USAID/MOLDOVA SUPPORTS CREATION OF FIRST REGIONAL TV STATION NETWORK

ffering Moldovan television viewers an independent source of news coverage, a new network of regional television stations has been established with the support of the U.S.Agency for International Development's (USAID's) Media Program in Moldova (MPM). Known as AICI TV, the network's board includes representatives of six regional TV stations, including Drochia TV, Sor-TV, VTV Ungheni, TV Elita, Media TV and Eni-Ai.

"AICI TV is the first 'bottom-up'-built television network in Moldova. It has national coverage, and its founders have a direct responsibility to the American people, who contributed financially to the establishment and development of the network to keep it objective, apolitical, and promoting democratic values," said Andrei Bargan, the director of Cimislia Media TV, during a roundtable of board members held on September 29, 2011.

Under the MPM project that began in 2008, USAID helped partner stations share locally produced programming and improve their opportunities to generate revenue through building skills in journalism, advertising, and management at both station and network levels. In the first year of the program, an informal TV network developed, as regional TV stations exchanged news and produced a common weekly program. **Read more**

STRAWBERRY PRODUCTION BRINGS NEW POSSIBILITIES



Through the U.S. Agency for International Development's (USAID's) Farmer-to-Farmer Program, Moldovan farms like Agrodor Succes LLC have benefited from on-site, tailored training from U.S. volunteers. This assistance has enabled Agrodor to expand its operations into strawberry production, bringing higher profits and new possibilities for the future.

In early 2010, Agrodor Succes, a farm and input supply company located in Moldova, decided to head into a new direction: strawberry production. After encountering mixed results in producing other types of crops, the company determined that there was a great market opportunity in strawberries and opted to move forward. Read more

USAID ASSISTANCE REDUCES RISK OF TRAFFICKING AMONG YOUTH



This summer 16 university-aged young adults (18 to 21 years of age) seeking employment in Pinsk, Belarus participated in a job search skills training the USAID Countering Trafficking in Persons: Belarus Project, implemented by the International Organization for Migration (IOM). Through the training, young people currently entering the job market have acquired skills that will enhance their competitiveness and ability to find and secure local employment. Such training also reduces the risks of being recruited for human trafficking.

During the 2010 to 2013 phase of the USAID anti-trafficking project, specially trained instructors are delivering a series of job search trainings to approximately 1,200 victims of trafficking and at-risk groups in all regions of Belarus. The training aims to empower target populations to make educated career choices, identify appropriate job opportunities in the local market, and explore and take advantage of existing economic opportunities, while raising their awareness of the dangers of being trafficked. **Read more**
