1. During follow up of an oil spill report regarding an oil sheen on Courthouse Bay, the subject situation was discovered by Base Maintenance Department personnel. Three one-half 55-gailon oil drum drain pans, level full, of oil with spillage occurring were observed. Excessive amounts of lubricants and hydraulic fluids were found on the deck and surrounding soil. New motor oil was observed spilled on the deck around a 55-gailon oil drum that was not equipped with a dispensing faucet. Oil and hydraulic fluid were observed pooled on standing water at the Maintenance Facility. Second Assault Amphibian Battalion personnel were observed using water hoses to flush oil and soil into a storm drain which empties into Courthouse Bay in violation of references (a), (b) and (c). Used motor oil was observed on water in a second storm drain that empties into Courthouse Bay. A total of three storm drains were discharging petroleum products into Courthouse Bay on 21 August 1980 at approximately 1300 hours.

2. After touring the Maintenance Area around Building A-3, it was concluded good housekeeping practices by 2d Assault Amphibian Battalion line forces, as required by references (a), (b), (c) and (d), would have prevented the petroleum products from reaching Courthouse Bay. This incident, which could have been avoided, may result in embarrassment to Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, and the Marine Corps, as a result of the U. S. Coast Guard investigation of the spill. Water/oil samples were taken from the storm drain and Courthouse Bay by U. S. Coast Guard Representatives. The investigators indicated a formal report would be made and placed in a computer (a national data bank of oil spill event information). References (a), (b) and (c) require Marine Corps Base to report oil spills to the U. S. Coast Guard, the Environmental Protection Agency and Headquarters Marine Corps. It is possible, as has happened in the past, the Secretary of Defense will pick up information on this spill from the U. S. Coast Guard Report and take action through Headquarters Marine Corps.



- 3. References (d) and (e) called attention to two other significant oil pollution violations involving a unit of 2d Marine Division. These situations are serious and require aggressive, corrective action and prevention. Commanding Officers and Officers-In-Charge of Facilities can be civilly fined \$5,000 per violation for polluting the waters with oil. Each day is a separate violation. In addition, any person who willfully or negligently pollutes waters with oil can be charged for the cost of clean up and for the damage done to marine resources. Under some circumstances, criminal penalties may be attached for water pollution with the fine being a minimum of \$2,500 and up to \$25,000 and/or one years imprisonment.
- 4. Reference (d) recommended development and Implementation of a local Oil Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasure Plan (SPCC Plan) for units of 2d Marine Division. Evidence of such a plan was not observed on 21 August 1980. It is again recommended that local SPCC Plans be developed and implemented by units of your Command for all facilities with potential for oil spillage. Assistance with the technical and educational aspects of the SPCC Plan is available from Mr. Danny Sharpe, Base Maintenance Department, extensions 2083/5003.
- 5. It is requested that an investigation be conducted into the oil spill incident at Building A-3, Courthouse Bay. Please forward the results of the investigation to this Headquarters.

The subject action by line forces has subjected the base to adverse publicity which could have been avoided. The Commanding General has overall responsibility for these violations and the resulting legal consequences. The future involvement of North Carolina regulatory personnel, as discussed during reference (a), greatly increases the probability of legal action and fines.

The Commanding General is being exposed to unnecessary criticism and possible adverse action which could be avoided by correction of operational problems of line forces involved in the handling and disposal of petroleum products and other related materials. P-996 and other construction projects have or will provide a basic level of facilities to correct this problem. However, without full cooperation of tenant commands in the operation and maintenance of these facilities, the subject problems will continue. Reference (b) contains a compliance agreement for completion of oil related pollution abatement facilities (P-996) by June 1982. New maintenance facilities are being constructed which contain oil/water separators, waste oil storage, etc. After June 1982, base must be in compliance with all requirements of reference (b) including those of North Carolina.



- 1. During an environmental inspection, 19 February 1980, to ascertain the cause of a reported oil sheen on Courthouse Bay waters adjacent to Building A-3, the following violations of references (a), (b) and (c) were discovered: (1) discarding used oil filters into surface drains, (2) flushing oily wastes from concrete lot into surface drains, (3) draining motor oils, transmission fluid and hydraulic fluids onto floor and ground and (4) pouring used petroleum products onto ground and into storm drains.
- 2. This incident coupled with the oil spill in the 1800 Area noted in reference (d) is the second significant oil pollution violation noted in the preceding 60 days involving a unit of 2d Marine Division. The situation is serious and requires aggressive corrective action and prevention. In this regard it is recommended that an oil spill prevention, control and countermeasure plan (SPCC Plan) be developed and implemented for units of 2d Marine Division at the earliest practicable date.
- 3. Assistance with the technical and educational aspects of the SPCC Plan is available from Mr. Danny Sharpe, Base Maintenance Department, extensions 5003/2083.


1. <u>Purpose</u>. To publish the Spill, Prevention, Containment and Countermeasure Plan for Oil and Other Hazardous Substances for Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune/Marine Corps Air Station (Helicopter), New River Complex and assist the Commanding General in the implementation of reference (a) with respect to pollution abatement.

2. Cancellation. BO 11090.1

3. Policy. It is the continuing policy of the Commanding General to actively participate in environmental pollution abatement and take positive planning and programming action to control petroleum products pollution from installations, equipment, vehicles and other Marine Corps facilities. This base and air station will conform to the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act and the Oil Pollution Act of 1961, as amended, and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, insofar as the acts prohibit the discharge of oil, regardless of whether the acts pertain specifically to naval vessels and shore activities. The intent of this policy is to carry out the various measures of references (a) and (b) and prohibit the discharge of all oil, oily mixtures and other hazardous substances except in designated areas by qualified personnel.

4. Responsibilities


a. Base Maintenance Officer is charged with the overall responsibility of carrying out the various measures of this order. Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director (telephone 5003) is responsible to the Base Maintenance Officer for the day to day monitoring, surveillance, and upchannel reporting of events concerning pollution caused by oil or other hazardous substance spills.



- . b. Commanding Officers/Area Commanders are charged with the responsibility of preventing oil spills or other hazardous substances within their own areas and will develop local plans for containment in case of accidental spills.
- c. Base Fire Chief or his senior representative will act as the On-Scene Coordinator (OSC). He will make the initial response to any contingency spill and will be in overall charge at the scene until relieved by the arrival of the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director or his representative. The Crash Crew Officer or his senior representative will act as the OSC in spill areas aboard MCAS(H), New River in aircraft operating areas.
- 5. Action. Discharge of oils or other hazardous substances on the ground, into ditches, culverts, or receiving streams is prohibited. Special attention will be directed to areas where vehicles and equipment are serviced. Cognizant officers will take necessary action to assure compliance. Commanding Officers/Area Commanders shall conform to the standards and criteria as set forth in enclosures (1) and (2).
- 6. Applicability. Having received the concurrence of the Commanding Generals, 2d Marine Division, FMF and Force Troops/2d Force Service Support Group, FMFLANT, and the Commanding Officers of Naval Regional Medical Center, Naval Medical Field Research Laboratory, Naval Regional Dental Center, this order is applicable to those Commands. Since the Commander, Marine Corps Air Bases East likewise concurs, it is further applicable to the Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River, Jacksonville, North Carolina.






SPILL PREVENTION AND CONTAINMENT PLAN

- 1. Oil spill prevention is the responsibility of all organizations/ activities. Each Area Commander will ensure all personnel are indoctrinated in order to make them thoroughly conscious and aware of the environmental impact of oil spills and other hazardous substance discharges.
- 2. All activities will guard against the creation of possible oil spills and hazardous substance discharge situations and necessary action shall be taken to assure containment.
- 3. Disposal of oil, gasoline, kerosene, lube grease, JP-4, JP-5, hydraulic fluid, paint thinner, organic solvents, deteriorated cleaning solutions, poisonous chemical waste and corrosive acids through any drainage system (either surface or subterranean) is prohibited. Waste oil, kerosene, JP-4, JP-5, hydraulic fluid and paint thinner will be disposed of in accordance with paragraph nine below. Lube grease will be collected and disposed of at the sanitary landfill. For disposal of contaminated gasoline contact Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director (telephone 5003). Other substances mentioned herein will be disposed of as outlined in reference (c).
- 4. Personnel wishing to change oil in privately owned vehicles will use facilities at Base Special Services Auto Hobby Shop, Building 1120, Hadnot Point or Special Services Auto Hobby Shop, Building 828, Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River or put the waste oil in one of the collection tanks found aboard base. At no time will oil be drained from a vehicle on the deck, into a storm drain or any other drainage system.
- 5. Disposal of empty or damaged containers of all types in wooded areas, drainage ditches, and other areas that might cause environmental damage is prohibited. All empty 55-gallon drums will be disposed of through Defense Property Disposal Agency Office Lejeune, Building 906. Other containers will be disposed of at the sanitary landfill, or prepared for recycling if practical.
- 6. Oil and gasoline storage tanks larger than 550-gallon capacity will be properly diked. The dike will be properly equipped with a drainage line and valve(s). Only authorized personnel will be permitted to open and close said valve(s). After each drainage, the valve(s) will be closed and locked.
- 7. From time to time organic tactical refueling systems are installed and used on base. Installation of this equipment must be approved by the Base Maintenance Officer. Fuel stored in these tactical refueling systems will be properly diked in accordance with reference (d) or (e).




