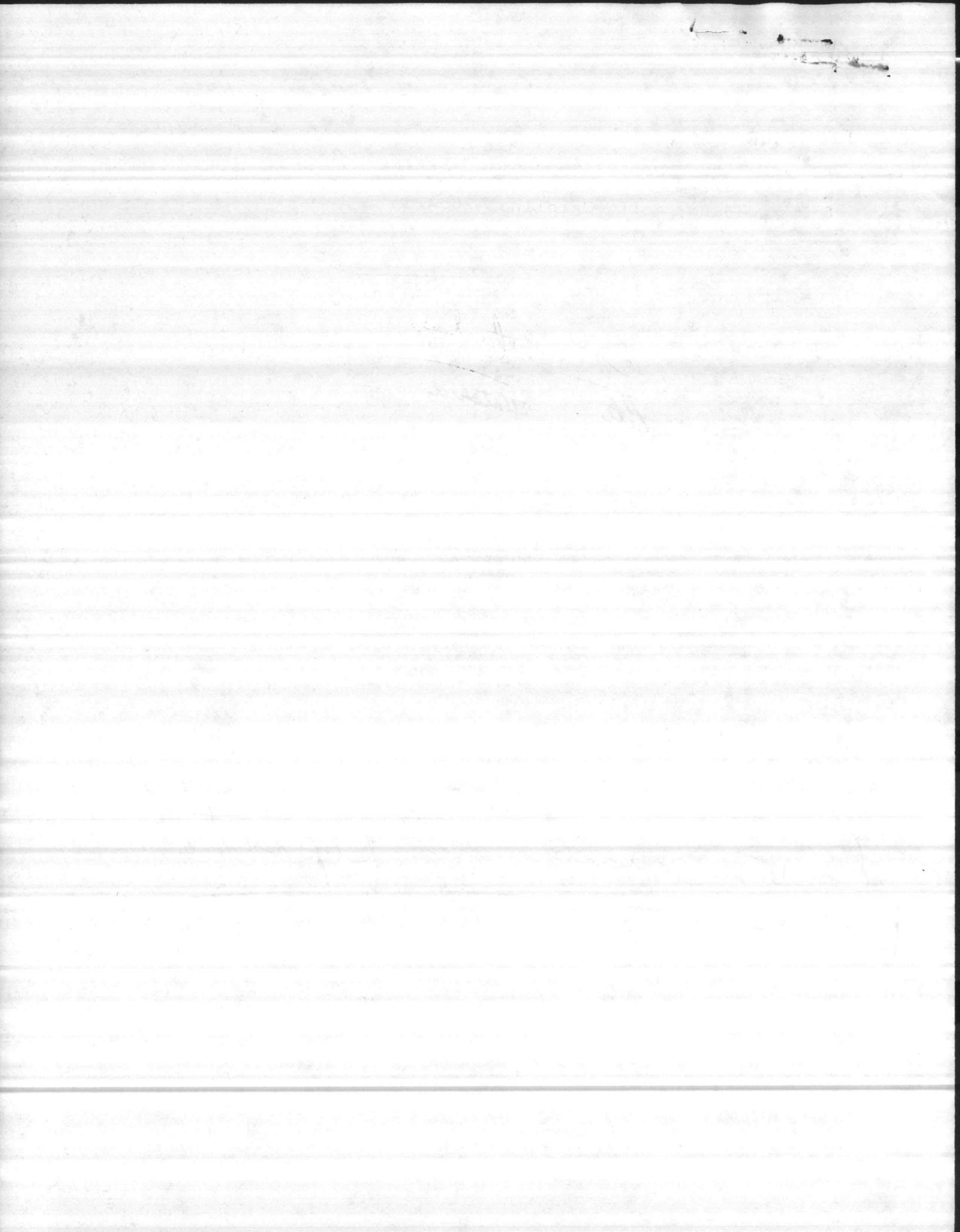

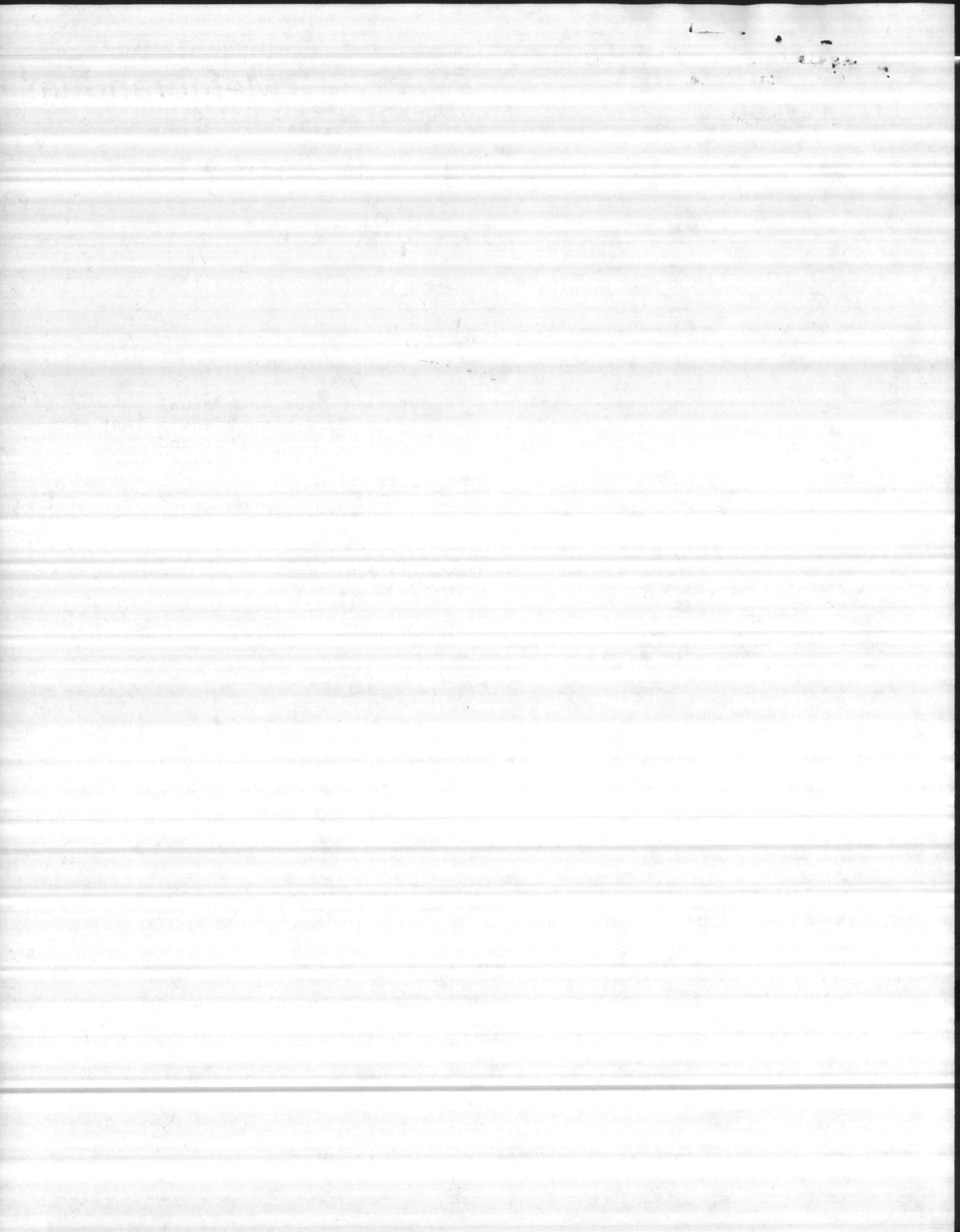

July-December 1985

Sixty-four construction contracts worth over 17 million dollars were awarded for Camp Lejeune. Construction was completed on another 67 contracts totaling almost 21 million dollars. Significant projects were two railroad repair projects costing almost 12 million dollars; a half-million dollar project to widen Holcomb Boulevard; repairing Riseley Pier (\$418,880); water and sewer improvements in the Midway Park housing area (\$474,103); and resurfacing the streets in the Tarawa Terrace and Paradise Point housing areas (\$1,316,000).

