Airmen honored by college for heroism in Afghanistan

CLEMSON, S.C. -- As the battle on the gridiron between the Clemson Tigers and the Virginia Tech Hokies paused for halftime, a story of heroism was broadcast over the Memorial Stadium speakers for some 80,000 people in attendance Oct. 20, 2012, at Clemson, S.C.

Capt. Michael Polidor and Capt. Justin Kulish, now B-2 Bomber pilots at Whiteman Air Force Base, Mo., watched the two teams battle it out before walking onto the field to be recognized for their heroic acts during a much different battle on a much different terrain - Afghanistan.

Rewind to October 2009, 70 American and Afghan Soldiers at Combat Outpost Keating, a remote outpost in northeastern Afghanistan, about approximately 10 miles from the Pakistan border, laydown fire as more than 100 Taliban insurgents armed with AK-47s and grenade launchers ambushed the base.

With barbed wire the only thing standing between them and the insurgents, the Soldiers quickly requested air support.

Air Force pilots from Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan, had just taken off for a routine mission when they were given the orders to stop

insurgents from over running a nearby outpost. One of those pilots was Polidor, deployed from the 335th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron out of Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, N.C., he raced over the mountainous terrain in his F-15E Strike Eagle to reach the battle that was raging below him.

"It looked like the Fourth of July down there," said Polidor. "They were taking fire from all directions, 360 degrees."

Polidor used his jet fighter's sensors to gauge the situation occurring 20,000 feet below him. Because of low-lying clouds, Polidor and his fellow Wingman flying high in the sky were forced to rely solely on their jets advanced technological instruments to target insurgents on the ground.

As Polidor and his fellow F-15 pilots wreaked havoc on the insurgents by dropping bombs and firing rounds at them, A-10 Warthogs, B-1 Bombers and Army helicopters provided additional assistance.

Kulish was one of the B-1 pilots assigned to the 379th Air Expeditionary Wing providing the vital close air support needed for the Soldiers on the ground.

"They were in danger of being completely overrun by insurgents," said Polidor. "It was our job to eliminate them."

What Polidor did not know was that this battle would last for more than eight hours. When the dust settled around the remote outpost that lied in a valley surrounded by three mountains, eight American Soldiers had made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of their country. Three Afghan soldiers had also lost their lives in the fight with several more American and Afghan Soldiers wounded.

Nearly 100 insurgents were killed and the attempted overrun of the remote outpost was over. A total of 20 bombs were dropped on the battlefield that day with several thousand rounds hurled at the insurgents as well. Of the 20 bombs dropped Oct. 3, 2009, in Afghanistan, Polidor was responsible for four of them and had fired 170 rounds from his F-15.

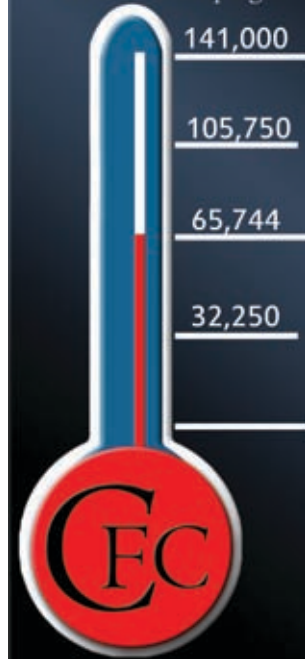
Fast forward to today, Oct. 20, 2012, Polidor and Kulish stand on the 50-yard line of the Memorial Stadium in Clemson, S.C., where more than 80,000 people clap in appreciation after hearing their heroic stories.

"Clemson fans have been amazing to us and it is an honor to be here on this field today," said Polidor.

While Polidor was being honored on the field, he met with Clemson wide receiver Daniel

Fifth CMSgt of the Air Force visits Whiteman

The fifth chief master sergeant of the Air Force visited Team Whiteman Oct. 17 to 19, sharing stories about his military background and comparing the changes from yesterday's Air Force to today's Air Force.

Retired Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force Robert D. Gaylor spoke about the evolution of the Air Force since his retirement thirty years ago.