- 8. Certain units aboard base and the air station use tankers for temporary storage of fuel. In the past spillage has occurred around these vehicles during recirculation operations and while transferring fuel. To help alleviate this problem hoses, nozzles, and other equipment will be checked for serviceability. Before recirculation operations begin, nozzles will be secured in the tanker. Pump or truck operators will stay with the vehicle while loading, unloading, or recirculating fuel. Catch buckets will be placed under hose connections to tank trucks before connecting or disconnecting hose to prevent minor spills. Tankers containing fuel will be parked in a position that will prevent any spilled fuel from entering ditches and storm drains.
- 9. Waste oil will be collected in a tank of at least 250-gallon capacity equipped with a funnel, strainer, and cover so as to prevent entrance of trash, water, and other foreign matter. When the container requires emptying, the officer in charge will call Base Maintenance Department (telephone 5909) and a truck will be dispatched to remove the oil. 55-gallon drums will be used for temporary storage of waste oil in emergency situations.
- 10. Waste petroleum products generated during field exercises will be stored in 55-gallon drums. For disposal instructions contact Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director, Base Maintenance Department (telephone 5003). At no time will these products be poured on the ground.




CONTINGENCY SPILL AND COUNTERMEASURE PLAN

- 1. Reporting. Spills, accidental or otherwise, of oil or other hazardous substances will be reported immediately to the Base Fire Department (on base telephone 3333/off base telephone 451-3333) giving location, substance spilled and approximate amount.
- 2. Response. Upon receiving a report of a significant oil or other hazardous substance spill, the Base Fire Department will dispatch a regular fire fighting unit to the scene. The Base Fire Chief or his senior representative will also report to the scene as soon as possible. Upon arrival, the Base Fire Chief or his senior representative will:
 - a. Assume the role of On-Scene Coordinator (OSC).
- b. Take necessary steps to eliminate any fire hazard developed from the spill. If possible, take necessary steps to contain the spill.
- c. Notify Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director (telephone 5003).
- d. Evaluate the situation and request necessary logistic support from the Base Maintenance Officer to contain the spill and facilitate recovery or mopping up action.
- e. Upon arrival at the scene, the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director or his representative will assume command and will direct further containment and clean up activities.
- 3. Supplies and Materials. Base Maintenance Officer will provide the basic materials and equipment necessary to contain and mop up on-base spills. The U. S. Coast Guard will be contacted for equipment and assistance in the event of a major spill.
- 4. Reports. A report of oil spills and other hazardous substance discharges in the inland navigable waters of the United States and the coastal water including between 3 and 12 miles from the coast will be made immediately by the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director or his representative to:
 - a. Base Maintenance Officer.
 - b. Assistant Chief of Staff, Facilities, Marine Corps Base.
- c. Captain of the Port, Room 101, Federal Building, Wilmington, North Carolina 28401 (telephone 919 763-9435).



In every case, a report of the incident will be made to the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code LFF). Incidents of a serious nature, which require urgent action at the Headquarters level, or may result in adverse news coverage or public relations, will be reported by message.

- 5. Small Spills. Occurrence of small gasoline and fuel oil spills on refueling aprons are very common. Gasoline and fuel oil spilled on refueling aprons will not be flushed into any ditch or storm sewer. To reduce the pollution and fire hazard, the spill will be covered with sand obtained from a nearby storage bin. As the sand absorbs the fuel, it will be taken up and returned to the storage bin after evaporation or placed into the sanitary landfill as required. Sand can be obtained by calling Base Maintenance Department (telephone 3001).
- 6. Restoration of Damaged Area. Grounds around grease racks and maintenance buildings that have been severely damaged by oil and grease will be restored to their natural state. If necessary, the contaminated soil will be removed and replaced with clean soil and reseeded.





- 1. During a routine environmental inspection of the 1800 Area, it was ascertained that used motor oil was being dumped in a storm drain near Building 1841. Follow-up inspections revealed the following violations of references (a), (b) and (c): (1) used motor oil being dumped into two storm drains or directly on the ground; (2) draining crankcase oil directly from military vehicles onto asphalt pavement; (3) and improper storage of oil, paint thinner (Flash Point 110°F) and xylene (Flash Point 79°F). The latter resulted in leakage of oil and paint thinner onto the asphalt pavement which could have resulted in serious loss of property/injuries to personnel.
- 2. Reference (a) states that the Director, Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) can assess civil penalties ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 per violation of the law. Additionally, criminal sanctions could be imposed including felony penalties of \$10,000 per day plus imprisonment. The Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, is required to monitor the oil pollution program and report each violation of the law to higher Headquarters.
- 3. The cooperation of the personnel involved in the above cited instance during the initial clean up of these spills is to be commended, however, the fact remains that each of the violations was considered to be preventable by increased supervision/education. It is requested that an investigation be conducted into this matter and comments concerning compliance with regulations be forwarded to this Headquarters.

1. Purpose. To disseminate information concerning oil pollution abatement responsibilities.

2. Information

- a. References (a) and (b) revealed oil pollution problems associated with the following: petroleum storage areas, maintenance facilities, grease racks, motor pool operations, parking lots, etc. Most of the oil pollution problems associated with the subject facilities are due to inadequate operational procedures often caused by lack of knowledge of and emphasis on abatement of oily waste.
- b. It is imperative that appropriate emphasis be directed at this problem to eliminate the discharge of petroleum by-products into receiving waters. This activity is required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to monitor and report findings on water quality in storm drains leading from Industrial Areas. Initial monitoring indicates abuse of standing instructions contained in references (c) and (d). It is noted that the EPA initiated administrative action proceedings against the Base due to a violation of reference (d) that resulted in pollution of New River. Any violation of this type may subject commanding officers to legal action by the private sector, of further administrative action may be taken against the Command by the EPA.
- c. Plans are underway to submit a massive MCON pollution abatement project to provide treatment of oil and other industrial waste discharges. Project completion is estimated to be July 1981. In the interim, such discharges will continue to constitute noncompliance with the Clean Water Act. Subsequent to the placement of facilities to abate such pollution, noncompliance will continue if operational procedures are not corrected to fully comply with reference (d).

- 1. During references (a) and (b) two JP-5 and one diesel fuel spills totaling approximately 7,550 gallons were inspected by Base Maintenance Department, Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Division personnel. The spills were caused when fuel bladders operated by Bulk Fuel Company, 8th Engineer Support Battalion, ruptured spilling fuel on the ground. Approximately 3,000 gallons of the 7,000 gallon spill, which occurred on 23 July 1979, was deliberately drained from the diked area as reported by Lt. Menza and reached navigable waters violating references (c), (d) and (e). That action caused serious clean up problems which to date has not been completed. During the inspection of this spill, it was learned that nine other spills at the same location involving fuel bladders had occurred recently. Those spills were not reported as required by reference (e).
- Improper disposal of petroleum products is significant and serious as reference (c) states that the Director, Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), can assess civil penalties ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 per violation; and this is in addition to criminal sanctions which could be imposed in the same matter including felony penalties with \$10,000 per day fines plus imprisonment. Under the law, each spill, however slight, is a separate violation. It is not as if violations will never be noted. law requires this activity to monitor oil pollution and report each violation to Region IV, EPA in Atlanta, Georgia, and we comply.
- 3. Accordingly, it is recommended that storage of petroleum products in fuel bladders be discontinued until such time as assurance can be provided that no further spills will occur. Further, it is requested that an investigation be conducted to establish the facts of the incident, responsibilities therefor and measures to be taken to prevent a recurrence.



- 1. During reference (a), a reported hazardous substance spill at MAG-25 Group Supply's open storage lot behind Building AS-143 was investigated. At this time an unrelated oil spill was discovered. Further investigation revealed Marine Wing Support Group-27, Detachment "A" was disposing of waste motor oil by dumping on the ground near Building AS-117 and into a drainage canal that empties into a tributary of New River, violating references (b), (c) and (d). It should be noted that a waste oil storage tank was located nearby for the temporary disposal of waste petroleum products.
- 2. Improper disposal of petroleum products is significant and serious. Reference (b) states that the Director, Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), can assess civil penalties ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 per violation; in addition to criminal sanctions which could be imposed in the same matter including felony penalties with \$10,000 per day fines plus imprisonment. Under the law, peach spill, however slight, is a separate violation. The law requires this activity to monitor oil pollution and report each violation to Region IV, EPA in Atlanta, Georgia, and we comply.
- 3. In accordance with reference (e), this letter is to officially notify you of the oil pollution problem at Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River, on 21 May 1979 and to advise of the legal implication of all oil spill events. It is requested that an inquiry be conducted to establish the facts of the incident, responsibility therefor, and measures to be taken to prevent a recurrence.



