- 2. You will keep a reading log that will be submitted and will be graded.
- 3. For each book
  - 1. Write down the title, author, publisher and date of the book.
  - 2. You are to keep a reading journal. As you read:
    - Be sure to date your entries and include the page numbers/chapters read. (You may choose to use a Cornell note format for this)
    - 2. Take notes of the facts, information and situations that you are reading about.
    - 3. Write down the vocabulary and/or the information that you do not understand.
    - 4. Write any questions you may develop as a result of your reading.
    - 5. I encourage you to write any kind of response, positive, negative or otherwise, indicating the dates and page numbers or chapter that you are responding to. Include new information that you have learned and what it means to you.
  - 3. When you have completed the book, write a one-page summary
    - 1. As you read, try to relate or connect the information to your life personally.
    - 2. How did you feel about the book, was it a good read? Would you recommend it to others? What information affected you the most?
    - 3. How do you think it will relate to this course? How do you plan to follow up on what you have read?
