

Reservists head to Afghanistan

Approximately 130 Citizen Airmen from the 442nd Maintenance and Operations groups here deployed to Afghanistan Dec. 28, 2011 in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

The units maintain and operate the A-10 Thunderbolt II, which provides close air support to ground troops and is most notable for its 30-millimeter gatling gun.

"The purpose of A-10 combat power is to keep others safe," said Col. Eric S. Overturf, 442nd FW commander, to the deploying Airmen at their final out brief. "Because you're going over there to employ this aircraft and its munitions, you are ensuring that a Soldier, Sailor, Airman or Marine can return home safely to his family."

Members from throughout the community, to include the Whiteman Base Community Council and local retirees had to opportunity Dec. 28, 2011 to wish the reservists well on their deployment. The Whiteman BCC made hundreds of cookies for each reservist to take with them to make the flight more comfortable.

Despite the 3 a.m. takeoff, the reservists had dozens of people sending them off.

The wing has a rich history in deployments - four deployments since 9/11 - where it has sent a package of maintainers, operators and aircraft to the area of responsibility.

Hundreds of reservists from other parts of the wing have also deployed in previous years, but most recently the 442nd Security Forces Squadron, and currently, the 442nd Civil Engineer Squadron.

The reservists are scheduled to return in the spring.

Why America needs a new bomber -- A bomber pilot's perspective

Many now question whether the nation requires a new bomber. Faced with recent budget issues it is easy to see why one would question the need for a new global power projection capability merely on the basis of the procurement expense. The logic for a new bomber, however, is straightforward and can be broken down into three main reasons; expense, versatility and deterrence.

When President Dwight D. Eisenhower, a former army general, was faced with the Soviet menace he used his considerable military experience to devise a plan to ensure our security. He realized the United States could deter, and if necessary defeat any existential threat to the U.S. with a bomber-based air force for substantially less money than fielding a large ground force. Today our military once again faces cuts, and bombers still offer an economical alternative to large standing ground forces.

Bombers also offer cost advantages when compared directly with other current U.S. power projection capabilities. For example, during recent Odyssey Dawn missions, B-2s flying from Whiteman Air Force Base struck a total of 45 targets at a relatively modest cost to taxpayers of less than \$5 million. During the same time, cruise missiles struck a similar number of targets at a cost of over \$50 million – more than 10 times the cost of bombers. But modern bombers are not just relatively inexpensive, they are also versatile.

The bomber has evolved tremendously since the days of Gen. Curtis LeMay and the Strategic Air Command. Between 1950 and 1973, the Korean War demonstrated bombers could not do Close Air Support (a mission where weapons are dropped in close proximity to troops), and Vietnam proved bombers could not survive advanced air defenses. Yet today, B-1s routinely provide Close Air Support to troops in Afghanistan, and the B-2 has demonstrated its ability to penetrate advanced air defense systems.

By overcoming the two major shortcomings of precision targeting and survivability, the modern bomber has been unleashed on the battle field to showcase its true value. It is the range, payload, and persistence of the bomber that makes it easily the most versatile of any available weapon system in the U.S. inventory. Today in Afghanistan that versatility means long loiter times and ample payloads whenever the B-1 is overhead. But bombers not only make manifest Billy Mitchell's vision of airpower, they also continue to be the only visible representation of American will.

Nuclear weapons underpin U.S. national security by providing a powerful capability. This capability is arguably most effective when coupled with the nation's intercontinental and submarine based missile forces. Yet, missiles lack an essential element of the equation that enables nuclear weapons to deter. The bomber's ability to be visibly placed on alert provides the nation's only capability to signal will, thus completing the deterrence equation.

There is no question America needs a new bomber. The current bomber force is aging, and our military is facing a day when it may not have the benefit of fielded forces abroad. Procuring a new aircraft is neither simple nor timely, and we do not have the luxury of a long debate. The bomber is cost effective, versatile, and a potent deterrent, and ultimately assures America a place at the table in any future international political, economic and military environment.

The dos and don'ts of the political season

VANCE AIR FORCE BASE, Okla. (AFNS) -- With the excitement of the presidential primaries lurking around the corner, there are a few things Airmen must remember during this upcoming political season.

When you joined the military or became a federal employee, you did so with the knowledge that this decision came with some sacrifice.

Everyone is encouraged to register to vote, research candidates and vote for the candidates. However, in order for this representative democracy to function properly, civil servants and military professionals cannot be seen as partisans.

