

173rd STB Soldier receives Silver Star

BAGRAM AIR FIELD, Afghanistan

— Capt. William G. Cromie of the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team was presented the Silver Star during a ceremony July 12 at Bagram Air Field.

Cromie was recognized for his actions during an ambush on Nov. 16, 2007, while serving as platoon leader for 3rd Platoon, Alpha Company, 173rd Special Troops Battalion for a route-clearance operation along the Korengal Road in Konar province.

Maj. Gen. Jeffrey Schloesser, Combined Joint Task Force 101 commander, presented the award, one of the highest military decorations, and praised Cromie for his valor.

The platoon was called out to perform route clearance on a portion of the Korengal Road after receiving a tip an improvised explosive device may have been placed there.

"While travelling down the road, our first vehicle struck an IED," said Cromie. "Immediately, we were ambushed on three sides by heavily-armed militants." I really would like to thank the squad leaders. They really acted professionally even under a stressful situation like that.

And the guys in 3rd Platoon for their bravery.

Two of his Soldiers managed to maneuver into a better position that allowed them to cover the platoon, but they were soon pinned down and running dangerously low on ammunition. Grabbing more ammunition, Cromie took off through the small-arms cross fire to resupply his two Soldiers.

The platoon called for close-air support, and mounted a counter-attack which pushed the militants back to a fortified compound. The platoon then cleared the compound and killed the militants.

"I really would like to thank the squad leaders," said Cromie. "They really acted professionally even under a stressful situation like that.

"And the guys in 3rd Platoon for their bravery," he added.

"Few militaries have the experience and

professionalism as our Georgian brethren, and we acknowledge your contribution to ongoing operations in the Global War on Terror and greatly appreciate your shared commitment.

"We fully expect to learn from you and are optimistic you will value the training we will provide."



Immediate Response is an annual, bilateral security cooperation exercise conducted between U.S. and coalition partners. The exercise is focused on interoperability training and is designed to promote understanding and cooperation between military forces of the United States and its allies.

Sinise entertains troops, supports children

SCHWEINFURT, Germany – The Lt. Dan Band played U.S. Army Garrison Schweinfurt July 7 with a blend of rock, funk, soul and pop covering the last 40 years of music, and then some.

Gary Sinise, star of stage and screen both big and small, co-founded the band and lent the name of one of his more famous screen personas – Lt. Dan from the movie "Forrest Gump" – to the group.

Sinise and Kimo Williams, a Vietnam veteran and composer, co-founded the band as a way to entertain troops and veterans, touring overseas with the United Service Organizations and performing stateside on bases and in veterans' hospitals.

Besides his work with the Lt. Dan Band, the bass-

playing Sinise travels on his own to visit deployed Soldiers. It was on one such trip in 2003 that Sinise formed the seed of an idea that would grow into another goodwill project known as Operation Iraqi Children.

"When I went to Iraq on my second tour in November of 2003," Sinise explained, "I [visited community] schools. The troops took me out to these schools they had rebuilt and refurbished."

What struck him immediately was the scarcity of basic materials such as paper and pencils. After returning home, Sinise gathered school supplies and shipped them to Soldiers in Iraq with whom he had met for them to distribute.

"They videotaped it all, and sent it to me," he recalled. "I ... thought this would be a great way to help the troops interact with kids around Iraq."

That seed grew into OIC, which in 2004 began shipping school supply kits to U.S. troops for distribution in Iraqi schools

"The troops can't seem to get enough ... and now we're shipping to Afghanistan," Sinise said.

For example, last fall, 2,048 school supply kits made their way to Bagram Air Base in Afghanistan. Those supply kits were flown by helicopter to Forward Operating Base Naray, where Soldiers from the Schweinfurt-based 1st Squadron, 91st Cavalry Regiment (Airborne), 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, took charge of them.

"The supplies were distributed to the Naray and Nishigam Schools," wrote squadron Chaplain (Capt.) Kelly O'Lear in an e-mail. The chaplain and most of the 1-91 CAV are wrapping up their mission in Afghanistan, but more school supplies for the children are "en route," according to O'Lear.