1. <u>Purpose</u>. To disseminate information concerning oil pollution abatement responsibilities.

2. Information


- a. Reference (a) and recent monitoring and surveys by Base Maintenance Department personnel evidenced oil pollution problems associated with petroleum storage areas, maintenance facilities, grease racks, motor pool operations, parking lots, and other activities utilizing petroleum products. The main oil pollution problems are due to inadequate operational procedures caused by lack of knowledge of and emphasis on abatement of oil waste by operating personnel.
- b. The Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, is required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to monitor and report findings on water quality in storm drains leading from all industrial areas. Initial monitoring indicates abuse of the procedures outlined in references (b) and (c). As a result, the EPA initiated administrative action proceedings against the Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, due to a violation of reference (c) that resulted in pollution of New River. Any violation of environmental protection laws may subject commanding officers to civil and criminal penalties.
- c. Plans are underway to submit a massive military construction pollution abatement project to provide treatment of oil and other industrial waste discharges. Project completion is estimated to be July 1981. In the interim, such discharges continue to constitute noncompliance with the Clean Water Act. Subsequent to the replacement of existing facilities to abate such pollution, operational procedures must be in consonance with references (b) and (c).




- 3. Action. Area Commanders will survey all facilities where oil pollution problems might exist or originate and will take appropriate action to achieve compliance with references (b) and (c). Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Division, Base Maintenance Department, phone 5003/2083, is the point of contact for technical advice/assistance.
- 4. Applicability. Having received the concurrence of the Commanding Generals, 2d Marine Division, FMF and 2d Force Service Support Group (Rein), FMFLant, and the Commanding Officers of Naval Regional Medical Center, Naval Regional Dental Center and Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River, this Bulletin is applicable to those Commands.






ARTICLE 21A. Oil Pollution Control. Part 1. General Provisions. Article shall be known and stances Control Act of 1978 as the purpose of this Articles of this State by protection from pollution

§ 143-215.75. Title. — This Article shall be known and may be cited as the "Oil Pollution and Hazardous Substances Control Act of 1978." (1973, c. 534, s. 1.)


\$143-215.76. Purpose. — It is the purpose of this Article to promote the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of this State by protecting the land and the waters over which this State has jurisdiction from pollution by oil, oil products, oil by-products, and other hazardous substances. It is not the intention of this Article to exercise jurisdiction over any matter as to which the United States government has exclusive jurisdiction, nor in any wise contrary to any governing provision of federal law, and no provision of this Article shall be so construed. The General Assembly further declares that it is the intent of this Article to support and complement applicable provisions of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. section 1251, et seq., as amended, and the National Contingency Plan for removal of oil adopted pursuant thereto. (1973, c. 534, s. 1.)

§ 143-215.77. Definitions. — As used in this Article, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (1) "Barrel" shall mean 42 U.S. gallons at 60 degrees Fahrenheit.
- (2) "Environmental Management Commission" shall mean the North Carolina Environmental Management Commission.
- (3) "Secretary" shall mean the North Carolina Secretary of Natural Resources and Community Development.
- "Discharge" shall mean, but shall not be limited to, any emission, spillage, (4) leakage, pumping, pouring, emptying or dumping of oil or other hazardous substances into waters, or upon land in such promimity to waters that oil or other hazardous substances is reasonably likely to reach the waters, but shall not include discharges in amounts determined by the Environmental Management Commission to be not harmful to the public health or welfare (including but not limited to fish, shellfish, wildlife and public and private property, shorelines, and beaches); provided, however, that this Article shall not be construed to prohibit the oiling of driveways, roads or streets for reduction of dust or routine maintenance; provided further, that the use of oil or other hazardous substances, oil-based products, or chemicals on the land or waters by any State, county, or municipal government agency in any program of mosquito or other pest control, or their use by any person in accepted agricultural, horticultural, or forestry practices, or in connection with aquatic weed control or structural pest and rodent control, in a manner approved by the State, county, or local agency charged with authority over such uses, shall not constitute a discharge; provided, further, that the use of a pesticide regulated by the North Carolina Pesticide Board in a manner consistent with the labelling required by the North Carolina Pesticide Law shall not constitute a 'discharge' for purposes of this Article.
- (5) "Having control over oil or other hazardous substances" shall mean, but shall not be limited to, any person using, transferring, storing, or transporting oil or other hazardous substances immediately prior to a discharge of such oil or other hazardous substances onto the land or into the waters of the State, and specifically shall include carriers and bailees of such oil or other hazardous substances.



- "Hazardous Substance" shall mean any substance, other than oil, designated by regulation of the Commission upon a finding that the discharge of the substance in any minimum prescribed quantity into or upon the waters of the State presents an imminent and substantial danger to public health or welfare; or to fish, shellfish, wildlife, or vegetation. Provided, that only those substances and corollary harmful quantities which have been designated by the Administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency pursuant to 33 U.S.C. 1321 (b)(2)(A) shall be designated by the Commission as hazardous substances. Additions to or deletions from the list of hazardous substances by the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency shall be deemed to be automatically added to or deleted from this definition unless the Commission objects within 120 days of publication of the action in the Federal Register. If the Commission objects to a particular addition or deletion, the substance so designated will neither be added to nor deleted from the definition pending a public hearing pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 150A of the General Statutes.
- (7) "Land" shall mean only land from which it is reasonable likely that oil or hazardous substances will flow into the waters of this State.
- (8) "Department" shall mean the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development.
- (9) "Oil" shall mean oil of any kind and in any form, including, but specifically not limited to, Petroleum, crude oil, diesel oil, fuel oil, gasoline, lubrication oil, oil refuse, oil mixed with other waste, oil sludge, petroleum related products or by-products, and all other liquid hydrocarbons, regardless of specific gravity, whether singly or in combination with other substances.
- (10) "Bailee" shall mean any person who accepts oil or other hazardous substances to hold in trust for another for a special purpose and for a limited period of time.
- (11) "Carrier" shall mean any person who engages in the transportation of oil or other hazardous substances for compensation.
- (12) "Oil terminal facility" shall mean any facility of any kind and related appurtenances located in, on or under the surface of any land, or water, including submerged lands, which is used or capable of being used for the purpose of transferring, transporting, storing, processing, or refining oil; but shall not include any facility having a storage capacity of less than 500 barrels, nor any retail gasoline dispensing operation serving the motoring public. A vessel shall be considered an oil terminal facility only in the event that it is utilized to transfer oil from another vessel to an oil terminal facility; or to transfer oil between one oil terminal facility and another oil terminal facility; or is used to store oil.
- (13) "Operator" shall mean any person owning or operating an oil terminal facility or pipeline, whether by lease, contract, or any other form of agreement.
- (14) "Person" shall mean any and all natural persons, firms, partnerships, associations public or private institutions, municipalities or political subdivisions, governmental agencies, or private or public corporations organized or existing under the laws of this State or any other state or country.
- (15) "Pipeline" shall mean any conduit, pipe or system or pipes, and any appurtenances related thereto and used in conjuction therewith, used, or capable of being used, for transporting or transferring oil to, from, or between oil terminal facilities.
- (16) "Restoration" or "restore" shall mean any activity or project undertaken in the public interest or to protect public interest or to protect public property or to promote the public health, safety or welfare for the purpose of restoring any lands or waters affected by an oil or other hazardous substances discharge as nearly as is possible or desirable to the condition which existed prior to the chicagons.




