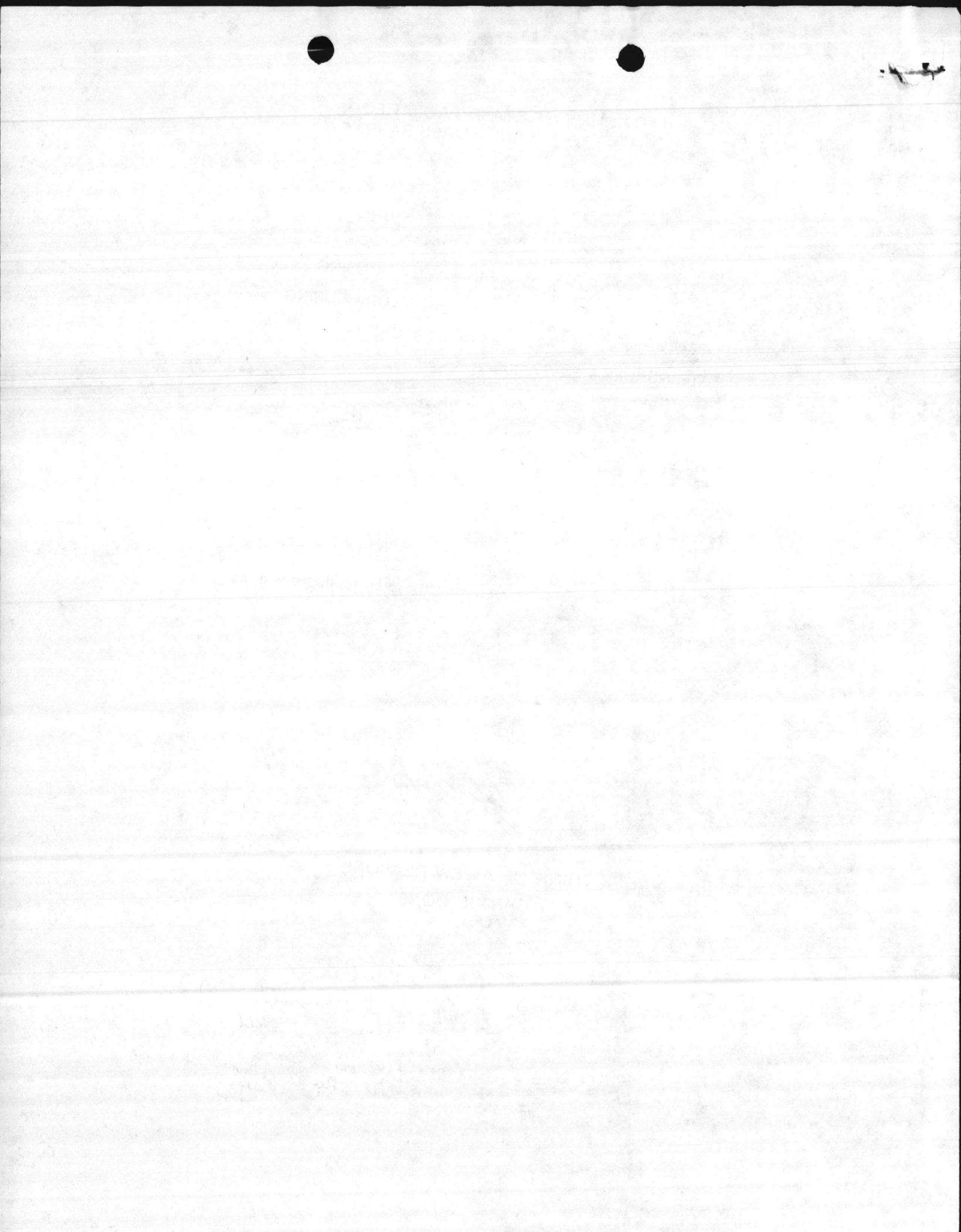




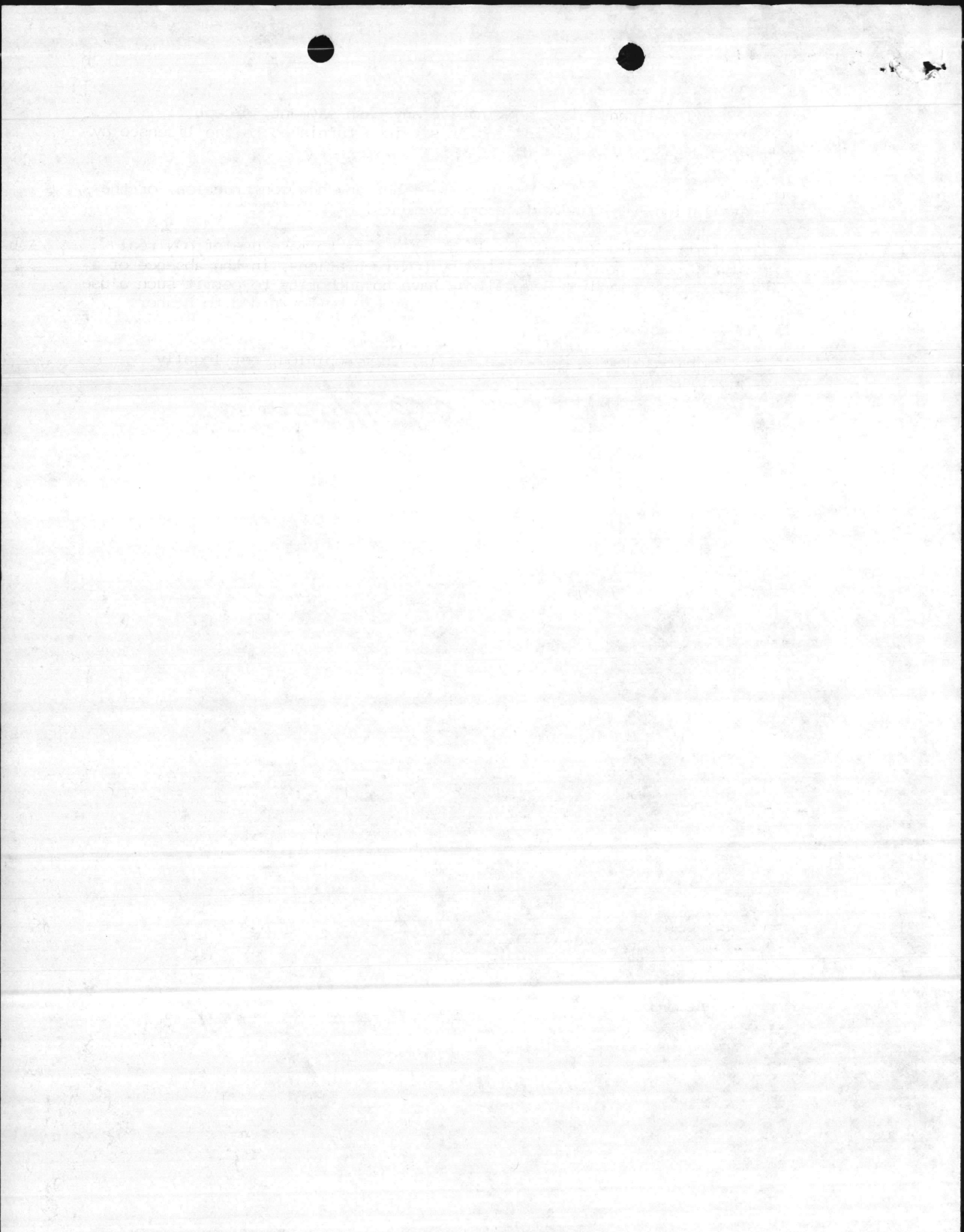
d. The license does not involve any cash payment, except reimbursement for utilities and/or services furnished to the licensee by the Government.

e. The license does not permit either any new construction, or the installation, of nonseverable improvements.