But whether it's rocking out on Kessler Field here, touring deployed positions or gathering supplies for needy children, Sinise believes that it is his "purpose to help our Soldiers."

With the Lt. Dan Band, that assistance comes in the form of musical entertainment. As for Operation Iraqi Children, Sinise hopes to help "extend the hand of friendship" between Soldiers and children impacted by military operations.

"[OIC] helps the kids to see that Soldiers are not just people that carry guns, but ... can be helpful and beneficial to them as well," Sinise said.

"It is heartwarming to see how the supplies help troops help the kids," Sinise said.

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

Commissary checkout systems save time

Bob Comer, DeCA's CARTS program manager, said the new system is easy to use and is the latest in grocery store technology.

"This new system will noticeably cut down on customers' wait times because cashiers now have a 360-degree scanning capability so the product no longer has to be perfectly aligned when scanned like the old system," said Comer.

Miguel Vicente, commissary patron, says the self checkout makes getting in and out of the commissary at lunch time very fast.

"I only have 30 minutes for lunch and now that I don't have to wait in line, I can actually enjoy eating my sandwich instead of trying to scarf it down while walking back to work," said Vicente.

According to Gerri Young, DeCA-Europe Public Affairs, stores will receive different quantities and styles of these registers based on sales.

"The Express Plus model is for 15 items or less and features a three-unit bagging module whereas the Carousel model is for 40 items or less with a six-unit bagging module," said Young. "Many customers enjoy having control over their shopping experience and appreciate the convenience of being able to pick up a few items during lunch hour or after work and being able to check out by themselves; timed results have shown checkout to be as little as two to three minutes

with only a couple of items —perfect for those who want to pick up something quick for lunch or buy those few essentials before going home for the day."

Young added that Livorno, Vicenza, Aviano and Neubruecke will finish installation in July and Mannheim, Baumholder and Riyadh will see this new technology arriving at their commissaries in August.

Postage stamp brings cultures together

The San Marino-American Friendship Association celebrated its 30^{th} anniversary on Independence Day and in honor of the occasion, San Marino, one of the oldest European Republics, issued a \in 1.50 stamp which depicts the images of the respective states' statues of liberty.

According to the designing artist Cristian Cerraroni, "the stamp represents in a simple, yet incisive and direct manner, the values which characterize the association, friendship and peace.

"The closeness of the two symbols, the two flags, highlights a symbolic and humanitarian union, tolerance and willingness, an active coexistence with mutual respect and support."

Between the end of the 19th century and the mid-1900s, San Marino saw a great exodus of thousands of Sammarinese, many ending up in Detroit, Michigan, said Olimpio Guidi, a native Sammarinesi who grew up in Detroit, became an American citizen and served in the U.S. Navy as a Hospital Corpsman.

"In order to further strengthen ties between those who immigrated to the United States and to assist those who returned to San Marino, the Mutual Friendship Association was founded in 1978," said Guidi. "The MFA sponsors social events, including celebrating two uniquely American holidays: Thanksgiving and the Fourth of July."

Guidi added that civilian and military representatives of the United States have been honored guests at these events in San Marino.

U.S. Army Garrison Livorno Commander, Lt. Col. Steven Cade, who attended the event, said he was glad his family and him got to be part of the occasion.

"San Marino began issuing its own stamps in 1877 and has

released a famous series dedicated to the presidents of the United States, emigration to the United States and Walt Disney, so to be part of the friendship stamp ceremony really enforces how much our two cultures have in common," said Cade.

Daniela DiPierro, vice consul at the U.S. Consulate in Naples and also attending the ceremony added "I was humbled by the

gracious hospitality of the association. I know I can speak on behalf of my countrymen when I say 'thank you' from the bottom of my heart. I can only hope to have the pleasure to visit the beautiful Republic of San Marino again. I will cherish the beautiful stamp I was given as a token of our shared values of brotherhood, friendship and peace."

