Director asks Air Guard leaders to look ahead

Times are tough for the Air National Guard, but Lt. Gen. Harry Wyatt III sees many "great" opportunities for his 106,700-member force to excel in the future.

"We know there is a mismatch right now of demands on the force and resources," said General Wyatt, the director of the Air Guard. "I think it will get worse before it gets better, but I don't bring you a message of despair today.

"I bring you a message of hope and courage because I see great opportunity, because we are the most efficient force, the most capable force that we have ever been. The country can afford us before it can afford some other things that (it) is looking at."

General Wyatt's question for senior Air Guard leaders from around the country is: "ANG 2025: Are We Ready?"

"Are we willing to make the tough choices that will posture us for the future?" he asked.

Air Force officials announced that Stewart Air National Guard Base in New York is the preferred base for eight C-17 Globemaster III aircraft.

"Through the next several months and years, there will many of these announcements," General Wyatt said. "The questions will be: Are they the type of announcements that we as an organization can embrace and take forward and excel the way we have excelled in our missions in the past?"

General Wyatt said the Air Guard should prepare for future demands now.

"We have got to start shaping that force today, to be ready to provide the force that this country needs in 2025," he said.

General Wyatt said the Air Guard has seen "significant change" over the last decade.

Chairman's Corner: Too Many Doors Still Closed to Women

Thad the opportunity to address a conference on

"Women and War," hosted by Unitthe States ed Institute of Peace. My main message this: was no matter how many



doors we have opened for women in the military -- and there have been many -- there are still too many others yet closed.

We simply must do a better job tapping into their unique talents and understanding their unique challenges.

Today, women are rising through our ranks and expanding their influence at an everincreasing rate, serving magnificently all over the world in all sorts of ways. More critically, in these wars of ours, they've served and sacrificed and led every bit as much and every bit as capably as any man out there. Well over 200,000 women have served in Iraq and Afghanistan, demonstrating tremendous resilience, adaptability and

> capacity for innovation. Indeed, they have given us a competitive advantage.

Five years ago, when the enemy was using

Iraqi women to subvert our security checkpoints, female Marines started something called the "Lioness" program to counter this threat and then conduct broader outreach to the women of Iraq.

In Afghanistan today, female Marines are providing hope and promise through female engagement teams in the Taliban strongholds in that country. These brave women have in many places been able to operate where male troops often cannot go. One Afghan elder who opened his home so female Marines could visit with his wife told Washington Post reporter Tom Ricks, "Your men come to fight, but we know the women

are here to help."

Now, I would tell you that ALL of our deployed troops, men and women alike, are there to fight for and to help the local population. But these women have been able to build special relationships and trust with Afghan women, to see things through their eyes and gain valuable insight that we would not have gained otherwise.

Time and again, military women show us that courage and leadership recognize no gender. In a war where there is no longer a clear delineation between frontlines and sidelines, where the war can come at you from any direction, I think it's important for all of us to remember that this will be the first generation of veterans where large numbers of women returning will have been exposed to some form of combat.

I know what the law says, and I know what it requires. But I'd be hard pressed to say that any woman who serves in Afghanistan today or who's served in Iraq over the last few years did so without facing the same risks to live and limb that their male counterparts faced. Military women are coming home to Dover too.

And just like the men, those that make it home do so with wounds visible and invisible, with similar consequences for our health-care system, our national employment rate and even homelessness. Along with other issues, financial hardships are driving veteran homelessness to a rate faster than experienced by the Vietnam generation. Experts say that more than 100,000 veterans are homeless on any given night and almost 4,000 are from today's generation and 10 percent of those seeking help for homelessness are women. Many of these women have young children who have already been through so much.

This is something that deeply troubles me, because the resources for these women haven't caught up with those for male veterans. And they have unique challenges that the system just does not understand yet.

There are, indeed, many doors yet to open.

Johnson, with the help of Ramona Baker and Beth Johnson, led the children in a craft making session where they created memory boxes for their deployed parent. These boxes were filled with items that the children have saved over the course of the deployment such as; tickets from sporting events attended or sea shells from a beach visit. They'll be able to use these boxes to share memories of what happened in their lives while their parent was deployed. Kids also

partook in a snack time that included items native to the areas their parent may be deployed in, including Naan bread and pomegranates. The teenagers enjoyed games at Fall Hall, on F.E. Warren Air Force Base, including laser tag, and finished the day with a carear guiding session led by

laser tag, and finished the day with a career guiding session led by Robin Gorsuch.