"Transfer" shall mean the transportation, on-loading or off-loading of oil or other hazardous substances between or among two or more oil terminal facilities; between or among oil terminal facilities and vessels; and between or among two or more vessels. "Vessel" shall include every description of watercraft or other contrivance used, or capable of being used, as a means of transportation on water, whether self-propelled or otherwise, and shall include, but shall not be limited to, barges and tugs; provided that the term "vessel" as used herein shall not apply to any pleasure, sport or commercial fishing vessel which has a fuel capacity of less than 500 gallons and is not used to transport petroleum, petroleum products, or general cargo. "Waters" shall mean any stream, river, creek, brook, run, canal, swamp, (19)lake, sound, tidal estuary, bay, reservoir, waterway or any other body or accumulation of water, surface or underground, public or private, natural or artificial, which is contained within, flows through, or borders upon this State, or any portion thereof, including those portions of the Atlantic Ocean over which this State has jurisdiction. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; 1973, c. 1262, s. 23; 1977, c. 771, s.4.) § 143-215.78. Oil pollution control program. — The Department shall establish an oil pollution control program for the administration of this Article. The Department may employ and prescribe the duties of employees assigned to this activity. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23.) Management Commission, through its authorized representatives, is empowered to conduct such inspections and investigations as shall be reasonably necessary to determine com-

§ 143-215.79. Inspections and investigations; entry upon property. — The Environmental pliance with the provisions of this Article; to determine the person or persons responsible for violation of this Article; to determine the nature and location of any oil or other hazardous substances discharge to the land or waters of this State; and to enforce the provisions of this Article. The authorized representatives of the Environmental Management Commission are empowered upon presentation of their credentials to enter upon any private or public property, including boarding any vessel, for the purpose of inspection or investigation or in order to conduct any project or activity to contain, collect, disperse or remove oil or other hazardous substances discharges or to perform any restoration necessitated by an oil or other hazardous substances discharge. Neither the State nor its agencies, employees or agents shall be liable in trespass or damages arising out of the conduct of any inspection, investigation, or oil or other hazardous substances removal or restoration project or activity other than liability for damage to property or injury to persons arising out of the negligent or willful conduct of an employee or agent of the State during the course of an inspection investigation, project or activity. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23.)

§ 143-215.80. Confidential information. — Any information relating to a secret process, device or method of manufacturing or production discovered or obtained in the course of an inspection, investigation, project or activity conducted pursuant to this Article shall not be revealed except as may be required by law or lawful order or process. (1973, c. 534, s. 1.)

§ 143-215.81. Authority supplemental. — The authority and powers granted under this Article shall be in addition to, and not in derogation of, any authority or powers vested in the Environmental Management Commission under any other provision of law, except to the extent that such other powers or authority may conflict directly with the powers and authority granted under this Article; and the Environmental Management Commission is empowered to adopt such rules and regulations as are necessary to administer and carry out the purposes of this Article. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23.)



Local ordinances. — Nothing in the Arti shall be construed to deny any county, municipality, sanitary district, metropolitan sewerage district or other authorized local governmental entity, by ordinance, regulation or law, from exercising police powers with reference to the prevention and control of oil or other hazardous aubstances discharges to sewers or disposal systems. (1973, c. 534, s. 1.)


Part 2. Oil Discharge Controls.

- § 143-215.83. Discharges. (a) Unlawful Discharges. It shall be unlawful, except as otherwise provided in this Part, for any person to discharge, or cause to be discharged, oil or other hazardous substances into or upon any waters, tidal flats, beaches, or lands within this State, or into any sewer, surface water drain or other waters that drain into the waters of this State, regardless of the fault of the person having control over the oil or other hazardous substances, or regardless of whether the discharge was the result of intentional or negligent conduct, accident or other cause.
- (b) Excepted Discharges. This section shall not apply to discharges of oil or other hazardous substances in the following circumstances:
 - (1) When the discharge was authorized by an existing regulation of the Environmental Management Commission.
 - (2) When any person subject to liability under this Article proves that a discharge was caused by any of the following:
 - a. An act of God.
 - b. An act of war or sabotage.
 - c. Negligence on the part of the United States government or the State of North Carolina or its political subdivisions.
 - d. An or omission of a third party, whether any such act or omission was or was not negligent.
 - e. Any act or omission by or at the direction of a law-enforcement officer or fireman.
- (c) Permits. Any person who desires or proposes to discharge oil or other hazardous substances onto the land or into the waters of this State shall first make application for and secure the permit required by G.S. 143-215.1. Application shall be made pursuant to the rules and regulations adopted by the Environmental Management Commission. Any permit granted pursuant to this subsection may contain such terms and conditions as the Environmental Management Commission shall deem necessary and appropriate to conserve and protect the land or waters of this State and the public interest therein. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23.)
- § 143-215.84. Removal of prohibited discharges. (a) Person Discharging. Any person having control over oil or other hazardous substances discharged in violation of this Article shall immediately undertake to collect and remove the discharge and to restore the area affected by the discharge as nearly as may be to the condition existing prior to the discharge. If it is not feasible to collect and remove the discharge, the person responsible shall take all practicable actions to contain, treat and disperse the discharge; but no chemicals or other dispersants or treatment materials which will be detrimental to the environment or natural resources shall be used for such purposes unless they shall have been previously approved by the Environmental Management Commission.
- (b) Removal by Department. Notwithstanding the requirements of subsection (a) of this section, the Department is authorized and empowered to utilize any staff, equipment and materials under its control or supplied by other cooperating State or local agencies and to contract with any agent or contractor that it deems appropriate to take such actions as are necessary to collect, investigate, perform surveillance over, remove, contain, treat or disperse oil or other hazardous substances discharged onto the land or into the waters of the State and to perform any necessary restoration. The Secretary shall keep a record



- of all expenses incurred carrying out any project or a livity authorized under this section, including actual expenses incurred for services performed by the State's personnel and for use of the State's equipment and material. The authority granted by this subsection shall be limited to projects and activities that are designed to protect the public interest or public property and shall be compatible with the National Contingency Plan established pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. section 1251 et seq.
- (c) The Secretary of the Department of Transportation is authorized and empowered, after consultation with the Secretary of Natural Resources and Community Development, to purchase and equip a sufficient number of trucks designed to carry out the provisions of subsection (b). These trucks shall be maintained by the Department of Transportation and shall be strategically located at various locations throughout the State so as to furnish a ready response when word of an oil or other hazardous substances discharge has been received. The Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development or his designee will, after consultation, decide where the trucks are to be located.
- (d) The Secretary of the Department of Transportation and the Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development or their designees shall prepare rules and regulations and develop procedures for the placement of these trucks and shall determine the manner and way in which they are to be used. The Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development shall reimburse the Department of Transportation for expenses incurred by the Department of Transportation during cleanups as provided in G.S. 143-215.88. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23; 1975, c. 885; 1977, c. 771, s. 4.)
- § 143-215.85. Required notice. Every person owning or having control over oil or other hazardous substances discharged in any circumstances other than pursuant to existing regulation of the Environmental Management Commission or the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency or pursuant to a permit required by G.S. 143-215.1 or the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, upon notice that such discharge has occurred, shall immediately notify the Department, or any of its agents or employees, of the nature. location and time of the discharge and of the measures which are being taken or are proposed to be taken to contain and remove the discharge. The agent or employee of the Department receiving the notification shall immediately notify the Secretary of Natural Resources and Community Development or such member or members of the permanent staff of the Department as the Secretary may designate. If the discharged substance of which the Department is notified is a pesticide regulated by the North Carolina Pesticide Board, the Department shall immediately inform the Secretary of the Pesticide Board. Removal operations under this Article of substances identified as pesticides defined in G.S. 143-60 shall be coordinated in accordance with the Pesticide Emergency Plan adopted by the North Carolina Pesticide Board; provided that, in instances where entry of such hazardous substances into waters of the State is imminent, the Department may take such actions as are necessary to physically contain or divert such substance so as to prevent entry into the surface waters. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23; 1977, c. 771, s. 4; c. 858, s. 1.)
- 5 143-215.86. Other State agencies and State-designated local agencies. (a) Cooperative Effort. The Board of Transportation, the North Carolina Wildlife Ressources Commission, and any other agency of this State and any local agency designated by the State shall cooperate with and lend assistance to the Environmental Management Commission by assigning to the Environmental Management Commission upon its request personnel, equipment and material to be utilized in any project of activity related to the containment, collection, dispersal or removal of oil or other hazardous substances discharged upon the land or into the waters of this State.




