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
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On the cover...

the T-6, T-28, T-33, T-38, F-80, F-84,

F-86, F-100, F-104, F-4, F-5, A-7, and the F-15. He also flew Tiger Moths, Vampires and Meteors for the Royal Air Force. In addition to his military career, he flew the Skybolt for aerobatic demonstrations for seven years before moving to the MiG-17 which he has been flying for 13 years. He has more than 42,000 flying hours. Originally from Iowa, Wilhite joined the Air Corps during World War II and has been flying ever since. He now lives in the Denver area.

I 53rd Airlift Wing command changes

ol. Stephen Rader assumed command of the Wyoming National Guard's 153rd Airlift Wing in a ceremony July 9 at the Wyoming Air National Guard base.

Rader assumed command from Col. Dennis Grunstad. Grunstad will be assigned to Wyoming Military Department Joint Force Headquarters, in Cheyenne.

The 153rd Airlift Wing is composed of 12 H-model C-130 Hercules and contains four group commands; the 153rd Maintenance Group, 153rd Operations Group, 153rd Mission Support Group and the 153rd Medical Group.

The wing provides worldwide theater airlift, airdrop and aeromedical evacuation; responds to state and federal disasters to assist with relief; and, when activated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, employs the Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System (MAFFS).

"Col. Rader is an outstanding senior leader who will excel in leading the best airlift wing in the world," Assistant Adjutant General-Air Brig. Gen. Donald Haught said. "We look forward to the continued success of the wing and its ability to meet every challenge that comes its way."

As a result of the change of command, additional command personnel moves include:

Col. Paul Lyman moved from 153rd Mission Support Group commander to 153rd Airlift Wing vice commander.

Lt Col. Pete Linde assumed command of the 153rd Mission Support Group.

WyANG airshow draws thousands

n estimated 10,000 spectators attended the 2011 Air Power Airshow at the Wyo. Air National Guard Base, Cheyenne Regional Airport July 27.

People from around the country, and around the world, came to see the Thunderbirds, a variety of aerial demonstrations and static displays showcasing historical and current aircraft.

Phil and Kathy Joubert came from Whitman, Mass., just outside of Boston. "This is great," said Phil. "It's ideal, it's easy, it's nice and brings me back to my youth." Phil was stationed at F.E. Warren Air Force Base from 1959 to 1960 and last year came back to Cheyenne for the first time since being stationed in Wyoming. "We just love it out here," he said.

Keith Hampton and Mike Zherdev, of Ft. Collins, Colo., work together. It was Keith's first time at the airshow. "Seeing the variety is great," Hampton said. "It's such a nice day." Zherdev, originally from Russia, is no stranger to aviation. He is a professional pilot and flight instructor and aviation enthusiast. "Your airshow is always a nice experience. A must see. This is something unique," he said. "You've done a great job. Just give me the keys to the planes."

Jim Peloquin, originally from Chicago, Ill., and now living outside of Ft.

Collins, Colo., is a Vietnam veteran. The atmosphere reminds him of his service and being around F-4s. "I always come and see this," he said. "I gotta see the Thunderbirds. The noise and the afterburners. Amazing."

Others make the show come alive. They are the performers. Retired Col. Jack Wilhite has been flying most of his life. With 227 combat missions in Vietnam and service in World War II. Korea. and a retired United Airlines captain, it's hard to keep him out of a cockpit. He has more than 42.000 flying hours in a variety of aircraft and has been flying at airshows for nearly 20 years.

"I've been really fortunate to fly," said Wilhite. "A high in my career would be flying combat missions in Vietnam." Wilhite flys a Russian MiG-17, at the age of 82. "People come to airshows looking for thrills and to

watch war birds fly," he said. "It's a fun day to bring your family."

Maj. Ryan Hendrickson, a pilot for the 30th Airlift Squadron, and airshow director, along with assistance from other base agencies, made the airshow a success. "I truly appreciate the team effort and support from dedicated individuals and squadrons who supported the event. We couldn't have done it without them." Hendrickson said. "The number of people at the airshow and community involvement was amazing. Many of the performers said they want to come back next year--that's a good thing."

im Mundell has been interested in aviation all his life. His father was a "Tail End Charlie" in Lancaster bombers with

the 35th Squadron, Pathfinder Force, and they lived in Scotland close to a Royal Naval Air Station and a civil airport.

Twenty five miles down the road was

Prestwick Airport, the transatlantic gateway of the 1960s to 1980s and a busy refuelling stop for USAF flights to and from Europe. On March 3, 1960, Sgt. Elvis Presley made his one and only visit to the UK when his aircraft made a refuelling stop at Prestwick en route to Mc-

Guire Air Force

Base, N.J. In 1976, the Mundell's moved to the outskirts of London, just 8 miles from the famous "Battle of Britain"

airfield, Biggin Hill, where, five years later, Mundell would complete his one and only solo flight.

"I loved flying, and still do, but I was aware that

my vision was not 20/20 and you can't pull into a parking lot at 5,000 feet to check where you are on the map," said Mundell.


"In 1988, I flew to Louisville, Ky., on business and was invited by a local deputy sheriff to visit the ANG Base at Standiford Field where KY ANG flew the RF-4C Phantom. I was so impressed with the warm welcome, and the dedication of the Air Guardsmen, that I have been interested in the ANG ever since," Mundell said.

Mundell's interest in aviation led him to a hobby of creating models of aircraft to include those from the ANG inventory.

Several of the present producers of 1/200 scale model aircraft go under the label "The One True Scale" because 1/200 was the first widely used scale for aircraft models. Why Wyoming? "My long term aim is to have an example from each state with as many different types as possible. When I heard that a casting was in progress I asked a friend if he would build me a unique model of the Beech C-45 with Wyoming ANG markings to fill the gap in my collection," said Mundell.

A very detailed process is followed to make the scale models. Small scale producers are often willing to produce individual models and color schemes. "As these are one-offs they are not cheap, but your model will be unique and very collectable," Mundell said.

The Wyoming Air National Guard now has a piece of history, with bucking horse and original tail number, in the form of a 1/200 scale model thanks to Jim Mundell.
