Leaders talk on 3 topics before panel

Focus on people, equipment, money

WASHINGTON — People, equipment and money were the main topics Oct. 24 when the secretary of the Air Force and the chief of staff testified before the House Armed Services Committee.

Secretary Michael Wynne and Gen. T. Michael Moseley answered questions from the committee about warfighting resources required for today and the future.

"While we're fighting the war on terror, we're also preparing for an uncertain future by doing all we can to become an even more efficient and effective instrument of national power," General Moseley said.

To that end, the Air Force is committed to flying a new air refueling tanker, testing rotary aircraft for combat search and rescue and developing a new long-range bomber. In addition, the F-22 Raptor and F-35 Lightning II

We must continue improving, streamlining our processes

RANDOLPH Air Force Base, Texas — One command ... one strategy!

Just over two years ago, I challenged my senior leaders to embrace this goal. At that time I set in motion the "Balanced Scorecard" process — a management tool for our nearterm strategy of recruiting, training and educating.

The BSC strategy map articulates Air Education and Training Command leadership's vision of where we want to lead the command. The map is more than just a "pento-paper" exercise — objectives on the map address unique challenges facing the command and help identify issues that hinder mission success.

The balanced set of objectives ensures our customers' needs are being met through our internal processes while supporting the needs of our own people. When everyone begins executing the strategy map, we all win.

In September 2006, I asked my strategy management team to cascade strategy maps to every AETC wing. The last wing strategy map was completed last month, and we now have 20 strategy maps in all. I sincerely appreciate the outstanding support from all our organizations and their participation in this important process.

Now that we've completed our cascading efforts, maintaining two-way communication becomes even more crucial. At the headquarters, we communicate our vision and assess progress across the command through bimonthly strategy review teleconferences. In return, subordinate units must identify obstacles that need to be removed by the headquarters to improve performance.

There's a risk that communication, through the strategy map, becomes one-way or topdown. If wings are reluctant to highlight issues that block mission accomplishment, we at the headquarters will never be able to remove those obstacles or reassess performance goals. Similarly, good ideas that increase productivity or eliminate inefficiencies will never see the light of day.

While it's taken two years to reach this milestone along our strategic journey, we haven't yet realized the full potential of our efforts. Our next step is to evolve the BSC into the resource and continuous process improvement (Air Force Smart Operations 21) arenas.

Sir Winston Churchill said it best during the darkest hours of the Battle of Britain: "Gentlemen, we are out of resources; therefore, we must think."

We're currently facing the same type of challenges he faced in that critical time. Our budgets are decreasing and we must recapitalize our air, space, cyberspace and training assets while continuing to fight the global war on terror. We must heed Mr. Churchill's advice and think — we must continue to improve and streamline our processes to ensure AETC remains the First Command.

You're crucial to these initiatives. Everyone in AETC plays an important role as we recruit, train and educate. I encourage you to participate in our strategy process by sharing good ideas that increase productivity or eliminate inefficiencies.





Early trainee dental exams breaks new ground in AETC

Keesler's dental clinic boasts a program unique to Air Force technical training bases.

Shortly after assuming command in July 2004, Col. (Dr.) Kenneth Levin, 81st Dental Squadron commander, worked with 81st Training Group officials to have all nonprior service students sent to the dental clinic for exams during their first week at Keesler.

"They receive a comprehensive examination," Colonel Levin explained. "This reduces the occurrence instances of dental class III status, which prevents Airmen from being qualified for worldwide assignments."

Students are bused from the Triangle Thursdays on compressed work schedule weeks and working Fridays. "We see up to 200 a day," the colonel noted. "We establish prioritized dental care and set up follow-on appointments. We also provide preventive dental education for the students, some of whom have never seen a dentist."

Colonel Levin said Keesler was the first Air Education and Training Command base to establish such a program.

"Other bases are now looking into doing something similar," he said.

The colonel stressed if the students didn't have the dental exams soon after arrival, they wouldn't be seen by a dentist until they're at their first duty assignment, which would be months in the future.

