From the DAG

Dear National Guard Retiree,

I hope everyone had a great holiday season. 2007 was an extremely busy year for the North Dakota National Guard. Looking ahead to 2008, it is clear that the high operational tempo and transformational challenges we faced in 2007 will be with us in 2008 and beyond.

As part of the continuing transformation of the Army STARC headquarters to a true Joint Force Headquarters, the N.D. National Guard will launch a joint publication this month the 'ND Guardian'. This publication will be produced using the combined talents of our Soldiers and Airmen and will highlight the strengths, accomplishments and diversity of our organization. Look for the 'ND Guardian' in your mailbox in the near future.

In other transformation news, the Air National Guard continues its transformation from fighter aircraft to Predators and C-21s. The Wing is also progressing nicely in standing up their security mission at Minot Air Force base. Additionally, Patrick Martin has been promoted to Brigadier General. He will continue to serve as Chief of Joint Staff and Assistant Adjutant General for Air.

On the Army side, the 141st Combat Support Brigade (ME) will be renamed the 141st Maneuver Enhancement Brigade (MEB) on Feb 1. The unit has begun drilling in Fargo and continues steady progress toward becoming an operational headquarters. With the return of the 34th Engineer Brigade this spring, the final pieces of the puzzle will be in place for the 141st MEB to officially activate and assume control of subordinate units.

In addition to the 34th Engineer Brigade we have a number of Army units coming and going in support of the War on Terror. We'll welcome home 1-188th Air Defense Artillery (Raid Detachment), the 132nd Quartermaster Detachment, the 817th Engineer Company and the 164th Engineer Battalion during the first half of 2008. We'll see off the 191st Military Police Company in mid-January as they head off to Iraq. We have also announced that the N.D. National Guard will lead 1,400 Soldiers in the Balkans (Bosnia and Kosovo) mission in late 2009. This will be a multi-state, multi-component, multi-country mission that should prove to be a challenging and exciting mission for our National Guard.

Transforming while fighting a war is a tall order, but the N.D. National Guard has shown it is up to the challenges and continues to build on the great legacy of our retirees.

At our quarterly meeting at Camp Grafton in conjunction with the Retirees Weekend in September we questioned how we, as retirees, are organized in the state since the advent of the Retiree's Advisory Board and what is our relationships with the existing Retiree Caucuses under the NGAND and NDNGEA.


Going back to the beginning of the Retiree's Advisory Board, the initial goals were to improve relationships and communications between the National Guard and its Retirees and improve National Guard support to its Retirees. There was some thought expressed that over time this board, comprised of regional and functional liaisons could be the umbrella organization for all retirees whether officer, enlisted, army, or air. The decision was to be made by all of us and in no way forced on us by the Guard leadership at the time.

As the Board matured it became clear that being organized formally and sanctioned by the Guard had benefits. Resources were made available to fund initiatives that would achieve those initial goals, this newsletter, as an example.

Within that the first year of existence Retirees' Caucuses from NGAND and NDNGEA were struggling to sustain the yearly Retiree's Weekend at Camp Grafton. That year they had asked for the Guard's help in doing the mail out to save money and used the new Retiree's Advisory Board's database. Over the next few quarterly meetings the board decided to ask the Officer and Enlisted Associations if they would allow the Retiree's Advisory Board to assume sponsorship of the weekend with each association taking a supporting role. Each association agreed and at the next meeting the weekend organizers (Ray Scharnowske, Christie Barkke, and Terry Thilmony) were invited to workout a transition process. There existed then and even now some question as to the relationships between the Board, the associations, and the retirees group (association).

The following two charts depict how we believe the organizational lines and relationships were and what we believe they are now.

The Advisory Board now has a standing subcommittee for the Retiree's Weekend. This event, open to all NDNG Retirees, will be the yearly flagship event for the Board.

NEW VETERANS HOME IN LISBON

As we age, so do our facilities. The North Dakota Soldiers Home, as it was originally called back in 1891, currently exists on 92 beautiful acres in southern Lisbon, ND, along side the meandering Sheyenne River. Numerous trees provide the decor for this home on the gently rolling hillsides where peace and tranquility are afforded without so much as the mentioning of a single word.

The first barracks building was built in 1893 and a hospital was built in 1899. The "Commandant's House", which was probably built in the WPA days, the dirty '30s, is currently used by the present administrator and his family. Very few changes were made until the '40s when the barracks and hospital were removed and the current main structure was built to provide housing and care for those veterans in need.

