Gould cited for ILO training leadership

Maj. Gen. Mike Gould, 2nd Air Force commander, received the Sen. Ted Stevens Award Sept. 26 at the Air Force Association's Air and Space Conference and Technology Exposition in Washington, D.C.

"The criteria is simple, outstanding leadership while serving as a numbered Air Force commander," said Gen. T. Michael Moseley, Air Force chief of staff. "General Gould's leadership has been instrumental in preparing our Airmen for the combat environment they'll face." General Gould has been leading the way for the Air Force's in-lieu-of training. ILO training prepares Airmen for tasks traditionally performed by Army personnel.

"We're sending these Airmen to perform non-traditional roles, in many cases, like driving trucks and manning gun turrets for convoys, helping our Army brothers and sisters," said General Moseley.

"Our vision has been to become more responsive to

the warfighter – and thanks to great leadership at all levels, out in the training wings, groups, squadrons and detachments all over the world, we are moving rapidly toward achieving that vision," said General Gould.

"What stands out about Second Air Force are the superb efforts of the headquarters staff to transform the numbered Air Force into an organization that now complies with the Air Force's command and control

enabling construct model," he added.

The Air Force has sent more than 9,720 Airmen to ILO training since Oct. 1, 2006. About 6,000 Airmen currently deployed have gone through the training.

Open another gate

Comment — Traffic congestion has increased to the point where another gate needs to be open for at least two hours in the morning.

I understand the need to keep costs down, but it's costing Keesler more in lost time for people who're late for work because they're waiting in traffic to get on base.

Recalls and emergency vehicles may also be affected.

Response — Air Force Instruction 31-101, The Air Force Installation Security Program, requires security forces to "operate only the minimum number of perimeter gates required for operational needs."

This requirement, coupled with the fact the 81st Security Forces Squadron is undermanned, means opening another gate isn't feasible at this time.

To help alleviate the congestion, supervisors are authorized to stagger work hours for their personnel if their mission allows.

Barksdale NCO milestone recipient of CCAF degree

MAXWELL Air Force Base, Ala. — The Community College of the Air Force recognized its 300,000th degree recipient during a ceremony at the Air Force Association's 2007 Air and Space Conference and Technology Exposition in Washington, D.C.

The milestone highlights the significant role advanced education plays in sustaining a highly skilled and highly motivated enlisted Airmen corps, said Lt. Col. Raymond Staats, CCAF commandant.

The recipient of the degree, Staff Sgt. Danyail King, earned her Associates of Applied Science in Logistics. She's assigned to the 2nd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron at Barksdale Air Force Base, La.

The ceremony, honoring Sergeant King as an individual graduate, also appropriately symbolized the Air University mission: to make a difference ... one student at a time, Colonel Staats said.

He added that as the 300,000th degree recipient, the Airman joined one of the world's

largest college alumni bodies.

With a record 17,456 Airmen earning a CCAF degree this year, Colonel Staats said Airmen are embracing education as a lifetime endeavor.

Sergeant King earned her degree within her first enlistment, an accomplishment the Air Force's top enlisted leader encourages, said Chief Master Sgt. Joseph Thornell, the CCAF superintendent.

"The chief master sergeant of the Air Force believes that all Airmen can accomplish this personal and professional goal through CCAF," the chief said. "And we are focused on making that possible within their first enlistment."

Since it was created in 1972, the CCAF has awarded 308,596 degrees. CCAF offers and awards job-related associate in applied science degrees and other academic credentials that enhance mission readiness, contribute to recruiting, assist in retention and support the career transitions of Air Force enlisted members.

Computer-based training: Budget crunch alternative

SCOTT Air Force Base, Ill. — In an effort to fill the gap between tight budgets and training requirements, officials here remind Airmen and Air Force civilians there's a place to go for free computer-based training.

Hosted on the Air Force Portal, the Information Technology e-Learning program primarily offers continuing education to help communications professionals prepare for IT certifications and keep up with the latest software upgrades.

It's geared toward active-duty, Reserve, Guard and Department of Defense civilian IT professionals, "but you don't need to be a 'comm' troop to use the resources provided there," said James Shaw, Air Force Communications Agency technical director.

The agency administers the site for the Air Force.

"Anyone who uses Microsoft Office applications such as Word or Excel can take courses to improve their knowledge," Mr. Shaw said. "We'll also have a course online soon so people can learn the about Microsoft's Vista platform."

People can take courses in human resource development, project management or marketing strategies. They can also learn more about Adobe software systems such as Acrobat and Photoshop. These courses can be finished in a single sitting or saved and worked on as time permits.

People also have access to "Books 24x7," a comprehensive online reference library of fully-searchable technical books. The library contains more than 6,000 books covering topics such as IT software development, system engineering, and network design and support. It also contains 294 books covering desktop applications, operating systems, graphics, multimedia and design.

These books are available for all levels of expertise and experience.

"We have such a wealth of free resources to use," Mr. Shaw said. "Why not take a few minutes to visit the IT e-Learning site and discover the benefits yourself?"