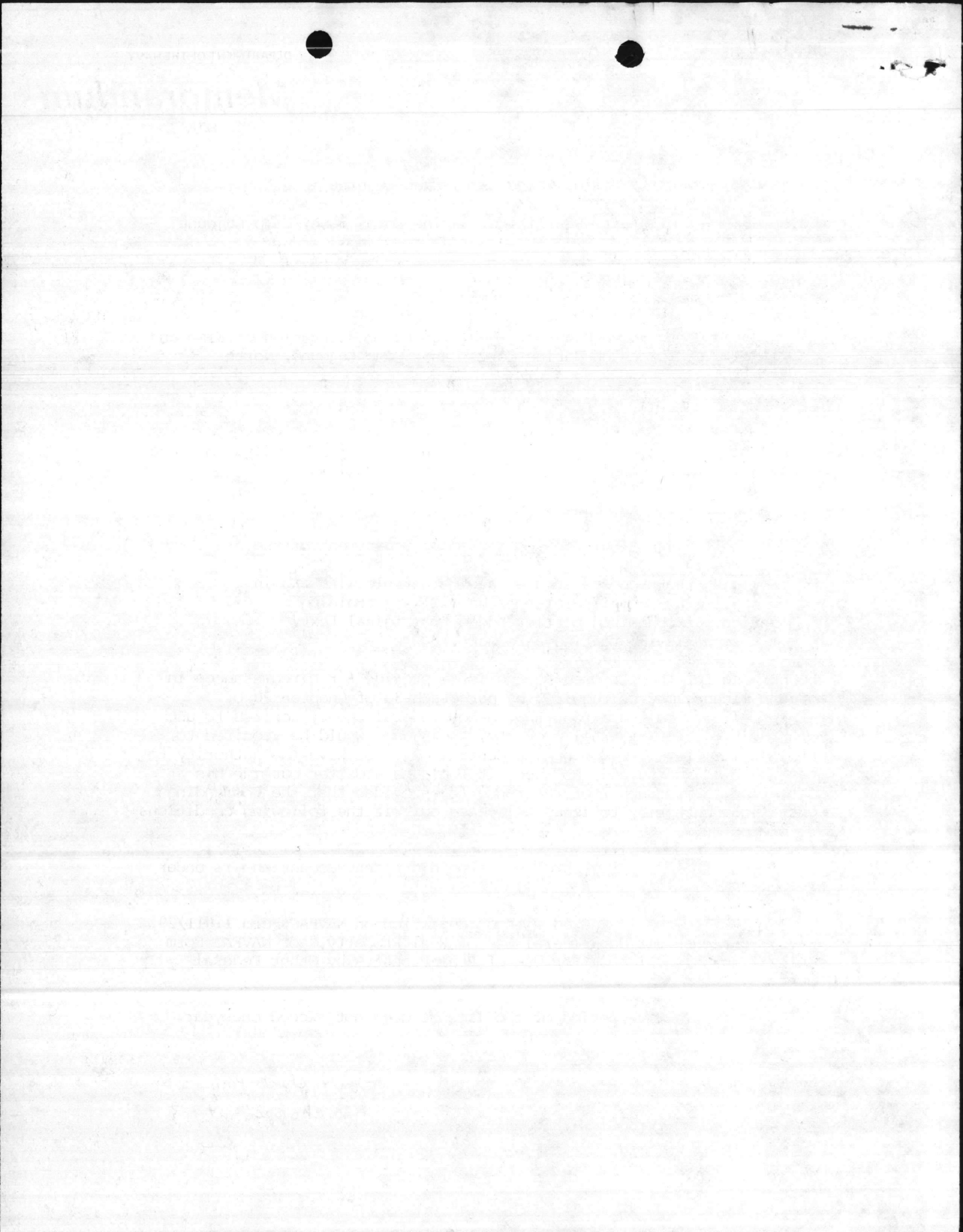

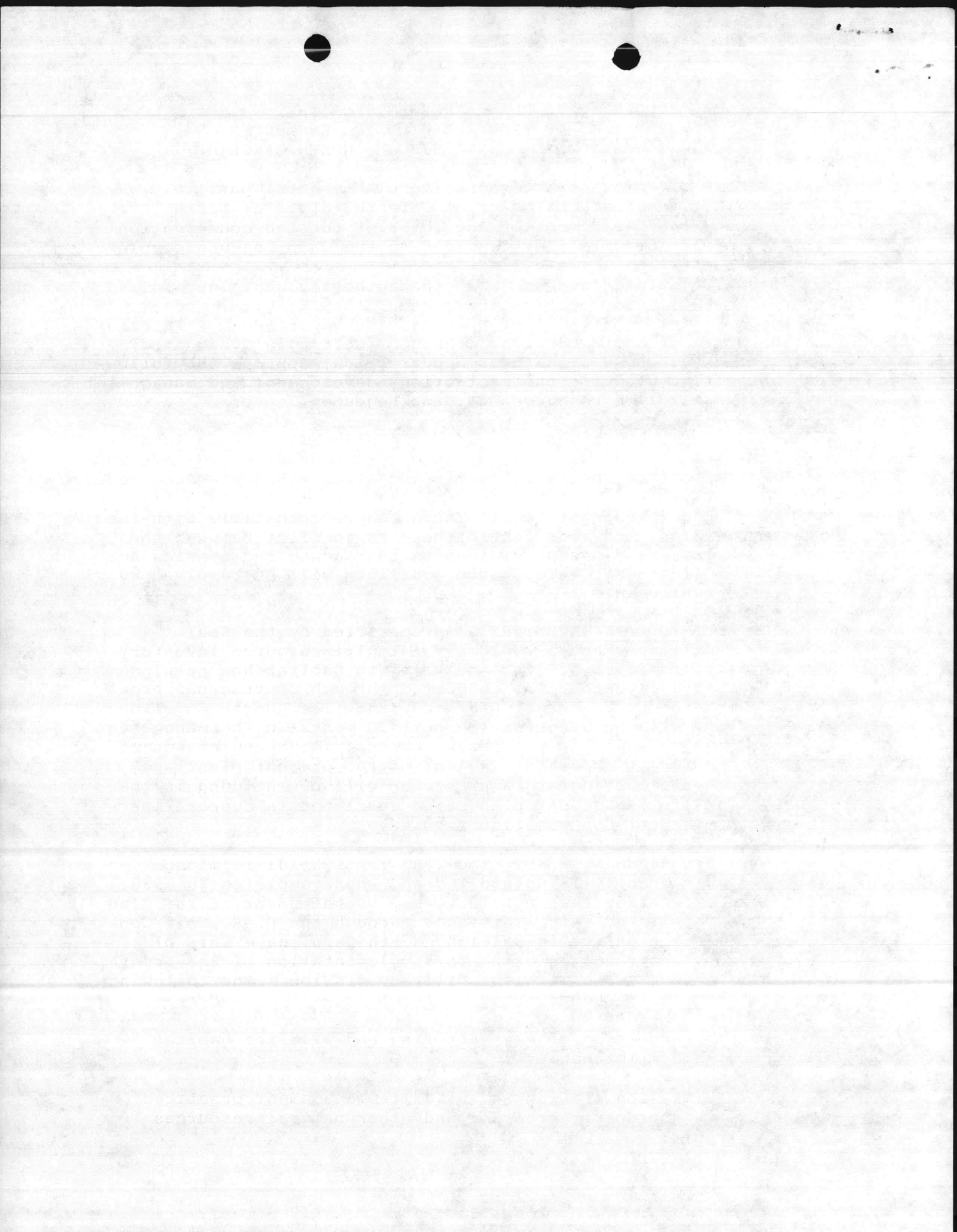






COOPERATIVE PLAN AGREEMENT FOR THE  
CONSERVATION OF FISH AND WILDLIFE RESOURCES  
ON MARINE CORPS BASE, CAMP LEJEUNE, NORTH CAROLINA

1. PURPOSE. To provide a cooperative plan and tri-partite agreement between the Department of Defense, State of North Carolina and the Department of the Interior for the conservation and development of wildlife resources on the Camp Lejeune complex.
2. AUTHORITY. In accordance with the authority contained in Title 10, U. S. Code, Section 2671, and Title 16, U. S. Code, Section 670, the Department of Defense, the Department of Interior and the State of North Carolina, through their duly designated representatives whose signatures appear below, approve the following cooperative plan for the protection, development and management of fish and wildlife resources at Camp Lejeune.
3. LIMITATIONS. This agreement covers Marine Corps Base lands for the management of fish, game, nongame, endangered and threatened species only. The military mission at Camp Lejeune supersedes fish and wildlife management and associated recreational activities; and, such activities must in all instances be compatible with the military mission. However, where there is conflict between the military mission and the provisions of the Endangered Species Act or other applicable statutes, such conflicts will be resolved by statutory requirements.
4. FISH AND WILDLIFE INVENTORY. As specified by the Real Property Facilities Manual, Volume V, a multi-resource inventory of vegetative profiles of fish and wildlife habitat has been completed. The inventory was conducted through contractual procedures with the U. S. Forest Service, Asheville, North Carolina. The inventory will be used for the next 10 years in the management of vegetative communities for producing sustained populations of wildlife and forest products. A list of the present plant and animal species occurring at Camp Lejeune will be included in the updated wildlife management plan being completed in cooperation with the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.
5. WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT PLAN. The long range wildlife management plan is currently being updated and when completed in 1986, will be in effect for the next 10 years. Development of the plan is being accomplished with assistance through the U. S. Soil Conservation Service Office in Raleigh, North Carolina. This plan will provide long range guidance for implementation of the program that will be compatible with the military mission. The following will be specifically addressed:
  - a. Long range plan of work for fish and wildlife habitat development and maintenance.
  - b. Intergration of fish and wildlife management practices with forestry, outdoor recreation and other natural resources management work.