Local zoo offers family fun

Summer vacation just doesn't seem the same without a trip to the zoo. There is something enchanting about seeing all those animals, large and small, from all over the world. And, who would have guessed, there's a zoo, practically in our back yard.

Located just outside of the center of Nove, about 30 minutes from Vicenza, is *Il Parco Faunistico Cappeller (zoo)*; an oasis of exotic birds, mammals, reptiles and more. With over 500 species to see, your family members are sure to find at least one which inspires the imagination.

"My favorite is the monkeys," said 3-year-old Diego Tovo, who was visiting the park with his family. "I also liked the zebras, just like on 'Madagascar."

Unlike large zoos in the states, the animal habitats are open-air, and visitors can get a close-up view of most of the animals on display. By the tidiness of the park, it is visible the animals are well-cared for.

The park is 40,000 meters square and takes about two hours to stroll through depending on the speed of little feet and what sparks their interest. Also, there are many rest areas spread throughout the park which host picnic tables and playground equipment for children.

It's possible to make a day out of the visit and bring along your own coolers with lunch goodies, but no feeding the animals, except in the petting zoo area where there are gumball-like machines with corn for purchase to feed the goats and others. There are also snack bars serving sandwiches and beverages, as well as spacious bathrooms throughout the park.

"I like to move it, move it," sang Tovo to the black and white lemurs sunbathing in the trees, another one of his favorites from the movie "Madagascar."

During the summer through Nov. 15, the park is open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday

through Thursday. Closed on Fridays, except for August when it is open daily. The cost is 9 euro for adults and 6 euro for children.

Directions: Entering the center of <u>Nove</u> from Vicenza, take a right at the center crossroads onto Via Brenta and go over the bridge. Following the bridge, go straight through the traffic circle and watch for the park's sign. Turn right on Via Marabelli (it is the first right street following the traffic circle).

Highlights in Milano, more

A visit to Milano

Life in <u>Milano</u> centers around the area of the *Duomo*. A huge Gothic cathedral with more than 2,000 statues and over 140 spires, the *Duomo* hosts a large gold Madonna at the top. The best time to visit is on a sunny day, when light penetrating the windows creates a kaleidoscope of colors through the interior of the church.

There's also the world's most famous opera house, *La Scala*, which first opened in 1778 and has, since that time, entertained several generations of opera fans from around the world. Opera lovers who visit the museum, located in *La Scala*, will find numerous mementos and items of opera memorabilia including two rooms devoted to Verdi featuring, among other things, Verdi's scores in his own hand and his jewel-encrusted baton.

Art lovers can find Leonardo da Vinci's masterpiece "The Last Supper" in the refectory at the *Basilica di Santa Maria delle Grazie*. The painting has deteriorated over the years and has undergone a number of restorations. To view the painting, visitors must make reservations in advance which can be done by calling the booking office in Milano at 02-8942-1146. The office is open Monday-Friday 9 a.m.-6 p.m., Saturday 9 a.m.-2 p.m. or book online at www.cenacolovinciano.org. Only small groups are allowed inside at a time and only for 15 minutes. Cost is approximately 8 euro.

A model of 19th century life

Lying on the River Adda, about 18 miles east of Milano, Crespi d'Adda is a unique and fascinating example of a late 19th-century village.

Established in 1878 by Christoforo Benigno Crespi, proprietor of a cotton mill, the community included the factory, housing and social facilities for employees, a central square, a church, and a castle for the owners.

The areas for work, free time and housing are clearly delineated, with the layout faithfully reflecting the social hierarchy. The residential accommodations upscale the further away from the factory, with apartment blocks for the workers, terraced housing for the clerks and roomy villas for management.

The project continued until 1925, by which time there were also a free school for children of employees, medical clinic, cemetery and public washhouse. The village was also the first in Italy to have public electric lighting.

Despite the closure of the cotton mills many years ago, the village has remained largely untouched. Guided visits are available and take about three hours, or you can wander on your own. The Web site, also in English, outlines a one-hour walking tour. Call 029-098-7191 for reservations and visit www.villaggiocrespi.it for more information.
