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Admiral Mullen on Leadership & Mentorship

"Leading in a time of change, is the toughest kind of leadership, because people like the status quo. They don't like things to change. And when things change, they're uncertain. "(June 11, 2009, National Defense University Commencement 2009, Fort McNair, Washington, D.C.)

"Our senior enlisted best understand our troops, the sources of their motivations and their hopes for the future. You may lead your units from a strategic level, but these professionals really run your units." (June 11, 2009, National Defense University Commencement Speech 2009, Fort McNair, Washington, D.C.)

"Within the ranks of young officers lies the future of our military and the future of our security ... how we raise them and reward their creativity is the key to our success." (June 11, 2009, National Defense University Commencement 2009, Fort McNair, Washington, D.C.)

"Responsibility of leaders in combat have been driven down to the very junior levels ... First Lieutenants, Sergeants and Staff Sergeants have performed incredibly well, and we ask them to be creative and dynamic and be innovative in some very complex battle space, and they have shown the way. I believe that keeping them around, retaining them, is key to leadership of the United States Military for the next 10, 20, 30 years." (July 01, 2009, Interview w/ Washington Post)

"At a time when we're asking young men and women to sacrifice their lives, which they are doing ... I need the best leaders, in the toughest spots." (July 01, 2009, Interview w/ Washington Post)

"I believe the most important part of leadership and who we are, is the people side. Leaders, enlisted and officer, junior and senior, need to be so close to their people that they can pick off where there are signs, and get them help. "We need to advance and execute matchless leadership. . . .we can have lots of greatness and lots of great equipment, but unless we make sure we have it right for our people and unless we treat every single individual we see as someone who has the potential to lead, I think we're going to fall well short." "Lastly, I would just want to say your leadership is absolutely critical. There are some areas we're in a crisis in, I talk about suicide being one. I think longer term how we handle the fullness of these challenges and it takes people like you and believe me, from the bottom of our hearts, we are grateful for what you're doing. Most important ingredient is leadership, aggressive, focused, listening leadership because at least it's my experience throughout my career in the toughest of situations when nothing else seems to work, leaders can break through, leadership breaks through. "And the last thing I just focus on briefly is leadership. Specifically that in the difficult times in my life and the most stressful parts of my professional career and in others as I've observed it, there's nothing that will solve problems more effectively than leaders. And at the essence of this, this is a people organization and it's who we are in every service. There's no more important part of our organization than you and our families. And the leaders – leadership that is associated with that. And it's not just about the brigade commander or me. This is about everybody in the room, everybody focusing on; mentoring those that are coming up behind us, making sure we are treating each other well, making sure people succeed, making sure the unit succeeds, putting the unit ahead of self, treating everybody with dignity and respect in a way that makes sure that this unit gets better every single day. "And I have a passion for people and a passion for the team, if you will. And so from a leadership perspective, I have always depended on my people. And in its simplest form, I try to take care of my people so that they will take care of me. And when I say take care of me, in a leadership position, a position where we have a job and we have a mission, and we do it together. And that is true literally to this day. 