Commission cannot accommodate the requested assistance. Subject to availability of funds and personnel, visits to Camp Lejeune will be made by personnel as requested or as necessary to maintain a sound fishery management program. Visiting personnel may provide advice and assistance in all phases of the program to include; inventory, renovation, stocking, weed control, and other manipulation of aquatic habitat as required. It is understood, however, that assistance provided by the Fish and Wildlife Service will be on a cost-reimbursement basis, with the exception that fish for stocking installation waters may be supplied without cost, subject to availability.

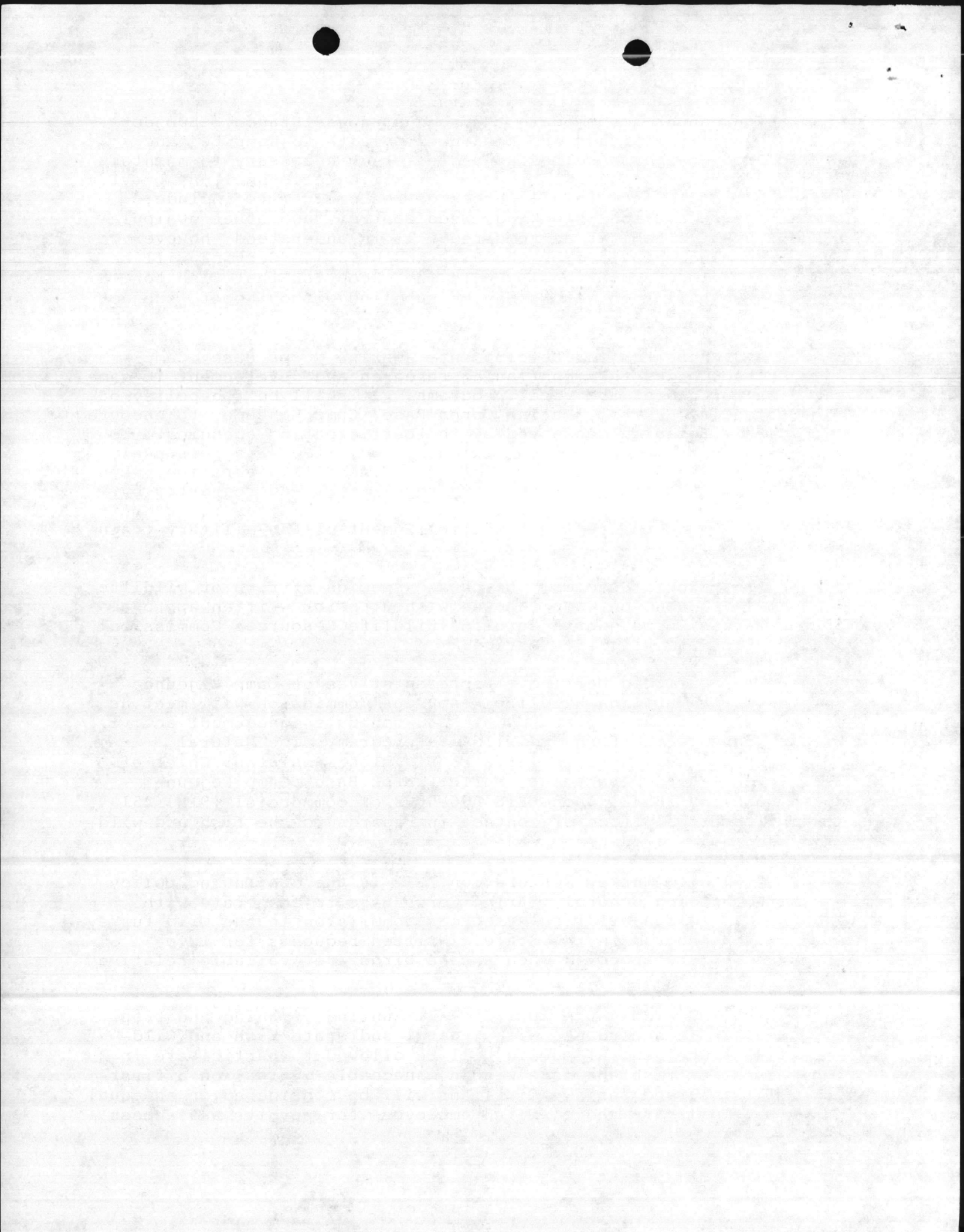
(3) Research and Development. Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune recognizes that continuing research and development in game and fish management are vital programs. It shall be the policy of the Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, to encourage and support research conducted by the participating agencies. To this end, suitable land areas, animals, facilities and personnel may be made available at the Commanding General's discretion, when permitted by Department of the Navy regulations and requested by participating agencies, providing the proposed studies are compatible with and in no way limit accomplishment of the military training mission.

