Vicenza ACS leads charge on worldwide transformation

Vicenza's Army Community Service will finish a test period March 31, officially becoming its own directorate April 1 to complete a separation from its parent organization, the Directorate of Family, Morale, Welfare and Recreation.

Vicenza was one of 22 pilot sites leading the way on the changes, which are intended to enhance delivery of services to Army communities worldwide. The pilot period was a way to offer lessons learned to garrisons around the Army as they prepare to tranform.

The change aims to make it easier and faster for Soldiers and their family members to get the help they are seeking, said Vicenza ACS Director Marva Dixon.

USARAF trans-Sahel forum provides leaders 'deeper look'

More than 120 U.S. Army Africa Soldiers and civilians participated in the Trans-Sahel Region Conference March 14-16 in Vicenza, Italy.

The USARAF-sponsored conference featured nearly a dozen presenters, including two former U.S. ambassadors and several renowned academics from colleges and universities throughout the United States.

The trans-Sahel region is an area in North Africa that includes Senegal, Mali, Burkina Faso, Niger, Nigeria and the far northern


tip of Cameroon, ending at Ndjamena, just inside the western border of Chad.

During the three-day conference, several topics such as unique political, economic, social and cultural challenges currently taking place in the trans-Sahel region were presented.

Col. Randall Carlson of the USARAF training office said the conference offered several takeaway benefits.

Know customs rules before shipping POVs

U.S. personnel stationed overseas can ship vehicles to the United States free of federal tax and duty, which can mean big savings, as long as personnel meet three conditions.

Personnel must take physical possession of the vehicle prior to shipment, have valid PCS orders and import it for personal use. State taxes may still apply.

"Most people who miss out on the exemption do not take physical possession of the vehicle before shipment," said Bill Johnson, director of the European Command's Customs and Border Clearance Agency. "If you have a car shipped directly from the factory, you risk having to pay the 2.5 percent federal import duty," he added.

Registering a vehicle is the best way to show possession, but you can also prove it by putting a copy of your movement orders in the glove compartment.

Second, you must have a set of official change of station orders in hand before shipping a vehicle. The exemption is not for people on extended leave or temporary duty.

Third, the vehicle must be for your personal use or for use by immediate family members.

"If you had six dependents of driving age," Johnson explained, "you could justify importing seven vehicles duty-

'Car Talk' tip can help reduce blind spots

After many accidents, big or small, you're likely to hear, "I just didn't see them."

All too often, unseen vehicles or pedestrians become casualties when accidents occur in blind spots. While some vehicles incorporate television cameras to help improve a driver's view to the rear, most motorists must rely heavily on mirrors.

There is a method for adjusting rearview and side mirrors to eliminate most blind spots. Tom and Ray Magliozzi, hosts of National Public Radio's "Car Talk", suggest the following mirror-adjustment tips.

- Step 1: Start by setting your rearview mirror as you normally would, then, lean your head all the way to the left so it touches the driver's window. From that position, set your left side-view mirror so you can see the back corner of your car.
- Step 2: Now lean the opposite way, and

set your right mirror the same way.

- Step 3: Check the mirrors by stopping next to a row of parked cars and pulling slowly past while checking the mirrors. Select a car to act as a "passing car." Set the left-side mirror so that as soon as the car disappears from your rearview mirror, it appears in your left-side mirror.
- Step 4: Do the same with the right mirror. A car you pull past on the right should disappear from your rearview mirror and appear instantly in the right-side mirror.

When a car comes up behind you, you should first see it in your rearview mirror. As it passes you (let's say, on your left), you'll see it move to the left side of your rearview mirror. As it disappears from your rearview mirror, it should show up in your left mirror.

Driving with the mirrors this way, you must learn to rely on your rearview mirror first. The good news is your blind spots should be gone, which should help make the roads safer for all of us.

"ACS will remain a one-stop information hub and a location where customers can make their first contact for all available services on the installation," Dixon said. "What is changing is that we are developing more of a generalists approach to service delivery. Everyone is being cross-trained to handle multiple programs in ACS to better serve every customer."

The transformed ACS will also be taking more programs and services to units, housing, schools, lodging, commissary, exchanges and offsite locations to meet customers' needs, Dixon said.

Since it was established in 1965, ACS has developed from a place for spouses to find assistance and information to centers of diversified programs staffed by professionals. ACS programs include: Army Family Action Plan, Army Family Team Building, Deployment/Mobilization Program, New Parent Support, Army Volunteer Corps, Master Resiliency Training, Exceptional Family Member, Family Advocacy, Financial Readiness, Victim Advocacy, Army Emergency Relief, Information and Referral, Relocation Readiness, Sexual Assault and Response Program, Soldier and Family Assistance Center, Spouse Employment Readiness, Survivor Outreach Services, Military Family Life Consultants and Computer/Yellow Ribbon Rooms.

