Town hall briefings provide overview of A-76's future

Two Oct. 11 A-76 town hall meetings provided a clearer picture of what the future holds for Keesler's military and civilian personnel.

The Air Force's final decision to award a \$270 million contract to Computer Services Corp. to cover most base operating support functions at Keesler for an initial year and nine option years was announced Sept. 12.

"Big BOS" covers civil engineering, parts of the 81st Services Division, weather station and certain mission support functions.

"Little BOS," a second contract for most communication support functions by government employees at a cost of \$54 million over 10 years, remains in litigation with the U.S. Court of Federal Claims.

Big BOS affects about 586

civilian and military positions, while Little BOS affects about 175 positions.

Although Keesler welcomed a new commander, Col. Greg Touhill, less than two weeks after the announcement, the commitment to the competitive sourcing process remains in place as a means of making the base's support services more efficient and economical.

"Colonel Touhill wants A-76 at Keesler to be a success story," said Col. Richard Pierce, 81st Training Wing vice commander, who conducted the town hall meetings in the new commander's absence. "He's seen it go both ways at other bases."

Brian Mooers, Keesler's competitive sourcing chief, said Air Education and Training Command contracting officials meet with CSC in



Dark Knights team to beat in season's final drill down

The 338th Training Squadron tries to capture its second straight monthly and annual titles in the end-of-the-season drill down, 8 a.m. Friday on the parade field.

The Dark Knights are coming off an overall win in the August drill down. They're also the defending annual champions.

Going into Friday's competition, the 338th TRS has 38 points toward another annual title.

If the Dark Knights hope to retain the trophy, they'll have to fight off the 334th TRS. For the the Gators, who have 33 points, to overtake the 338th TRS, they must place first and the Dark Knights sixth.

Practice is the key to victory in the final drill down, according to Staff Sgt. Reginald Brooks, noncom-

missioned officer in charge of the 338th TRS drill team.


Sergeant Brooks said lots of practice has been required because of all of the new faces on the team.

"The drill team members know that the pressure is on and that the bulls-eye is on their backs," he said. "They really can't wait to get out there and prove that the first-place sweep of the previous drill down wasn't a fluke."

Staff Sgt. Dorian Dejean, NCO in charge of the 334th TRS drill team, has also found preparation difficult.

"We've had many of our students graduating and departing for their permanent duty assignments," he explained.

Other teams competing Friday and their points to date: 335th TRS Bulls, 31 points; 332nd TRS Mad Dogs, 30; 336th TRS Red Wolves, 25; and the Center for Naval Aviation Technical Training Unit, 23.







SAN ANTONIO — Famed Flying Tigers ace and Texas Air National Guardsman Brig. Gen. David Lee "Tex" Hill, 92, died Oct. 11 of congestive heart failure.

General Hill flew with Gen. Claire Chennault as a member of the Flying Tigers, a volunteer group of American aviators who flew during World War II to defend China, which had no air force of its own. He was credited with 12 aerial victories as a Flying Tiger, and six more with the 23rd Fighter Group.

the next 30 to 60 days to officially sign the contract and finalize milestones.

However, the estimated contract start date remains Oct. 1, 2008. Big BOS mobilization is projected to start May 1, when the contractor comes onboard to work shoulder-to-shoulder with the existing workforce in preparation to take over responsibility for support services.

July 1, a 90-day transition period is estimated to begin in which CSC assumes Big BOS support services incrementally before the expected Oct. 1 contract start date.

Experts share insights

Several officials gave presentations on A-76 processes at last week's meetings.

Senior Master Sgt. Shirley Bailey, military personnel flight superintendent, talked about assignment issues for military members. Kathleen Reese from the Air Force Personnel Center discussed the mechanics of the RIF process. Lee Hathorn, Keesler's civilian personnel officer, addressed civilian personnel concerns.

Sergeant Bailey said assignments for Airmen in affected units may be issued as early as January based on the tentative milestones.

"There's lots of flexibility with (continental U.S.) assignments, but commanders must ensure that they have adequate staffing during the transition period," she stressed.