Spouses attending the YRRP were provided with information in helping the transition back into non-deployed life including subjects on "Where Do I Fit In With the Homecoming?" and the affect of deployment on children. Various speakers throughout the day included Col. Dennis Grunstad II, commander of the 153rd Airlift Wing, Trish Bannon, director of psychological health for the Wyoming National Guard and Meg Wright, wife of Maj. Gen. Ed Wright, Wyoming's adjutant general.

orking with what you have is the main theme for the Mobile Aeromedical Staging Facility. So, when bad weather and a lack of tents threatened the 153rd Medical Group's yearly MASF training they just adapted and overcame by using available buildings and equipment

The MASF is a CONUS mission that lends medical support in event of a natural disaster or other emergencies requiring medical evacuations. Since taking over the program two years ago from the 187th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron, 2nt Lt. Kent Ammerman and Master Sgt. Shane Larson of the 153 MDG have been preparing its members in the event real world support is needed. According to Ammerman the MASF package is "like a great big ambulance." When the 153 MDG gets called by an overwhelmed agency, such as a hospital, the MASF mobilizes. They are self-contained with both staff and equipment. This includes a medical team of: four nurses, seven Medical technicians, one logistics officer, one administration person, and two communications personnel. Once on the ground the MASF is able to operate for up to 48 hours before needing resupplies. This enables them to be efficient and effective at treating the injured and getting them to a safe location.

The 153 MDG MASF has yet to be tested in a real world situation, however, Ammerman feels that "even though we're still on a pretty good learning curve we're confident that we are prepared to make it work". Wyoming Air National Guard

Airmen who have been in the Air Guard for 20 years or less, he said, have been focused on the air expeditionary force construct.

"They know nothing else," General Wyatt said. "They are used to it."

General Wyatt said that when he joined the Air Guard, the force was not built for such deployments.

"We have evolved into an air expeditionary force -- an extremely capable air expeditionary force. But what will be the demands of tomorrow?"

General Wyatt said he also is proud of the Air Guard's domestic response capability, but there are challenges ahead for that mission too.

"We have 30 percent less airlift now than we did when we responded to Hurricane Katrina," General Wyatt said, adding that in fiscal year 2010 more than 100 emergencies across the country generated over 2,250 airlift sorties.

"We are on call 365 days a year, 24 hours a day. If that's not value for America, I don't know what is," he said.

The Air Guard is slated to undergo many mission changes next year, Wyatt said, as a result of the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure Commission.

"We have undergone a lot of change and it has been undertaken in a short time period," he said. "The rate of change is not slowing at all. We need to reflect on the implications of what we have done in the past as we look to the future of the Air National Guard."

The Air Guard has been through trying times before, General Wyatt said, noting that when Maj. Gen. Winston P. "Wimpy" Wilson was the director of the Air National Guard, he lost 50 percent of his aircraft due to resource constrictions. General Wilson converted into more modern aircraft and diversified the force into non-flying missions, General Wyatt said.

On the other hand, when Lt. Gen. John B. Conaway was director of the Air National Guard during the Reagan years, he was faced with a flood of resources.

"He took advantage of the landscape and he moved us forward," General Wyatt said of Conaway's achievements.

General Wyatt said he needs his senior leaders to help him decide how to go forward. He plans to conduct an internal review this year to get an "honest assessment" of the Air Guard.

"We will not lose momentum," he said. "We owe our airmen that effort."

General Wyatt said the key to the Air Guard's future is to: "Figure out what we do best, what we do most efficiently, most cost-effectively and grab it!" Wyoming Air National Guard Fire Department Fire Prevention Tip of the Month

Smoke Detectors

• Place a smoke alarm on every level of your home and inside all bedrooms.



Check smoke alarms

monthly by pushing the test button. If you cannot reach the button easily, use a broom handle.

• Change the batteries in your alarms at least once a year - perhaps when you change your clocks for daylight savings time or if the device is chirping.

• Teach children what the smoke alarm sounds like and what to do - leave the building immediately by crawling low under the smoke - when they hear it sound. If cooking smoke sets off the alarm, do not disable it. Turn on the range fan, open a window or wave a towel near the alarm.

• Do not remove the batteries to put in other appliances such as personal stereos or games. Smoke alarms wear out over time. Replace yours if it is 10 years old or more. Keep smoke alarms clean. Dust and debris can interfere with their operation. Vacuum over and around your smoke alarm regularly.

• Consider installing a 10-year lithium batterypowered smoke alarm, which is sealed so it cannot be tampered with or opened.

• Hard-wired smoke alarms with battery backups need to be tested monthly and batteries replaced yearly. When Chekhov saw the long winter he saw a winter bleak and dark and bereft of hope.

Yet we know that winter is just another step in the cycle of life.

But standing here among the people of the Wyoming Air National Guard and basking in the warmth of their hearths and hearts, we couldn't imagine a better fate than a long and lustrous winter.
