#### Safety Notes: enhanced car mirror settings

Many crashes involve merging and changing lanes. Proper side mirror positioning can give the driver the side and rear vision they need to drive safely.

Most people have always adjusted side mirrors so they can see the side of the car on the inside edge of the mirror. This limits what we can see along side of us creating blind spots. These new enhanced settings provides an extra margin of safety. As a vehicle leaves the field of view of your inside rear view mirror, it will seamlessly enter the side view mirrors.

To adjust the outside mirrors this way, follow these two steps:

- 1) For the driver side mirror, roll up the window and press your head against the glass. Adjust the mirror so that you can just see the edge of the car.
- 2) For the passenger side mirror, place your head in the center of the car (directly behind the inside mirror mount) and adjust the outside mirror so that you can just see the edge of the car.

It takes a little time to get used to this new setting, but give it a try. It truly works to reduce those blind spots.

The New Jersey National Guard State Family Readiness Council has increased the amounts of family and business grants up to \$5,000 and \$10,000.