All personnel have an opportunity to be selected for overseas EQUAL positions. The

listing is available Nov. 1 and preferences must be updated by Nov. 16.

"When the EQUAL listing comes out, people that are mandatory movers are considered after the consecutive overseas tour volunteers are looked at," Sergeant Bailey said.

CONUS assignments

Continental U.S. assignments are processed by Air Force Specialty Code and grade and prioritized by date of rank, total active federal military service date and birth date.

"A lot of people have been here more than four years and qualify for base of preference assignments," Sergeant Bailey explained. "They should visit the MPF and give us three CONUS choices by Dec. 15."

The Air Force attempts to keep married couples together, and Sergeant Bailey advised spouses to make sure their intent codes agree. Couples get two choices for where they can PCS.

She also mentioned retraining, special duty assignment, humanitarian moves, separations and retirements, urging people considering those options to start working now with MPF customer service.

Special cases

"We need to talk about special circumstances as soon as possible," Sergeant Bailey said.

Officers work directly with AFPC for assignments, and chief master sergeant positions are handled by the chiefs group.

Ms. Reese has been through a RIF herself, so she understands what Keesler people are going through. She outlined responsibilities of AFPC and the civilian personnel office before, during and after a RIF,

and explained processes, retention factors and qualifications.

She emphasized the importance of making sure civilian personnel records are updated, accurate and include supporting documentation. During AFPC's RIF process, which runs eight weeks, every package is manually reviewed before the RIF is run, an action report is issued and notices are sent out.

Ensuring fair process

"We're looking at a database," Ms. Reese pointed out. "We don't know the names it's the best way to ensure a fair and equitable process. That's why it's so important to make sure your record is correct."

Among the data elements impacting the process are career tenure, veterans preference, length of creditable service and performance ratings.

National Security Personnel System employees don't compete with non-NSPS employees under the general schedule and federal wage grade systems.

"They don't compete with each other and can't displace each other," Ms. Reese explained. "Non-NSPS vacancies can't be used as valid RIF replacements for NSPS employees, but can be offered in lieu of separation outside of the RIF and vice versa."

"The bottom line is that things have to be done — whether you're going to be placed elsewhere, move, retire, resign or accept a separation incentive — by the

end of the RIF," Mr. Hathorn stressed.

During pre-RIF planning, some employees have already been identified for placement into vacant positions.

"There's no requirement to move an employee immediately when a vacancy materializes," he noted. "We work with management to make sure we consider the mission of the organization as well as the needs of the employee. The employee may be moved to a position at a later date, or a supervisor may have to hire a temporary employee, even for an A-76 position.

In placing individuals, Mr. Hathorn said, "The problem is that some of the positions in the study are so specialized that you don't find them anywhere else at Keesler."

Interest in VSIP

Nearly 200 employees expressed an interest in Voluntary Separation Incentive Pay during a February survey.

"We're surveying our employees again so we have an up-to-date listing," Mr. Hathorn remarked. "We have some new employees and others who may have become eligible, so the results may differ."

VSIP may be paid to employees who voluntarily separate through retirement or resignation when the separation saves another person's position. A recent clarification also allows a person in an A-76 job being abolished to be offered a

VSIP as determined necessary.

Severance pay is also available. To be considered, employees can't be eligible for retirement, must be involuntarily separated and have at least 12 months of continuous federal service. Retired military members aren't eligible. Employees can't decline a reasonable offer under RIF, but accepting or declining a contractor offer doesn't affect eligibility.

Retention register

Mr. Hathorn expects the first RIF register in January, but hopes it can be provided earlier. The final RIF register should arrive later in January or February after adjustments are made, so RIF notices may be issued as early as February or March.

"However, the law prevents us from issuing notices from Dec. 15 to the first pay period in January," he pointed out.

Defense Department officials are scheduled to arrive Jan. 14 to begin the Priority Placement Program process, but the date may shift depending on when the civilian personnel office receives the RIF retention register.

The register includes permanent employees, identifies the best employment offers available or projected separations.

