and the Leaning Tower are lit up by thousands of wax candles called Lampanini which are mounted on wooden holders in the shape of the buildings themselves.

Evening activities include food vendors and various stands and conclude with a large firework display near the Cittadella, the medieval Pisa harbor.

June 17th there is a boat race along a stretch of the Arno with teams from each of the quarters of the city dressed in traditional costumes.

At the end of the month there is a great procession before the Gioco del Ponte takes place. This game

derived probably from the Mazzascudo that used to take place in Piazza degli Anziani, the present day Piazza dei Cavaglieri, in the period between Christmas and the end of Carnival.

In more recent times the aim of the game had been to force the retreat of the opposing forces by pushing them back to their own side of the bridge with a great trolley placed on rails in the center of the bridge.

For this occasion, the banks of the Arno are decorated with carpets, flags and banners. Those taking part in the procession are richly costumed and whole occasion is a great event in the life of the city.

Sandcastles in Jesolo

The traditional sand sculpting festival in Jesolo, on the beach area of Brescia Square, gets underway on June 20. This year's theme is a journey into the history of a fascinating civilization. No less than 20 sculptors from 10 nations will participate and represent the theme, China and the Olympics, La Cina e le Olimpiadi.

Almost a thousand tons of white beach sand has been carefully screened to provide excellent raw material for the sculptors. The work will take place in a large covered area on the beach from 9:30 a.m.-11 p.m.

Entrance fee to see the work is 1,50 euro. Children shorter than one meter tall are free.

The sculptures will be on display until July 30.

Egyptian museum

Torino's Egyptian Museum is one of the world's most important museums for Egyptology outside of Cairo. The exhibition areas include a room devoted to prehistoric times and the first three dynasties (4000 to 2300 B.C.).

The exhibit features the reconstruction of a protodynastic sepulcher with the oldest existing example of a naturally mummified body.

Another room is dedicated to the Old Kingdom, the 4th, 5th and 6th dynasties, and has a wall of the tomb of Iteti, which was discovered by Schiaparelli in 1903.

One of the museum's treasures is the Tomb of Kha, a burial chamber dating back 1400 B.C., which contains sarcophagi, statues, garments, furniture. Also, the Royal Papyrus or the Papyrus of Torino, which lists all the kings of Egypt from 3000 to 1600 B.C. is a site to see.

Open 9:30 a.m.-8:30 p.m. everyday excluding Monday, Entrance fee is 7,50 euro for adults, people 18-25 years of age cost 3,50 euro, and children younger than 18 are free.

The museum is located on Via Accademia della Scienza.

Trieste & the giant cave

In the Italian port city of Trieste, you can take a trip to the Grotto Gigante, Giant Cave, located 400 meters from the center of the village bearing its name. Grotto Gigante is a suburb of the town of Sgonico, which is located about 17 kilometers from Trieste. The environment with its stalactites and stalagmites is beautiful, and the main cavern, high 107, long 280 and wide 65 meters, is so immense that it could contain St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

Open everyday, except Mondays, through September from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. The entrance fees are 7,50 euro for adults and military ID card and children 6-12 years of age cost 5,50 euro.

Near the entrance of the cave is a museum of speleology with geological, speleological and archaeological exhibits.

While in <u>Trieste</u>, visit the Piazza dell'Unita', with its numerous cafes, restaurants, book shops and antique shops.


Close by the piazza is an ancient Roman amphitheater and the Castello di San Giusto, a fortress built in the 15th century by the Austrians.

The Revoltella Museum, which was once the 19th century house of Baron Revoltella, contains a gallery of modern art and a roof top terrace offering a sweeping view of the city.

Finally, the Miramare Castle,

which was constructed in the mid-1800s for Archduke Maximillian of Habsburg, was his home until he left to become the Emperor of Mexico.

The castle is now a popular museum and visitors can visit several of Maximillian's rooms, all containing original furniture commissioned by Maximillian.

Eight adventurous souls left Vicenza under gloomy skies on Mother's Day and headed for Lake Garda to go sea kayaking under the direction of Chris Wolff, Outdoor Recreation director and his assistant Paul Brownlee.

The group began the trip by picking out wet suits, life vests and waterproof bags, which would keep money, cameras and other necessities dry, from the ODR office before heading out to Sirmione, located on the south shores of Lake Garda.

"Outdoor Rec bought 10 open kayaks," said Wolff as he and Brownlee off-loaded the kayaks from the trailer, "and we've had great success in running trips to Lake Garda. Many people seem to prefer the open-style kayak because it doesn't involve learning how to roll the kayak under water and up again."

"The fact that I didn't have to learn how to roll the kayak was the reason I came on this trip," admitted Arlana Young, Child Development Center director. "Even though I'm a good swimmer I don't like the feeling of being trapped under water inside a kayak."

On this particular trip, only a couple participants had actual kayaking experience.

"I used real sea kayaks, which are quite long and you are enclosed from the waist-down, in North Carolina and along the

inside passage of Alaska," said Carole Faver, who was in Vicenza visiting her daughter. The trip was a Mother's Day present from her daughter and son-in-law.

"These are just as much fun to use and a little bit easier to handle."

Once the kayaks and paddles were off the trailer, the group moved the kayaks from the drop-off point to the shoreline and had a brief lesson on different paddle styles and safety from Wolff. Then it was time to get in the kayak and push off.

Wolff led the way

under cloudy skies, no wind, mild temperatures and within view of villas and parks hugging the shoreline. The group paddled for about an hour and a half taking a couple of breaks to regroup and give the hands, arms and shoulders a rest.

"It's so peaceful,"