July-December 1985

The Facilities Department researched and reviewed 85 proposals under the Model Installation Program that concerned facilities matters.

July-December 1985

A monthly testing program for all sources of drinking water found no traces of organic contaminants.

1 July 1985

Construction to expand the Holcomb Boulevard Water Treatment Plant from two million gallons daily to five million gallons daily began. Upon completion, the Tarawa Terrace and Camp Johnson Water Treatment Plants will be abolished.

28 July 1985

Commanding General, Second Marine Amphibious Force (II MAF) message routing distribution was upgraded to that of a Guard Command.

August 1985

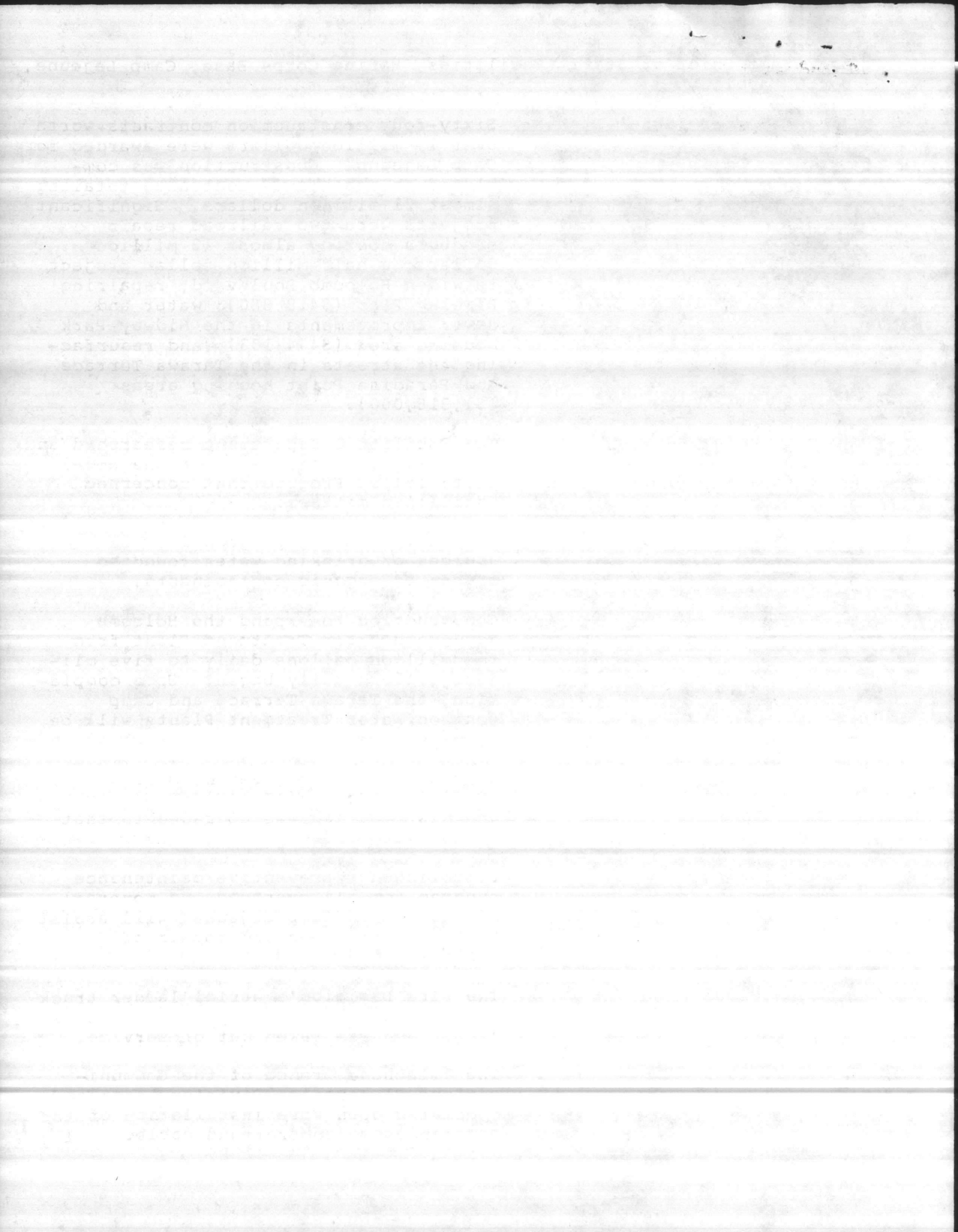
Established a preventive maintenance program for all overhead and monorail hoists aboard Camp Lejeune; will assist units in detection and repair of defects.

