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PREFACE

A work like this, covering over 58 years of the command's history, is a collaborative effort. Most of the information from 1943 through 1974 came from an earlier work compiled by Lloyd H. Cornett, Jr., and MSgt James H. McDermid and published by the then-ATC History and Research Division entitled "Bases, Bosses, and Budgets of Air Training Command 1943-1974." Information from 1942 and after 1974 came from the command histories compiled by the current historians and our many predecessors.

Finding new photographs for this study led us to the collection of yearbooks and class books maintained in the AETC History Office. These books provided photographic insights into the various eras portrayed in this study. Including pictures from them gives us glimpses into the past. Graphic artist Joe Beach from the Randolph Multimedia Center created the artwork that graces this cover. We thank him for his time and talent in adapting the design from the cover of a Barksdale Field yearbook, circa 1947.

We owe special thanks to Mrs Patricia E. Parrish, who took on the tremendous task of laying out the entire study. She spent countless hours rearranging the data and fitting in the pictures, adding immeasurably to the book's eye-catching appeal. Her work has captured something of the spirit of AETC's past and has made this volume far better than it otherwise would have been. Any errors of fact or interpretation are ours alone.

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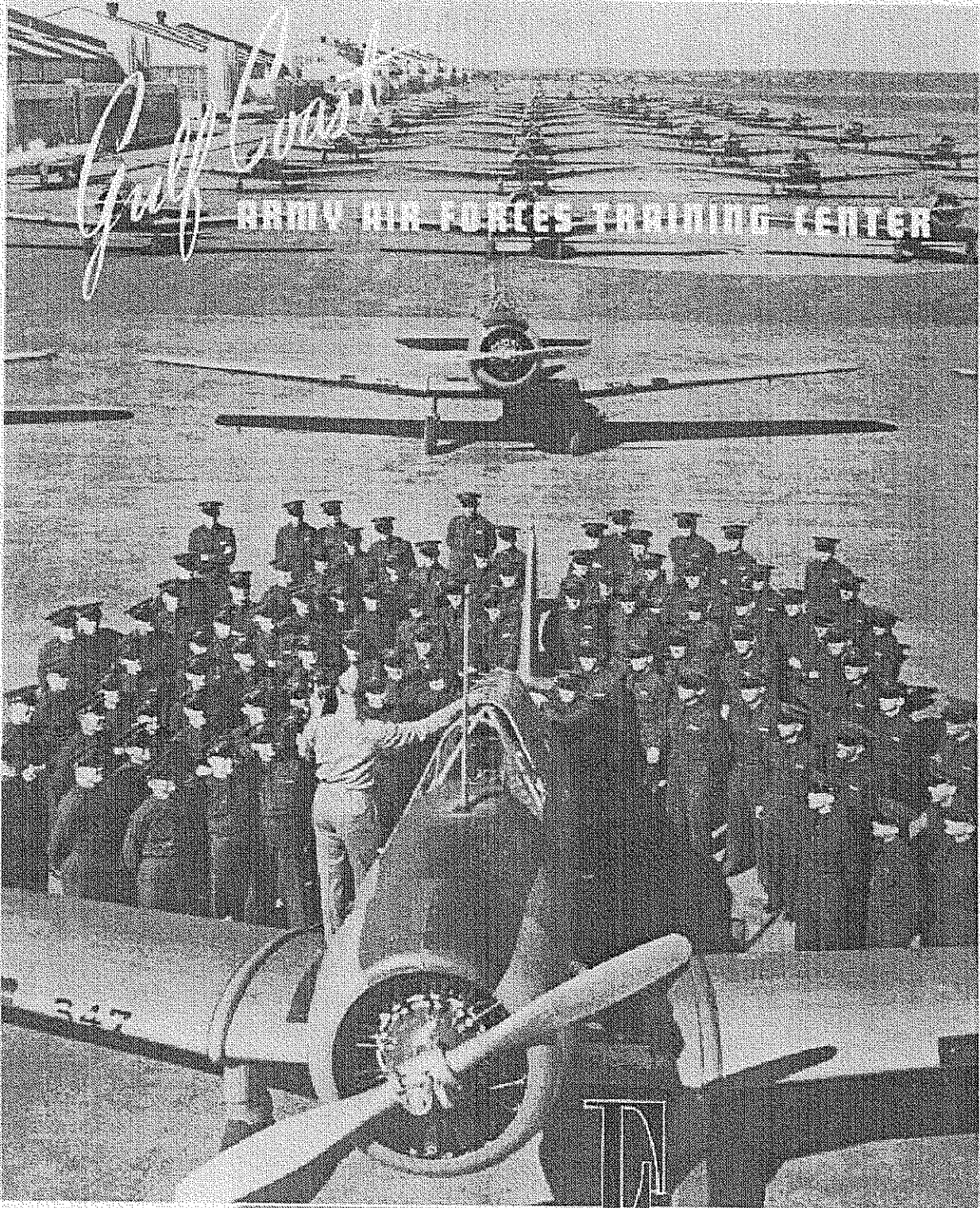
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PROLOGUE

Born during the hurly-burly days of World War II, Air Education and Training Command (AETC) traces its lineage to 23 January 1942 when the Chief of the Army Air Forces received authorization to establish the Army Air Corps Flying Training Command in Washington, D.C., under the command of Maj Gen Barton K. Yount. The young command had a single mission— flying training. On 15 March 1942, the organization became the Army Air Forces Flying Training Command. A little over a year later, on 31 July 1943, that mission expanded to include military and technical training when the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command merged with the Army Air Forces Flying Training Command, and the War Department redesignated the organization as the Army Air Forces Training Command (AAFTC). The merger created an organization with over one million people assigned at over 600 training installations, including 375 devoted to flying training.

