Gadson brings message of hope, undying determination to Vicenza

Lt. Col. Greg Gadson, a bilateral above-the-knee amputee, adddressed U.S. military community members at the Caserma Ederle post theater Sept. 25.

His message was one of hope and determination. Gadson was serving with the 2nd Battalion, 32nd Field Artillery in Iraq when his convoy was struck by an improvised explosive device in 2007.

He and wife Kim talked candidly with audience members about individual and family struggles as they continue to recover from Gadson's life-altering experience. The key to recovering from such a devastating event is to walk in love, allowing yourself to grieve and be angry at the situation and not the family member, insisted the former field artillery commander and his wife. The Gadsons opened the floor to questions from the audience after their speech.

Garrison news Garrison urges troops, community members to avoid unofficial taxis

USAG Vicenza troops and community members are being warned not to use

unofficial taxi services.

There have been several recent reports of passengers who were quoted a reasonable fare upon entering an unofficial taxi, only to be charged more

than double the reasonable fare upon arriving at their destination.

There are also reports of at least one service member who was assaulted by an unofficial

taxi driver, according to a 1st Battalion (Airborne), 503rd Infantry official.

"This is a serious problem and

potentially dangerous. The bottom line is that troops should only use official taxis, which are properly marked and have meters. "And always employ the buddy system," said USAG Vicenza Command Sgt. Maj. Jeffrey Hartless. "Don't travel alone,

and if anything seems strange, remember as many details as possible and report it to the military police immediately."

civilian, postal and military donors during the campaign season support eligible nonprofit organizations that provide health and human service benefits throughout the world.

It is the only authorized solicitation of federal employees in their workplaces on behalf of approved charitable organizations.

The CFC-Overseas program raised more than \$15.8 million during its 2008 campaign.

Steinhorst said each unit or organization has a CFC representative who can assist donors in filling out their pledge cards.

Pledge cards can be filled out manually and given to the unit representative or completed online with the "Online Pledge Assistant," which helps participants identify charities by name. Pledge cards filled out online must still be printed and given to your local CAPO.

Payment can be made by cash, check, credit or debit transaction or by payroll deduction.

When making donations, contributors can designate that their pledges go to support specific charities. Overseas donors can also contribute to one special program — the Family Support and Youth Programs initiative.

One hundred percent of donations made to FSYP go directly to overseas military communities to help fund child care, emergency assistance, recreation, community education and other quality of life programs and facilities, and enable overseas locations to offer free or reduced-cost programs. According to a September 2009 U.S. Army Europe news release, the U.S. Army community in Europe received nearly \$93,000 in funds from the FYSP program following last year's CFC-O campaign.

"This is a chance to give to many different charity agencies or to our own community by donating to the Family Support and Youth Programs initiative," noted USAG Livorno Command Sgt. Maj. Felix Rodriguez. "Donating to FSYP means supporting our Soldiers and families by improving the experience of living abroad or helping in the transition."

Community events BOSS urges Don't be "That Guy"

Camp Darby's Better Opportunity for Single Service members teamed up with USAG Livorno's Safety Office and Army Community Service to talk with junior troops about binge drinking and to kick off the *That Guy* campaign Sept. 25.

"This campaign is not an abstinence campaign and it's great the BOSS program here is being proactive about peer-to-peer efforts to reduce excessive drinking among troops living in the barracks," said USAG Livorno Command Sgt. Maj. Felix Rodriguez.

He said that taking the time to get the troops together in the base theater before the holidays started was a good way to help remind them about the consequence of drinking and driving.

BOSS members handed out *That Guy* drink coasters and playing cards with saying on them such as "Going home with a '10', waking up with a '2'," and "What you won't remember, your friends will," along with entertaining synopses about the dancing guy, the player guy and the drama queen.

One thing the service members learned that wasn't entertaining was that under Italian law if they are out with "That Guy" and there is an alcohol related incident, they too can be held accountable for aiding and abetting, according to Army Capt. Todd Simpson, the staff judge advocate at Camp Darby.

"The Italians have penal codes that punish those who help someone get drunk or are involved in a brawl with three or more people," he said.