He stated that today's training, technology and the care afforded to families are the best they've ever been, and supervisors place more faith in their younger airmen in today's air force.

"I think we do a better job trusting our airmen," Gaylor said. "I think we train them, prepare them, and allow them to do their job. I entered an Air Force that didn't have a lot of trust where I was closely supervised and observed. Everything was just sort of saying to me, 'we don't really know if we can trust you.' I think we've worked that out."

During his visit, Gaylor took time to speak to recent graduates of ALS and made stops at the security forces squadron, explosive ordnance disposal flight and visited the flight line to view a B-2 Spirit.

Gaylor also spoke about his time in the Air Force and why he reenlisted throughout his career.

"I really thought about the Texas Highway patrol. I actually tested, took the physical, and changed my mind. I never pursued it," he said. "So in a sense I never really needed convincing, I think the Air Force and I were meant. I think it was just a logical match. I have no regrets. Thirty-one years and I loved it."

Gaylor ended his visit to Whiteman by speaking at the ALS graduation Oct. 18.

He said the most rewarding thing to happen to him since his retirement is his continued involvement with the Air Force, and his ability to travel around the country and speak at different bases, extending his stories to young Airmen.

He also noted, with humor, he travels more now than he did while on active duty but considers himself blessed and lucky to be extended the opportunities the Air Force affords him since his retirement.

Sweat the Small Stuff

F. E. WARREN AIR FORCE BASE, Wyo. -- I recently had an opportunity to learn about nuclear weapon design from some of the original engineers and physicists who designed the weapons that are in our custody.

It struck me that weapons we have in the deterrent force today were designed and built 35 years ago, with vastly different technology and computing power.

Furthermore, we recently passed the 20 year anniversary of our last nuclear test in the United States.

Today, a new generation of engineers and physicists certifies the stockpile with cutting edge technology, supercomputers and science-based tests.

They carry on the legacy of the designers of a generation ago through stockpile stewardship, allowing the continued certification of the safety, security and reliability of the stockpile without nuclear testing.

Other segments of the weapon system -- the Minuteman boosters, launch facilities, missile alert facilities and support equipment continue to be tested, modified and upgraded.

In fact, we recently completed another successful Simulated Electronic Launch Minuteman test.

- Everything we do to the weapon system--from maintenance and sustainment, to operations and security--requires a rigorous attention to detail.

In our business it's important to maintain the highest level of precision in both personal proficiency and equipment. I ask

that you think about the following:

- Sweat the small stuff: don't walk past a problem or accept substandard performance or equipment. Doing so erodes our standards. We must maintain the highest level of excellence in personnel and equipment.

- There are times when you may have to question the status quo. Have you ever been told, "We've always done it this way?" Ask why! In our business, shortcuts or "systems knowledge" are not acceptable. Do it by the book every time.

- You sign your work. Maybe you don't physically sign, but you are responsible for correctly accomplishing your assigned task. Whether you are a doctor, civil engineer, defender, maintainer or missileer, you have an impact on some part of the weapon system every day.

When you certify your work, you are acknowledging that you have completed the job correctly and upheld the surety of whatever part of the weapon system you are responsible for.

Adherence to procedures ensures the weapon system performs the way it was designed and intended.

Every time you interact with the weapon system and personnel you are creating your own legacy and leaving your impact on nuclear surety and deterrence.

Thomas Jefferson said, "The price of liberty is eternal vigilance."

Our vigilance day in and day out ensures freedom and liberty for our nation and our allies. Stay vigilant -- sweat the small stuff.

The actions we take today carry on the legacy started by the designers, operators and support personnel from the Manhattan Project and Trinity to today.

From the Frontlines: Maj. Joel Purcell

“Our squadron’s motto is ‘Engineering Combat Power’ and that’s what we did,” Maj. Joel Purcell, 777th Expeditionary Prime BEEF Squadron said recalling his deployment. “I was in charge of a detachment that designed, managed, constructed, and maintained facilities and infrastructure allowing combat forces to continue their mission.”

Purcell was deployed to Shindand AB, Afghanistan for four months and to Bagram AB, Afghanistan for his last two months. He left Whiteman in January and returned in September.