Since those hectic years of World War II, the men and women of AETC have responded to the surges in training requirements brought about by the Korean War, the war in Vietnam, the Cold War, and then adjusted to the periodic downsizing that a return to peace always signaled. During these decades, AETC added and deleted various missions. It gained and then lost operational aircrew training in the 1950s only to have it return in the 1990s. It picked up responsibility for recruiting in 1954. It also assumed responsibility for the Air Force's educational mission when Air University (AU) became a part of ATC first between 1978 and 1983 and again in 1993 when AU was reassigned to the command. As the new millennium dawns, the command is responsible for special, continuing, and professional military education in addition to recruiting and basic military, technical, and flying training.

This study focuses on the evolution of the command over the past three generations, the changes in organization and basing structure over the years, and the acquisition of new missions and responsibilities. It lists the commanders of AETC and its predecessor organizations, his staff, and the commanders of the various units in the field. The study also contains population figures, budget data, and the number of students graduating from command courses over the years. Looking at the myriad changes that occurred during the last 58 years, it is probably safe to assume that even more dramatic shifts lie ahead.



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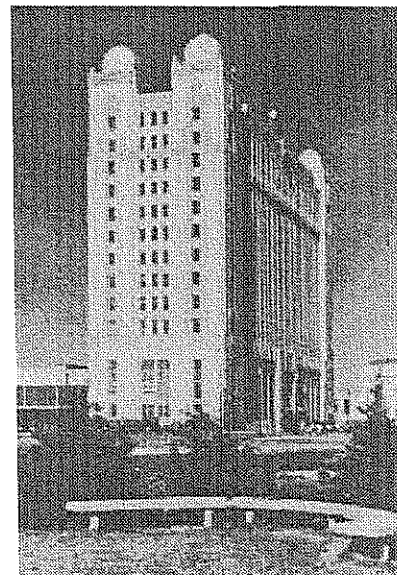

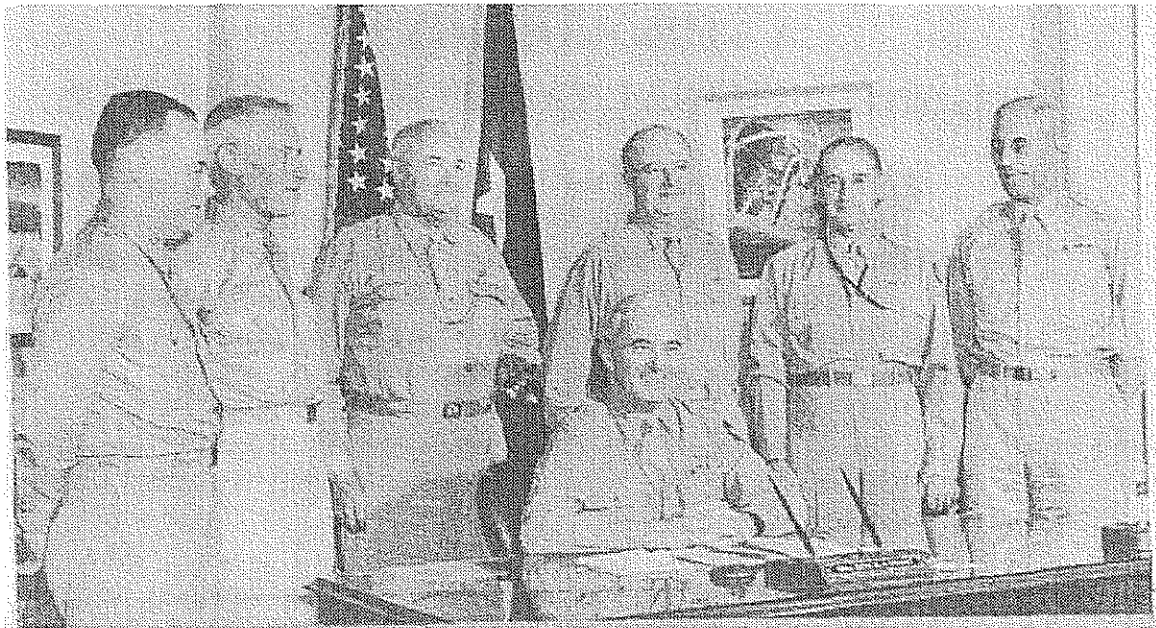

A CHRONOLOGY OF ORGANIZATIONAL CHANGES IN THE HQS

- 23 Jan 42 **Air Education and Training Command (AETC) traces its lineage to 23 Jan 42 when the War Department constituted and activated the Air Corps Flying Training Command at Washington, D.C. The photograph on page 2 shows the Gulf Coast Army Air Forces Training Center at Randolph Field, Texas, one of the major components of the new flying training command.**
- 15 Mar 42 The War Department redesignated the Air Corps Flying Training Command as the Army Air Forces Flying Training Command (AAFFTC).
- 16 Mar 42 The War Department approved General Yount's request to align his staff under the general staff, or "G," organization. Those organizations included Personnel, Intelligence, Operations, and Materiel. In addition, the headquarters had seven special staff sections: Judge Advocate, Inspector General, Finance, Ordnance, Signal, Medical, and Quartermaster. A few months later a Chemical Warfare section was added.*
- Apr 42 A Public Relations Office came into existence.
- 1 Jul 42 **Army Air Forces Flying Training Command moved its headquarters from Washington, D.C., to the Texas and Pacific Railroad building (at right) in Fort Worth, Texas.**



*The first Staff Quartermaster was Maj Buford R. Nyquist, 1 Jul 42. Two weeks later, on 15 Jul 42, Maj Bernard Case became the first Signal chief and Maj William R. Huber, the first Ordnance director. On 19 Oct 42, Maj Archbold R. Jones became the first chief of the Chemical Warfare section. By 28 Jul 43, A-4, Materiel had absorbed the Chemical Warfare, Ordnance, Signal, and Quartermaster functions. However, by Jan 48 Air Installations, Quartermaster, Ordnance, and Chemical were part of the special staff again until the headquarters reorganization of Nov 48 when all four went under DCS/Materiel.

