Commander's Corner

S exual harassment is a form of misconduct that requires the personal awareness of every member in the chain of command.

This article was originally written by Lt. Col. Bob
Korte for the men and women of the 153 CACS. I felt the message was so strong, powerful, and globally universal I asked Lt. Col. Korte to modify for the good of the wing and publish in the Guardian as this month's guest commander writer. Look forward to future missives from the other commanders throughout the wing, but for now, read on...

Team.

I recently attended the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) Bystander Intervention Training (BIT). It was taught by one of our own, Tech. Sgt. Jim Kassahn. It was an outstanding course and brings to the forefront our responsibilities as USAF and 153rd Airlift Wing wingmen. Research by sociologists and psychologists show that bystander intervention is one of the best ways to prevent sexual violence, but more so, to take care of each other. This course is required by all members of the USAF and must be completed by all by June 30, 2012.

You have provided your country with the highest quality of service resulting in superior performances in the many varied missions and support missions within the 153rd Airlift Wing. A high level of professionalism, in the work environment and outside the work environment, is paramount for mission success but also for maintenance of good order and discipline in the unit. This is the fiber of our profession.

All members of the unit need to be assured that they have a safe and non-threatening work environment. Sexual harassment of unit members causes a hostile work environment and will not be tolerated in the 153rd Airlift Wing. Members at all levels have the responsibility to prevent and report any actions associated with sexual harassment. The Wyoming Military Department and the 153rd Airlift Wing have a strict policy for the prevention of sexual harassment and this policy will be strictly enforced by all members.

- 1. Sexual harassment is defined as:
- a. A form of discrimination that involves unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical contact of a sexual nature when:
- (1) submission to or rejection of such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of a person's career, pay or job; or
- (2) submission to or rejection of such conduct by a person is used as a basis for career or employment decisions affecting that person; or
- (3) such conduct interferes with an individual's performance or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment.

b. Any person in a supervisory or command position who uses or condones implicit sexual behavior to control, influence, or affect the career, pay, or job of a military member or civilian employee is


Who knew butter could fly?

engaging in sexual harassment.

- c. Similarly, any military member or civilian employee who makes deliberate or repeated unwelcome verbal comments, gestures, or physical contact of a sexual nature is also engaging in sexual harassment.
- 2. All Wyoming Military Department members and employees are entitled to a work environment free from sexual harassment. Sexual harassment tears away at the fabric of our organization and will not be tolerated. In order to ensure compliance with this policy, appropriate authority will:
- a. make appropriate inquiry into any allegation of sexual harassment.

b. take particular care to treat all personnel consistently and fairly, regardless of gender.

- c. ensure that sexual joking and teasing is not allowed to take place, and if it happens, to cause it to cease immediately.
- 3. Each complaint will be judged on its facts and any person found to have engaged in sexual harassment will be subject to discipline which may include demotion, suspension, or discharge.
- 4. For reasons such as differences in values and

background, some individuals may find it difficult to recognize that their own behavior is sexual harassment. It is important for each individual to be aware and to understand that unwelcome conduct may be construed as sexual harassment. Therefore, all Wyoming Military Department members and employees will undergo training in the prevention of sexual harassment as prescribed by regulations or policies. This is clearly a leadership issue. Sexual harassment is a form of misconduct that requires the personal awareness of every member in the chain of command. Left unchecked, it is a serious detractor from morale, productivity, unit readiness, and mission accomplishment which we cannot afford nor tolerate.

Any member experiencing sexual harassment in the work environment or outside the work environment is advised to report the incident thru their chain of command and/or the 1st Sgt.. If you feel the issue is not being resolved through your supervisor chain, then you can come directly to your commander. Sexual harassment will not be tolerated in the 153rd Airlift Wing.

eventeen officers from the Wyoming Army and Air National Guard descended upon Milwaukee, Wis. on Aug. 26 to attend the 133rd National Guard Association of the United States (NGAUS) General Conference. The conference is a three-day event packed with keynote speakers, entertainment, special events and access to one of the largest defense industry trade shows featuring more than 300 exhibitors. The vigorous schedule of events held the attention of all attendees who participated in many of the social events including the Freedom Motorcycle Ride, Company Grade Officer Mixer, 5k Fun Run, Governor's Reception, at the Harley Davidson Museum, Hospitality Night and the culminating event, the States' Dinner featuring humorist Jeanne Robertson.

BRAC, strategic reserve, mission sustainment, alternative missions, budget constraints...just a few of the words heard as influential and dynamic speakers took the stage during the business and professional development sessions. They continually reiterated the importance of the National Guard and reinforced the conference theme, "The National Guard, Right for America." Speakers included the Honorable Scott Walker, governor of Wisconsin, Admiral James A. Winnefeld, Jr., vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Craig R. McKinley, chief of the National Guard Bureau,

and many more spectacular leaders. One of the biggest issues discussed was the need for the National Guard to have a formal seat on the Joint Chiefs of Staff. What does that mean? It was best put by McKinley in his address to the Company Grade Officers, "If you're not at the table at the Pentagon, you're on the menu." This effort is part of the National Guard Empowerment and State-National Defense Integration Act of 2011, which is currently before the U.S. Senate.

The conference provided attendees the opportunity to participate in one-on-one discussions with local and national senior leaders. With attendance at more than 2,000, it also provided an opportunity to build strong networks and learn about what NGAUS is doing at a national level to help National Guard members and their families.

During the ceremonies, awards were given for outstanding performance. Wyoming and specifically the 187th Airlift Squadron was honored with the Distinguished Flying Unit Plaque and the Curtis N. "Rusty" Metcalf Trophy. Capt.

Eric M. Green, commander of the 153rd Communications Flight, was awarded the Theodore Roosevelt Leadership Award for Company Grade Officers. These awards contribute to our positive reputation and reinforce our status as the world's best unit.