"Our program enables us to target dental care before they go to their next base," Colonel Levin said.

Keesler NCO one of 14 selected for training as physician assistants

Staff Sgt. Nathan Stafford, 81st Medical Operations Squadron, has been selected to attend Tri-Service (Phase I) Physician Assistant Training at Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, in May. He's one of only 14 Airmen chosen for the program. Participants in the two-year program earn bachelor's degrees after the first year and master's degrees upon completion of the second year at one of five locations in the U.S. Airmen who successfully complete Phase I and II courses are commissioned as first lieutenants. The Fountain Inn, S.C., native has been in the Air Force five years, the entire time at Keesler.

Leadership summit:

'One plan, set of road maps, vector'

WASHINGTON — Air Force leaders met here recently to discuss the bed-down of weapons systems over the next several years, outlining a strategy to address the service's most pressing need: recapitalization and modernization of its aging fleet.

The discussion focused on maintaining, evolving and expanding America's capabilities in air, space and cyberspace.

"I specifically set this day aside to gather top Air Force leaders to set out one plan, one set of road maps and one vector to best meet the war fighting requirements of our nation," said Gen. T. Michael Moseley, Air Force chief of staff. "Whether we're programming for a weapons system or developing the next generation of Air Force leaders, we need to prepare today for tomorrow."

Lt. Gen. Raymond Johns, the Air Force's senior programmer, outlined a comprehensive, capabilities-based force structure plan of 29

weapon systems and operations the Air Force intends to maintain, invest in or recapitalize through future budgets, some of which will be announced over the coming weeks.

"Faced with emerging threats, the Air Force must provide its Airmen the best equipment available, which involves recapitalization and modernizing the force," General Johns said.

The roadmap includes the Air Force's top weapons systems procurement priorities to provide America global reach, global power and global vigilance. The KC-X air refueling tanker provides global reach; the CSAR-X combat search and rescue helicopter, F-35 joint strike fighter and next generation bomber provide global power; and space assets provide global vigilance.

The emphasis across all of the plans is to further enhance the Air Force's total force integration by fully incorporating active-duty, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve forces across existing and new weapons systems.

will be the staples of future fighter wings, the general said.

"A new refueling platform is our number one priority we don't maintain air superiority and global reach without it," General Moseley said.

As one potential solution, several committee members asked if the Air Force has considered a civilian contracted "fee-for-service" air refueling solution similar to a Navy program.

"We're open to exploring it as an option," General Moseley said. "What we'd like is the freedom to test it on our own to see if it works for us. There are a lot of variables in a service like that."

The secretary hammered home the need for recapitalizing the Air Force inventory and retiring airframes that are no longer viable. At the center of the discussion were the KC-135E Stratotanker, C-5A Galaxy and C-130E Hercules.

"Congressional legislation keeps us from maintaining our own fleet," Secretary Wynne said. "What we want is to be able to retire aircraft that don't fly anymore."

For example, some grounded KC-135Es have to be towed around the flight line every few days just to keep the tires from going flat. In addition, once a month, the engines have to be run, just to keep within federal regulations. Because these grounded aircraft have to go through these mandatory procedures, they must continue to be funded, General Moseley said.

"This wastes time, money and the efforts of our crew chiefs to work on airplanes that don't fly," he added.

In order to save the money necessary to recapitalize the fleet, the Air Force has conducted several money-saving initiatives, including reshaping the service to operate with fewer people.

"Ultimately our goal is to ensure the Air Force maintains the right size and mix of forces to meet the global challenges of today and tomorrow. While our force size is getting smaller, we are making every effort to do business smarter," Secretary Wynne said.

"Some of our most successful initiatives have led to even more seamless integration of all elements of our total force," he added. Members of the committee expressed concern over how the Guard and Reserve would be affected by the Air Force's plan to draw down by 40,000 Airmen and if their missions would still be relevant.

"We have Guard and Reserve units partnering with their active-duty equivalents in several areas," General Moseley said.

"We also want to integrate the Guard and Reserve into our cyberspace mission," Secretary Wynne added.

