Are YOU Ready to be a Leader?

Have you ever considered the fact that you already are one? Whether you supervise or train someone, you are no doubt a leader to someone in your life. Whether it's a child, sibling, friend or even your parent, someone looks up to you.



So what's the deal with not being able to be recognized as a leader in the Air Force? Good question. Unless you're an airman basic, you ARE considered a leader. Think about that a minute. If you are an A1C, an airman basic looks up to you and more so as you gain rank. You ARE a leader to someone – you may just not have the title or the responsibility commensurate with what you're already doing.

So let's talk a minute about leadership and how we, as your senior leaders can help you gain more experience and knowledge Air Force leadership techniques.

As you know, the Air Force has a rank structure that tells us exactly how much responsibility is expected at each rank. As we advance, we are required to take on the roles of trainer, supervisor, evaluator and leader. We must start holding each other accountable no matter what rank is on our sleeves or lapels, because with each promotion we earn, more is expected of us. Yet, why is it that our promotions are oftentimes treated like an entitled pay raise with nothing more expected on the leadership end? In order for us to be able to function

effectively and efficiently, we must use the basic foundations on which our leadership structure was founded. Maternal and paternal approaches in the work setting are counterproductive because they don't allow our junior enlisted members to experience learned supervision and leadership.

The concept is simple and one that we learned in kindergarten. Be responsible for what you do and accountable for your actions, then tell the Airmen in your charge what are your expectations of them and vice versa – let them share with you what they expect of you as a leader. Listen carefully to them. The best leaders are those that have inspired and empowered Airmen and have given them a voice that is heard.

Most leaders possess certain characteristics, to include servitude, collaboration, vision, openness, empowerment, ethics, listening, questioning and empathy among others.

In the coming months, you'll hear about some leadership opportunities. One is a professional development seminar. This seminar will offer tracts in leadership techniques, progressive discipline, mentoring, effective writing for appraisals and decorations, interviewing skills, and force development. I hope that those interested in becoming a better leader will partake in this seminar – it's one way to help you develop your skills so you won't feel awkward when you become a rater or supervisor.

Never be afraid to lead or voice your opinion, concern or suggestion – it's the only way we will be able to grow as a unit. But most importantly, never forget you ARE a leader.

Base and community come together to aid reservist and his family

When a person's sense of security and comfort becomes altered by life's unexpected events, a timeless cliché can come to mind- the only constant in life is change, and a crisis can lead to enriched character and advancement.

Recently, Tech. Sgt. Gregg Shepherd, 445th Security Forces Squadron, was deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. While he was away defending our nation from hostile enemy regimes, the lives of his expectant wife, Karen, his two-year old daughter Angel, and his parents Ross and Gerelene Draper, were jeopardized by what was said to be an electrical house fire that took place May 18 around 2 a.m.

Chief Master Sergeant Peri Rogowski, 445th Airlift Wing command chief, said the entire house and all of their belongings inside were mere ashes and unrecognizable remnants of possessions they once found comfort and security in. There were only enough salvageable items to fill a gym bag.

Anyone who has experienced this type of loss can relate to feelings of despair and frustration.

Sergeant Shepherd said he was nervous about the circumstances he faced on the flight back home. "Once I got off the plane and saw everyone, I knew it would be alright," he stated.

He was greeted with American flags and salutes by a crowd of military members and civilians alike. "It was overwhelming to have complete strangers say, 'sorry about your house and thank you for your service,'" he said.

Chief Rogowski said the base and surrounding community pulled together to provide donations to meet the entire family's needs and show support. Members of the Air Force

Sharon Dondlinger, SFS commander, and the entire security forces squadron along with Senior Master Sgt. Julie Haskell, services flight, have done an amazing job of taking care of our Airman and his family."

Fellow wingmen of all ranks came together, along with the community. The family has been provided lodging, clothing, household goods and furniture, and donations to help this service member and his family through

this transition.

"I can't keep up with the amount of household goods, furniture and clothing; there's too much pouring in," Chief Rogowski said.