8 Aug 42 At the direction of the War Department, the headquarters changed from "G" staff designations to "A" staff.

G-1 Personnel.....	A-1 Personnel
G-2 Intelligence	A-2 Intelligence
G-3 Operations.....	A-3 Operations
G-4 Materiel.....	A-4 Materiel

31 Jul 43 The War Department inactivated Army Air Forces Technical Training Command and transferred its mission to Army Air Forces Flying Training Command. At the same time, the flying training command was redesignated as Army Air Forces Training Command to show it had responsibility for flying, technical, and basic military training.

28 Aug 43 The headquarters established a Deputy Chief of Staff (DCS) for Flying Training and a DCS for Technical Training to supervise flying and technical training activities. Both were dropped by Dec 45.

- 18 Oct 43 A Management Control Section came into existence, reporting to the Chief of Staff. It had three units assigned: Organizational Planning, Manpower, and Statistical.
- 10 Jul 44 Within the headquarters, senior staff established a Deputy Commander for Flexible Gunnery.
- 1 Aug 44 The headquarters established a Plans Section, reporting to the Chief of Staff, to produce post-war plans.

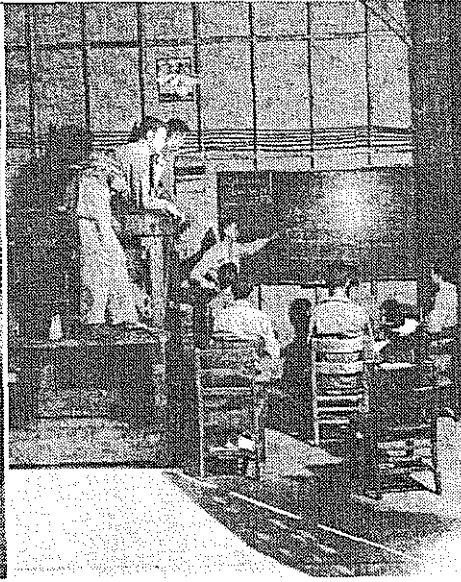
- 28 Feb 46 **Army Air Forces Training Command completed the transfer of its headquarters from Fort Worth to Barksdale Field, Louisiana. At right is a photo of the Barksdale headquarters building.**



- 1 Jul 46 The War Department redesignated Army Air Forces Training Command as Air Training Command (ATC).
- 7 Oct 46 Air Installations became a special staff section, but by Nov 48 it was again under DCS/Materiel.
- 1 Nov 46 Air Training Command inactivated its Flying and Technical Training Commands and organized three major subordinate divisions: Flying Training at Randolph Field, Texas; Technical Training at Scott Field, Illinois; and Indoctrination in San Antonio.
- 21 Jun 48 The Budget and Fiscal Officer was given equal rank with other members of the general staff and renamed Staff Comptroller.
- 12 Nov 48 The Chaplain position moved from A-1 and became a separate staff section, with the title of Air Chaplain.

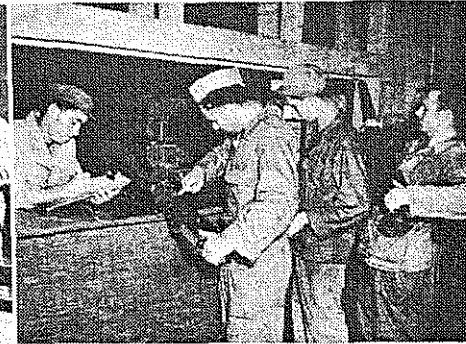

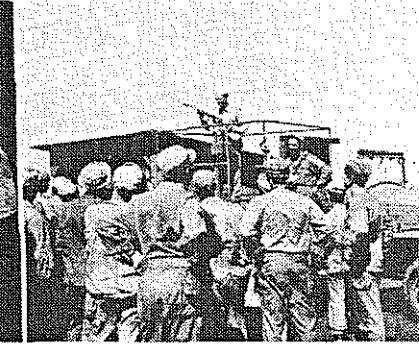

On 16 Jun 41, the Southeast Air Corps Training Center assumed jurisdiction of the Air Corps Gunnery School at Tyndall Field, Florida. When the Training Department opened in Aug 41, its initial task was instructor training. The first class of gunners began training in Feb 42. During World War II, thousands of aerial gunners received their silver wings from what quickly became the largest flexible gunnery school in AAF Training Command.

16 Nov 48

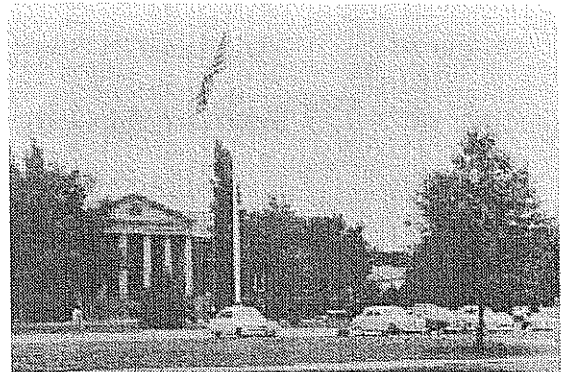
Throughout the Air Force the older "A" designations were dropped in favor of the DCS designations:

Staff Comptroller	DCS/Comptroller Office (included Finance Office)

The newly created position of Deputy Commanding General, predecessor of today's vice commander appeared in Air Training Command.

17 Oct 49

Air Training Command completed the move of its headquarters from Barksdale to Scott AFB, Illinois.



14 Nov 49

The position of Deputy Commanding General became Deputy Commanding General for Administration.

When ATC inactivated the Flying Training, Indoctrination, and Technical Training Divisions, subordinate organizations which had been established on 1 Nov 46, the functions returned to the headquarters. Consequently, the ATC commanding general established a Deputy Commanding General for Flying Training and a Deputy Commanding General for Technical Training.