- (b) Planning. Subsequent to May 16, 1973, and prior to September 1, 1973, designated representatives of the Environmental Management Commission, the Board of Transportation, and the Wildlife Resources Commission and any other agency or agencies of the State which the Environmental Management Commission shall deem necessary and appropriate, shall confer and establish plans and procedures for the assignment and utilization of personnel, equipment and material to be used in carrying out the purposes of this Part. Every State agency involved is authorized to adopt such rules and regulations as shall be necessary to effectuate the purposes of this section.
- (c) Accounts. Every State agency or other State-designated local agency participating in the containment, collection, dispersal or removal of an oil or other hazardous substances discharge or in restoration necessitated by such discharge, shall keep a record of all expenses incurred in carrying out any such project or activity including the actual services performed by the agency's personnel and the use of the agency's equipment and material. A copy of all records shall be delivered to the Environmental Management Commission upon completion of the project or activity. (1973, c. 507, s. 5; c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23.)
- § 143-215.87. 011 or Other Hazardous Substances Pollution Protection Fund. There is hereby established under the control and direction of the Department an Oil or Other Hazardous Substances Pollution Protection Fund which shall be a nonlapsing, revolving fund consisting of any moneys appropriated for such purpose by the General Assembly or that shall be available to it from any other source. The moneys shall be used to defray the expenses of any project or program for the containment, collection, dispersal or removal of oil or other hazardous substances discharged to the land or waters of this State or for restoration necessitated by the discharge. In addition to any moneys that shall be appropriated or otherwise made available to it, the fund shall be maintained by fees, charges, penalties or other moneys paid to or recovered by or on behalf of the Department under the provisions of this Part. Any moneys paid to or recovered by or on behalf of the Department as fees, charges, penalties or other payments as damages authorized by this Part shall be paid to the Oil or Other Hazardous Substances Pollution Protection Fund in an amount equal to the sums expended from the fund for the project or activity. Within the meaning of this section, the word "penalties" means civil penalties and does not include criminal fines or penalties. (1973, c. 534, s. 1; c. 1262, s. 23.)
- § 143-215.88. Payment to State agencies or State-designated local agencies. Upon completion of any oil or other hazardous substances removal or restoration project or activity conducted pursuant to the provisions of this Part, each agency of the State or any State-designated local agency that has participated by furnishing personnel, equipment or material shall deliver to the Department a record of the expenses incurred by the agency. The amount of incurred expenses shall be disbursed by the Secretary to each such agency from the Oil or Other Hazardous Substances Pollution Protection Fund. Upon completion of any oil or other hazardous substances removal or restoration project or activity, the Secretary shall prepare a statement of all expenses and costs of the project or activity expended by the State and shall make demand for payment upon the person having control over the oil or other hazardous substances discharged to the land or waters of the State unless the Environmental Management Commission shall determine that the discharge occurred due to any of the reasons stated in G.S. 143-215.83(b). Any person having control of oil or other hazardous substances discharged to the land or waters of the State in violation of the provisions of this Part and any other person causing or contributing to the discharge of oil or other hazardous substances shall be directly liable to the State for the necessary expenses of oil cleanup projects and activities arising from such discharge an the State shall have a cause of action to recover from any or all such persons. person having control over the oil or other hazardous substances discharged shall fail or refuse to pay the sum expended by the State, the Secretary shall refer the matter to the Attorney General of North Carolina, who shall institute an action in the name of the State in the Superior Court of Wake County, or in his discretion, in the superior court of the county in which the discharge occurred, to recover such cost and expenses. 

Multiple liability for necessary expenses. — Any person liable for costs of cleanup of oil or other hazardous substances under this Part shall have a cause of action to recover such costs in part or in whole from any other person causing or contributing to the discharge of oil or other hazardous substances into the waters of the State, including any amount recoverable by the State as necessary expenses. The total recovery by the State for damage to public resources pursuant to G.S. 143-215.91 and for the cost of oil or other hazardous substances cleanup, arising from any discharge, shall not exceed the applicable limits prescribed by federal law with respect to the United States government on account of any such discharge. (1973, c. 534, s. 1.)

- § 143.215.90. Liability for damage to public resources. (a) Any person who discharge: oil or other hazardous substances in violation of this Article or violates any order, rule or regulation of the Environmental Management Commission adopted pursuant to this Article, or fails to perform any duty imposed by this Article, or violates an order or other determination of the Environmental Management Commission made pursuant to the provisions of this Article, including the provisions of a discharge permit issued pursuant to G.S. 143-215.1, and in the course thereof causes the death of, or injury to fish, animals, vegetation or other resources of the State or otherwise causes a reduction in the quality of the waters of the State below the standards set by the Environmental Management Commission, shall be liable to pay the State damages. damages shall be an amount equal to the cost of all reasonable and necessary investigations made or caused to be made by the Environmental Management Commission in connection with such violation and the sum of money necessary to restock such waters, replenish such resources, or otherwise restore the rivers, streams, bays, tidal flats. beaches, estuaries or coastal waters and public lands adjoining the seacoast to their condition prior to the injury as such condition is determined by the Environmental Management Commission in conference with the Wildlife Resources Commission, and any other State agencies having an interest affected by such violation (or by the designees of any such boards, commissions, and agencies.
- (b) Upon receipt of the estimate of damages caused, the Department shall give written notice by registered or certified mail to the person responsible for the death, killing, or injury to fish, animals, vegetation, or other resources of the State, or any reduction im quality of the waters of the State, describing the damages and their causes with reasonable specificity, and shall request payment from such person. Damages shall become due and payable upon receipt of such notice. Upon written application to the Department within 30 days of receipt of notice, the person assessed damages may request an administrative hearing pursuant to G.S. 143-215.4. On such hearing, the estimate of the replacement cost of fish or animals or vegetation destroyed, and the estimate of costs or replacing or restoring other resources of the State, and the estimate of the cost of restoring the quality of waters of the State shall be prima facie evidence of the actual replacement cost of fish, animals, vegetation or other resources of the State, and of the actual cost of restoring the quality of the waters of the State; provided, that such evidence is rebuttable. In arriving at such estimate, any reasonably accurate method may be used and it shall not be necessary for any agent of the Department or Wildlife Resources Commission to collect, handle, or weigh numerous specimens of dead or injured fish, animals vegetation or other resources of the State, or to calculate the costs of restoring the quality of the waters using any technology other than that which is existing and practicable as found to be such by the Secretary. Provided, that the Department may effect such mitigation of the amount of damages as the commission may deem proper and reasonable. Appeal from final determination of the commission or its agents pursuant to such a hearing shall be pursuant to G.S. 143-215.5. If the damages are not paid to the Department within 30 days of receipt of notice, or if the amount of damages provided in an order issued subsequent to an application to the Department is not paid within 30 days of the issuance thereof, the Attorney General, upon request of the Department, shall bring an action to recover such damages in the name of the State, in the Superior Court of Wake County, or in




Upon such action being brought, the scope of the court's review shall be as provided in G.S. 150A-51. Any money recovered by the Attorney General or by payment of damages by the person charged therewith by the Department shall be transferred by the Environmental Management Commission to appropriate funds administered by the State agencies affected by the violation for use in such activities as food fish or shellfish management programs, wildlife and waterfowl management programs, water quality improvements and such other uses as may best mitigate the damage incurred as a result of the violation. No action shall be authorized under the provisions of this section against any person operating in compliance with the conditions of a waste discharge permit issued pursuant to G.S. 143-215.1 and the provisions of this Part.

- (c) For the purpose of carrying out its duties under this Article, the Environmental Management Commission shall have the power to direct the investigation of any death, killing, or injury to fish, animals, vegetation or other resources of the State, or any reduction in quality of the waters of the State, which in the opinion of the Environmental Management Commission is of sufficient magnitude to justify investigation.
- § 143-215.91. Penalties. (a) Civil Penalties. Any person who intentionally or negligently discharges oil or other hazardous substances, or knowingly causes or permits the discharge of oil in violation of this Part or fails to report a discharge as required by G.S. 143-215.85, shall incur, in addition to any other penalty provided by law, a penalty in an amount not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for every such violation, the amount to be determined by the Environmental Management Commission after taking into consideration the gravity of the violation, the previous record of the violator in complying or failing to comply with the provisions of this Part as well as G.S. 143-215.1, the amount expended by the violator in complying with the provisions of G.S. 143-215.84, the estimated damages attributed to the violator under G.S. 143-215.90, and such other considerations as the Environmental Management Commission deems appropriate. Every act or omission which causes, aids or abets a violation of this section shall be considered a violation under the provisions of this section and subject to the penalty herein provided The penalty herein provided for shall become due and payable when the person incurring the menalty receives a notice in writing from the Environmental Management Commission describing the violation with reasonable particularity and advising such person that the penalty is The Environmental Management Commission may, upon written application therefor, received within 15 days, and when deemed in the best interest of the State in carrying out the purposes of this Article, remit or mitigate any penalty provided for in this section or discontinue any action to recover the penalty upon such terms as it, in its discretion, shall deem proper, and shall have the authority to ascertain facts upon all such application in such manner and under such regulations as the Environmental Management Commission may adopt. If the amount of such penalty is not paid to the Department within 15 days after receipt of notice, or if an application for remission or mitigation has not been made within 15 days as herein provided, and the amount provided in the order issued by the Environmental Management Commission subsequent to such application is not paid within 15 days of receipt thereof, the Attorney General, upon request of the Environmental Management Commission, shall bring an action in the name of the State in the Superior Court of Wake County or of any other county wherein such violator does business, to recover the amount specified in the final order of the Environmental Management Commission. In any such action, the amount of the penalty shall be subject to review by the court. In all such actions and procedures and rules of evidence shall be the same as in an ordinary civil action except as otherwise in this Article provided. Notification received pursuant to this subsection or information obtained by the exploitation of such notification shall not be used against any person in any criminal case, except as prosecution for perjury or for giving false statement.