"I never envisioned this kind of support," Major Dondlinger said. "It's absolutely amazing!"

Sergeant Shepherd and his family's support of our nation during wartime show great strength in character. The service members at Wright Patterson Air Force Base and members of the community have enhanced their

character by helping his family through this crisis.

Sergeant Shepherd is truly grateful and humbled by all of the support he and his family have received. "I never thought that my house burning down would turn out to be a blessing," he said. "I would like to thank everyone personally although that would be nearly impossible because of the enormous amount of support received," he added.

The truism, the only thing constant in life is change, can often be followed by this: crisis is incubation for enriched character and advancement.

C-5 goes around the world in 13 days

A 445th Airlift Wing C-5 Galaxy flew around the world, picking up and delivering cargo for two weeks in June in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Aircrew members assigned to the 89th Airlift Squadron and two crew chiefs assigned to the 445th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron had the opportunity to add more stamps to their passports because their aircraft flew on missions that took them to Colorado, Germany, Iraq, Afghanistan, Diego Garcia, Japan, Korea, Alaska and California before returning home.

The crew originally set out on one mission. The crew's aircraft commander, Capt. Frank Saul, knew of cargo planes flying out of California that were taking on missions flying further and further west; basically, taking them around the world. He saw this as the perfect opportunity to extend their trip to take on another mission to do just that. Plus, at the same time, it would save another unit from being tasked if they could take on this second mission.

"I called someone I knew at the Tanker Airlift Control Center at Scott Air Force Base, Ill., and asked him if they had anything going further west bound; going all the way around the world. He looked into it and got back to me, and said they had a mission that they could use our support on. They contacted our current ops, and we got the approval through maintenance, operations, and scheduling to accept the mission. The crew was excited and willing to stay with the trip for a few more days," Captain Saul said.

The first leg of the around the world mission had the crew delivering Army supplies from Colorado to

Afghanistan. On their way to Afghanistan, the crew stayed the night in Iraq in makeshift sleeping quarters built out of old shipping containers that were retrofitted into trailers.

The second leg of the trip included an overnight stay in Diego Garcia for crew rest before picking up cargo at two different locations in Japan. The captain said most of the cargo they picked up included household goods that needed to be shipped back to the United States.

"Basically, the cargo we picked up in Japan was composed of anything that had to be moved from the Pacific back to the States. We picked up roughly 40,000 pounds of cargo at each location, filling up most of the plane, and flew it to the United States," Captain Saul said.

The crew stopped in Alaska for crew rest before dropping off the cargo in California. After dropping off their last load, it was time for the aircrew to make one more trip and that was to fly home to Wright-Patt.

"This was an amazing experience. We traveled in two hemispheres, flew near the 38th parallel, and passed through several time zones. It was a lot of work but very rewarding in the end," Tech. Sgt. Joshua Roland, flight engineer, said. "We experienced a lot of different cultures in one trip and sampled different cuisines—eating Japanese food one day followed by German the next day," Sergeant Roland added.

Both Captain Saul and Sergeant Roland concurred that everyone on the flight did a great job and that the C-5 performed exceptionally well for such a long flight.

"I love my job and this was a great trip. Our unit went above and beyond by volunteering to pick up the second mission," Captain Saul said.

C., June 1-4, as part of the Air Force Reserve Headquarters Commanders Congressional Orientation Course. The course included a legislative update, the omnibus process, and information on current and future issues affecting the Air Force and the Air Force Reserve. The course gave commanders a better understanding of Air Force Reserve

challenges that come up during the annual legislative cycle.

In addition to the course, wing leadership participated in their annual Commander Congressional visits. The visits allow wing leaders to meet with congressmen representing their areas to discuss issues and concerns facing their units. Colonel Goeman met with Congressman Steve Austria, who represents the 7th Congressional District of Ohio; Congressman Michael Turner, the Ohio 3rd District Representative to the United States Congress; and Ohio Senator Sherrod Brown.

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