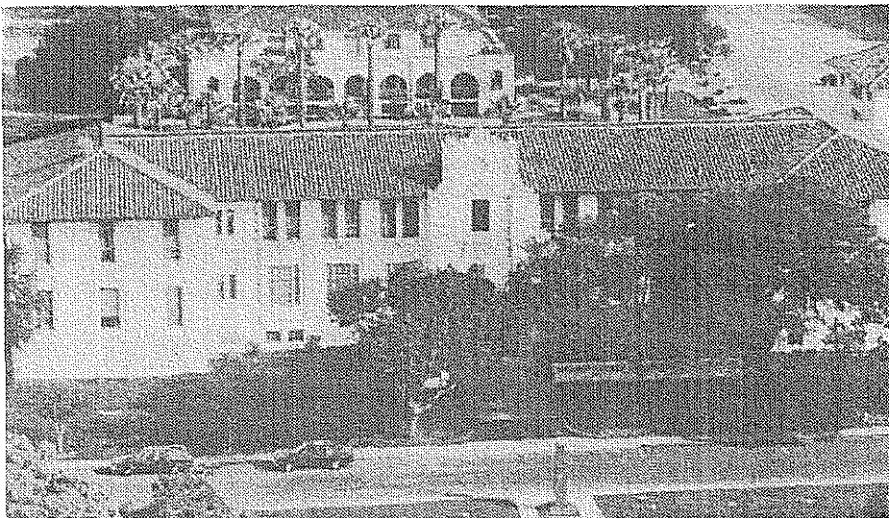
1 Apr 50

The headquarters established a Vice Commander position, replacing Deputy Commanding General for Administration.

The ATC commander renamed his Deputy Commanding General for Flying Training position as Deputy Commander, Flying.

Deputy Commanding General for Technical Training became Deputy Commander, Technical.

- 1951 In response to a major increase in aircraft accidents, the ATC commander established a Director of Flight Safety and assigned the position to DCS/Operations.
- 1 May 51 With the establishment of Flying Training Air Force at Waco, Texas, HQ ATC closed its Deputy Commander, Flying office.
- 16 Jul 51 HQ ATC discontinued its Deputy Commander, Technical position when it established Technical Training Air Force at Gulfport, Mississippi.
- 15 Oct 51 DCS/Programming established.
- Jan-May 52 The Public Information Office became the Office of Information Services.
- 9 Jun 52 History moved from the Adjutant General's Office to the Office of Information Services.
- 12 Aug 54 Established DCS/Installations.
- 6 Dec 54 Reserve Affairs Officer position established; dissolved 9 May 55.
DCS/Comptroller dropped "office" from its title.
- 1 Feb 55 DCS/Programming dissolved and became a part of DCS/Operations.
- 3 Oct 55 DCS/Operations was renamed DCS/Plans and Operations.
- 1 Mar 56 DCS/Manpower and Organization established; reduced to a directorate on 15 Dec 58. This position was filled by Col James R. Nuzum, Jr., 1 Mar 56 - 31 Mar 58; and Col John A. Rouse, 1 Apr 58 - 15 Dec 58.



1 Aug-30 Sep 57—HQ ATC relocated from Scott AFB, Illinois, to Randolph AFB, Texas, moving into Building 900, which originally served as the aviation cadet administration building.

1 Oct 57 Control of Scott AFB transferred from ATC to Military Air Transport Command.

1 Nov 57 HQ ATC established a Directorate of Procurement, DCS/Materiel. It replaced the Procurement and Production Division, Directorate of Supply and Services, DCS/Materiel.

15 Dec 58 DCS/Plans and Operations renamed DCS/Plans, Programs, and Operations Services.

With the inactivation of Flying Training and Technical Training Air Forces, management of flying and technical training returned to HQ ATC and its new DCS/Flying Training and DCS/Technical Training.

21 Apr 59 DCS/Installations became DCS/Civil Engineering.

8 Jul 59 ATC inactivated the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing. In its place, the command activated HQ USAF Recruiting Service.

1 Oct 59 The Office of Information Services was replaced by the Office of Information.

7 Jun 61 The position of Adjutant General was replaced by the Director of Administration.

1 Mar 65 DCS/Flying Training became DCS/Operations, and DCS/Plans, Programs, and Operations Services became DCS/Plans. Flying activities fell under Operations as did the command post, weather, and operation services. DCS/Operations transferred responsibility for monitoring OTS and general military training to DCS/Technical Training.

1 Jul 65 Headquarters USAF Recruiting Service moved to Randolph AFB.

30 Sep 66 DCS/Plans set up a Military Assistance Program (MAP) Directorate.

1 May 69 The History and Research Division realigned from the Office of Information to the ATC Chief of Staff.

Feb 70 The Director of MAP became the Director of Military Assistance.

1 Oct 70 New office of the Senior Airman Advisor established.

15 Dec 70 The Office of Foreign Military Affairs was established. It replaced the Military Assistance Directorate in DCS/Plans.

1 Oct 71 Communications/Electronics Support Office established.

- 1 Dec 71 In the headquarters, DCS/Logistics replaced DCS/Materiel.
- 1 Mar 72 The USAF Recruiting Service commander gained a second title, that of DCS/Recruiting Service. This move saved several personnel authorizations as the organization no longer needed its own comptroller, materiel, or personnel functions.
- 1 May 73 The President of the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) was also on the ATC staff as DCS/Community College Affairs.

