McKinley: National Guard is a national treasure

9/16/2010 - OXON HILL, Md., (AFNS) -- The National Guard is a national treasure that we need to preserve and protect, the guard's senior officer told attendees at the 2010 Air Force Association Air and Space Conference here Sept. 14.

"The dual mission of the National Guard, and its ability to combine and work with local, state and federal governments, makes us a force that I think is arguably a force that this nation cannot do without," said Gen. Craig R. McKinley, the chief of the National Guard Bureau.

The National Guard has always had a dual mission at home and abroad, but it is now also considered an operational reserve providing forces for missions in Iraq, Afghanistan, the Sinai, Haiti, the Horn of Af-



rica and Kosovo. "The citizens of the United States expect the full might of the armed forces to come to their aid in the event of a natural disaster, and the National Guard has been there every time," General McKinley said. Since Hurricane Andrew in 1992 and Hurricane Katrina in 2005, the guard has made rapid improvements to its response with local, state and federal governments. "Our domestic mission is a piece of our fabric, it's a piece of our culture," he said. General McKinley also described the overseas missions the guard has been a part of since the attacks in New York City on Sept. 11, 2001.

"The Army Guard has been involved in operations for the last nine years, while the Air Guard is going on nearly two decades," he said. "The Air Guard has been supporting the Air Force, and has been fully integrated into operations, such as Northern Watch and Southern Watch. "Under great leadership, the Air Guard has been able to achieve this full integration with the active force and perform its missions in a very professional manner," the general said.

Currently, about 44,000 Soldiers and 10,000 Airmen are deployed in support of operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. "Over the last 20 years, we've made some dramatic changes in the National Guard, changing from what the guard used to be, to what it is today," General McKinley said.






Man on the street...

153rd Security Forces Get Physical With Their Training

Military training doesn't always consist of hours of computer based training in a stuffy class room. For members of the 153rd Security Forces Squadron, October's training was more hands on and fun.

Security Forces members are qualified on many means in which to protect the base and its assets, one of these is the police baton. In order to carry this defensive weapon, all members must go through initial training, followed by yearly recertification. Starting in 2000, Senior Master Sgt. Doug Rhodes, 153 SFS superintendent, after becoming a certified baton instructor, took over the training and started teaching the unit's members on use of the baton. Prior to this, mem-



bers were trained by the local police department. Staff Sgt. Gregory Wardle, a certified instructor, heads up the training.

This past drill consisted of members getting hands on training techniques with the weapon, culminating with a more realistic simulation of real world scenarios. Along with Wardle, Master Sgt. Troy Woolhether geared up in the "red man suit", which is a full body padded suit, so course members could implement techniques taught earlier in the class. During two- to five- minute drills, members using padded batons were given scenarios in which they had to

decide when, if, and how to use the baton to "control" the suspect.

Even though the instructors' play acting caused some laughter and the members' batons cause some bruises, the overall goal of preparing the troops for actual and proper use of a deadly weapon was accomplished. The baton, along with many other weapons at security forces disposal, prepares the men and women of the 153 SFS to defend us when called upon.

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The Six Pillars of Character

Summary from "Making Ethical Decisions" by Michael Josephson

Trustworthiness. Respect. Responsibility. Fairness. Caring. Citizenship. The Six Pillars of Character are ethical values to guide our choices. The standards of conduct that arise out of those values constitute the ground rules of ethics, and therefore of ethical decision-making.

There is nothing sacrosanct about the number six. We might reasonably have eight or 10, or more. But most universal virtues fold easily into these six. The number is not unwieldy and the Six Pillars of Character can provide a common lexicon. Why is a common lexicon necessary? So that people can see what unites our diverse and fractured society. So we can communicate more easily about core values. So we can understand ethical decisions better, our own and those of others.

The Six Pillars act as a multi-level filter through which to process decisions. So, being trustworthy is not enough — we must also be caring. Adhering to the letter of the law is not enough — we must accept responsibility for our action or inaction.

The Pillars can help us detect situations where we focus so hard on upholding one moral principle that we sacrifice another — where, intent on holding others accountable, we ignore the duty to be compassionate; where, intent on getting a job done, we ignore how.

In short, the Six Pillars can dramatically improve the ethical quality of our decisions, and thus our character and lives.

1. TRUSTWORTHINESS

When others trust us, they give us greater leeway because they feel we don't need monitoring to assure that we'll meet our obligations. They believe in us and hold us in higher esteem. That's satisfying. At the same time, we must constantly live up to the expectations of others and refrain from even small lies or self-serving behavior that can quickly destroy our relationships.

2. RESPECT

The Golden Rule — do unto others as you would have them do unto you — nicely illustrates the Pillar of respect. Respect prohibits violence, humiliation, manipulation and exploitation. It reflects notions such as civility, courtesy, decency, dignity, autonomy, tolerance and acceptance.

3. RESPONSIBILITY

Life is full of choices. Being responsible means being in charge of our choices and, thus, our lives. It means being accountable for what we do and who we are. It also means recognizing that our actions matter and we are morally on the hook for the consequences. Our capacity to reason and our freedom to choose make us morally autonomous and, therefore, answerable for whether we honor or degrade the ethical principles that give life meaning and purpose.

4. FAIRNESS

What is fairness? Most would agree it involves issues of equality, impartiality, proportionality, openness and due process. Most would agree that it is unfair to handle similar matters inconsistently. Most would agree that it is unfair to impose punishment that is not commensurate with the offense. Essentially fairness implies adherence to a balanced standard of justice without relevance to one's own feelings or inclinations.

5. CARING

If you existed alone in the universe, there would be no need for ethics and your heart could be a cold, hard stone. Caring is the heart of ethics, and ethical decision-making. It is scarcely possible to be truly ethical and yet unconcerned with the welfare of others. That is because ethics is ultimately about good relations with other people.

6. CITIZENSHIP

Citizenship includes civic virtues and duties that prescribe how we ought to behave as part of a community. The good citizen knows the laws and obeys them, yes, but that's not all. She volunteers and stays informed on the issues of the day, the better to execute her duties and privileges as a member of a self-governing democratic society. She does more than her "fair" share to make society work, now and for future generations. Such a commitment to the public sphere can have many expressions, such as conserving resources, recycling, using public transportation and cleaning up litter. The good citizen gives more than she takes.

Wyoming Air National Guard Fire Department Fire Prevention Tip of the Month

All Fired Up!

When winter comes, we tend to think of home as a warm, safe retreat from the cold weather outside. But sources of indoor warmth can put you at significant risk to fire if they're not used carefully.

Fact: According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), heating equipment is the second leading cause of U.S. home fires. An average of 74,400 home heating fires each year results in 480 deaths, 2,290 injuries and \$582 million in property damage. In addition, December, January and February are the leading months for fires in the U.S.

Keep warm and safe by using the following heating advice from the NFPA:

All heating systems should be inspected and cleaned, if necessary, by a trained professional before the start of each heating season.

Keep combustibles, including people, pets and furniture, at least three feet (one meter) away from all heat sources, especially space and portable heaters.

Turn off space and portable heaters when leaving home or going to bed.

When using a fireplace, place a fire screen of sturdy metal or heat tempered glass in front of it to trap any sparks. Burn only seasoned wood – never rubbish - in your fireplace.

Keep fireplace mantels and the surrounding area clear of combustibles, such as dried flowers and wreaths.

Inspect electrical heaters for frayed, cracked or damaged cords, and have them replaced by an electrician.