(4) Exotic Species. No exotic species of fish or wildlife will be introduced on Camp Lejeune without prior written approval of the Marine Corps, North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the Fish and Wildlife Service.

(5) Periodic Meeting. Representatives of Camp Lejeune and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission will meet as necessary to discuss, plan, update and schedule management activities to enhance the fish and wildlife program. The Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Division, Assistant Chief of Staff, Facilities Department, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina 28542, phone FTS 676-5003 or commercial (919) 451-2195 will be the office of contact in regards to the fish and wildlife program.

(6) Wild Turkey Restoration. It is the continuing policy of the Commanding General, Marine Corps Base to cooperate with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission in the wild turkey restoration program in the State. Written requests for live-trapping will be approved when excess birds are available relative to the population.

7. HARVESTING FISH AND WILDLIFE. All hunting, fishing and trapping will be in accordance with federal and state fish and wildlife laws. The general public will be allowed to participate in the harvest of fish and game within manageable quotas, on a first-come, first-served basis. Civilians will be considered on an equal basis with military and civilian employees for permits and access

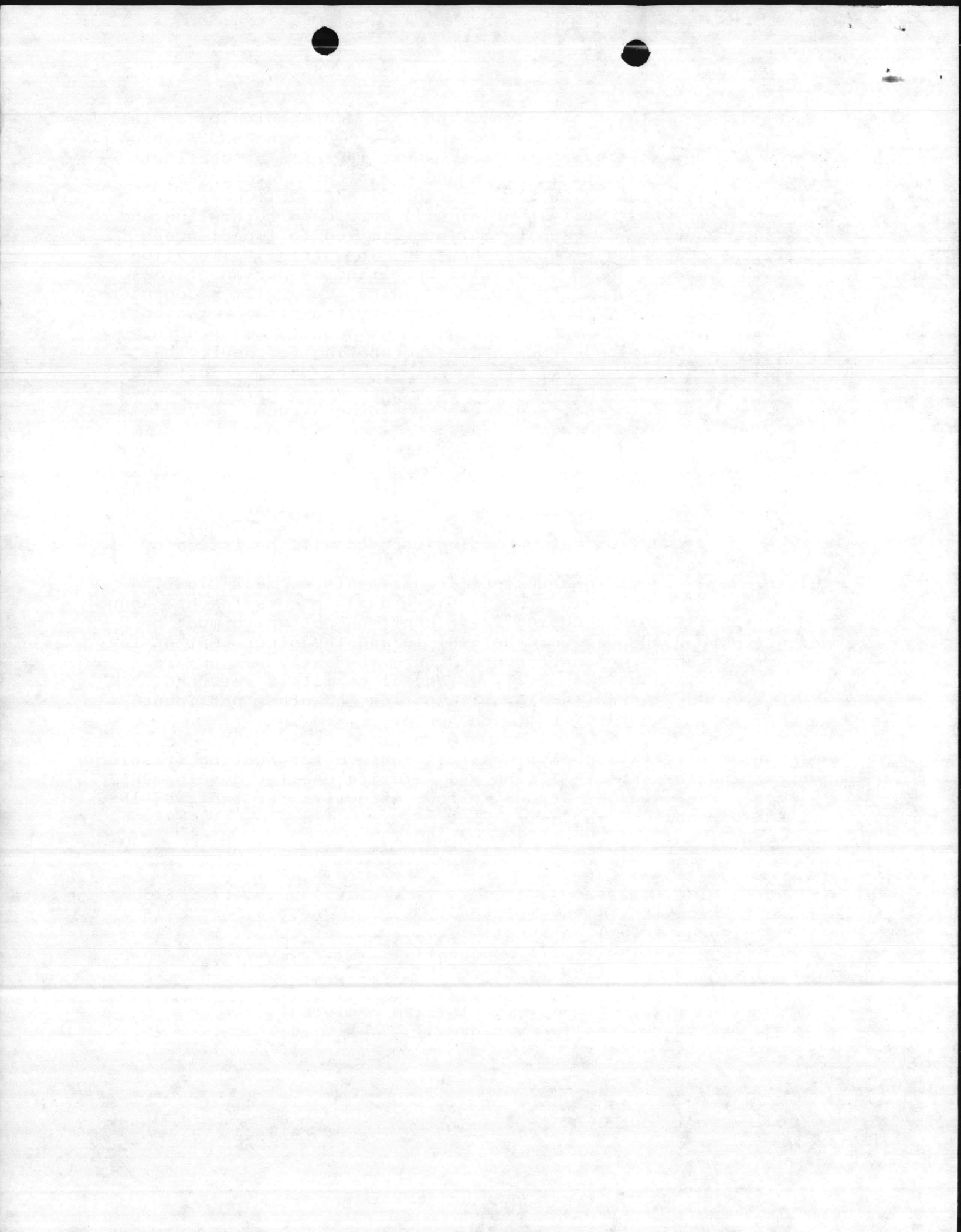


to hunting and fishing areas when they are accompanied by a civilian or military host for reasons of safety. Hunting and fishing will be allowed only on those areas where there is no conflict with military training activities and no unreasonable safety hazard to participants, military personnel and dependents, or civilian employees. Certain areas will be closed to hunting and fishing permanently, including but not limited to impact areas containing unexploded ordnance, housing, industrial, ammunition and storage areas. Such areas will be marked as permanently closed on the installation hunting maps. Training areas will be open on a daily basis when not scheduled for military training operations. All hunters must check in and check out on a daily basis when still or stalk hunting. When organized hunting for deer, the huntsmasters serves as host for hunters in the party. Installation hunting maps indicating open or closed areas will be posted and updated daily, or as required by the Game Warden.

