

embers of the 153rd Civil LEngineering Squadron continue construction affiliated with St. Michaels Association for Special Educa-

tion (SMASE) on the Navajo Nation, in Arizona. SMASE

is included in the National Guard's Innovative Readiness Training (IRT) program, a civilmilitary affairs program linking military units with civilian communities for humanitarian projects.

This year, the focus has been a new adult treatment center.

"We really needed a

lot of space," said Elaine Long, training coordinator for the campus and director of adult treatment. "With all the different rooms, we can zero in on assessing

skills."

The school has been serving the needs of children and adults with moderate to severe disabili-

ties for more than 40 years regardless of tribal affiliation and state of residency. The children, a majority of them Navajo, come from all over the Navajo Reservation, the largest in America. St. Michael's is school and home for more than 80 children and young

adults.

Because of limited space, SMASE has had to turn people away. "The new building means we are able to accept more clients," Long said. "It will mean everything to the clients and their families." Families and clients been watching the progress with anticipation. "They keep asking," said Long. "I can envision the activities we will have. I'm excited."

From inside the nurse's station, constructed last year as part of the project, Pat Smith, director of nursing, reflected on her time at St. Michaels. "It just felt like I was being called to work on the reservation." A native of New Jersey, Smith said, "I promised them two years; I have been here

eleven. They're really special kids."

Senior Master Sgt. Leroy Rusk, structures superintendent for the 153rd Civil Engineering Squadron is the program manager superintendent for the project.

"It's a great project." Rusk said. "The Navajo Nation provides the materials and the military provides the labor, tools, and heavy equipment. It's a win-win situation for both parties."


Communication equipment was donated from the 153rd Communications Squadron. "SMASE has been very grateful for the extra materials," Rusk said.

utors from Guam, Utah, and Florida Air National Guard units and Seabees from Ft. McCoy, Wis.

"They've done a great job," said Rusk. "It's good for the Air National Guard because, in the civil engineering world, this is the one time during the year where the teams are brought in to practice and train additionally in their skills: surveying, engineering, plumbing, heating, ventilation, air conditioning, and communication. The project has the whole facet from bringing a project from ground level, up to a finished project."

In addition to honing skills, it's about community.

"It's great to be part of something to help people," said Master Sgt. Chad Holmes, pavement and equipment journeyman of the 153rd Civil Engineering Squadron.

"This has been so wonderful," said Long. "For some, this is their home; they deserve this."

187th Airlift Squadron named distinguished flying unit

he Wyoming Air National Guard's 187th Airlift Squadron has won a prestigious national award for meeting the highest standards of mission accomplishment in 2010.

For its accomplishment, the unit will be presented the prestigious Metcalf Trophy, in August, at the National Guard Association of the United States (NGAUS) convention in Milwaukee, Wis. The unit will also receive the NGAUS Distinguished Flying Unit Plaque.

The Curtis N. "Rusty" Metcalf Trophy, bestowed annually by the National Guard Bureau, recognizes the airlift or air refueling unit that demon-



strates the highest standards of mission accomplishment.

"It's been a long year of inspections, exercises and deployments to the farthest reaches of the globe," Col. Dennis Grunstad, 153rd Airlift Wing commander said. "In every instance, and with every tasking, the unit has performed with professionalism, dedication, perseverance and a great attitude that has reflected well on the Wyoming Air National Guard," he said. "Receiving the Rusty Metcalf Trophy formalizes the fact that we are the top airlift wing in the nation, and that makes our Airmen a champion in my book. They earned this award, and they deserve it."

To be considered for this award, units are evaluated in the areas of exercises and deployments, human resources, accident rate history, accident prevention and significant accomplishments during the award period.

The award is named for a former deputy chief for plans and operations at the National Guard Bureau, in Washington, D.C.



Guard and Reserve aerial firefighting resources conduct annual training in Idaho

he Wyoming Air National Guard's 153rd Airlift Wing in Cheyenne, Wyo., in participation with the National Interagency Fire Center, conducted annual Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System training in Boise, Idaho, May 1-7.

The Wyoming Air National Guard recently sent 13 personnel and one aircraft to Texas in support of the Texas wildfires. They deployed to Dyess Air Force Base, in Abilene, Texas, from April 18-26, using the second generation of the U.S. Forest Service's Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System or MAFFS 2.

The crew dropped 12,000 gallons on the Possum Kingdom Fire; 9,000 gallons on the Wildcat Fire; and 6,000 gallons on the Cole Fire. The crew consisted of Maj. Jeremy

Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard members are currently undergoing their annual currency and re-currency certification required by the U.S. Forest Service prior to this year's fire season.

Schaad, Maj. Rickey Rau, Maj. T.J. Gagnon, Senior Master Sgt. Ted Anthony, Senior Master Sgt. Doug Peterson, and Master Sgt. Mike Novick. The crew had completed advanced training in Colorado last month.

Those crews and the other 153rd Airlift Wing personnel will receive their annual certification in Boise. Military pilots flying C-130 airplanes will conduct up to 80 practice flights per day, dropping water on target sites on national forest land in Idaho.

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
30th Airlift Squadron change of command

The Cheyenne Trophy is a longstanding award presented to outstanding military units or personnel by the Greater Cheyenne Chamber of Commerce.

Det. 53 was established in 1995 and over the last 15 years, Det. 53 has supported a wide variety of missions to include support of the Wounded Warrior Transport Program, movement of sensitive material, transportation of heavy cargo, courier missions and passenger transportation to special events, which has saved the state of Wyoming hundreds of thousands of dollars each year. Det. 53 was deployed from December 2009 to December 2010, It's mission during the deployment was to observe, detect, identify, and neutralize enemy threats under Task Force ODIN to help defeat IEDs, and increase the survivability of U.S. Army units.

"I am proud of the men and women of Det. 53. Our mission is a very diverse one that requires a lot of support and training alongside of our fellow Wyoming Guard Units," said Chief Warrant Officer Randy Sindelir, Det. 53 commander. 'We

Even being submitted for the award seems a little much for this chief. "Don't even do that, I'm just doing my job," he said when he was informed he was being submitted.



Carolina Air National Guard in Charlotte, N.C.; the 146th Airlift Wing of the California Air National Guard in Port Hueneme, Calif.; and the 302nd Airlift Wing with the U.S. Air Force Reserve of Colorado Springs, Colo.

The military C-130s equipped with slide-in MAFFS units can drop

up to 3,000 gallons of retardant per run on wildfires. The four MAFFSdesignated military units must perform refresher training each spring before the start to wild-land fire season.

MAFFS is a partnership between federal land management agencies and the military to provide supplemental air tankers to assist in fire suppression efforts nationwide during times of high fire activity. There are two units assigned to each of the four military wings, with a total of eight aircraft available for supporting civilian agencies if necessary.

Congress established the authority for the MAFFS program in the early 1970s to support wild-land firefighting through an agreement with the U.S. Forest Service. The military aircraft are requested by the National Interagency Fire Center and activated through the U.S. Northern Command, based on an agreement with the Department of Defense. The most recent MAFFS mission was mobilized this month to Texas.