General Moseley and Secretary Wynne also answered questions about Air Force readiness, considering more than 6,100 Airmen are filling in-lieu-of taskings for the Army.

"The Air Force has been in combat consistently for 17 years — we never left. Our jets were flying no-fly zones getting shot at every day," General Moselev said. "Our rotating schedule has changed and adapted over the years to work with our Airmen and their families. But there will always be a need for airlift as well as (intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance) in the Middle East. We're prepared to be there for at least another decade."

Promotion process change

WASHINGTON — Air Force Personnel Center officials recently announced changes to the captain promotion process, which affect line officers.

Beginning in January, active-duty line officers are considered for promotion to captain on a quarterly basis, instead of during the third quarter of each year.

Line officers won't have to do anything differently as the established board is automatic based on eligibility criteria.

Tricare during PCS moves

Enrollees in Tricare Prime scheduled for permanent change-ofstation moves remain enrolled at Keesler Medical Center until arrival at their new duty location.

To prepare for transferring Tricare Prime enrollment out-process the local Tricare office. This protects members and their families from incurring unnecessary charges for unexpected or emergency health care needs while traveling to their new duty location. The address and phone number of the Tricare Service Center at the new location is also available from this office.

Upon arrival at the next assignment, visit the military treatment facility for information about Tricare programs.

If emergency health care is required while in transit, go to the nearest military or civilian emergency room. If it's not an emergency, but can't wait, contact the losing Tricare Service Center or military treatment facility to ensure care is authorized and claim is properly processed.

Care received from a civilian provider during PCS may require payment prior to filing a claim. Providers who are part of the Tricare network normally file claims for members. To locate Tricare providers, first find the nearest Tricare Service Center at http://www.tricare.osd.mil.

Wearing headphones: What's in, what's out

There are places at Keesler for running with headphones and places where they're prohibited.

According to Keesler Instruction 31-204, Rules of the Road, and the safety office, headphones aren't allowed in areas outside approved running surfaces.

The instruction states, "No person may drive a vehicle, ride a bicycle, roller skate, roller blade, walk, or jog on any portion of any roadway while wearing a device or instrument which substantially impairs their hearing. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of headsets or earphones containing or connecting to a source of sound such as a radio, tape player, etc."

Headphones such as those used with iPods, which are popular with runners, aren't to be worn while running next to roads.

Headphones can be worn while running at certain designated locations, including the Crotwell, Triangle and I-81 tracks.

Headphones and other devices aren't allowed while running between an approved running area and the person's final destination.

"The ability to hear while



jogging, bicycling, skating, and operating motor vehicles is of the utmost importance when in, or near, a traffic environment. Wearing headphones is distracting and interferes with our ability to hear and be cognizant of our surroundings," said Virgil Mitchell, 81st Training Wing safety manager. "The use of headphones, where prohibited, is subject to punishment in accordance with Article 92 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice."

Air Force Instruction 91-207, The U.S. Air Force Traffic Safety Program, echoes KI 31-204, stating the use of portable headphones, earphones and other listening devices on Air Force installation roadways is prohibited.



Recognizing stress factors

"It is critical we recognize that our service members and families face enormous stress, and that stress can affect physical as well as mental health," said Army Maj. Gen. Elder Granger, Tricare Management Activity deputy director. "We support all efforts to reach out and offer help and advice on dealing with life's challenges.'

The Department of Defense Task Force on Mental Health report recently referenced a DOD survey of health-related behaviors among military personnel indicating 74 percent of active-duty members cope with stress by talking with a friend or family member.

Education, skill-building

Those individuals play a key role in influencing service members to seek help. As such, family members, as well as service members, need to be equipped with coping skills, the ability to recognize distress, and the knowledge of how and where to get assistance.

Cops back in refurbished building after Katrina repairs completed

The 81st Security Forces Squadron marks its return to its refurbished building on Larcher Boulevard with a ribbon-cutting ceremony, 2 p.m. Monday, according to Maj. Joseph Musacchia, commander.

Damage from Hurricane Katrina 26 months ago forced the squadron to move into temporary quarters while extensive renovation took place.

