Of 2008's 2,553 potential donors, \$193,599 was pledged by 1,651 community members. This year, he's hoping for at least 70 percent participation and \$200,000 in pledges. Health center starts flu immunizations; **Novel H1N1 vaccine arriving late fall**

The health center kicked off its flu prevention program last month and are offering two types of vaccine to the community:

■ The nasal-spray — a vaccine made with live, weakened flu viruses that do not cause the flu (sometimes called LAIV for live attenuated influenza vaccine or FluMist). LAIV (FluMist) is approved for use in healthy people 2-49 years of age who are not pregnant.

■ The flu shot — an inactivated vaccine (containing a killed virus) that is given with a needle, usually in the arm. The flu shot is approved for use in infants 6-24 months, those 50 years and older, and people with chronic medical conditions.

According to Vicenza health officials, the vaccine for the Novel H1N1 influenza will arrive later this fall and the health center will launch a campaign to get it to the community. In the meantime, officials advise community members to take the following steps to stay healthy:

Get your regular flu vaccine (nasal spray or shot) by visiting the health center.

• Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

■ Wash hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. If soap and water are not available, use an alcoholbased hand rub.

Avoid touching eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way. ■ Stay home if you get sick. CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

No. Novel H1N1 (referred to as "swine flu" early on) is a new influenza virus causing illness in people. This new virus was first detected in people in the United States in April 2009. This virus is spreading from person to person worldwide, probably in much the same way that regular seasonal influenza viruses spread. On June 11, 2009, the World Health Organization (WHO) signaled that a pandemic of novel H1N1 flu was underway.

Q: How severe is illness associated with novel H1N1?

A: Illness with the new H1N1 virus has ranged from mild to severe. While most people who have been sick have recovered without needing medical treatment, hospitalizations and deaths from infection with this virus have occurred. About 70 percent of people who have been hospitalized with this novel H1N1 virus have had one or more medical conditions previously recognized as placing people at "high risk" of serious seasonal flu-related complications.

Army Community Service sponsored a 360-degree installation tour Friday for senior spouses and Family Readiness Group leaders.

"It is most important that the leaders and their spouses receive firsthand information to pass on to their groups," said Rita Bonamego, ACS mobilization-deployment program manager.

The itinerary included a tour of new construction at Caserma Ederle and the Villaggio housing area.

"(We) were amazed with the change at Villaggio since last year," said Bonamego of the progress on the new elementary/ middle school complex. The school is expected to open its doors as early as next summer.

The tour marked the first senior spouses visit to the Dal Molin construction site, the future home of the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team. "This was a really informative tour that helped our Family Readiness Group leaders and advisors understand a lot more about Dal Molin," said Kimberly Garrett, wife of U.S. Army Africa Commander Maj. Gen. William Garrett III.

Tour participants received briefings on the U.S. military in Vicenza construction projects and a firsthand glimpse at boots on the ground as the more than \$500 million construction projects move forward.

Patty Francis said she was most impressed with the "care the Dal Molin team takes when coming across archeological finds. "Of the effort the military is placing on environmentally friendly architecture, she said "it's outstanding. It is the future of architecture and meshes with the desire to cut down on the overhead to run a military installation."

The tour concluded with noon refreshments at the ACS building, where participants gathered to discuss the day's events.





Former Carabinieri achieves dream to own his own café

Giuseppe Imbesi, or Pino to most, didn't begin his career in the café business but "it was always his dream," according to his wife, Maria Amoruso. "He's always been good at cooking and in the kitchen," she says.

When he retired from a 27-year career in the Carabinieri in 2000, he took over the Carabinieri bar on post, behind the MP station. Four years ago he opened Ciao Café across from the post office and has steadily expanded his operation

since then.

Born in the small fishing village of Bagnara in Calabria, Imbesi later moved to Florence. He met Amoruso at the wedding of his sister and her brother in Bagnara. Amoruso was an elementary school teacher living in Vicenza at the time. In 1985 he transferred to Vicenza and the two got married. The couple have a 21-year old daughter who attends university to become an engineer.

Amoruso gives Imbesi a hand running the café during the summers and in the afternoons during the school year.

"He's the brains," said Amoruso. "I

just help out when I can."

"It's the best coffee on post" says Ciao Café customer Matt Stanley one recent afternoon. Indeed, at all hours of the day, American and Italian customers alike line up for their daily dose of espresso, snacks, sandwiches and even pasta that are offered at the café. Kids are entertained by the fresh orange juice machine and enjoy the thick hot chocolate that Imbesi mixes up to order.

A man of few words who wasn't sure about the publicity of a newspaper article, Imbesi seems content in his second career.

Fifty citizens from the small country of San Marino in eastern Italy visited Camp Darby Oct. 1 as part of the San Marino-American Association.

Association president Paolo Berardi explained that the association was established on July 4, 1978, with the aim of strengthening economic and cultural cooperation between the two countries.

"San Marino in the past was a very poor country and many citizens migrated to the United States to search for employment," said Berardi. "Upon their return to San Marino they felt the need of maintaining a constructive relationship with the host country".

Ready to tie the knot? Proof of legal status now needed to marry in Italy

U.S. citizens who want to get married in Italy now have to produce evidence of their legal status in Italy, according to Michela Ferrara, Camp Darby soggiorno technician.

"Active duty service members now need a copy of their military orders and their dependents and civilians will need their permesso di soggiorno if they wish to get married in Italy," said Ferrara. "Fiancés who come from the States to get married in Italy have to report to the Italian immigration office first and obtain a tourist permesso di soggiorno (tourist permit of stay in Italy) before they can start the procedure to get married."