A four story structure was added onto the main building in 1980 and the name was officially changed to the North Dakota Veterans Home in 1983. In 1990 another addition was added to the east end to provide space for skilled nursing. Although the home has an authorization for 150 beds only 122 are in use at this time because of various restricting factors.

Currently the home is maintained in the best condition possible but as a result of a life safety inspection during late 2006 the main structure failed current fire safety requirements and could not be brought up to standards without major renovation. The 2007 session of the state legislature, aware of the importance of the home, worked with the federal government to provide funds to build a new state of the art veterans home.

Although current authorizations are short several million dollars in providing the \$27 million needed for a new facility, it has been determined that the necessary funding can be attained by loans, grants and special programs. Hopefully construction will begin by fall 2008 with the official opening occuring late 2009. Yes, our facilities are keeping up with our needs.

AIR GUARD UPDATE

Change = Opportunity

2007 has been a year of change for the Happy Hooligans of the North Dakota Air National Guard. As many unit members adjust to their new roles within the organization new opportunities are created. The Air Guard conversion to new missions is expected to last at least another year indicating there could be many more opportunities to come.

The predator mission is growing faster than anticipated. At this time the North Dakota Air Guard is the only guard unit in the nation that has expanded their operation to 2 predator control stations. This has almost doubled their manning requirements creating enormous opportunity for those who want to convert to this challenging new career field.

This year the Air Guard in North Dakota has also established the largest Security Police Squadron in the total Air National Guard. Located in Minot, this squadron presents lots of opportunity for both Army and Air guard personnel. Right now they have approximately 70 traditional and 30 fulltime non-deployable AGR positions available. If Minot is the place you want to be, getting in on the ground floor can only be a plus for our airmen and soldiers.

The C-21 (Lear Jet) business is also alive and well and expanding daily to additional operational missions that create a need for more pilots. If you, a son, a daughter or a grandchild is interested in flying, this is a great opportunity to start at the top with the Happy Hooligans. At this time the Fargo unit is flying two missions a day that are considered operational missions as well as additional local training sorties. These operational missions are important to all retirees because it is these missions that are available for Space A travel. Presently the Hooligans have a dedicated phone number that everyone can call to hear the recorded flight schedule and the number of Space A seats available on each flight. The Space A number is 701-451-2123. Write this number down and check it out. The availability changes daily so I would advise checking it frequently if you are interested in these opportunities for retired travel. Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR) is a Department of Defense organization. We provide free education, consultation, and if necessary, mediation for employers of Guard and Reserve members and the military members themselves. Our goal is to serve America's employers who serve the nation.

The National Office of ESGR has identified and scheduled training courses for our lead volunteers. There will be a three day course for State Chairs and Executive Directors at San Antonio, TX in March; a two day course for Employer Outreach Directors at San Antonio, TX in March; a two day course for Military Services Directors at St. Louis, MO in August; and a two day course for our 10 regional chairs either at Chicago in May or St. Louis in August. This is the first time that training of this magnitude is being provided by the National Office. We thank our volunteers for giving their time to attend this training.

Mandan Chamber of Commerce Holiday Mixer at the Civic Center in December, briefings to the 957 Engr Co and JFHQ in Bismarck and several My Boss is a Patriot Award presentations across the state. Upcoming events include mobilization briefings to the 191 MP Co, a Fargo Committee ESGR regional meeting; a Governor's Task Force meeting in Minot, an ESGR brief to Co A, 231s Engr Bn in Fargo, ISFAC (Interservice Family Assistance Committee) meeting in Grand Forks, and the NGAUS Conference in Fargo.

ND-ESGR probably will not have a National Bosslift in 2008 due to unavailability of airlift. Because the desired aircraft is C-130 or KC-135 provided by the Air Force Reserve or Air National Guard, we are at the mercy of other states. The answer we are getting to our request is the funding is down and missions are up. As a result we are not optimistic of a National Bosslift.

Local instate bosslifts are very meaningful and we are urging commanders to consider an employer/media day during their annual training at Camp Grafton or Camp Ripley. We have been very successful in securing helicopter support from the North Dakota Army Guard Aviation Section.

The 461st Engr Co (USAR) of Grand Forks and Fargo will be honored with a Welcome Home Citizen Award Ceremony on Sunday, March 9th, 2008 at 1:pm. The event will take place at the Memorial Hall, NDSU Campus, Administration Avenue at Centennial Boulevard. The public is invited and encouraged to attend.