Squadron members began an incremental move back to the building in late September after more than 15 months in Avery Manor, an old dormitory slated for demolition.

Repairs cost more than \$3 million, said Bob Moseley, chief of the 81st Civil Engineer Squadron's program management office.

The building's structural and roof system was upgraded to meet current building code requirements designed for 140 mph sustained winds.

Walls, ceiling grids, electrical wiring, communication systems, flooring, gutters, downspouts and awnings were replaced and repaired, and hurricane screens were added.



Whew! New bridge rejoins Biloxi, Ocean Springs

Many Keesler employees who live in Ocean Springs are breathing a collective sigh of relief as two lanes of the new Biloxi Bay Bridge open this afternoon.

The major connector on U.S. Highway 90 between Biloxi and Ocean Springs was knocked out by Hurricane Katrina more than two years ago. Since then, commuters have had to take a longer northerly route through D'Iberville and St. Martin to get back and forth.

Celebrations take place at the foot of the bridge in each city during much of the day. The Mississippi Department of Transportation's official ceremony takes place at 2 p.m. at the Biloxi end of the bridge with speeches and musical performances. At 3:30, the Biloxi and Ocean

Springs high school bands march to the center of the bridge, where a ribbon-tying signifying the reconnection of the two communities takes place. A flyover by the 403rd Wing's Hurricane Hunters is also planned.

At 4:30, first responders lead a parade of motorcyclists, the NASCAR Talladega pace car and antique cars from Ocean Springs to Biloxi. Then, the bridge opens to regular traffic.

The day's festivities end with fireworks on the south side of the bridge, sponsored by the city of Biloxi and five casinos.

Work on the \$338 million project began in June 2006 and should be completed April 16. The bridge is 1.6 miles long, 120 feet wide and 85 feet above Biloxi Bay at its highest point. The finished structure will have six traffic lanes, four breakdown and emergency lanes and a bike path/walkway.

Coming soon: Holiday mailing deadlines

DALLAS – While the holidays may still seem far away, for Americans hoping to show support to deployed troops some deadlines are rapidly approaching.

According to the Military Postal Service Agency, mail going parcel post must be sent by Nov. 14 and first class mail must be sent by Dec. 10 to arrive by Dec. 25.

In addition to deadlines, several other factors must be considered when sending mail overseas. For example, each country has customs regulations that apply to all incoming mail, pertaining to everything from food items to reading materials. Military units may also have additional restrictions on incoming mail as to size and weight. Finally, all packages and mail must now be addressed to individual service members as required by the Department of Defense.

To help facilitate the mailing process and avoid many of the obstacles that come with the traditional care packages, the Army and Air Force Exchange Service created "Gifts from the Homefront," a campaign that allows anyone to make a direct and tangible contribution to military morale with a gift certificate that can be redeemed for nearly anything a specific service member wants.







Katrina-ravaged golf course restored — reopens Friday

Bay Breeze Golf Course reopens, 8 a.m. Friday, completely restored since being devastated by Hurricane Katrina 26 months ago.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony marks the occasion at 8 a.m.. The first ball is teed up at 8:30. Golfers may play for the special rate of \$10, including refreshment.

Katrina flooded greens and deposited silt and mud several inches deep over much of the course. Salt water from the Back Bay of Biloxi killed the grass and hundreds of trees.

The \$4.5 million restoration project included scrapping off dead grass, spraying the course with new grass seed, digging up and replacing greens and replacing dead trees with flower beds.

The layout remains the same, although golfers may notice the greens have a different look. The size, contours and grass of the greens have been changed.

"The greens used to be common Bermuda, but we decided to go with Tifdwarf Bermuda this time," said Tama Manu, director of golf for the 81st Services Division. "Tifdwarf has been used on the newer courses in the area. The hybrid grass is easier to maintain and is more suitable for our climate.

"We are extremely happy with the results of the restoration project," said Manu, noting the restored course now meets U.S. Golf Association standards.

Bay Breeze is a Par 71 lay-