Both military members and federal employees work for the government and in doing so they must support elected officials regardless of whether or not they voted for, or against, particular candidates. For this reason, among others, getting a paycheck directly from the federal government necessarily limits a person's ability to participate in some aspects of the political process.

Department of Defense Directive 1344.10, "Political Activities by Members of the Armed Forces on Active Duty," and Air Force Instruction 51-902, "Political Activities by

Members of the U.S. Air Force," outline permitted and restricted political actions for active military members.

Military members who violate these rules may face punishment under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

There are some reoccurring issues surrounding prohibited political activities. A frequent issue concerns whether or not an individual can display a large political sign on his or her car or truck. Displaying a large political sign on your automobile is prohibited; however, members are allowed to display a political bumper sticker on their car or truck.

Military members are prohibited from using official authority to influence an election or solicit votes for a specific candidate or issue.

Military members are limited in their involvement in the political process off duty as well. This includes being a candidate for, or holding, political office, except in those circumstances authorized by the AFI.

Speaking at any partisan political gathering, including a radio or television program, and advocating for a partisan political candidate or party is also prohibited.

Military members should reference AFI 51-902 when they have any questions regarding the legality of



In an effort to sustain fitness habits throughout the winter, the HAWC encourages Team Whiteman to join a program called Stepping/ Running through the winter.



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Overturf nominated for brigadier general

Col. Eric S. Overturf, commander of the 442nd Fighter Wing here, has been nominated for appointment to the rank of brigadier general.

Overturf is responsible for approximately 2,000 reservists here and at three other geographically separated units: the 917th Fighter Group, Barksdale AFB, La.; the 476th Fighter Group, Moody AFB, Ga.; and the 924th Fighter Group, Davis-Monthan AFB, Ariz.

Overturf was born in Greeley, Colo. He is a 1984 honors graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy. He served 14 years in the regular Air Force in a wide variety of F-16 assignments in U.S. Air Forces Europe, Pacific Air Forces, and Air Combat Command and as an instructor at the U.S. Air Force Weapons School. He joined the Air Force Reserve in 1998 as a traditional reservist and is currently serving in full-time status.

Department of Defense Releases 2012 BAH Rates

The Department of Defense released the 2012 Basic Allowance for Housing rates, which took effect Jan. 1. Overall rates will increase an average of 2 percent this year.

For members with dependents, average increases in BAH are approximately \$39 per month. A typical E-6 with dependents, for example, will find his/her BAH about \$35 per month higher than last year, while an O-3 with dependents will receive about \$40 more than last year.

In areas where rates will decrease, the decrease will only apply to members newly reporting to those locations. Members are protected by individual rate protection which ensures that those already assigned to a given location will not see their BAH rate decrease; however, they will receive the increase if the rate goes up. This assures that members who

have made long-term commitments in the form of a lease or contract are not penalized if the area's housing costs decrease.

Three components are included in the BAH computation: median current market rent; average utilities (including electricity, heat, and water/sewer); and average renter's insurance.

Total housing costs are calculated for six housing profiles (based on dwelling type and number of bedrooms) in each military housing area. Basic Allowance for Housing rates are then calculated for each pay grade, both with and without dependents. An estimated \$20 billion will be paid to over 1 million service members in 2012.

The Weapons School provides the world's most advanced training in weapons and tactics employment and every six months, produces a new class of graduates who are expert instructors on weapons, weapons systems and air and space integration. Upon completing the course, graduates return to their home stations, taking the latest tactics, techniques and procedures for air-to-air and air-to-ground combat to their respective units.

The Weapons School traces its roots to the Aircraft Gunnery School established in 1949 at Las Vegas Air Force Base, which became Nellis Air Force Base in 1950. This organization brought together a cadre of World War II combat veterans dedicated to teaching the next generation of pilots. The Gunnery School converted to combat crew training to meet the needs of the


Korean War.

Today's Weapons School encompasses 17 squadrons, teaching 22 combat specialties at eight locations. Only 30 percent of today's students come from the classic fighter specialties which built the initial reputation of the "patch." The 62-year tradition of excellence associated with the Weapons School continues as today's graduates go to units worldwide to focus on the integration challenges of tomorrow.







Soldiers collect blood to support CENTCOM

Soldiers from the Fort Leonard Wood Blood Donor Center held a blood drive at Whiteman Air Force Base's Community Activity Center as part of the Armed Services Blood Program Dec. 21, 2011.

