As summer quickly approaches, I hope you'll spend more time engaged in outdoor activities with family and friends.

Unfortunately, these activities usually correspond to a rise in safety mishaps involving our personnel. For this reason, the period from Memorial Day through Labor Day is known as the "101 Critical Days of Summer."

Historically, America's highways and waterways are dangerous places for military personnel, especially during the 101 Critical Days.

During last year's 101 Critical Days, the Air Force suffered 23 offduty fatalities. 18 of these involved motor vehicle accidents, in which many of the fatally injured individuals were either speeding, not using seatbelts or helmets, or they involved alcohol. Another five deaths occurred during sports and recreational activities.

These statistics are tragic because of the resulting loss of life, but many of them were preventable.

Here at Homestead, we did not fall victim to the 101 days of summer last year. That is a direct result of your efforts to recognize and manage the risks associated with the many fun activities in South Florida that can easily turn dangerous.

Our home is close to many fun activities, but fun can easily turn into danger if you don't minimize the hazards related to your activities.

Something as simple as a backyard barbeque or a trip to the beach can turn tragic if you don't take the proper precautionary measures.

And of course at this time of year, we South Floridians must pay special attention to the arrival of hurricane season. The Emergency Management office has put together some useful information on that; see page eight for more on that topic.

As you embark on your summertime fun – whether it is a family vacation or simply time outdoors – use your common sense and mitigate the risks.

Let's continue to lower the number of senseless deaths on the highways, waterways and in our own backyards. Drive defensively and wear seat belts when you're on the road, use flotation devices when you're on the water and always arrange for a designated driver when your social activities involve alcohol.

Every one of you and your family members are important members of the Homestead Air Reserve Base team. The loss of any one of you would be tragic.

I'm confident that each of you will do your part to eliminate summertime incidents. Enjoy the 101 days of summer, but please make them safe for you and your family.

New Chief selected as CMSAF #15

WASHINGTON - Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley has named Chief Master Sgt. Rodney J. McKinley to serve as the 15th chief master sergeant of the Air Force. Chief McKinley will assume his new position on July 1, following the June 30 retirement of Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force Gerald R. Murray. CMSAF Murray's retirement culminates 29 years of service to the Air Force.

"I'm excited to have Chief McKinley take the helm of our enlisted force," said General Moseley. "Chief McKinley is a tremendous leader with an impressive array of expeditionary and combat experiences to help him steer our Airmen and serve as my partner. We were blessed to have a number of exceptionally well-qualified candidates for the position. While the decision was not an easy one, I feel we have the right person to lead our enlisted force during this time of a long war on terrorism, recapitalization and transformation. I look forward to working with him."

Chief McKinley is currently the command chief master sergeant for Pacific Air Forces. He originally joined the Air Force in 1974, took a break in service in 1977, attended college, and reentered the Air Force in 1982. Chief McKinley's career includes various assignments in medical, aircraft maintenance, first sergeant and as the command chief master sergeant at the 86th Airlift Wing, Ramstein AB, Germany; 1st Fighter Wing, Langley

Cell phone use while driving now leads to tickets, fines

The Air Force has implemented a new cell phone restriction for drivers, which could lead to loss of base driving privileges for offenders.

As of Feb. 27, drivers are not allowed to talk on their cell phones while driving on Air Force installations without a hands free device. This policy is part of the Department of Defense's Joint Traffic Guidance.

This restriction also applies to all government owned vehicles, or GOVs, at all times. No GOV drivers are permitted to talk on a cell phone while driving without a hands-free device on or off base.

"This is really a cooperative effort for everyone from the base populace to the base leaders," said Master Sgt. Gloria Ornelas, the superintendent of law enforcement for Air Force Security Forces. "I think it is long overdue. The DOD recognized that, and we are now in line with what some states and municipalities are doing to create a safer environment for drivers."

Joint Traffic Regulation, Air Force Instruction 31-218 (I), Motor Vehicle Traffic Supervision, will restrict the use of cell phones while driving. Only cell phones with hands-free devices will be allowed for use by drivers. The Defense Department's joint traffic document states: "Vehicle operators on a DOD Installation and operators of Government owned vehicles shall not use cell phones unless the vehicle is safely parked or unless they are using a hands-free device.

"The wearing of any other portable headphones, earphones or other listening devices (except for hand-free cellular phones) while operating a motor vehicle is prohibited. Use of those devices impairs driving and masks or prevents recognition of emergency signals, alarms, announcements, the approach of vehicles, and human speech. DOD component safety guidance should note the potential for driver distractions such as eating and drinking, operating radios, CD players, global positioning equipment, etc. This should only be done when the vehicle is safely parked."

Using a cell phone while driving without a hands-free device will be considered a "primary offense." This means violators will be able to be stopped solely for this offense.

Offenders will be given three assessment points against their driving records or an appropriate fine. Drivers should be aware that if two or more violations are committed, even on a single occasion, a ticket may be given to the driver for each violation.