- (b) Criminal Penalties. Any person who intentionally or knowingly or willfully discharges or causes or permits the discharge of oil or other hazardous substances in violation of this Part shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment not to exceed six months or by fine to be not more than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), or by both, in the discretion of the court. No proceeding shall be brought or continued under this subsection for or on account of a violation by any person who has previously been convicted of a federal violation or a local ordinance violation based upon the same set of facts. - \$ 143-215.92. Lien on vessel. Any vessel (other than one owned or operated by the State of North Carolina or its political subdivisions or the United States government) from which oil or other hazardous substances is discharged in violation of this Part or any regulation prescribed pursuant thereto, shall be liable for the pecuniary penalty and costs of oil and other hazardous substances removal specified in this Part and such penalty and costs shall constitute a lien on such vessel; provided, however, that said lien shall not attach if a surety bond is posted with the Environmental Management Commission in an amount and with sureties acceptable to the Environmental Management Commission, or a cash deposit is made with the Environmental Management Commission in an amount acceptable to the Environmental Management Commission. Provided further, that such lien shall not have priority over any existing perfected lien or security interest. The Environmental Management Commission may adopt regulations providing for such conditions limitations, and requirements concerning the bond or deposit prescribed by this section as the Environmental Management Commission deems necessary. 



Part 4. Oil Refining Facility Permits.

\$ 148-215.100. Oil refining facility permits. — No facility which is to be used or is capable of being used for the purpose of refining oil shall be initiated or constructed after July 1, 1975, without a permit from the Secretary of Natural Resources and Community Development. (1975, c. 521, s. 2; 1977, c. 771, s. 4.)

- \$ 143-215.101. Powers of the Secretary. The Secretary, in addition to any other powers granted under the laws of this State, shall have the power:
 - (1) To adopt, modify and revoke rules and regulations relating to the issuance of oil refining facility permits. Such rules and regulations may include, but shall not be limited to, the following matters:



- a. Requirements for submission of engineering reports, plans and specifications for the location and construction of oil terminal facilities.
- b. Establishment of procedures and methods of reporting discharges and other occurrences prohibited by this Article.

c. Establishment of procedures, methods, means, and equipment to be used in the removal of oil pollutants.

(2) To deny the issuance of a permit upon a finding that:

a. The installation will have substantial adverse effects on wildlife or on fresh water, estuarine or marine fisheries; or

b. The operation of the installation will violate standards of air or water quality promulgated or administered by the Environmental Management Commission; or

c. The installation will have a substantial adverse effect on a publicly


owned park, forest, or recreation area.

(3) To grant permits for the operation of existing or proposed oil refining facilities and to impose such terms and conditions therein as it shall deem necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this Article.

(4) To require the installation of such facilities and the employment of such protective measures and operating procedures as are deemed necessary to prevent, insofar as possible, any oil discharges to the waters or lands of the State.

(5) To issue guidelines consistent with the Uniform Administrative Practices Act for the issuance or denial of permits. (1975, c. 521, s. 2.)

ARTICLE 21B.

Air Pollution Control.

Repeal of Article. — This Article is repealed, effective July 1, 1961, by Session Laws 1977, c. 712, s. 3. 

The Environmental Management Commission shall review and have general oversight and supervision over the creation and administration of local air pollution control programs authorized by this Article. - 1. The purpose of this letter is to provide a statement regarding the subject incident, as requested during reference (a). I inspected this spill in response to a request by MGySgt Deatch, Assistant Chief of Staff, Facilities, by phone at 1130 on 19 Sep 1980. My observations are as follows:
- a. Upon arriving at the scene at approximately 1145, I observed a thin slick (not sheen) of used crankcase oil on the surface of running water in side ditch adjacent to Bldg 1505, from the culvert at the intersection of Michael Street and Elm Street to the intersection of the side ditch and a surface drain leading from a wash rack at the south corner of Bldg 1505. Oil had been poured approximately six-ten feet southwest of this point in the side ditch and had run down the ditch into the running stream of water coming from the wash rack (See Enclosure (1)).
- b. I observed a ten-quart bucket with similar residue in it sitting between the wash rack and grease rack. Also, oil had been poured into an adjacent waste oil drum which lacked a funnel as required by reference (b). As a result, oil was spilled on the drum and on the ground beside the drum. However, this oil had not reached running water and was not included as part of reported oil spill. Also, there was no visible sign of crankcase oil in the drain between the wash rack and the side ditch.
- c. After reviewing the situation with MSgt Smith, I was unable to determine the organization or identity of person(s) causing the oil spill. In my opinion, the spill was associated with the wash rack and grease rack at south end of Bldg 1505. The spill was cleaned up by the organization at the facility involved.
- d. After providing instruction for clean up of spill and replacing of funnel on oil drum, I inspected the storm drain between the intersection of Elm and Michael Streets and Louis Road. While a sheen of oil was present, further clean up was not feasible.





- 1. Reference (a) requested advice as to the legal requirement for MARCORB CAMP LEJEUNE personnel to notify the State of North Carolina personnel when an oil spill occurred on the Base. It was acknowledged that spills were reported to either the Environmental Protection Agency or the Coast Guard when they occurred. However, spill reports were not made to any North Carolina Pollution Control Agencies.
- 2. In reference (b), paragraph 2021, Marine Corps activities are directed to report accidental spills to local and state pollution control agencies if required by state ordnance or regulations. The State of North Carolina, by reference (c), at paragraph 143-215.85 Required notice "...shall immediately notify the Department or any of its agents or employees, of the nature, the location and time of the discharge and of the measures which are being taken or are proposed to be taken to contain and remove the discharge." In paragraph 143-215.77, the word "Department" is defined as the Dapartment of Natural Resources and Community Development. Thus, Base personnel may wish to contact the regional office in Wilmington vice headquarters in Raleigh to report spills.
- 3. The context of the spill reporting requirements, contained in reference (c), addresses oil and other hazardous substances. Therein, the Base should not limit spill reports to oil spills only. Also, if any other state agency should request notification beyond the "Department", it is suggested that the Base comply in the spirit of cooperation with state agencies.

Pursuant to the FWPCA and EPA regulations (40 CFR Part 1510), the State does not have responsibility for clean-up and mitigation unless it is necessary. If the State is going to become involved, there should be a memorandum of agreement between USCG and the State.

Section 143-215.76 of the State law states the purpose of the law is to support and complement applicable provisions of the FWPCA and the National Contingency Plan. According to Section 143-215.84, the Department of NR&CD can only conduct clean-up operations that are compatible with the National Contingency Plan and the FWPCA. Section 143-215.86(b) calls for an implementing plan with supporting regulations. The Environmental Management Commission and NR&CD have not yet issued regulations implementing plans and procedures to be used in carrying out the purposes of the State law. Under the circumstances, it is difficult to see how giving notice to NR&CD would serve the stated purposes of the statute. Because of the nature of Federal-State relations, I doubt the State can require Federal facility compliance with an ambiguous State law. In this instance, the State law predates the Federal statute that requires Federal facility compliance with State law. I am sure this explains why the requirements of Federal facilities are not clear in the law.

This command has always tried to cooperate fully with all Federal and State agencies involved in protecting the environment and natural resources. Since NR&CD desires to be notified directly by us in the event of an oil discharge, we will do so in the spirit of cooperation. However, such notice will not indicate "violation" of any provision of the N. C. Water Pollution Control Act.

We will appreciate hearing from you or Mr. Lehrer when you receive the opinion from the Attorney General. If you need further information from us, please contact Major Rountree (451-5502). Thank you for your attention to this matter.

Dear Mr. Ross:

This is in response to your letter of September 9, 1980, concerning 40 gallons of JP-5 jet fuel spilled at Marine Corps Air Station (Helicopter), New River, on July 22, 1980. Your letter was a letter of warning for unlawful discharge and failure to notify NR&CD.

Major Neal T. Rountree, Environmental Counsel, Office of the Staff Judge Advocate, discussed this matter with you and with Mr. Robert W. Lehrer, Environmental Enforcement Officer. We appreciated the letter from Mr. Lehrer dated October 6, 1980.

We believe N.C.G.S. 143-215.85 only requires notice when oil is discharged in violation of the provisions of the Oil Pollution Control Act of 1973. Under the provisions of N.C.G.S. 143-215.83, discharges of oil that are accidental or that result from negligence on the part of the U.S. Government are not unlawful. The only other obligations imposed on this facility by State law is to obtain permits for intentional discharges, and to undertake to collect and remove discharged oil and to restore the area affected as nearly as may be to the previous condition. We believe the spill of JP-5 on July 22 was not unlawful as defined by State law. Since the spill was removed and the area restored, there was no violation of N.C.G.S. 143-215.84. Therefore, there was no requirement to notify NR&CD. I request you withdraw the letter of warning.