8. PERMITS. An annual or daily permit will be required for all hunting, trapping and fishing activities on the installation except for fishing in navigable waters. All persons hunting, trapping or fishing on Marine Corps lands must also meet applicable licensing requirements of State laws and of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, as amended. Annual or daily hunting permits will be issued by the Base Game Warden at Building PT-4. Permit holders must also meet the daily check-in/check-out requirements of self clearing daily passes. Each hunter receives two daily passes for his annual or daily permit when checking in to hunt, one of which must be placed on the dash-board of the vehicle and the other kept on the individual. When the hunter checks out, the daily passes are returned and the hunter's daily or annual permit is returned. Game harvested, recreational participation and other pertinent information is recorded from each hunter.

9. FEES. There will be nominal fees charged for hunting, fishing and trapping in support of fish and wildlife habitat development projects. Fees charged are as follows effective for the 1987-1988 hunting seasons:

10. OFF-ROAD RECREATIONAL VEHICLES (ORRV'S). There will be no restrictions on the use of off-road vehicles for hunting, fishing and trapping with the following exception:

a. Saltwater fishermen may use ORRV's on the beach strand from the waters edge to the seaward side of the sand dunes from Riseley Pier to New River Inlet except during sea turtle nesting season. Onslow Beach is closed to ORRV travel from sunset to sunrise for protection of sea turtles from June - October. The main access road from the North Tower to the South Tower is open for use by fishermen during the nesting season and throughout the year. Riseley Pier and South Tower are the only two egress routes used to gain access to the beach strand. ORRV's are not permitted at any time to be on any portion of Onslow Beach north of Riseley Pier.

11. ADOPTION. This agreement will become effective upon the date subscribed by the last signature and shall continue in full force for a period of five years or until terminated by written notice to the other parties by any of the parties signing this agreement. This agreement may be amended or revised by agreement between the parties hereto. Action to amend or revise may originate with any one of the participating agencies.

Problem:

References (a) and (b) require Marine Corps Base to maintain a cooperative plan agreement with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service for technical assistance in support of fish and wildlife resources. The cooperative plan must also include provisions for controlled public access for such recreational uses as hunting, fishing and trapping.

Background/Discussion:

The first cooperative plan agreement by the three parties was implemented in 1962. The subject agreement has been previously updated five times at the request of at least one of the three parties. Permit fees charged to both military and civilian personnel are proposed to be increased in this updated agreement. The Deputy Director, Environmental Policy, Department of Defense, has recommended the hunters, fishermen and trappers participating in recreational use of wildlife resources pay a proportionate share for access to military lands.

Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the cooperative plan agreement be signed and forwarded to the other two parties.

The participating agencies will provide technical assistance on the fishery management program, with the understanding that the Fish and Wildlife Service may provide assistance only if the North Carolina Wildlife Resource Commission cannot accommodate the requested assistance. Subject to availability of funds and personnel, visits to Camp Lejeune

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will be made by personnel as requested or as necessary to maintain a sound fishery management program. Visiting personnel may provide advice and assistance in all phases of the program to include; inventory, renovation, stocking, weed control, and other manipulation of aquatic habitat as required. It is understood, however, that assistance provided by the Fish and Wildlife Service will be on a cost-reimbursement basis, with the exception that fish for stocking installation waters may be supplied without cost, subject to availability.

(3) Research and Development. Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune recognizes that continuing research and development in game and fish management are vital programs. It shall be the policy of the Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, to encourage and support research conducted by the participating agencies. To this end, suitable land areas, animals, facilities and personnel may be made available at the Commanding General's discretion, when requested by participating agencies, providing the proposed studies are compatible with and in no way limit accomplishment of the military training mission.

(4) Exotic Species. No exotic species of fish or wildlife will be introduced on Camp Lejeune without prior written approval of the Marine Corps, North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the Fish and Wildlife Service.

(5) Periodic Meetings. Representatives of Camp Lejeune and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission will meet as necessary to discuss, plan, update and schedule management activities to enhance the fish and wildlife program. The Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Division, Assistant Chief of Staff, Facilities <sup>Division</sup> Section, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina 28542, phone FTS 676-5003 or commercial (919) 451-2195 will be the office of contact in regards to the fish and wildlife program.

(6) Wild Turkey Restoration. It is the continuing policy of the Commanding General, Marine Corps Base to cooperate with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission in the wild turkey restoration program in the State. Written requests for live-trapping will be approved when excess birds are available relative to the population.

7. HARVESTING FISH AND WILDLIFE. All hunting, fishing and trapping will be in accordance with federal and state fish and wildlife laws. The general public will be allowed to participate in the harvest of fish and game within manageable quotas, on a first-come, first-served basis. Civilians will be considered on an equal basis with military and civilian employees for permits and access to hunting and fishing areas when they are accompanied by a civilian or military host for reasons of safety. Hunting and fishing will be allowed only on those areas where there is no conflict with military training activities and no unreasonable safety hazard to participants, military personnel and dependents, or civilian employees. Certain areas will be closed to hunting

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and fishing permanently, including but not limited to impact areas containing unexploded ordnance, housing, industrial, ammunition and storage areas. Such areas will be marked as permanently closed on the installation hunting maps. Training areas will be open on a daily basis when not scheduled for military training operations. All hunters must check in and check out on a daily basis when still or stalk hunting. When organized hunting for deer, the huntsmaster serves as host for hunters in the party. Installation hunting maps indicating open or closed areas will be posted and updated daily, or as required by the Game Warden.