"It was recognized at the DOD level that we needed some changes," Ornelas said. "The winner here is the base populace. They will have more mobility while driving, a greater range of view — in short, a safer driving environment for all."

Eight employers were recognized by the Employee Support of the Guard and Reserve organization at a ceremony here May 4. Each company was presented with the ESGR Above and Beyond Award.

One of the companies, Lee Memorial Health System, Fort Myers, Fla., is the ESGR Florida Field Committee's nominee for the 2006 Secretary of Defense Employer Support Freedom Award.

"We're trying to do the right thing," said Ms. Kimberley Gaide, staff activities military support supervisor for Lee Memorial, about the company's commitment to Guard and Reserve members, their families, and the military overall.

"We see ourselves in a [community] leadership role. We're a an organization dedicated to taking care of the health of our community and this role means that we have to set the tone [for all businesses and organizations in the community]," said Mr. Jon C. Cecil, chief human resources officer for Lee Memorial.

The keynote speaker at the event was Thomas F. Hall, Assistant Secretary of Defense for Reserve Affairs. Mr. Hall lauded the employers at the reception for their dedication to the country and to their employees.

Lee Memorial's company motto, "The Heart of the Community," goes a long way in explaining how they became listed as a "National Employer of Choice" recently by the non-profit organization Employers United for a Stronger America. During the awards reception the company also signed the ESGR "5-Star Statement of Support"

letter.

Lee Memorial Health System employs more than 6,800 people in Lee County, Fla., and has close ties to three families directly impacted by the Global War on Terror: first, one of their employees lost a son at the start of Operation Iraqi Freedom; then an employee from one of their hospital emergency rooms was killed while serving in the military. A third employee lost a brother during current operations.

Mr. Cecil refers to Ms. Gaide as the "mom" of the organization. "We send out 50 to 70 care packages a month to service men and women and encourage family members of our Reservists to call me if they need anything at all," said Ms. Gaide.

By signing the 5-Star Letter of Support, Lee Memorial, and the other seven companies, agree to uphold human resources policies that ease employment concerns for their Reservists. They have each reviewed their human resources policies to ensure compliance with the Uniformed Services Employment and Re-Employment Rights Act Law, and they promote training for managers and supervisors to effectively manage their employees who serve in the Guard and Reserve. The companies have adopted polices and programs that are "Above and Beyond" what is required by the USERRA Law, and they will serve as advocates for employee service in the National Guard and Reserve and help promote the mission of ESGR.

Lee Memorial provides full pay and benefits to employee Guard and Reservists for the duration of their military duty.

Mr. Cecil is taking the Lee Memorial philosophy to the Florida business community in an effort to strengthen understanding of the role of Reservists and promote human resources policies that recognize their value.

Air-Sea Show bigger, better than ever 482nd Fighter Wing participates in Fort Lauderdale's premiere air show

May 7, 2006, Fort Lauderdale, Fla. – Deafening noises, huge crowds and bright sunshine combined to make Fort Lauderdale Beach the place to be during the 12th annual Air-Sea Show.

More than a million people turned out over the three days of the event to enjoy the show. The cast of performers read like a "who's who" of the elite aviation community. From the Navy's aerial demonstration team, the "Blue Angels," to the Canadian Forces "Snowbirds," the U.S. Army's "Golden Knights" parachute demonstration team, to a simulated assault of the beach by members of the U.S. Marine Corps Amphibious Assault Group, the weekend rocked the beach with the deafening roar of the air and sea forces of the most powerful military in the world. Spectators were even treated to a four-ship fly-by of F-16s from Homestead's own 93rd Fighter Squadron during the singing of the national anthem.

Spectators also enjoyed seeing some of the U.S. arsenal's most advanced military hardware performing at its most extreme. For example, many of the stunts performed by the Blue Angels' F-18 Hornet aircraft are not often performed in actual combat situations. Many of these aircraft are sent into battle fullyladen with bombs, additional fuel and external tanks which prevent them from engaging in aerial acrobatics.

While the featured performers may have had top billing, all of the acts excelled in the clear South Florida skies. One of the highlights included a fly-by of the Navy's soon-to-be-retired F-14 "Tomcat." The aircraft was put through a series of thunderous passes that had many in the crowd covering their ears. The F-16 "Falcon" aerial

demonstration plane and the F-15 "Strike Eagle" also used their afterburning thunder to get the crowd's attention. While saying goodbye to the older technology of the F-14, the crowds were also treated to a show of might by the newest plane to enter the Air Force arsenal - The F-22 "Raptor."

By far, a crowd pleaser as it showed off its 21st century technology to a crowd that appeared obviously pleased with this investment in our nation's defense. Another crowdpleaser was the brief appearance by the B-2 "Spirit" bomber as it darkened the sky in an eerily quiet pass over the

beach.