There are further considerations that may be of interest to you. Camp Lejeune, as a Federal facility, is included in the National Contingency Plan for oil discharges. Our local plan assigns responsibilities for prevention and clean up. It also designates a member of this command as the On-Scene Coordinator (OSC) until the USCG or EPA On-Scene Coordinator arrives. This command has committed considerable resources to this program, and has always been able to clean up spills or mitigate any damage without assistance from other agencies. All discharges of oil have been reported to EPA and USCG in accordance with the Federal Water Pollution Control Act and the National Contingency Plan. The USCG, in turn, immediately notifies the Wilmington Regional Office of NR&CD. EPA has also reported oil spills at Camp Lejeune to the Wilmington Regional Office. Over the years, this method of operation has appeared to be satisfactory to the State agents. Your letter is the first notice received indicating the State does not agree with our local plan and method of operation.


1. Purpose. To publish the Spill, Prevention, Containment and Counter-measure Plan for Oil and Other Hazardous Substances for Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune/Marine Corps Air Station (Helicopter), New River Complex and assist the Commanding General in the implementation of reference (a) with respect to pollution abatement.

2. Cancellation. BO 11090.1

3. Policy. It is the continuing policy of the Commanding General to actively participate in environmental pollution abatement and take positive planning and programming action to control petroleum products pollution from installations, equipment, vehicles and other Marine Corps facilities. This base and air station will conform to the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act and the Oil Pollution Act of 1961, as amended, and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, insofar as the acts prohibit the discharge of oil, regardless of whether the acts pertain specifically to naval vessels and shore activities. The intent of this policy is to carry out the various measures of references (a) and (b) and prohibit the discharge of all cil, oily mixtures and other hazardous substances except in designated areas by qualified personnel.

4. Responsibilities


a. Base Maintenance Officer is charged with the overall responsibility of carrying out the various measures of this order. Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director (telephone 5003) is responsible to the Base Maintenance Officer for the day to day monitoring, surveillance, and upchannel reporting of events concerning pollution caused by oil or other hazardous substance spills.



- b. Commanding Officers/Area Commanders are charged with the responsibility of preventing oil spills or other hazardous substances within their own areas and will develop local plans for containment in case of accidental spills.
- c. Base Fire Chief or his senior representative will act as the On-Scene Coordinator (OSC). He will make the initial response to any contingency spill and will be in overall charge at the scene until relieved by the arrival of the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director or his representative. The Crash Crew Officer or his senior representative will act as the OSC in spill areas aboard MCAS(H), New River in aircraft operating areas.
- 5. Action. Discharge of oils or other hazardous substances on the ground, into ditches, culverts, or receiving streams is prohibited. Special attention will be directed to areas where vehicles and equipment are serviced. Cognizant officers will take necessary action to assure compliance. Commanding Officers/Area Commanders shall conform to the standards and criteria as set forth in enclosures (1) and (2).
- 6. Applicability. Having received the concurrence of the Commanding Generals, 2d Marine Division, FMF and Force Troops/2d Force Service Support Group, FMFLANT, and the Commanding Officers of Naval Regional Medical Center, Naval Medical Field Research Laboratory, Naval Regional Dental Center, this order is applicable to those Commands. Since the Commander, Marine Corps Air Bases East likewise concurs, it is further applicable to the Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River, Jacksonville, North Carolina.




SPILL PREVENTION AND CONTAINMENT PLAN

- 1. Oil spill prevention is the responsibility of all organizations/ activities. Each Area Commander will ensure all personnel are indoctrinated in order to make them thoroughly conscious and aware of the environmental impact of oil spills and other hazardous substance discharges.
- 2. All activities will guard against the creation of possible oil spills and hazardous substance discharge situations and necessary action shall be taken to assure containment.
- 3. Disposal of oil, gasoline, kerosene, lube grease, JP-4, JP-5, hydraulic fluid, paint thinner, organic solvents, deteriorated cleaning solutions, poisonous chemical waste and corrosive acids through any drainage system (either surface or subterranean) is prohibited. Waste oil, kerosene, JP-4, JP-5, hydraulic fluid and paint thinner will be disposed of in accordance with paragraph nine below. Lube grease will be collected and disposed of at the sanitary landfill. For disposal of contaminated gasoline contact Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director (telephone 5003). Other substances mentioned herein will be disposed of as outlined in reference (c).
- 4. Personnel wishing to change oil in privately owned vehicles will use facilities at Base Special Services Auto Hobby Shop, Building 1120, Hadnot Point or Special Services Auto Hobby Shop, Building 828, Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River or put the waste oil in one of the collection tanks found aboard base. At no time will oil be drained from a vehicle on the deck, into a storm drain or any other drainage system.
- 5. Disposal of empty or damaged containers of all types in wooded areas, drainage ditches, and other areas that might cause environmental damage is prohibited. All empty 55-gallon drums will be disposed of through Defense Property Disposal Agency Office Lejeune, Building 906. Other containers will be disposed of at the sanitary landfill, or prepared for recycling if practical.
- 6. Oil and gasoline storage tanks larger than 550-gallon capacity will be properly diked. The dike will be properly equipped with a drainage line and valve(s). Only authorized personnel will be permitted to open and close said valve(s). After each drainage, the valve(s) will be closed and locked.
- 7. From time to time organic tactical refueling systems are installed and used on base. Installation of this equipment must be approved by the Base Maintenance Officer. Fuel stored in these tactical refueling systems will be properly diked in accordance with reference (d) or (e).




- 8. Certain units aboard base and the air station use tankers for temporary storage of fuel. In the past spillage has occurred around these vehicles during recirculation operations and while transferring fuel. To help alleviate this problem hoses, nozzles, and other equipment will be checked for serviceability. Before recirculation operations begin, nozzles will be secured in the tanker. Pump or truck operators will stay with the vehicle while loading, unloading, or recirculating fuel. Catch buckets will be placed under hose connections to tank trucks before connecting or disconnecting hose to prevent minor spills. Tankers containing fuel will be parked in a position that will prevent any spilled fuel from entering ditches and storm drains.
- 9. Waste oil will be collected in a tank of at least 250-gallon capacity equipped with a funnel, strainer, and cover so as to prevent entrance of trash, water, and other foreign matter. When the container requires emptying, the officer in charge will call Base Maintenance Department (telephone 5909) and a truck will be dispatched to remove the oil. 55-gallon drums will be used for temporary storage of waste oil in emergency situations.
- 10. Waste petroleum products generated during field exercises will be stored in 55-gallon drums. For disposal instructions contact Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director, Base Maintenance Department (telephone 5003). At no time will these products be poured on the ground.






CONTINGENCY SPILL AND COUNTERMEASURE PLAN

- 1. Reporting. Spills, accidental or otherwise, of oil or other hazardous substances will be reported immediately to the Base Fire Department (on base telephone 3333/off base telephone 451-3333) giving location, substance spilled and approximate amount.
- 2. Response. Upon receiving a report of a significant oil or other hazardous substance spill, the Base Fire Department will dispatch a regular fire fighting unit to the scene. The Base Fire Chief or his senior representative will also report to the scene as soon as possible. Upon arrival, the Base Fire Chief or his senior representative will:
 - a. Assume the role of On-Scene Coordinator (OSC).
- b. Take necessary steps to eliminate any fire hazard developed from the spill. If possible, take necessary steps to contain the spill.
- c. Notify Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director (telephone 5003).
- d. Evaluate the situation and request necessary logistic support from the Base Maintenance Officer to contain the spill and facilitate recovery or mopping up action.
- e. Upon arrival at the scene, the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director or his representative will assume command and will direct further containment and clean up activities.
- 3. Supplies and Materials. Base Maintenance Officer will provide the basic materials and equipment necessary to contain and mop up on-base spills. The U. S. Coast Guard will be contacted for equipment and assistance in the event of a major spill.
- 4. Reports. A report of oil spills and other hazardous substance discharges in the inland navigable waters of the United States and the coastal water including between 3 and 12 miles from the coast will be made immediately by the Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Director or his representative to:
 - a. Base Maintenance Officer.
 - b. Assistant Chief of Staff, Facilities, Marine Corps Base.
- c. Captain of the Port, Room 101, Federal Building, Wilmington, North Carolina 28401 (telephone 919 763-9435).



- In every case, a report of the incident will be made to the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code LFF). Incidents of a serious nature, which require urgent action at the Headquarters level, or may result in adverse news coverage or public relations, will be reported by message.
 - 5. Small Spills. Occurrence of small gasoline and fuel oil spills on refueling aprons are very common. Gasoline and fuel oil spilled on refueling aprons will not be flushed into any ditch or storm sewer. To reduce the pollution and fire hazard, the spill will be covered with sand obtained from a nearby storage bin. As the sand absorbs the fuel, it will be taken up and returned to the storage bin after evaporation or placed into the sanitary landfill as required. Sand can be obtained by calling Base Maintenance Department (telephone 3001).
 - 6. Restoration of Damaged Area. Grounds around grease racks and maintenance buildings that have been severely damaged by oil and grease will be restored to their natural state. If necessary, the contaminated soil will be removed and replaced with clean soil and reseeded.