- 1 Mar 75 DCS/Civil Engineering became DCS/Engineering and Services.
- 15 Mar 75 The Security Police Directorate moved out of the Office of the Inspector General and became a special staff activity.
- 1 Feb 76 At the direction of the ATC commander, DCS/Technical Training was replaced by co-equal offices reporting directly to the commander— the Assistant Chief of Staff for Technical Training Operations and Assistant Chief of Staff for Technical Training Support.
- Mar - Jul 76 Some time during this four-month period, the title of the Senior Airman Advisor was changed to Senior Enlisted Advisor.
- 1 Jun 76 Air Training Command closed its Office of Foreign Military Affairs and, in its place, activated the Foreign Military Affairs Training Group. The group reported to HQ ATC.
- 31 May 77 The ATC commander announced establishment of an Assistant for Readiness as a special office reporting directly to him.
- 15 Aug 77 The headquarters reestablished the DCS/Technical Training, replacing the offices of the Assistant Chiefs of Staff for Technical Training Operations and Technical Training Support.
- 29 Mar 78 ATC established DCS/Education prior to the transfer of Air University to the command.
- 15 May 78 ATC assumed command of Air University.
- 10 Jul 78 ATC established a new Readiness Directorate within DCS/Plans to provide a single manager of disaster preparedness, command post functions, and plans.
- 16 Aug 78 At the direction of the ATC commander, DCS/Community College Affairs ceased to exist. The DCS/Education picked up staff responsibility for CCAF.
- 1 Oct 79 The Office of Information became the Office of Public Affairs.
- 1 Jun 83 Directorate of Data Automation, DCS/Comptroller renamed as the Directorate for Computer Resources, a special staff activity reporting directly to the commander.
- 1 Jul 83 With the establishment of Air University as a separate command, ATC eliminated its DCS/Education and created an Assistant Chief of Staff, Commissioning Programs as part of the headquarters.

- 1 Oct 84 DCS/Information Systems came into existence when the Computer Resources and the Communications-Electronics Directorates merged.
- 16 Oct 86 DCS/Information Systems became DCS/Communications.
- 1 Jan 87 The Readiness Directorate transferred from DCS/Plans to DCS/Operations, and the latter was redesignated DCS/Operations and Readiness.
- 16 Feb 87 The San Antonio Joint Military Medical Command activated. The ATC Command Surgeon was dual-hatted as the JMMC commander.
- 1 Apr 87 DCS/Plans changed its name to DCS/Plans and Requirements.
- DCS/Recruiting Service became DCS/Recruiting Service and Commissioning Program as ATC disestablished the Assistant Chief of Staff, Commissioning Programs. Responsibility for the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps and Officer Training School transferred from the Assistant Chief of Staff for Commissioning Programs to Recruiting Service's new directorate for commissioning programs. The ATC commander realigned Community College of the Air Force and the 3340th School Squadron (NCO Academy) under DCS/Technical Training.
- 8 Jun 87 In addition to its Foreign Military Affairs Training Group, ATC established a Foreign Military Training Affairs Directorate under DCS/Plans and Requirements. The group commander was dual-hatted as the chief of the directorate.
- 26 Jun 87 Two other functions related to foreign training (the Defense Language Institute English Language Center and Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training) became management responsibilities of DCS/Plans and Requirements.
- 15 Oct 87 DCS/Medical Services and Training replaced the office of the ATC Surgeon.
- 16 Feb 89 DCS/Communications changed its name to DCS/Communications Computer Systems.
- 1 Apr 89 The Director of Information Management replaced the Director of Administration.
- 27 Jul 90 A Commander's Action Group went into operation in the headquarters.

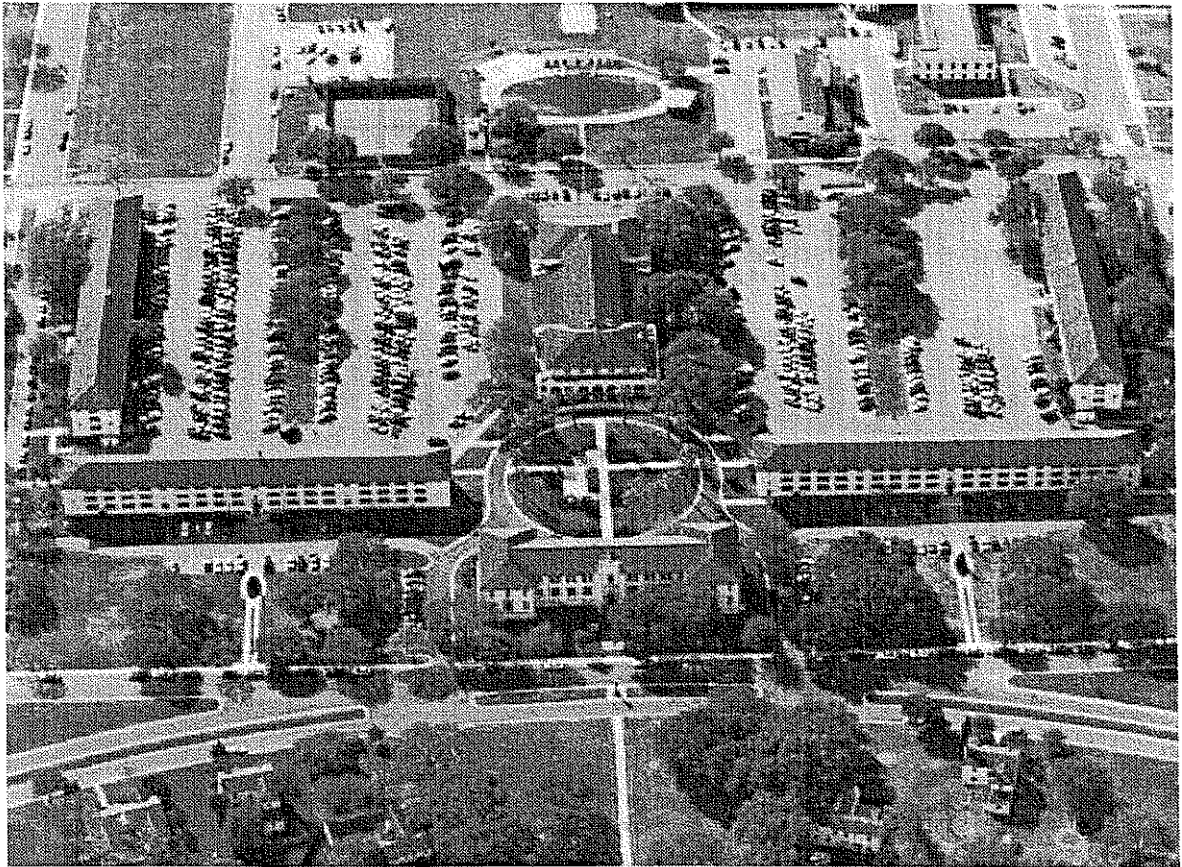
- 1 Oct 90 The Air Force Security Assistance Training Group replaced the Foreign Military Affairs Training Group. At the same time, the group was realigned from DCS/Plans and Requirements to the ATC vice commander.
- The Security Police special staff activity was realigned as a directorate under the Inspector General.
- 15 May 91 ATC established a Quality Council within the headquarters to oversee and support quality implementation throughout the command.
- 1 Jul 91 ATC established a Quality Improvement Office in the headquarters.
- 1 Sep 91 Morale, Welfare, and Recreation became a special staff activity. Prior to that, it was part of DCS/Personnel.
- 1 Oct 91 The San Antonio Joint Military Medical Command inactivated.
- The DCS/Comptroller was renamed DCS/Financial Management and Comptroller.
- 1 Dec 91 DCS/Operations and Readiness became DCS/Operations.
- 1 Sep 92 The Air Force merged morale, welfare and recreation with services to form a single organization known as morale, welfare, recreation and services.
- 1 Feb 93 The Chief of Staff of the Air Force eliminated the position of chief of staff and hence the title deputy chief of staff at the major command level. Consequently, HQ ATC established an Executive Services Division, which incorporated those functions formerly under the Chief of Staff. The title deputy chief of staff became director, and the organizations became directorates.
- 1 Jul 93 With the merger of ATC and Air University, HQ USAF redesignated Air Training Command as Air Education and Training Command (AETC).
- The Security Police function became a special staff activity.
- AETC combined the plans and operations functions into a Directorate of Plans and Operations.
- 1 Jan 94 Directorate of Morale, Welfare, Recreation, and Services became the Directorate of Services.

