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

Wyoming troops saddle up for service

waft of air at Cheyenne's Frontier Park brings the faint smell of manure, which is freshly pounded by the boots (cowboy, not combat) of soldiers and airmen of the Wyoming National Guard.

Their uniforms show the wear of the day and the 90-plus-degree temperatures, but remain professional, shirts tucked in with belt buckles still sparkling.

For more than a week, and many more days throughout the past year, these Guardsmen worked without pay. Their work is volunteer only, a service to their community and a chance to maintain their ties to the state's cowboy heritage.

They are volunteers with Cheyenne Frontier Days, billed as the world's largest outdoor rodeo. In turn, the event produces a significant portion of the annual revenue needed for Chevenne and its communities.

"We do this for the community, just like the Guard is there for the governor to help our communities," said Col. Pat Moffett, a rodeo volunteer and commander of the Wyoming Air National Guard's 153rd Maintenance Group.

No statistics were available regarding how many Wyoming Guardsmen volunteer with the 10-day rodeo. However, Guardsmen serve in a variety of ways, including marching in one or more of the four parades, serving pancakes during one of the three free breakfasts,

even working as medical technicians during the rodeo.

Some volunteer directly with one of the 10 official committees, ranging from contract acts to contestants to public relations. Some, like those serving breakfast, volunteer with other clubs and organizations that take part in the festivities.

The Guardsmen come from a variety of ranks and disciplines. There are traditional Guardsmen, who maintain other careers or go to school during the work week. Others are employed fulltime by the Wyoming National Guard.

As volunteers, military rank in the committees does not carry weight. Colonels flip flapjacks alongside sergeants and a private may be the most senior volunteer in the group. Some only recently volunteered; others have ties to the rodeo since childhood.

Whether on the arena fence or behind the chutes, Cowboy Medics volunteering from the Wyoming Air National Guard are ready to assist Frontier Days contestants at a moment's notice.

Cowboy Medics are a blend of local emergency medical technicians, doctors, nurses and military personnel who volunteer to assess rodeo injuries and other health related issues of those attending events at Frontier Park.

Wyoming Air National Guard's 153rd Civil Engineer Squadron recently returned from deployment training at the NATO School in Oberammergau, where they put their engineering skills to work.

Various projects were completed by members of the 153 CES including: laying asphalt and lumber for a new deck at the NATO School recreation center, mixing and pouring concrete for multiple projects, knocking down a chimney of an old steam plant and re-roofing the area, and building a car port at the recreation center.

The hands-on training offered the 153 CES an opportunity to put their skills to use in a real-world environment while providing the NATO School with needed construction.

"This training was a win-win situation for both us and

NATO," said Lt. Col. Stan White, 153 CES commander. "We received real-world training and the NATO School received free labor."

The skill sets Airmen brought to bear were a cross-section of the civil engineering career field including: structures and power production specialists; plumbers; heavy equipment operators; heating, ventilation, air-conditioning and refrigeration craftsman and fire-fighters.

The NATO project did not afford all members a chance to practice their particular skill set, but everyone involved was able to jump in and learn a new skill or brush up on old ones.

"Everyone had to overlap and chip in," said White. "Everyone had their turn at the shovel."

Even when things didn't go as planned, with weather

or materials, the members of the 153 CES remained flexible and accomplished the job.

"I have to brag on these guys a little," said Senior Master Sgt. Carl Hocking, operations superintendent. "They always make good use of the opportunities they are given and that's one of the strongest points of the unit."

With the unit's work completed and new skills acquired, the trip was an overall successful training mission, command said.

"The guys were able to receive excellent hands-on training and were able to see the direct results," said Hocking.

The Wyoming Air National Guard has taken significant measures to replace dated lighting fixtures with energy efficiency products in several structures at its Cheyenne, Wyo., facilities. Cheyenne Light, Fuel & Power presented rebates to the WyANG, Aug. 3, for their energy efficiency, totaling more than \$84,000.

The primary goal for the WyANG was to reduce energy consumption, said Col. Steve Rader, 153 AW commander. The projects resulted in meeting qualifications for rebate incentives being offered through the Cheyenne Light, Fuel &

Power Energy Efficiency Solutions Program.

"We're known for taking some chances," Rader said, "so we're happy to lead this initiative to save energy,"

The receipt of a rebate incentive, from a local utility, is likely the first of

many to come for the 153 AW.

"We're real proud of this energy saving effort," said Master Sgt. Carl Hocking, facility manager.

Hocking said the rebated funds will be reinvested into additional energy efficiency measures, with a number of projects already outlined by the National Guard Regional Energy manager Mel Klaus.

When asked if the WvANG would recommend other community businesses to learn more about Chevenne Light's Energy Efficiency Solutions Program, Lt. Col. Stanley White, 153rd Civil Engineer Squadron commander said, "It's easy to recommend a win-win situation to others. We like to make decisions based on data. 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Wyoming Firefighters Certified Urban Search and Rescue

The Wyoming Air National Guard sent eight firefighters for the first part of a certification process in urban search and rescue, January 2012, in Ark.

The Air National Guard has begun the new initiative to certify members in urban search and rescue. Over the past year guardsmen have been training in Arkansas and North Carolina in hopes of developing regional teams that are available to deploy to domestic emergencies, such as tornadoes and hurricanes.

Six of the eight WyANG firefighters have since completed the second part of their training that focused on trench rescue and structural collapse. They spent a total of four weeks training on highly technical skills including; making a trench safe for victim rescue, directing a crane, lifting and moving heavy objects and breaching through concrete to gain access to a victim. The firefighters are also now certified in a number of rescues including; rope, confined space, vehicle, machinery, trench and structural collapse.

The training instructors are highly-experienced professional rescue technicians from Spec Rescue International. Many of the instructors responded to the 9/11 attacks and Hurricane Katrina and also belong to regional FEMA teams.

The ANG will be purchasing cache trailers and rescue equipment which will be distributed among the teams so they may be deployed when an emergency arises.

For Lt. Col. Julie Resheske, 187th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron flight nurse, the experience started nearly 10 years ago, while stationed at F.E. Warren Air Force Base, on active duty. In 2008, she transferred to the Wyoming Air National Guard.

"It's just so different than your day-to-day job," said Resheske. "You have no idea what injury you might be helping with. There is variety and extremes."

Resheske, a pediatric nurse practitioner, finds satisfaction with the unique work at a cowboy event.

"The contestants are great to work with and are very appreciative of what we are doing for them," she said. "We do what we can to keep in them in their job. They want to get patched up and compete again tomorrow."

Staff Sgt. Heidi Valdez, 153rd Medical Group health technician with the Wyoming Air National Guard, is volunteering at Frontier Days for the first time.

"The clinic let us know we could volunteer so I signed up," Valdez said.

Valdez also helped with the Challenge Rodeo where special-needs children are paired with Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association contestants in a modified rodeo performance.

"Working with the kids is fun too," said Valdez. "It's great to get a smile on their face and make their day."

For Valdez, this is just the beginning.