Right of first refusal

Mr. Hathorn also explained CSC's duty to give qualified displaced federal employees the right of first refusal for job openings. The contractor isn't required to create enough jobs to accommodate every employee, and the length of employment with the contractor isn't guaranteed. Temporary employees aren't included in this provision as an entitlement, but may apply for contractor positions if they lose their jobs.

CSC determines qualifications and pay based on U.S. Department of Labor guidelines. The civilian personnel office provides CSC a listing of impacted employees interested in employment. Office space for CSC will be provided on base to simplify contact with potential employees.

Temporary duty and test cycles

If members' temporary duty period begins before the testing cycle starts and extends beyond the end of the testing cycle, they should test at the TDY location if facilities are available and requirements permit.

Testing up to 10 days prior to the announced cycle is authorized for members TDY during the entire testing cycle who can't test at their TDY location.

Members who decline to test early when so directed are ineligible for promotion for the remainder of the current test cycle.

'Move Over' in effect in state since July 1

"Move Over," a new Mississippi traffic law applies to Keesler personnel.

The law, which became effective July 1, states, "Upon approaching an authorized emergency vehicle, recovery vehicle or highway maintenance vehicle that is both stationary and using flashing lights, the person driving the approaching vehicle, proceeding with due caution, shall yield the right-of-way by making a lane change into a lane not adjacent to that of the authorized emergency vehicle."

The law defines "highway maintenance vehicle" as any vehicle used for maintenance of highways and roadways in Mississippi owned and operated by the Mississippi Department of Transportation, a county, municipality or other political subdivision, or owned or operated by a contractor under contract with those government entities.

A "recovery vehicle" refers to a vehicle used for towing a disabled vehicle or combination of vehicles.

According to a news release on Mississippi Link .net, motorists should yield the right-of-way and immediately drive to a position parallel to, and as close as possible to, the right-hand edge or curb of the roadway. If traffic is too congested to move over safe-



ly, motorists are required to slow down and proceed with caution.

The release goes on to say, "The 'Move Over' law was designed to protect law enforcement and other emergency workers on highways. With a rising number of deaths and injuries to police, emergency technicians, department of transportation workers and other emergency personnel around the nation, it is imperative that this law be put into effect in every state in order to save lives.

"A violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$250; provided that, should there be property damage to the emergency vehicle or bodily harm to the emergency vehicle driver resulting from the violation, the fine shall not exceed \$1,000."

Flu season

Keesler medical officials expect supply of vaccine for this year to be plentiful

Delivery of this year's influenza vaccine to Keesler Medical Center is pending.

Once it arrives and a schedule is developed, officials intend to inform Tricare military health care-eligible members and families through the Keesler News and the base's public Web site.

In the past few years, a vaccine shortage required medical officials to prioritize vaccinations for "high risk" patients. However, no vaccine shortage is anticipated for the 2007-08 season.

To ensure effective, targeted vaccination coverage, officials use a phased strategy that begins with active-duty military — an integral part of force health protection, medical readiness and deployability — and "high risk" enrolled beneficiaries in these categories:

Age 65 andolder with other serious health problems.

Residents of long-term care facilities.

Age 2 to 64 with other serious health problems.

Age 65 and older without other serious health problems

Children 6 to 23 months and pregnant women.

Health care personnel with direct patient contact.

Household contacts and out-of-home caregivers of children less than 6 months old.

The 81st Medical Group works with individual units to schedule immunizations for military personnel. Simultaneously, "highrisk" enrolled beneficiaries are contacted to schedule immunization appointments.

Once the first phase for active-duty and "high-risk" enrollees is completed, vaccine appointments are made available and scheduled for other Department of Defense-eligible members and families.

CDC recommendations

The Centers for Disease Control recommend these health habits during flu season:

Avoid close contact with sick people.

Keep your distance from others if you're sick.

Stay home when sick; cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing.

Wash hands often.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth – germs spread contamination.

According to the CDC, certain categories of the population shouldn't be vaccinated with the live, attenuated influenza vaccine which contains a live but "weakened" influenza virus. It's sprayed into the nostrils rather than injected into the muscle. These categories include:

People under age 5 or 50 and older. **People** with asthma, reactive airways disease or other chronic disorders of the pulmonary or cardiovascular systems.