8. PERMITS. An annual or daily permit will be required for all hunting, trapping and fishing activities on the installation except for fishing in navigable waters. All persons hunting, trapping or fishing on Marine Corps lands must also meet applicable licensing requirements of State laws and of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, as amended. Annual or daily hunting permits will be issued by the Base Game Warden at Building PT-4. Permit holders must also meet the daily check-in/check-out requirements of self clearing daily passes. Each hunter receives two daily passes for his annual or daily permit when checking in to hunt, one of which must be placed on the dash-board of the vehicle and the other kept on the individual. When the hunter checks out, the daily passes are returned and the hunter's daily or annual permit is returned. Game harvested, recreational participation and other pertinent information is recorded from each hunter.

9. FEES. There will be nominal fees charged for hunting, fishing and trapping in support of fish and wildlife habitat development projects. Fees charged are as follows effective for the 1987-1988 hunting seasons:

10. OFF-ROAD RECREATIONAL VEHICLES (ORRVs). There will be no restrictions on the use of off-road vehicles for hunting, fishing and trapping, with the following exception:

a. Saltwater fishermen may use ORRVs on the beach strand from the waters edge to the seaward side of the sand dunes from Riseley Pier to New River Inlet except during sea turtle nesting season. Onslow Beach is closed to ORRV travel from sunset to sunrise for protection of sea turtles from June - October. The main access road from the North Tower to the South Tower is open for use by fishermen during the nesting season and throughout the year.





Riseley Pier and South Tower are the only two egress routes used to gain access to the beach strand. ORRVs are not permitted at any time to be on any portion of Onslow Beach north of Riseley Pier.

11. ADOPTION. This agreement will become effective upon the date subscribed by the last signature and shall continue in full force for a period of five years or until terminated by written notice to the other parties by any of the parties signing this agreement. This agreement may be amended or revised by agreement between the parties hereto. Action to amend or revise may originate with any one of the participating agencies.

Problem:

References (a) and (b) require Marine Corps Base to maintain a cooperative plan agreement with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service for technical assistance in support of fish and wildlife resources. The cooperative plan must also include provisions for controlled public access for such recreational uses as hunting, fishing and trapping.

Background/Discussion:

The first cooperative plan agreement by the three parties was implemented in 1962. The subject agreement has been previously updated five times at the request of at least one of the three parties. Permit fees charged to both military and civilian personnel are proposed to be increased in this updated agreement. The Deputy Director, Environmental Policy, Department of Defense, has recommended the hunters, fishermen and trappers participating in recreational use of wildlife resources pay a proportionate share for access to military lands.

Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the cooperative plan agreement be signed and forwarded to the other two parties.

COOPERATIVE PLAN  
CONSERVATION OF FISH AND WILDLIFE RESOURCES  
U. S. MARINE CORPS BASE, CAMP LEJEUNE, NORTH CAROLINA

I. Authority

A. In accordance with the authority contained in Public Law 85-337 (approved 28 February 1958), in Public Law 86-797 (approved 15 September 1960), and in Public Law 90-456, the Department of Defense, the Department of the Interior, and the State of North Carolina, through their duly designated representatives whose signatures appear below, approved the following cooperative plan for the protection, development, management, and recreational use of fish and wildlife resources on Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

B. Under the authority delegated by higher echelons of Command, the Commander, Marine Corps Base, hereinafter referred to as the Commanding General, is recognized as the official representative of the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

C. Under the authority vested, the Area Manager, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, hereinafter referred to as the Area Manager, is recognized as the official representative of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

D. Under the authority vested, the Executive Director, North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, hereinafter referred to as the Executive Director, is recognized as the official representative of the State of North Carolina.

E. By definition, action by and to the Marine Corps shall be understood to refer specifically to the U. S. Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

II. Forest-wide Wildlife Habitat Inventory

An inventory of fish and wildlife resources was completed in 1973 and included in the updated Management Plan for the Base. The inventory was accomplished through the cooperation of field personnel of the first representatives to this agreement. The inventory was planned to identify and describe habitat conditions of all present species regardless of the degree of public use.

III. Base Fish and Wildlife Management Plan

The ten-year plan for the management of fish and wildlife was published in 1975 and will be updated in 1983. This plan, primarily, involves management techniques for freshwater game fish, upland game mammals, upland game birds, fur-bearing mammals, migratory waterfowl, and threatened and endangered species. Consideration will be given to all other fish and wildlife species present in all aspects of management.

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#### IV. The Cooperative Plan

The Marine Corps Base, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission agree to assist together in preparing and implementing a progressive program of fish and wildlife conservation for the base. Meetings may be called as necessary by either of the three parties to review the fish and wildlife management and outdoor recreation program.

##### A. Cooperative Responsibility

1. Marine Corps Base will execute the Fish and Wildlife Management Plan, provide labor, equipment, and materials for habitat improvement and development, work effectively and in harmony with local, state, and federal conservation officials, provide within manageable quotas for controlled public access for the purpose of hunting, fishing, and trapping and regulate the taking of fish and wildlife in accordance with applicable local, state and federal laws and regulations. Biological Opinions rendered under Public Law 93-205 have been implemented for the protection of threatened and endangered species. Marine Corps Base will retain and protect all wildlife habitat to the fullest extent possible for all numerous and unique species. The base will promote an educational program of Wildlife Conservation to increase public awareness of wise use of these natural resources.

2. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will render technical advice and professional assistance through the Area Manager, Asheville, North Carolina, concerning management of fish and wildlife including game, nongame, and threatened and endangered species. The Service will assist in censusing of birds and mammals through its field personnel who visit the base.

