Following the reception, another ceremony took place, this time on Hoekstra Field where Via had the honor of attaching a streamer to the 509th guidon.


The streamer was the Meritorius Unit Commendation, which is roughly equivalent to the individual Legion of Merit award, on a unit level. The unit received this award for its work establishing critical secure communications under austere and hazardous hostile fire conditions.

The support provided by this signal task force included secure and non-secure Internet protocol router networks, Defense Switched Network lines, and video teleconferencing capability. This ability to communicate with Warfighters on the ground allowed the higher command to continue executing battlefield operations in all of Northern Iraq.

# Electronic items interrupt cell phone signals

This is my monthly column about how we can make the Vicenza Military Community a better place to work and live. I send my thanks for doing your part; it's a pleasure to have you on the team.

Sometimes it's not how we look, but what we own and use in our households.

An unusual problem came to my attention from Vodafone representatives located next to the Villaggio housing area. Apparently something inside Villaggio was causing significant disruptions to frequencies used to support the Vodafone telephone network.

I dispatched a team made up of 509th Signal Battalion Soldiers and Vodafone representatives to investigate the problem. It turns out that there are some electronic items in households that use frequencies that interfere with both the cellular telephone network and emergency service systems.

As a result, a remote sensor that turns the porch light on by the front door was identified as malfunctioning. This item is being repaired.

A second item that was identified was a remote baby monitor.

The problem with baby monitors, cordless phones and other wireless devices purchased in CONUS is they operate on frequencies not approved for use in Europe.

In the case of the baby monitors, they were not in compliance with European

standards. These frequencies are reserved for different purposes in Europe such as e m e r g e n c y r e s p o n s e infrastructure.

All electronic items used must be compliant with European standards. To ensure devices are compliant check for the letters "CE" on the electronic device (See photo). The letters "CE" are an abbreviation of Conformité Européenne, French for European conformity.

The letters "FCC" are for the United States which is the abbreviation for the Federal Communications Commission. In some cases, you may find both sets of letters, FCC and CE, meaning the device is approved for use in Europe and North America.

While AAFES stocks its shelves with approved items, sometimes items are ordered through a catalog, or received as a gift, and the recipient is not aware that the item is not approved for use in Europe. The purchaser and recipient are responsible for ensuring compliance.

In the future, this information will be briefed during in-processing to newcomer's of the Vicenza military community.



# Civilian fitness program has incentives to get out, get moving

Many people in our community would like to enjoy a healthier lifestyle by exercising and getting fit, but finding the time to workout can be difficult. With time-consuming careers, as well as situations that may arise in an individual's personal life, working out is just, well, too much work.

The Civilian Fitness Program gives civilians up to three hours per week to participate in fitness activities during work hours

Did you get that? Three hours a week for six months, motivated civilians can use an hour of their workday to pay attention to their fitness needs.

"This program was developed to increase the well-being of our civilian population and to help implement healthy lifestyles," said Lesley Gómez, USAG Vicenza Health Promotions coordinator.

"Participants must request an enrollment package and have their supervisor's approval to participate in the program. They also should coordinate with their supervisor for the days and times they will exercise.

Once that is completed they can contact me to schedule a fitness assessment March 28 at the Vicenza fitness center and March 30 in Camp Darby," said Gómez. "We meet at the gym to get baseline measurements – height, weight, blood pressure, body composition and cardio-respiratory recovery rate. Once that's done, thay can begin the program."

Sign-in cards are available at the front desk of the gym in order to document that a person was there to exercise and what activities they

performed. All participants in the program must conduct their exercise training on post and violations will be considered workplace infractions. The gym, pool, track, etc., are considered places of duty.

"If you are not working out, you should be in the office," said Gómez. The integrity system that the civilian fitness program operates on has proven to be effective. "We haven't had any reported offenses, and that's a good sign. The people who sign up want to participate and they take it seriously."

Civilians who are involved in the program tend to have a positive view on their experience. "I think it's wonderful, especially for people who have children and after work have to tend to all the family needs and have no time to exercise after duty hours," said Frances Packard, USAG Vicenza Exceptional Family Member program manager. "And for singles it's great because you get to workout even more. You also increase productivity and get things done faster because you are energized."

At the end of the six months another fitness assessment is taken to record the individual's improvement.

"We redo all of the measurements to show them where they have improved," said Gómez. "The creators of this program believe that, after exercising on a consistent basis for six months, working out will become a habit and people will stick with it. That's why the program is a one-shot deal. Then it's up to the participant to continue on his or her own."

Registration for the 2007-08 school year begins in April and is mandatory for all students. Staffing for the next school year is based on the number of students registered.

Registration will be held in the Vicenza school gymnasiums on the following dates:

**Vicenza Elementary School:** April 12 and 13, 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m., and 1:30-3 p.m. Portfolio conferences will be held at this time so there is no school for students.

Vicenza Middle and High School: April 13, 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m., and 1:30-3 p.m

Report card conferences are at this time, there is no school for students.

## Requirements for returning students

Sponsor must:

- Sign a new registration form.
- Review and update, if necessary, any other form required.
- ◆ Provide a copy of DEROS extension if tour has been extended.
- Bring updated immunization records to ensure all required immunizations are current.