- 1 Mar 94 In a change that took place Air Force-wide, the civil engineering function became civil engineer.
- 1 Apr 94 HQ USAF redesignated USAF Recruiting Service as Air Force Recruiting Service.
- 13 Dec 94 Directorate of Financial Management and Comptroller was changed to Comptroller.
- 1 Apr 95 Director of Staff replaced Director of Executive Services.

- 1 May 96 Directorate of Communications and Information created with the merger of the Directorates of Communications Computer Systems and Information Management.
- 12 Dec 96 HQ AETC merged its management engineering and quality functions to form the Quality and Management Innovation Flight which reported to DCS/Plans and Operations.
- 1 Jan 97 AETC replaced the Directorate of Plans and Operations with a Directorate of Plans and Programs and a Directorate of Operations. The Directorate of Technical Training merged into the Directorate of Operations.
- 1 Jul 97 In a change that took place Air Force-wide, the Security Police became known as Security Forces.

Along with this change, ATC established an Assistant Chief of Staff for Commissioning Programs (Col Bobby G. Waddle, 1 Jul 83 - 30 Sep 85; Col William D. Reese, 1 Oct 85 - 1 Apr 87). HQ ATC disestablished the organization on 1 Apr 87 and transferred its responsibilities to Recruiting Service and Commissioning Programs. Ten years later HQ USAF again merged AU with ATC and redesignated the command as Air Education and Training Command. This time around, the AU commander retained policy development responsibilities as Director of Education on the AETC staff.