People with other underlying medical conditions, including such metabolic diseases as diabetes, renal dysfunction and blood disorders.

People with known or suspected immunodeficiency diseases or who're receiving immunosuppressive therapies.


Children or adolescents receiving aspirin or other salicylates (in association with Rene syndrome with wild-type influenza infection).

Pregnant women.

People with a history of hypersensitivity to any components of LAIV or eggs, including anaphylaxis.

Cytogenetics laboratory staff boasts century of experience

Keesler Medical Center's cytogenetics laboratory boasts a wealth of experience.

Comprising one segment of the 81st Medical Operations Squadron's genetic center laboratory, four of the lab's staff members have devoted almost 100 years of expertise to the field.

Cytogenetics lab director Dr. David Rigdon, who retired from active duty as a colonel in June 2005, was part of the original cadre when the genetics center opened in 1980.

He explained that genetics basically deals with hereditary disorders.

Testing addresses questions

"For a given patient, there are three questions we try to answer: What is the diagnosis? What is the possibility of it occurring again in the family? What does the future hold for the affected individual?

"Laboratory testing for chromosomal disorders and/or molecular (DNA) mutations help address these questions, the doctor continued. "In addition, laboratory testing can be used to screen the population for mutations in order to determine the risk of having an affected child. For example, it's now recommended that all pregnant women be offered the option of screening for cystic fibrosis."

Recalling his history with Keesler Medical Center, Dr. Rigdon said, "I was first at the medical center as a pediatric resident from 1975-78 and then spent two years at the University of Alabama-Birmingham in a genetics fellowship. I returned to Keesler Medical center in 1980 as a geneticist."

Wearing two hats

In 1980, Col. (Dr.) Barry Thompson, who later became 81st MDG commander, ran the genetics department. He and Dr. Rigdon comprised the staff, acting as both clinicians and lab staff.

When Colonel Thompson left in 1985, Dr. Rigdon was named director of the Air Force Genetics Center at Keesler.

He returned in August to assume his current position. The doctor said the position was converted to a civilian post since there aren't many active-duty geneticists in the Air Force.

Gayle Bowman was hired by Colonel Thompson in November 1980. As a cytogenetic technologist, she analyzes chromosomes under a microscope, looking for abnormalities.

"I had previously worked in the same field for the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson," she explained. "Colonel Thompson learned I was in Pascagoula and

Wide-ranging genetics services

The other portion of the Air Force Medical Genetics Center in the basement of Keesler Medical Center is molecular genetics with three technologists.

Lt. Col. (Dr.) Michael Bashford, 81st Surgical Operations Squadron obstetrics/gynecology flight commander and a geneticist, oversees this area. He regularly sees clinical patients.

There are plans to hire a genetic counselor.

"The center provides focused genetic services relating to patient care and counseling, provider education and comprehensive diagnostic cytogenetic and DNA laboratory evaluations," said Capt. Mona Nelson, medical genetics center flight commander.

"The center serves Tricare's southern region as well as Department of Defense referral sites worldwide," she added.

Hours are 7 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday. Genetics appointments are made after referral from primary care managers.

had experience. He called me out of the blue and I came in for an interview.

"It took a year after the interview before I actually started work while they developed a job description and obtained funding," she said.

Ms. Bowman said when she started in the genetics lab, it was located in the main clinical laboratory while a portion of the medical center was under renovation. Genetics moved to its current location in what used to be the emergency room in 1996.

Cytogenetic technologists Karen Ball and Chris Williams both began their tenure in the lab in November 1984.

Ms. Ball came to the Mississippi Gulf Coast after working as a cytogenetic technologist at East Carolina University in Greenville, N.C.

Mr. Williams began working in genetics while attending graduate school at East Tennessee State University Medical Center in Johnson City, Tenn.

"I was low on funds and applied for a job there," he said. "I really enjoyed the work."

Rounding out the cytogenetics laboratory team is relative newcomer Ben Dudte, who started in 2002. He previously worked in a genetics lab in Ocean Springs.



Keesler's first men's varsity basketball team since Hurricane Katrina opens its home season this weekend.