### Requirements for new students

Sponsors must:

- Copy of sponsors original orders listing dependents.
- ◆ Child's Social Security number and ID card for middle and high school students.
  - Previous school records.
  - Immunization records.
- ◆ Birth certificate and passport. (kindergarten and first grade students only)
- ◆ \*Kindergarten students must be 5 years old prior to Oct. 31, 2007.
- ◆ \*First grade students must be 6 years old prior to Oct. 31, 2007.

Stop by the Vicenza Unit Schools Registration office beforehand to pick up the registration package for new students, so paperwork can be completed and presented at registration on the above dates.

Most importantly, all documents must be on file in order for the child to attend school.

If your child(ren) is registered for this school year, but is not returning for the next school year, ensure you notify the appropriate office so that records can be prepared for you.

A copy of your PCS orders is required. For details, call the appropriate offices: <u>Elementary school</u> (Kindergarten – grade 6),634-7710.

### Keep our children safe; follow SETAF child restraint regulation

Keeping the safety of our children in mind, the military police have been informing the public of the regulations concerning the use of child restraints on Caserma Ederle.

In accordance with USASETAF Regulation 190-2, all children 11 years of age or younger, or shorter than 150 centimeters (4 feet, 11 inches), are to sit in the back seat of a vehicle.

If your vehicle does not have a back seat, they are permitted to occupy the front seat as long as they have the safety equipment suitable for the child approved by the Department of Transportation or the Economic Commission for Europe.

DOT or ECE approved infant and child car seats are required in privately-owned vehicles for children 4 years old or under and not exceeding 45 pounds in weight (in accordance with Army Regulation 190-5)

The post exchange offers a wide variety of DOT-approved car seats.

If they do not have the size, shape or color of seat available, you can contact Army Community Service for a loaner car seat at no cost to you.

ACS has car seats available for infants and booster seats for older children.

"I told them they had to step up and play hard – there were only three minutes left in the game – and those last minutes would determine the final outcome," said Kenney. They told me they weren't ready to go home yet and proved it by Mannhiem 25-10 in the fourth quarter."

The team battled back and with less than a minute left in

the game and down by one point, Shakil Skeete nailed a 3-pointer, putting Vicenza up by two and in front for the rest of the game with the final score

"It [the ball] felt good after it left my hands," said Skeete about his 3-pointer after the Mannheim win. "I just knew it was going in, and when it did, I knew we were going to win the game."

The championship game found the boys again down by 10 in the fourth quarter. They battled back, but ran out of steam in the final minute of the game losing to Bamberg, 36-34.

"The kids played hard all weekend and were determined not to have a repeat of last year. I am so proud of all of them," said Kenney.

"Even though I was excited about winning the shootout," said player Anthony Davis, "my best memory will be beating Mannhiem after the Mannheim players told us to pack our bags, because they were sending us home and actually we sent them home."

### Army Emergency Relief campaign underway

Army Emergency Relief is celebrating 65 years assisting active and retired Soldiers and their families with financial emergencies.

AER is funded primarily with contributions from active and retired Soldiers, repayment of AER interest-free loans, investment income and unsolicited contributions. The AER campaign is the only time Soldiers are asked to help their own organization and their fellow Soldiers.

Last year, AER disbursed \$117,324.13 to Soldiers and their families in the Vicenza community. This includes \$41,942.68 for emergency travel, \$28,947.28 for auto repairs, \$19,062.07 for utilities, \$13,130.44 for rent assistance, \$5,531.05 for food, \$320 for loss of funds, and \$8,390.61

Since it was established in 1942, AER has helped more than three million Soldiers and family members, and in 2006 assisted 50,000 Army people with more than \$49

When patients arrive at the clinic, they receive a medication reconciliation form where they are to list all medications they are taking.

This form is reviewed by the doctor during the patient's appointment and also by the pharmacist whenever new medications are prescribed.

This form must be brought back with patients on followup visits for continued review and evaluation by the doctor.

Despite the long ingredients list, it is an easy recipe.

- **Ingredients:**
- 4 cups flour
- 2 cups almonds
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 pinch saffron
- 2 large eggs
- 2 large egg yolks
- Egg white for brushing
- Cold water

Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and saffron in a large

Make a hole in the center and add eggs, egg yolks, and four tablespoons of cold water.

ball on a floured surface. Add a bit more water to the dry bits and

kneed together. Push in half of the almonds on one side, flip the dough and add the rest of the almonds.

Blend well until the almonds are incorporated.

Divide the dough into eight parts and roll out into logs about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Flatten into semicircles.

Brush logs with egg whites and place on a greased and floured cookie sheet.

Bake at 325 degrees for 50-55 minutes. Remove logs and immediately cut into diagonal slices about 1/2 inch wide. Return to oven and cook for another 15 minutes.

Cool on racks. Serve with a sweet dessert wine, such as vin santo, or coffee, dipping

Mix well and form dough into a cookies into the liquid as you eat. **Buon Appetito!**




The Soldiers' Theatre upcoming production "Bleacher Bums," will open to the community March 23 and run through March 31.