Sloppy housekeeping was evident as oil was all around the area.
- 2. We are preparing a letter relative to the situation. I would like to arrange periodic aerial inspections of the bay as I think we have a serious oil problem at Courthouse Bay which must be pursued and corrected.

 The purpose of this letter is to inform concerned base officials information regarding the subject oil spill gathered during reference (a) while carrying out procedures contained in reference (b).

- 2. Mr. Sharpe arrived on the scene at approximately 1020. The on-scene weather was cloudy and grounds were rain saturated and runoff was occurring. Mr. Sharpe found an estimated 20 gallons of #6 fuel oil on the ground and on top of puddles of rain water. Base Maintenance personnel supervised by Mr. Fulcher xx had contained the oil using topsoil.
- 3. At approximately 1030, Mr. William Boone and Mr. Bob Ellis arrived and identified themselves as Midland Oil Company employees and stated that they had come to cleanup oil spill. Mr. Ellis stated that he was the driver of the truck and that he was responsible for the spill. He stated that while unloading fuel at 0100 on the same day that a gasket had fallen out of the hose used to unload the fuel from tanker into tanks. He stated that because of the darkness and the down pour of rain that he did not discover the problem until the spill had already occurred. He stated that he tried his best to contain the oil using soil from the surrounding area. After informing the attendant at the Heating Plant he left. Mr. Boone said he was in charge of the cleanup. Mr. Sharpe informed Mr. Boon that the oil had to be cleaned up immediately due to the danger of rain water washing it into streams. Mr. Boone brought enough absorbant and hand tools to apply it and for shoveling. Mr. Boone requested that Base Maintenance Department furnish a load of soil and absorbant and a truck to haul it to base landfill.

Mr. Boone stated that he and Mr. Ellis would do all the hand work.

Mr. Fulcher supervised the cleanup and kept records of Base Maintenance Department input in the event that efforts to secure reimbursement from the contractor were to be initiated.





- 1. The purpose of this letter is to provide a statement regarding the subject incident further described in reference (a), as requested by Maj Okland during reference (b). Maj Okland has been designated (see reference (c)) to conduct an official investigation into the incident. My observations regarding the subject incident are as follows:
- a. On 24 January 1980, while reviewing waste oil handling procedures by various units located in the 1800 Area, I visited Building 1841. Prior to the visit, Pierre Wilkes, temporary employee with Forestry Branch, had reported seeing oily substance in runoff from the lost surrounding Building 1841. Upon arriving at the site, I reported to the Regimental Sergeant (Sergeant Whipkey) who accompanied me on a tour of the facilities. Sgt Whipkey advised me that deficiencies in the handling of petroleum products and wastes had been a continuing problem at the location.
- b. While touring the grounds, I observed the following deficiencies, the location of which are shown on enclosure (1):
 - (1) Used lubricants poured onto ground.
- (2) Approximately 20 gallons of waste oil poured into drop inlet and ditch.
- (3) Leaking motor oil and paint thinner barrels. Oil and thinner had saturated an area of approximately 600 square feet and had run across the parking lot for a distance of 75 feet.

21 August 1980

- 1. This spill is a serious one which has potential to harm marine resources in New River. It is a violation of the oil spill prevention countermeasure regulations and the Clean Air Act. This spill, as others, resulted from a total lack of regard for the laws and regulations and as a result of dereliction on the part of persons responsible. For example, Mr. Wooten of Base Maintenance was told by a Lieutenant at the scene that he had better things to do than worry about oil being spilled on the ground. This spill was not the result of an accident, but resulted from inadequate procedures to prevent the occurrence.
- 2. The Coast Guard was on the scene and took a statement from Mr. Wooten as a witness, and also collected samples of New River. The Coast Guard has indicated that several local fishermen have made reports to the state regarding oil from the Base in New River polluting shell fish. Last Friday, Mr. Wakild of the Wilmington Regional Office of the North Carolina Department of Natural Resources and Community Development indicated he was preparing a letter to the Base Traday granting North Carolina authority to inspect and cite violators of oil spills. Therefore, we can expect some enforcement action. Violation can result in civil and criminal charges.
- 3. MCB Department of Natural Resources is not receiving the necessary cooperation to enforce the Base's Oil Spill Countermeasure Plan. Mr. Wooten believes he lacks direct enforcement authority and therefore cannot enforce the regulation without command support.
- 4. Recommendation: I recommend MCB convene an investigation under the Assistant Chief ofStaff, Facilities, with input from Natural Resources, to determine responsibility for this incident and possible disciplinary action. Prior efforts to obtain cooperation from units of 2d Marine Division appear to be unsuccessful.



- This letter is in reply to your request for comments on reference (a). Base has an active oil pollution abatement and oil recycling and conservation program. Basic instructions are contained in references (b) and (c) and have been implemented. As a result, approximately 130,000 gallons of petroleum products are being recovered annually. In January 1980, approximately 155,000 gallons were sold by Defense Property Disposal Office for approximately \$30.000.
- Base Comptroller has requested, as authorized by reference (a), that Defense Property Disposal Office return the proceeds of waste oil sales to base for use in environmental programs.
- 3. One of the primary uses the purchasers of this waste oil are making is as fuel. The waste oil contains contaminants such as paint thinners, transmission fluids, etc., which prevent re-refining for use as lubricants. In this regard, the Environmental Protection Agency's proposal to classify waste oil as hazardous waste may present a problem.
- None of the oil disposal practices such as road dust control, etc. are authorized aboard base. Some waste oil is being burned for Base Fire Department and Marine Corps Air Station (H), New River crash crew training.
- Significant progress has been made toward accomplishing action on items 3b-3f of reference (a). Examples are as follows:
- a. Base Maintenance Department budgets two man years for waste oil recovery. Work involves routine pumping out of waste oil storage tanks and maintenance of oil/water separators.
- b. Approximately 1/3 of the Supervisory Ecologist's time is spent on oil pollution abatement and oil conservation and recycling programs.
- c. An additional billet was requested during a recent Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs TMR Review for the purpose of accelerating all oil pollution abatement and fuel conservation programs.




1. Purpose. To issue revised Department of Defense (DOD) policy regarding recovery, reclamation, and reuse of used lubricating oils.

2. Information

a. The Marine Corps and other DOD activities require an adequate supply of various types and grades of lubricating oils to operate industrial equipment, vehicles, and aircraft.

b. Lubricating oil base stocks have decreased to a critically low level because of the worldwide demand for, and scarcity of, petroleum fuels. The refining industry has indicated that the ability to reduce the demand for lubricating and industrial oils depends on supplementing virgin stocks with professionally refined used stocks.

- c. The most energy conservative and environmentally acceptable disposal of used lubricating oils is re-refining and reuse. As an alternative, used lubricating oils have been burned in activity heating plants as a fuel or fuel supplement. The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) current plans to classify used lubricating oil as a hazardous waste (see reference (a)) will significantly complicate the burning of used lubricating oil.
- d. To promote the overall objective of utilizing used lubricating oil as an asset rather than as a waste product, the DOD has authorized that net proceeds from the sale of such oil may be used at the discretion of activity commanders for accomplishing special projects related to environmental improvement and/or energy conservation.
- 3. Action. Activity commanders shall:
- a. Discontinue all current used lubricating oil disposal practices which are not environmentally acceptable, including weed control, insect control, road dust control, open pit burning, dumping into landfills, etc.
 - b. Maximize the recovery and collection of used lubricating oil to include:
- (1) Identification of sources not being recovered and instituting new procedures to recover this additional oil, as required.

(2) Encouraging voluntary participation of military/civilian employees, who change the crankcase oil in their personal vehicles, to deliver the recovered oil to a Marine Corps collection point. Cooperative programs with local business, civic, and governmental organizations might also be considered.

- c. Utilize the services of the Defense Property Disposal Offices to accomplish the sale of recovered lubricating oil for the purpose of re-refining. (Reference (b) applies.)
- d. Burn the used lubricating oil as a fuel in boilers, if no reasonable arrangements can be made for recovery by re-refining. In determining reasonableness, economics alone shall not be considered as sufficient justification for burning used lubricating oil; environmental effects and conservation shall also be considered.
- e. Investigate ways to reduce the generation of used lubricating oil through good preventive maintenance, optimizing oil drain intervals, etc.
- f. Accomplish locally desired special projects related to environmental improvement and/or energy conservation using net proceeds from the sale of used lubricating oils.
- g. Keep accurate records for review by inspecting officials, regarding the following:
 - (1) Volume of used lubricating oil generated.
- (2) Volume of used lubricating oil recovered for sale and volume recovered for burning
 - (3) Revenue from sale.