The ASBP is a conjoined military program from each service branch that collectively gets donors from different locations across the United States and ships to units overseas for contingency operations.

"This blood here will be targeted for United States Central Command's blood mission which is over in Iraq and Afghanistan," said U.S. Army Capt. James E. Burke, Fort Leonard Wood Blood Donor Center officer in charge. "Our collections will be flown out this afternoon to a private processing station down at Fort Hood, Texas. They will process this blood in one to two days and they will go straight to McGuire Air Force Base, N.J."


According to Burke, the blood was sent to CENT-COM's bases by the end of that week.

Approximately 100 volunteers gave blood and contributed to a total of 72 pints.

"The volunteer can donate a whole unit of blood which we can collect every 57 days," Burke said. "When they donate, the next time we come we can be sure they can donate once again."

All excess blood leftover from the CENTCOM's mission will be distributed among military treatment facilities in the U.S. and overseas.

"The units of blood we collected here will stay within the military," Burke said. "So those donors who come out and want their blood to go to military members can be assured that the blood they donate today will go to military members. We are here to

take care of our military members to ensure that they have an adequate and safe blood supply."

Prior to donating blood, members participated in a screening to ensure they were healthy and able to give blood. Depending on how busy the blood drive is, the blood giving process for one donor takes about an hour from start to finish.

"We'll do an initial screening first just to see if you had any time overseas, what kind of medications you are on, if you have tattoos or piercings," said Staff Sgt. Torrey Woodcock, Fort Leonard Wood Blood Donor Center medical laboratory technician. "Once you pass the screening process, you'll do the interview for your medical history and basic administrative data.

"Then you will get your vitals taken, a bag issued, and pass the stations to where you'll donate blood. The donation takes about five-15 minutes, then you'll have juice and cookies and then we'll ensure you're good to go."

Members are asked not to engage in rigorous physical training for at least 24 hours after giving blood and to drink plenty of water at least a day before attending the blood drive.

"Water hydrates you and helps the donation process and help the blood flow a little bit quicker than it normally would," Woodcock said. "Additionally, there is no smoking for a half an hour after donation."

"I think it's important to help out and a great thing to do," said Tech. Sgt. Travis Trudeau, 442nd Maintenance Squadron armament specialist. "I'm not overseas right now, so this is the little bit I can do for those who are."

Fort Leonard Wood's Blood Donor Center is scheduled to return in February to host another blood drive.

"The best thing about the club is the games we played to learn how to act," said Haley.

The pre-teen program offers an after school recreation until 6 p.m. Teens can participate in community service projects, food drives, clubs and trips.

"It is great to see children involved in the community and participating in fundraisers that will benefit others," Torres said.

The teen programs provide different outlets to express themselves in a teen-friendly environment with stateof-the art electronic games to support recreational activities. One of the most popular clubs in the teen program is the Youth Employment Skills, which allows high school students to obtain \$4 in grant funding for every hour volunteered in an on-base function.

"Our main goal is to help develop leaders and prepare them for life after high school," Torres said.

In order to keep children physically active and not just mentally, the center also provides a sports and fitness program for children of all ages. There are four leagues every year with sports including basketball, soccer, baseball and softball.

"This is a very active program," Torres said. "Last year we had more than 1,000 participants. Being involved in sports creates opportunities for learning both physical and social skills."

their political activities

Rules governing political activities by government civilians are found in a federal law known as the Hatch Act. DOD civilians who violate the Hatch Act face adverse personnel actions, including suspensions and employment termination.


Most restrictions surrounding the Hatch Act are centered on the prevention of supervisors influencing subordinates to participate in or contribute to partisan groups or candidates. Federal employees may not display partisan political campaign materials in the workplace.

While federal employees may express opinions about candidates and issues when off duty, when on duty, in uniform, in a federal building, or in a federally owned or leased vehicle, federal employees may not express opinions directed at the success or failure of a political party, candidate for partisan political office or partisan political group.

There are three important things to remember during the upcoming political season. First, regardless of status, using command influence to sway subordinates to vote for a particular party, candidate or issue is prohibited by law or directive.

Second, when you receive a paycheck from the federal government, some aspects of your political freedom are limited.

Third, if you are unsure whether or not a political activity is approved, reference AFI 51-902 or contact your base legal office.