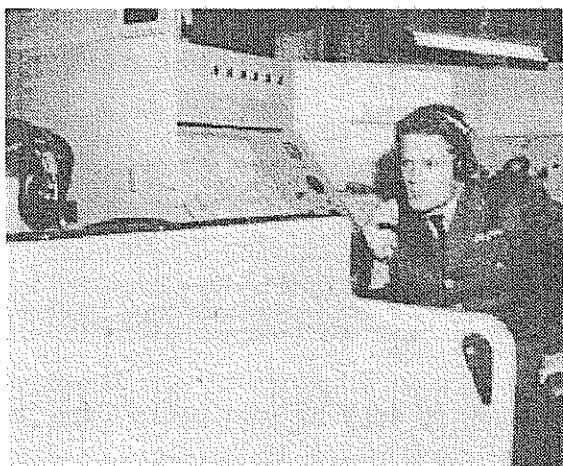

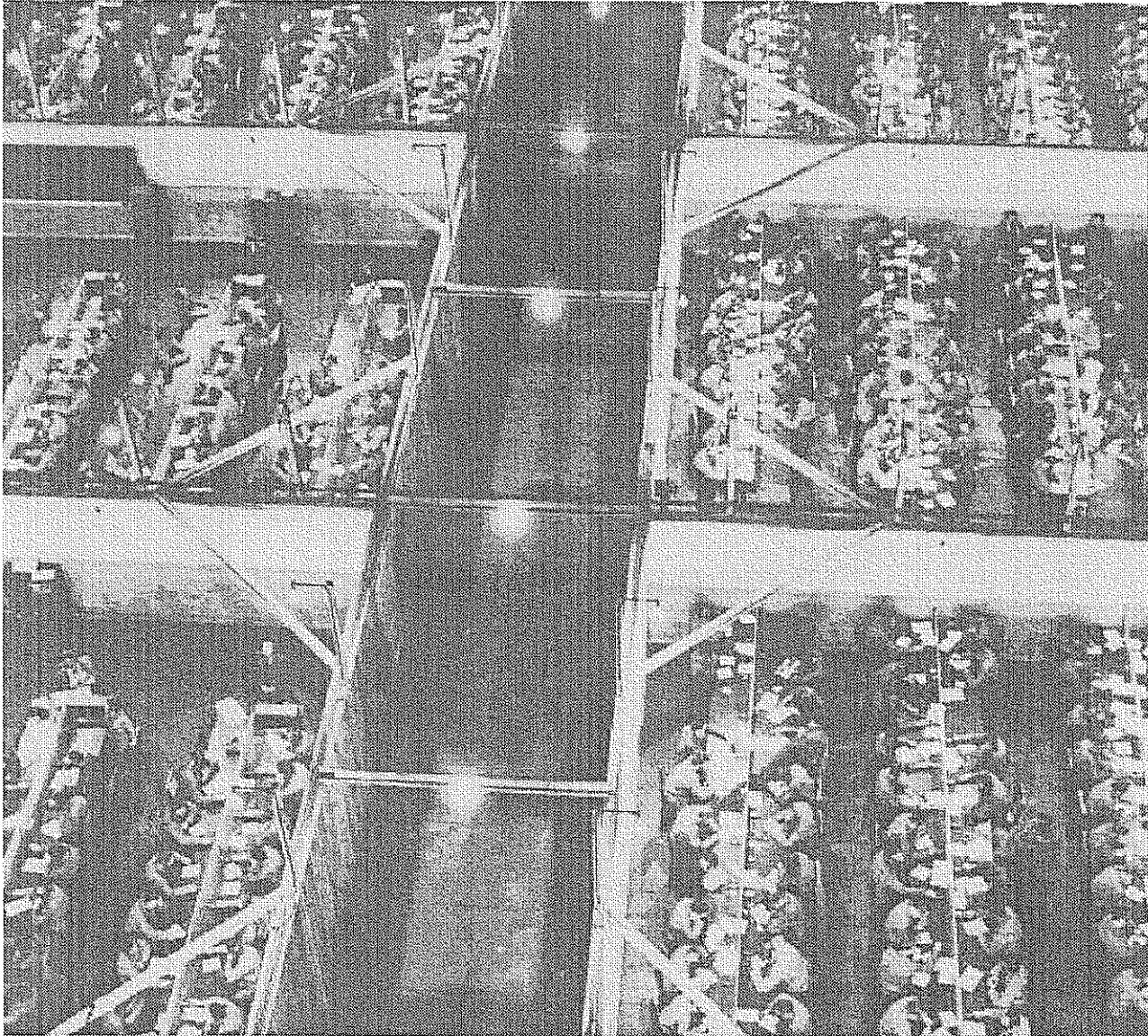

COLUMBUS AFB, MISSISSIPPI



The War Department activated Columbus Army Air Field on 23 Jul 41. Columbus became a part of the Air Corps Flying Training Command on 23 Jan 42. It conducted flying training and contract flying training until transferred to Air Technical Service Command on 6 Jun 45. The field was reassigned to Army Air Forces Training Command on 23 Nov 45. Columbus was placed on "reduced activity status" between Jan-Mar 46 and inactivated 15 Aug 46. Its name changed to Columbus AFB on 24 Jun 48. Air Training Command activated the base on 20 Dec 50 as a primary installation. Columbus transferred to Strategic Air Command on 1 Apr 55 and was reassigned to Air Training Command on 1 Jul 69.

On 1 Jul 93, AETC assigned the host wing to Nineteenth Air Force. Five years later, on 10 Jul 98, Columbus AFB had the distinction of hosting the first flying training wing commanded by a woman.

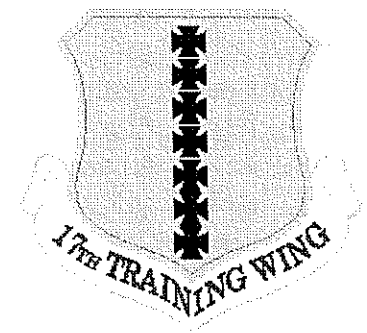

GOODFELLOW AFB, TEXAS

The War Department established a new airfield at San Angelo, Texas, on 17 Aug 40 for the purpose of operating a basic flying training school. On 11 Jun 41, it was named Goodfellow Field in honor of 2d Lt John James Goodfellow of San Angelo, who died during aerial combat in France on 14 Sep 18. The field became part of Air Corps Flying Training Command on 23 Jan 42. On 1 May 47, the War Department inactivated Goodfellow Field, but ATC reactivated it on 1 Dec 47 as a pilot training base. It became Goodfellow AFB on 13 Jan 48. On 1 Oct 58, the Air Force transferred control of Goodfellow from ATC to USAF Security Service. The base was reassigned to ATC on 1 Jul 78. On 1 Mar 85, ATC activated the Goodfellow Technical Training Center; HQ USAF redesignated it as the Goodfellow Training Center on 1 Feb 92. Over a year later, on 1 Jul 93, AETC activated the 17th Training Wing at Goodfellow AFB, inactivating the training center on the same day. The wing reported to Second Air Force.



