Noncommissioned officers who would like to get involved in on- and off-post activities have a new opportunity. The Sergeant Morales Club is getting started and they are looking for individuals who want to help others.

The Sergeant Morales Club was founded in 1973 by Lt. Gen. George S. Blanchard to promote the ideals of integrity, professionalism and leadership for enlisted Soldiers serving in Europe. Membership is considered exclusive and unique, because of the rigorous process members go through to join.

"The Sergeant Morales Club is similar to the Sergeant Audie Murphy Club, only specifically for Europe," said new club president, Sgt. 1st Class Thomas Kupsh, 509th Signal Battalion. "If you were a member of the Sergeant Audie Murphy Club in the U.S. you can be an honorary member of the Sergeant Morales Club."

The procedures for new members are the same as the Sergeant Audie Murphy Club. There is a board process that begins at the battalion level and goes up.

The idea for getting the club started came from Sgt. Maj. Rodney Rundblade, U.S. Army Africa, who saw a need here in Vicenza.

"The motivation to getting the program started within the Vicenza military community is to fulfill an obligation in allowing an opportunity for our NCOs to excel within their careers," Rundblade said.

The Sergeant Morales Club's motto is, "Be, Know, Do" encouraging its members to live by the leadership attributes.

According to Army in Europe Regulation 600-2, Sergeant Morales was a squad leader for three years in an engineer battalion. He did not have a high school degree and was of Puerto Rican descent with a limited knowledge of the English language. Sergeant Morales had been trained as a barber and would cut Soldiers' hair free. He had monthly get-togethers in his home for Soldiers and their families. During his time as squad leader, there were no AWOLs and everyone finished well on training tests. While serving

## New fiscal reality, same commitment to Soldiers, families

A fundamentally different fiscal reality. We will be hearing some variation of that phrase from Army leaders for a long time to come. The Army's budget is smaller than it has been in previous years, and it will get smaller still. However, a different fiscal reality does not change the reality of what we owe to Soldiers and families for their service and sacrifice. The Army's

commitment to Soldiers and families remains as strong as ever.

For the last 18 months, the Installation Management Community has been taking a hard look at the programs and services we provide to Soldiers and families, with an eye not only to costs but also to effectiveness.



As the inevitable belt-tightening comes, we are not trying to do more with less. We are working to make sure we can do the important things better.

One of our most important efforts has been to fully establish Survivor Outreach Services, to provide survivors with longer-term, expanded support and care after casualty assistance ends. SOS staff have made tremendous progress in a short time, receiving more than 24,000 cases from Casualty and Mortuary Affairs, and they continue to enhance services as more survivors provide feedback.

Other efforts include:

\*Transforming how Army Community Service delivers services, by cross-training more generalists to handle multiple programs and moving service locations out into communities.

\*Hiring more than 240 additional Army Substance Abuse Program counselors for installations worldwide.

\*Launching the Confidential Alcohol Treatment and Education Pilot, a program which allows Soldiers to seek help for addiction without mandatory command involvement.

\*Revising the Total Army Sponsorship Program that helps prepare Soldiers, Families and Civilians for their new duty station.

\*Reinvigorating the Army Family Action Plan process, with an analysis and review process that has reduced the backlog of active AFAP issues from 86 in February 2010 to 51 in February 2011.

This is a snapshot of what we have been doing to enhance support for Soldiers and families. It does not begin to convey the full scope of the programs and services installation management professionals provide every day, including housing, public works, emergency services, environmental programs, recreation, child care, single Soldier programs and family programs.

When we look at some big indicators, we see evidence that the Army is meeting the needs of Soldiers and families. The Army is exceeding its recruitment and retention goals, and on the most recent survey of Army families, the majority of spouses said they are satisfied with the Army as a way of life. This is significant after 10 years of ongoing conflict-it speaks to the dedication of Soldiers and their families and the Army's commitment to providing a quality of life commensurate with their service.

In the new fiscal reality, it will be more of a challenge for the IMCOM to provide the level of support we want to for our Soldiers and Families, but we will. We are finding better and smarter ways to provide services and programs by asking ourselves the same questions Families ask when they look at their own budgets: do we really need it? Is it worth the cost? What are we willing to do without?

To answer these questions, we need to keep hearing from Soldiers and family members-through ICE and local AFAP summits, for example-about the specifics of what is working, what needs to be improved, and what is missing. The commitment to supporting Soldiers and families remains as strong as ever, but more than ever, we have to make sure we are on target in meeting their peads.

### Poor choices, bad behavior could be costly for Soldiers in Vicenza

On any given night, military members and civilians can be found dining out and enjoying downtown Vicenza. Sometimes, "enjoying downtown Vicenza" includes consuming alcoholic beverages. While minimum drinking ages are lower in Italy than in the United States, it is not safe to assume that all laws are relaxed. In fact, there is one local law regarding drinking in public places that is being enforced more frequently. What is most troubling about this law is that until recently many did not know it existed.

In 2007, the mayor of Vicenza approved an ordinance prohibiting the consumption of alcohol in public areas. The ordinance resulted from pressure and complaints by citizens of Vicenza that those participating in such activities were trashing the city, disturbing the peace, and engaging in violent and indecent acts.

The list of places where alcohol is prohibited specifically mentions public areas,

parks, green areas, and public parking areas. This is not a complete list of areas where public drinking is prohibited. The only known exception to the ordinance includes designated outdoor areas of bars and restaurants.

Until recently, this ordinance was not strictly enforced. However, fines have become common in recent months. According to the ordinance, the fines may range from  $\[ \in \] 25-500$ . The reports suggest that most fines given are closer to the  $\[ \in \] 500$  amount.

Therefore, if you go out and spend time in downtown Vicenza, make sure you are not walking around public areas with alcohol. Even if the next bar you are visiting is within walking distance, it is recommended that you do not travel with alcohol in the downtown area. Furthermore, bear in mind that similar ordinances may exist in other cities in Europe, so be conscious of this while traveling.

Always remember to act responsibly, and exercise good judgment wherever you find yourself. Remember, living abroad is a privilege, and with it comes responsibility to be good guests of our host nation.

## Gothic Line sacrifices are never forgotten

On Italy's National Day of Liberation, April 25, the Commune of Ortonovo had a ceremony recognizing the contributions of World War II U.S. Army Soldiers, and dedicated the Annunziata town square to a fallen townswoman.

Capt. Nathaniel Paschal, USAG Livorno Headquarters and Headquarters detachment commander, Ortonovo Mayor Professor Francesco Pietrini and president of the Circolo Culturale "Nicola Nostra," Elio Gentili, spoke during the liberation ceremony about how the sacrifices of the American Soldiers will never be forgotten in the comune.

"When an elderly man late in his years, assisted by a young relative, came to thank me, as an American Soldier, for rescuing him from a Nazi prisoner camp, it was moving," said Paschal. "Recognizing my rank, he called me captain, shook my hand and vividly recalled the events prior to his rescue as if it happened only weeks before."

Paschal added that attending these ceremonies is always worthwhile for him on a personal level.

"My grandfather served in World War II in England and would often recall events that shaped his view of the world," said Paschal. "Each eye-witness account

is a history lesson."

Thirty minutes down the road from Ortonovo, the commune of Montignoso recently opened the Villa Schiff Giorgini Gothic Line museum which has a series of rooms with documents and miniatures dedicated to the resistance.