Purcell said his job ranged from constructing dining facilities, entry control points and tactical operations centers, to planning new mission bed downs and even drawdown and transfer plans of bases to Afghan forces.

“What makes the Expeditionary Prime BEEF Squadron unique is the speed in which we can respond to a situation,” Purcell said. “Generally when an emergency happened, we were on a helicopter to the area the same day.”

In addition to the response time, Purcell said his team offered specialized engineering skills other organizations do not possess.

“A few examples of this is my team was able to respond to a State Department request to assess a bridge between Afghanistan and Uzbekistan within two days, and we were able to construct a temporary ramp to recover a C-17 that had slid off the runway during a snow storm,” Purcell said.

He said being an engineering 911 force,

he never knew what order he would be given.

“I still remember a call I received late night on a Sunday from AFCENT-forward. I was told ‘we have some individuals relocating to a classified location next week, we need your folks on the ground surveying the area and planning their bed down tomorrow morning, we will have a helicopter on the ramp in five hours!’,” Purcell said. “My typical day was anything but typical.”

At Whiteman, Purcell is in charge of the Civil Engineer Squadron’s Operation Flight, where he is responsible for the day-to-day maintenance and repair of the facilities and infrastructures on Whiteman.

“In Afghanistan, the engineering forces I led were similar, but rather than maintaining a base, we were responsible for a region,” he said. “Most of the day-to-day maintenance in Afghanistan is done by contractors; we were called in when the timeline for was short, or the area was too dangerous to get a contractor in.”

Even though he was busy with his duties, just like during his previous three deployments, Purcell said he found time to help with the USO and also tutored some of his Airmen working on their bachelor degrees.

“I have deployed many times and I still keep in touch with folks I met on my first deployment 13 years ago,” Purcell said.

Purcell said overall it was a difficult but rewarding deployment, and the best part of his deployment was the people he met and the friends he made.

“Every time I deploy and I interact with the locals, I am reminded how lucky we are to be Americans and how much we take for granted,” he said.

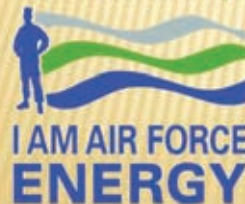

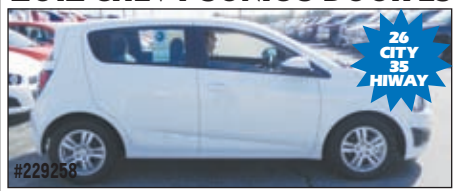

PROTECTING OUR FURRY FRIENDS

“Man’s best friend” is more than just a catchphrase to many pet owners. The adage holds especially true to the Team Whiteman’s Veterinary Corps who work to meet the mission of three faucets.

“The primary mission is the medical support of the military working dogs,” said Dr. Joanna Kuecker, U.S. Army Public Health Command District-Carson veterinarian. “On a U.S. Army installation, the Veterinary Corps has another primary mission that involves food safety and inspection. The secondary mission of the Veterinary Corps is to support the military family by providing preventative care to the pets of military members and retirees.”

On average, the clinic is open for patient examinations three days a week and sees 15-30 patients per day depending on the type of patient examinations scheduled, according to U.S. Army Specialist Ashley Klingman, U.S. Army Public Health Command Dis-