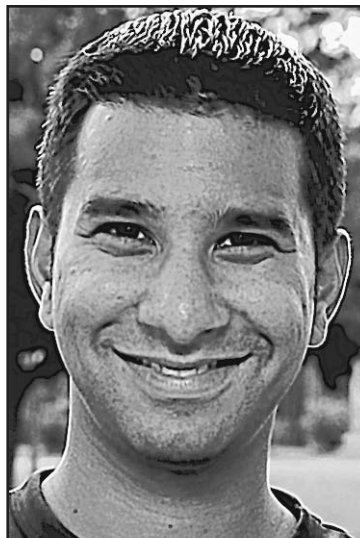
Former cop, now instructor, is base's nominee for award

Career job reservations unrestricted

RANDOLPH Air Force Base, Texas — Air Force officials announced fiscal 2008 started without any restrictions on first-term career job reservations for enlisted specialties.

Most years, Airmen compete for a limited number of jobs within their Air Force specialty codes, but this year, Air Force officials expect to meet enlisted authorized end strength through normal attrition.

“For the first time in four years, Airmen will not have to compete for the privilege of reenlisting in their specialty code,” said Chief Master Sgt. Christine Williams, chief of the Air Force Personnel Center enlisted skills management branch here. “However, commanders will still enforce quality standards before making Airmen eligible to reenlist.”

All first-term Airmen selected by their commanders as eligible to re-enlist under the Selective Reenlistment Program receive a CJR once they enter the first month of their reenlistment eligibility window. Aside from the fact there are no waiting lists, Airmen won't notice any difference from previous years. The automated processing continues to notify them of their career job reservations anytime they become eligible during their reenlistment window, even though there are no restrictions.

Force shaping preparations

In preparation for the next officer force shaping board in March, officers are encouraged to check their education levels in the virtual military personnel flight.

Household goods option

SmartWebMove is a new option allowing service members to set up their household goods moves on the Internet.

It can be used to set up household goods moves within the continental U.S. Sailors can also use SmartWebMove to arrange shipments overseas.

It can't be used for do-it-yourself moves, shipment of privately-owned vehicles, boats or mobile homes, or by first-time movers.

Personnel moving for the first time, call the personal property office, 377-9439 or 3436, to schedule counseling briefings.

'Rules of Road' apply to bicycle riders, too

Safety office

"Rules of the Road" apply to bicycle riders, as well as motorists and motorcyclists.

The safest place to ride at Keesler is Interstate 81, which follows the contours of the flight line. There, as well as anywhere else on base, bicyclists are required to ride single file and as close to the right side of the road as possible.

Other rules for bicyclists:

Ensure bikes have the necessary equipment, including white lights on the front and red lights or reflectors on the rear, brakes and bells or horns. The white light must be visible from at least 500 feet to the front. Brakes should be able to stop a bike within 25 feet from a speed of 10 mph on dry, level and clear pavement. Bells or horns need to be heard from at least 100 feet away. Sirens and whistles aren't authorized unless for official government business.



Wear approved protective helmets at all times.

In the fall and winter, when cyclists frequently travel in fog and darkness, highly reflective clothing is recommended. Wear reflective vests and belts when riding in uniform.

Come to a complete stop at all stop signs.

Use appropriate hand signals when preparing to make turns.

RANDOLPH Air Force Base, Texas — The Air Force is offering some active-duty staff, technical and master sergeants the opportunity to re-enter previous career fields now in demand.

The application deadline is Oct. 31.

The Air Force initiated the program due to unexpected retention issues and Air Force Specialty Code mergers.

Eligible Airmen must have held a valid skill level in a secondary AFSC within the last four years to reclassify into one of more than 70 AFSCs. Additional eligibility requirements are available by contacting unit commander support staffs.

“Those Airmen who apply must realize approval or disapproval is based on Air Force needs at the time,” said Master Sgt. Catina Johnson-Roscoe, superintendent of Air Force enlisted retraining and reenlistments at the Air Force Personnel Center here.

To apply for the program Airmen must:

Verify their eligibility and contact their commander support staff personnel for assistance in completing an application.

Contact the base functional manager for the old AFSC and obtain a letter of recommendation that certifies the member meets all eligibility criteria and is qualified for reclassification into the old specialty code.

E-mail a scanned copy of the application and recommendation letter to ncorp.suspense@randolph.af.mil.

Processing should take about four to six weeks.

Approved applicants don't incur additional active-duty service commitments for reclassification, and most stay in the local area of their current duty location to reduce permanent change-of-station costs.

Kids in college? Follow guidelines so Tricare isn't halted

If your college student turns 21 this year, there are things to do to ensure Tricare coverage isn't interrupted.

Tricare covers eligible dependents pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree until age 21. For coverage beyond that age, a student must be enrolled full-time at an accredited institution of higher education and the sponsor must provide more than 50 percent of the student's financial support.

The sponsor should visit or call the nearest uniformed identification card-issuing facility for information on necessary documentation needed to extend benefits for college students beyond their 21st birthday. This should be completed two months, but not less than one month, before their 21st birthday, so coverage isn't interrupted.

Tricare benefits end when the college student reaches age 23 or graduates, whichever comes first. For example, if a college student turns 23 on Jan. 3, but doesn't graduate until May, the student loses coverage at midnight Jan. 2.

It's also important for college students to keep their address, phone numbers and e-mail addresses current in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System so they can receive Tricare information as well as claims-generated explanations of benefits.

Shooting enthusiasts drawn to Coast Rifle and Pistol Club

Nearly 50 years ago, shooting enthusiasts in Harrison County founded the Coast Rifle and Pistol Club.

"You can trust other members here," said Ortego, a civilian training specialist in the 333rd Training Squadron. "You don't have to worry about going out to the range and someone not being safe."
