




Renewing ourselves as Spring comes!



Air Force Portal

As I have written about in previous articles, we are continuing to centralize IT services in the Air Force just like the rest of the world is doing. I talked about the fact that our web pages would start to migrate to the Air Force Portal. Well, that is now finally happening.

For the last year we have held back on making any drastic updates to the Vipernet web page on base because this was the future and because our missions and structure were in flux. As I write this in early February, we have deployed the 183rd's pages on the Air Force Portal. Most of the content from the local current "Vipernet" webpage is there in a new format that meets the Air Force criteria. The really nice thing is that these pages can now be accessed from anywhere that you can log into the AF Portal.

In order to find this page, first log into the Air Force Portal. Then look for the blue bar across the top of the portal content. When you move the mouse over the area that says "Bases-Orgs-Functional Areas" a drop down will appear with choices. Pick the one that says "Org A-Z listing" Once that page comes up, the organizational pages will be listed starting with the letter A. Ours is named "183 FW - 183rd

Fighter Wing - IL" so you will need to select the 0-9 under Air Force Organizations A-Z Index. Then scroll down to our listing and click on it. Once it comes up, you will see our main page. There is also a button that says "Save as my Org". From there on, you can get to the page easier.

Please go look at it. It has our drill schedule and other useful information that we all always wished we could get to from home or deployed locations. Not everything is assessable from off base, but most of it is assessable from anywhere. Our local Portal/Web team has gone out of their way to make our pages some of the best I have seen!

Please remember that this is setup as an organizational page. So you are looking for Org's and not Bases. We will also be creating content for the "My Base" page for the 183d but it will be minimal and mostly links to some information about the Springfield area and a link to the My Org page where our

content will be.

Also, in the future, network drives and public folders will all transition to that same higher level. They will more than likely reside on a Microsoft SharePoint server at a regional or national network center. We have few details about

this change, other than the fact that it is going to happen, and more than likely in the next six to 12 months.



As all of this data is moved off of our network, the NCC will have less and less control over the size limits and configurations of systems. Doing some cleanup and organizing now is the best favor you will do for yourself and us over the next year.

Ramstein Airmen show C-130 capabilities to Polish military

2/4/2009 - POWDIZ AIR BASE, Poland (AFNS) -- As the U.S. and Polish celebrate 90 years of diplomatic relations this year, members of the two countries' air forces strengthened their bonds by way of the C-130 Hercules in late January here.

Members of the 86th Airlift Wing from Ramstein Air Base, Germany, visited Powdiz Air Base by way of Warsaw to show off the aircraft's capabilities to Polish military members.

Poland is expected to receive five C-130E models from the U.S. Air Force in the near future. The new airframe is expected to expand Poland's cargo and troop moving capabilities while allowing seamless co-

operation between the two countries in contingency operations anywhere in the world.

The C-130 will be the biggest of the country's aircraft, said Polish Brig. Gen. Tadeusz Mikutel, the 33rd Air Base commander.

During the visit, members of the 86th AW demonstrated low-level flying, mission planning, standard maintenance and loading procedures, and had a chance to exchange ideas with the Polish military.

"One of the things we are able to do while we are here is to be able to partner and work with the Polish Air Force to demonstrate some of the capabilities of the C-130's that they will soon have in their inventory," said Brig. Gen. William J. Bender, the 86th AW commander. "I hope that we will continue to have a great working

relationship between our Air Force and the Polish air force."

While addressing the local Polish media, General Bender reassured the press and the Polish air force that they will be receiving a quality aircraft despite the E models age.

"The models the Polish air force will be getting will have some modifications, and many components will be changed, so now you are looking at year 2000 technology instead of 1960 technology," General Bender said. "It has great capabilities that I believe the Polish air force should be excited to have."

C-130 trained members of the Polish air force had the chance to watch and discuss what their U.S. Air Force counterparts do in their every day jobs on the C-130.

"They have received the same training that we have as members of the U.S. Air Force," said Tech. Sgt. Jay Mitchell. "With the demonstrations here, they get to see how things work outside of the classroom environment."

Through the training and teamwork, the U.S. and Polish air forces will continue to strengthen the bonds they have helped establish through the C-130.

Illinois CPA Society provides free tax return preparation to members of the armed forces

Chicago (December 18, 2008)

– In a show of appreciation to members of the U.S. Armed Forces and their families for their dedicated service, the Illinois CPA Society is once again partnering with the Internal Revenue Service to offer the Military Service Tax Preparation Project. The program, now in its sixth year, provides free personal income tax return filing assistance to members of the U.S. Armed forces who have recently returned or are still serving in a combat zone or qualified hazard-

ous duty area.

Preparing to file your taxes can be stressful enough under ordinary circumstances. But for military personnel and their families already coping with high levels of anxiety, the expertise of program volunteers can help alleviate at least one concern. Military personnel and/or their families are matched with CPA volunteers in their area who help make sure they take full advantage of tax benefits, exclusions, and filing and payment extensions available to them.

The Military Service Tax Preparation Project is designed to help those who don't have a relationship with a CPA and who would otherwise have few resources for financial advice and information on IRS guidelines for military personnel. To qualify for free tax preparation

assistance, individuals must meet the following criteria:

- Be an Illinois resident; and
- Be a member of the U.S.

Armed Forces having served in a combat zone or qualified hazardous duty area (either currently or in the last six months);

• Be a member of the U.S. Armed Forces serving in a contingency operation.

Family members – spouse, son, daughter or parents – can request assistance on behalf of military personnel.