Although aerial high-tech was the order of the day, the Air Force's "Heritage Flight" demonstration team reminded spectators that U.S. Air Force roots go back, way back, to a time when stick-and-rudder, seat of the pants flying was considered high tech. Their show team includes the World War II-vintage P-51 "Mustang," the F-15 "Eagle," and the F-16 "Falcon."

Recruiters also had the chance to display their wares during the show. With Homestead's team manning two separate booths to greet arriving and departing folks on either end of the Sunrise Boulevard drawbridge. One booth also happened to be the home-on-the-road for the Air Force Reserve acrobatic pilot Ed Hamill. Flying his custom-built biplane, he was one of the featured performers in the show.

"The air show provides great awareness for the Air Force reserve. This was an opportunity to reach 'influencers' who helped spread the message to potential candidates," said Technical Sgt. Travis Newkirk, Air Force Reserve recruiter. "I had a counselor from George T. Baker Aviation High School who came over and said that he would really like more interaction between us and his

Golden Baton passed to wing commander

Opa Locka, Fla. - Members of the U.S. Army's Golden Knights parachute demonstration team dropped by Opa Locka airport May 4 to deliver an award to the 482nd Fighter Wing Commander, Col. Randy Falcon.

The team presented the award after a demonstration jump at events coinciding with the annual Air-Sea Show in Fort Lauderdale. After the presentation ceremony, Col. Falcon accompanied team leader Sgt. 1st Class Paul Sachs in an inspection of its members.

The Golden Baton is a solid mahogany baton that is passed in mid-air between members of the team while freefalling during their jump.

The Golden Knights trace their lineage back to 1959, Fort Bragg, N.C. Gen. Joseph Stillwell formed the Strategic Army Corps Parachute Team to compete internationally, particularly head-to-head with the thenpremiere teams from the Soviet bloc nations. The team performed so well that Army adopted them as their official parachute demonstration team and changed the name to the United States Army Parachute Team. One year later, the name "Golden Knights" was adopted and remains the moniker used to describe the team today.



The team has dominated in numerous international sport parachuting competitions and participates in events around the world. They have won more than 408 national championships, 65 world championships, and 14 national and six world team titles in formation skydiving.

Maintenance was an entirely different issue as visiting high-performance aircraft required access to the finest facilities, maintainers, fuel and fuelers available. This was also provided with the aid of troops from Homestead's 482nd Maintenance Group.

While sunscreen and hydration were necessities

throughout the weekend, the sunny skies and festival atmosphere kept crowds happy while they enjoyed the astonishing displays taking place in the clear blue skies overhead.

Are you ready? Hurricane season is here Reservists and base employees must be prepared, accountable

At this point, if you still need to prepare emergency food, water and supply kits to make it through the aftermath of a hurricane, you're already behind the curve.

However, for Homestead Air Reserve Base personnel being "storm-ready" includes more than making stockpiles of emergency living supplies.

Making sure you're safe and accountable to your units should be high on your agenda.

First, **there is no hurricane shelter on base**. No one should assume that this military installation is a safe place to go if a storm is bearing down on South Florida. Just as we live in our local communities, we must use our local storm shelters.

In the event county or state authorities issue evacuation orders, follow those directions.

Secondly, **don't attempt to return to the base following a storm**. Only people on post-storm recovery teams are authorized to return the base and if you're not one of them Security Forces will turn you away. You will also waste valuable fuel and endanger yourself on roads which will likely be filled with debris.

"It's likely that many buildings would be damaged. We

can't even turn power on to any facilities following a storm until our assessment teams verify that it's safe to do so," said Sean Quinn, chief of emergency management.

"Essential personnel who need to return already know who they are. Others should return only if directed by unit or wing leadership," he said.

Mr. Quinn also pointed out that the first priority for poststorm teams is to make the airfield operational for major recovery operations and not the office buildings where the majority of base personnel work.

Finally, attempt to make contact with your unit.

"Letting your unit know your plans and location prior to a storm is a good idea," said Quinn.

The 482nd Civil Engineering Emergency Management office has also set-up an 800-number with information about the status of the base and reporting procedures before and after a storm.

All military and civilian personnel who are in a national emergency or declared disaster area are required to checkin no later than 48 hours from the onset of the crisis. Be sure to include your location, contact information, and status. Military members must also provide the same information for all members of their household; civilian employees only need to report for themselves.

Hurricanes 101

<u>Hurricane Watch</u>: A storm is anticipated to *threaten* the area within 24 hours. This watch should trigger your family's disaster plan, and proactive measures should be initiated especially those actions that require extra time such as securing a boat, leaving a barrier island, etc.

Hurricane Warning: A storm is expected to *strike* the area within 24 Hours. Once this warning has been issued, your family should be in the process of completing proactive actions and deciding the safest location to be during the storm.

The greatest threat is along coastlines where extremely high tides created by strong ocean currents and giant, wind-driven waves (Storm Surge).