5 August 1985

The Fire Division's aerial ladder truck was determined to be beyond economical repair and was taken out of service.

8 August 1985

The Telephone Branch of the Communications-Electronics Division began and completed open wire installation of the "G" ranges to underground cable.



11 August 1985

The Marine Telecommunications Center was upgraded to a Guard Command.

4-14 September 1985

Fire Chief Elmer J. Padgett and two operators visited the Naval Base, North Island, San Diego, California to attend and participate in the acceptance/operational testing of a 5000 gallons-per-minute Lightweight Fire Fighting Module.

6 September 1985

Marine Corps Base initiated a research study for the endangered Red-Cockaded Woodpecker which inhabits base woodlands. The Department of Zoology, North Carolina State University, Raleigh, North Carolina was awarded the contract.

10-11 September 1985

Retired Colonel Joe McCarthy, an Iwo Jima Medal of Honor winner, was billeted in the Senior Officers' Guest House.

12 September 1985

Rear Admiral R. DeLima, Venezuelan Commandant, was billeted in the Senior Officers' Guest House.

18 September 1985

Signed an agreement with Sea Grant College program of North Carolina State University to develop an Onslow Beach Coastal Management study of beach erosion and protective measures.

19 September 1985

Gasoline leak from underground tank at Tarawa Terrace Base Exchange Service Station led to monitoring and recovery study contract award in November 1985.

1 October 1985

The Communications-Electronics Division, in coordination with the Dictaphone Corporation, installed a tape recording monitor at Observation Post Two (OP-2) for Range Control. This system records conversations on the UHF and the VHF radios and the direct telephone line to the Cherry Point Control Tower.

1 October 1985

Major renovation of the Camp Johnson Central Heating Plant was completed. Renovation included complete replacement of boilers and associated equipment.

1 October - 1 December 1985

Building HP-53 was completely refurbished for use as Marine Corps Base Staff Noncommissioned Officer's quarters.

7-13 October 1985

Fire Prevention Week was observed aboard Marine Corps Base.

November 1985

Assistant Chief of Staff, Facilities personnel participated in Exercise Port Call 1985, a constructive mobilization exercise.

November 1985

A Special Training Analysis for Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune was presented in booklet and brief form by the firm of Harland Bartholomew and Associates, Incorporated. The study concluded that more land was required to carry out the Base's training requirements.

2 December 1985

Initiated base-wide study of hazardous material/waste and used oil handling and disposal to culminate with management plan in June 1986.

3 December 1985

The Family Housing Division received the hardware for its new computer system, the Local Area Network. Software is being developed.

9 December 1985

Installed microcomputer system with on-line connection to the Shore Facilities Planning systems at Port Hueneme.

11 December 1985

Mr. James F. Goodrich, Under Secretary of Defense, was billeted in the Senior Officers' Guest House.



## Command Chronology 1986

21-23 January National Interagency Incident Management System (NIIMS) training was held in Kinston, N.C. by the N.C. Forest Service. The training dealt with the incident command system for forest fire suppression and was attended by the Base Forester

12 FEBRUARY The N.C. Forest Service Cooperators meeting was held at Kinston, N.C. The meeting was attended by representatives of the Base Fire Department, Base Forestry and the Heavy Equipment Section of Base Maintenance.

6-20 May Base personnel assisted the N.C. Forest Service in combating a 73,000-acre forest fire in Pender and Onslow Counties. Civilian and military personnel ~~along with~~ <sup>and</sup> equipment were made available under a cooperative agreement between the Commanding General, MCBCL and the North Carolina Forest Service.

4-10 October NREAD, Director and Base Forester attended the Society of American Foresters Convention and the DOD and Navy Foresters Conference in Birmingham Alabama.