3. The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission will provide technical assistance and professional advice, through its Executive Director, Raleigh, North Carolina, concerning the management of fish and wildlife including game, nongame, and threatened and endangered species. Assistance for censusing fish and wildlife will be provided through biologists who call upon Base Conservation personnel. The Commission will provide seed mixtures and plants as needed and as available for upland game and migratory species. Freshwater fish for management purposes will be provided by the Wildlife Resources Commission based upon adequate survey and demonstrated need.

##### B. Development and Improvement of Habitat

Present habitat conditions are good to excellent for both game and nongame species. White-tailed deer, wild turkey, squirrel, rabbit, quail, and waterfowl are the featured game. Other game, nongame, and endangered species will be considered in all phases of management. Additional grassy openings are needed in some wildlife units and will be established in the near future. Forest access roads will be utilized for wildlife enhancement by establishing many of these in perennial grass plantings. Wetlands, bottomlands, hardwood, and hardwood stands on slopes or inclusions will be managed for wildlife. The Forester and





Wildlife Manager will coordinate management activities in a modified even-aged forest wildlife habitat program under the "Multiple-use" concept.

#### C. Restoration or Restocking of Desired Species

Restocking practices on the base will normally be limited to releasing freshwater game fish into ponds, lakes, and streams. The introduction of exotic species of fish and wildlife is prohibited. Only wild trapped birds and animals which are native may be released on the base at such times that might warrant restocking efforts in the future. Preliminary studies will be required by the three parties before any restocking is permitted in the future.

#### D. Control of Plant and Animal Species

1. All game species will be controlled through hunting to keep populations from reaching high densities which could limit essential requirements for food and cover.

2. Raccoons are being controlled by allowing individual trapping of these animals.

3. Aquatic weeds are controlled in ponds and lakes through the application of aquatic herbicides by management personnel as necessary.

#### E. Protection of Fish and Wildlife

The taking of all fish and wildlife will be within the manner and limits prescribed by local, state, and federal laws and regulations. Hunting and fishing access is controlled through a centrally located checking station. Tagging of big game kills at the scene of the kill is mandatory. Game kills are reported in at the checking station where they are inspected, management data collected, and possession permits affixed to the carcass of each kill.

#### F. Protection of Historical and Archeological Resources

A preliminary archeological and historic survey was conducted by professional archeologists in 1978 for identifying and mapping existing cultural resources. More intensive surveys were conducted by professional archeologists under Public Works Department contract during 1980-81 as required by the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, the Historic Preservation Act of 1966, and Executive Order 11593. Existing sites will be protected for the preservation of cultural resources.

#### G. Public Use of Fish and Wildlife Resources

Consumptive use of fish and wildlife resources by the public is through hunting, fishing, and trapping. Non-consumptive use of fish and wildlife includes nature study, viewing, and photographing wildlife. Plans are to make non-consumptive use more available to the public. The present civilian guest use of fish and wildlife resources comprises 27% of the total number of trips for fishing and hunting. The following persons are authorized to hunt, fish, and trap on base:

1. Military personnel, including retired and their dependents.
2. Civilians assigned to or employed on the base or living in base housing and their dependents to include Civil Service employees retired from federal service.
3. All civilians (other than employees) when accompanied by a military or civilian employee sponsor. Sponsors of such persons are responsible for their proper conduct. A sponsor may take with him no more than two guests on an individual hunt without special permission.
4. Public access to hunting, fishing, trapping and other recreational activities will be on a first-come, first-served basis within manageable quotas.

H. Permit Requirements and Use of Funds

1. All persons authorized to hunt, fish and trap shall have in their possession a valid North Carolina or Onslow County hunting, fishing and/or trapping license. A big game permit is required to hunt deer, bear and turkey. Persons hunting migratory waterfowl shall have in their possession a valid Federal Migratory Bird Stamp.

2. All persons must, additionally, apply for a base permit to meet the requirements for hunting, fishing and trapping on base.

3. Types of permits, fees and effective dates.

a. Combination Hunting/Fishing - to military personnel, civilian employees, their dependents:

1 August - 31 July \$ 7

b. Minor Dependent Hunting Permits - to minor dependents of military personnel and civilian employees:

1 August - 31 July No. Charge

c. Fishing Permits - to military personnel, civilian employees, their dependents 16 years of age and above:

1 January - 31 December \$ 5

d. Special Combination Hunting/Fishing Permits - to civilian guests:

1 August - 31 July \$ 7

e. Daily Hunting/Fishing Permits - to civilian guests:

\$ 3

f. Daily Hunting/Fishing Permits - military, civilian employees:

\$ 3

g. Trapping Permits - to military personnel, civilian employees and their dependents:

1 August - 31 July \$ 10

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4. Fees for base permits will be collected by an appointed collection agent. The collection agent is accountable for all fees and is responsible for depositing fees with the Base Comptroller to a special non-appropriated project fund.

V. Technical Advice and Assistance

1. The Area Manager, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, through the State Supervisor, Raleigh, North Carolina, and the Fishery Resource Biologist, Cherokee, North Carolina, will provide fish and wildlife management services and assistance to the base as funding and available manpower permit.

2. The Executive Director of the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, acting through the professional staff, will provide technical advice as requested concerning the proper management and regulation of the wildlife species native to Camp Lejeune.

3. This Cooperative Plan upon its adoption as witnessed by its execution will be in full force and effect for an indefinite period. The plan is subject to amendment or revision as may be agreed upon by all parties represented. A request for an amendment or revision to the Cooperative Plan may originate with any one of the represented parties. This plan supersedes the Cooperative Plan of March 1977.