ACS assists commanders in maintaining individual and family readiness, and helps deliver services to promote self-reliance, resiliency and stability. The community will probably not notice the internal changes to allow cross training, but will notice the improvement when they can get information on any program at ACS, even if a particular specialist is not in, Dixon said.

Some positions within ACS require the staff to have specialized credentials and/or licensure while others such as the deployment/mobilization programs, require more generalized credentials.

With the transformation, ACS will no longer be a division under Family and MWR, but will report directly to garrison commanders.

"ACS will continue to work in close partnership with FMWR on many of programs and activities as joint providers in service delivery to the military community," Dixon said.

Full implementation of the transformation Armywide is expected to be completed by October.

Lessons learned from the pilot program will be implemented at every installation as directed by the Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff of Installation Management.

The transformation is a result of feedback from 450 garrison focus groups, surveys and installations visits by IMCOM Commander Lt. Gen. Rick Lynch in 2009 and 2010.

the trans-Sahel, in particular in how these subjects relate to our interests in that area," Carlson said.

For Carlson, a session explaining the evolution of Al-Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb was of particular interest.

"One of the highlights of the conference for me was a presentation on Algeria and in particular the evolution of AQIM, a branch of Al-Qaeda in North Africa," Carlson said. "It was an informative presentation and they did a more effective as leaders in those areas of operations, great job on explaining AQIM origins."

Retired Col. Bob Tomasovic, program director for the Leader Development and Education for Sustainable Peace, is responsible for creating the agenda for the conference based on guidelines set by Maj. Gen. David R. Hogg, commander of U.S. Army Africa.

closely with Georgian soldiers to gain experience conducting operations with coalition partners. The Soldiers of the 509th and 52nd provided full-spectrum communications during the exercise, including not only Non-classified Internet Protocol Router, but also the secure CoNET Primary Network that was tunneled through a Tactical Local Area Network Encryption or TACLANE.

Eventually the network was supplemented by a microwave line of site that allowed for additional bandwidth, and the Soldiers were able to deal with environmental limitations, and the need to find solutions to work around them.



Soldiers must update EFMP status before PCS

Every year, many active duty personnel at Camp Darby eagerly await their assignment orders to new destinations.

However, it can become a frustrating event if they haven't done the necessary legwork to ensure their local personnel office has all of the information necessary to complete this process.

Last year more than 20,000 Soldiers in the Army didn't update their Exceptional Family Member Program status as required every three years. Many didn't even know that they or their family members were even enrolled in the program.

EFMP is based on federally mandated laws to ensure children and adults with need of special education, treatment, therapies and counseling receive proper services.

This can be critical for military members and their dependents because foreign assignments may not have the special educational, medical, mental health or others resources family members need.

All the services now require EFMP screening to be completed before any overseas PCS move, to ensure that each family is assigned to an appropriate location that has access to all of the resources that can support their family members' needs.

How do families enroll?

Soldiers and family members must enroll through their local Army medical treatment facility.

The military sponsor and the attending medical or educational specialist complete the EFMP enrollment forms (5888/2792).

The clinic EFMP coordinator will help the member set up an appointment and assist in completing paperwork. Completed forms are forwarded to the regional EFMP team to review and then sent to Personnel Command.

Who can help?

839th Transportation Bn. Soldiers complete border protection course

The 839th Transportation Battalion recently certified 10 personnel to clear cargo to the U.S. Department of Agriculture standards.

The eight-hour Customs Border Clearance Agent course teaches personnel what to look for on cargo heading to the United States. Soldiers have recently completed inspections in Italy, Croatia, the Ukraine, to name a few overseas locations.

The class taught the new CBCAs how to properly inspect the cargo inside

The course is designed to emphasize that proper planning and communication between the customer and inspector helps result in inspections that allow all cargo to be pre-cleared for transport to

To ensure a smooth inspection, the customer needs to be fully aware of the steps required to completely inspect each piece of cargo. For a container, a CBCA must be present prior to and during the loading of the container. By seeing the container empty and loaded prior to being sealed, the CBCA can ensure that no harmful organic material is being transported.

After the container is sealed, the customer needs to arrange for the container to be pressure washed at the port to ensure that all organic materials that hitched a ride on the cargo during transport to the port are removed. By following these steps, the customer should not have any trouble obtaining a USDA customs pre-clearance stamp.

For inspectors to remain qualified, they must attend quarterly training where they receive refresher training and news updates. This training allows each inspector to learn about trends and new regulations from the European Command Agricultural Customs Office and the USDA.

Although the EUCOM Agricultural Customs Office is ultimately responsible for all agricultural customs inspections in Europe, the creation of 839th Trans. Bn.'s Agricultural Customs Program assists with the inspections that occur in conjunction with the battalion's missions.

The battalion's program increases efficiency throughout the EUCOM area of responsibility by allowing for flexibility in mission planning. It has also decreased mission costs by enabling the battalion to provide inspectors when the **EUCOM Agricultural Customs Office is** unable to support.


In the 78th minute, Jadmir Holloway struck from 20 meters out from the left side to score the garrison team's only goal and avoid a shutout.