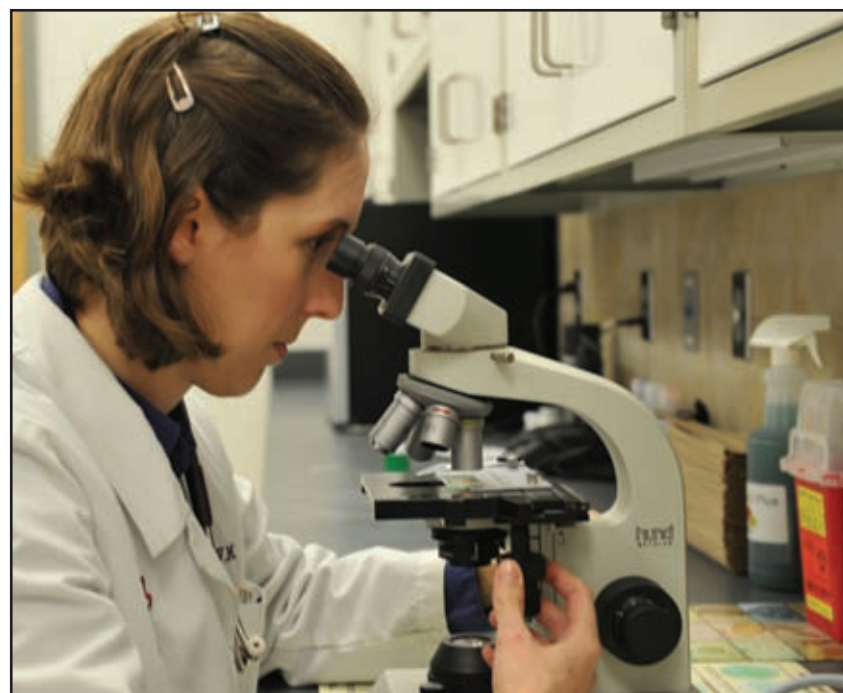
trict-Carson.

“Currently we offer routine vaccinations, microchips, heartworm tests and diagnostics for intestinal parasites and other zoonotic diseases,” Kuecker said. “Depending on our schedule, we can manage minor sick calls such as skin conditions, ear infections and gastrointestinal diseases.”

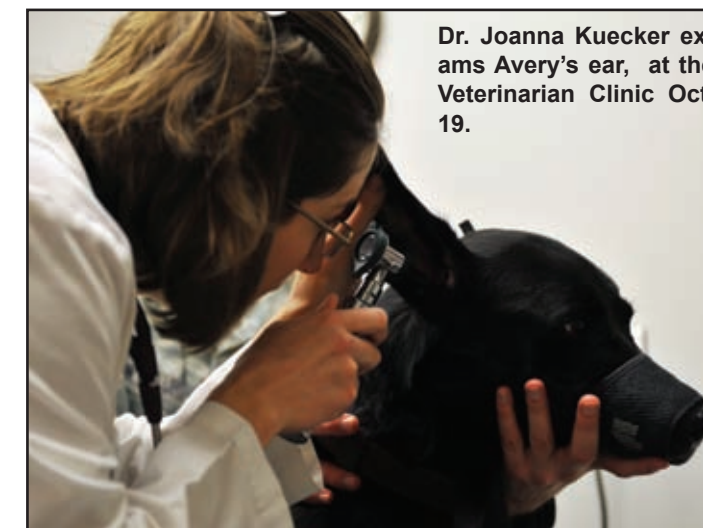
Over time, with proper funding, the veterinary clinic hopes to offer diagnostic radiology, routine in-house blood work tests, minor surgical procedures and dental services, according to Kuecker. Currently, the clinic has no equipment to meet these needs.

“The facility is a step in the right direction and I enjoy meeting new patients and their pets,” Kuecker said.

Individuals with PCS orders to overseas locations should contact the clinic for information and requirements about importing pets. In some cases, it can take as long as eight months to prepare a pet for entry into a country. For additional information, contact the Veterinarian Clinic 660-660-2667.

Rodriguez who had just finished battling it out on the field against the Virginia Tech Hokies. Though Polidor and Rodriguez had never met in person until now, their paths had crossed just a few years earlier. The day Polidor was raining down bombs and bullets on the insurgents in that Afghanistan valley, Rodriguez, a sergeant in the Army at the time, was one of the American Soldiers fighting for his life on the ground.

"I have never met someone who was on the ground that day," said Polidor. Polidor and Rodriguez met up after the game and spoke about the battle. "It was very revealing to get his side of the story and from his perspective," said Polidor. "They fought hard and we made sure the insurgents never reached the base."

They hugged one another and then Rodriguez ran off the field to meet back with his team.

Polidor received the Distinguished Flying Cross in 2010 for his heroism on that fateful day in Afghanistan.