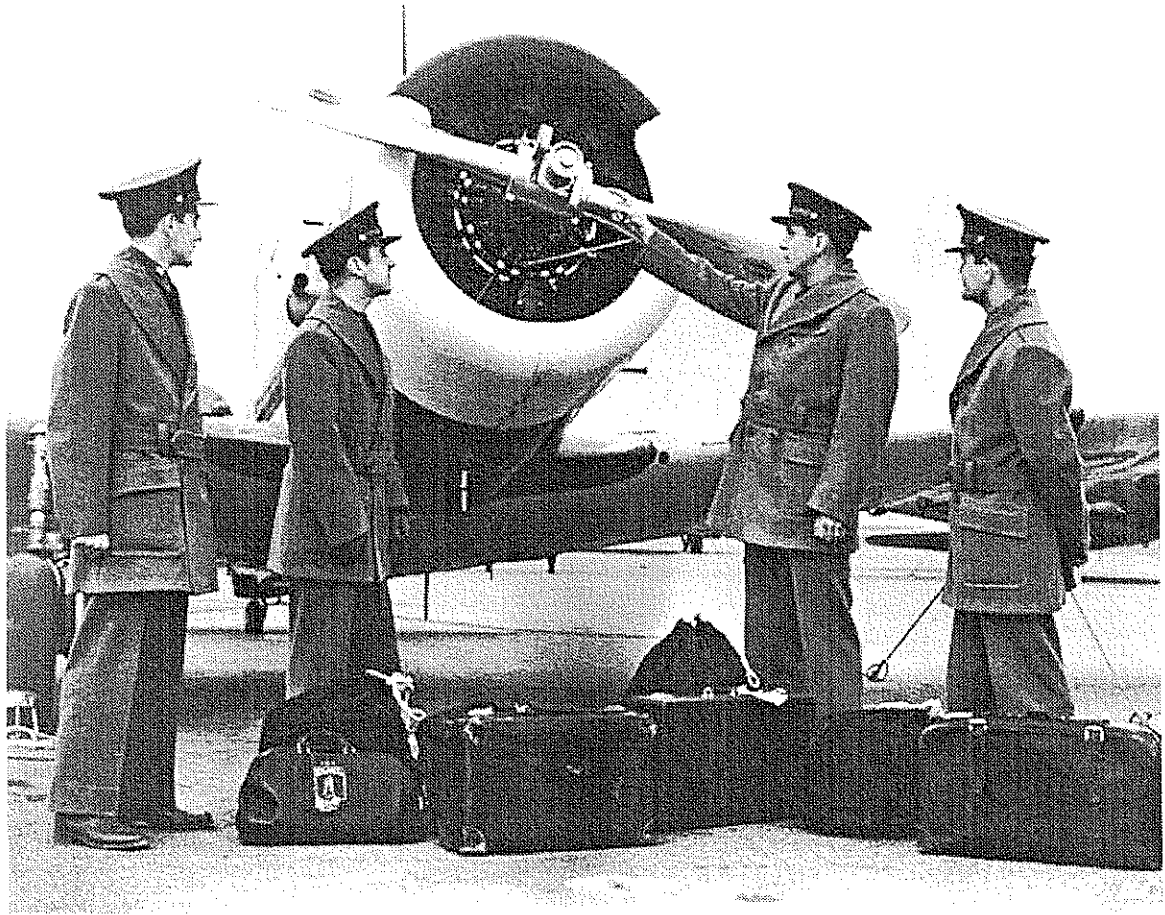

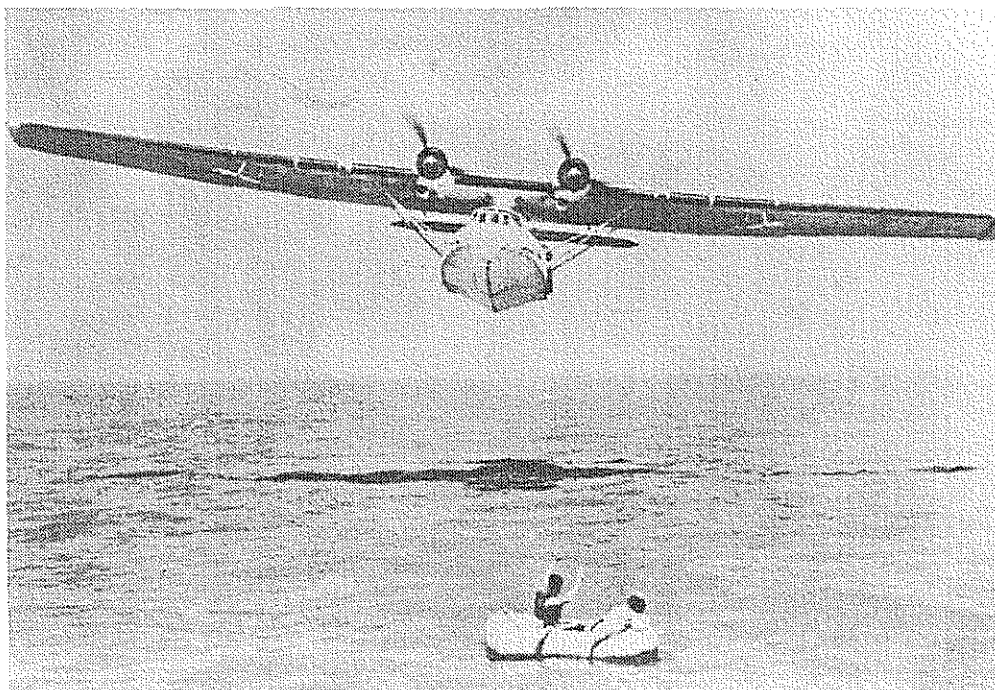

KEESLER AFB, MISSISSIPPI

The War Department activated the new installation as Army Air Corps Station No. 8 on 12 Jun 41. It was redesignated as Keesler Field on 25 Aug 41, named in honor of 2d Lt Samuel Reeves Keesler, Jr., who died as a result of aerial combat on 9 Oct 18. The War Department assigned the base to Air Corps Technical Training Command on 7 Feb 41 and reassigned it to the Army Air Forces Flying Training Command on 31 Jul 43. Keesler was the site of the principal Army Air Forces mechanic school during World War II, and it remains one of AETC's major installations for technical training. The field became Keesler AFB on 13 Jan 48. Air Training Command designated the school as the 3380th Technical



Training Wing on 26 Aug 48; HQ USAF redesignated it as the Keesler Technical Training Center on 1 Jan 59. More than three decades later, on 14 Feb 92, HQ USAF again redesignated the center, this time as the Keesler Training Center. The center inactivated on 1 Jul 93, replaced by the 81st Training Wing. HQ AETC assigned the wing to Second Air Force.



In the mid-1940s, the Army Air Forces operated an emergency rescue school at Keesler. The OA-10 was the preferred trainer.

Second Air Force. On 1 Jul 93, AETC activated Second Air Force, and headquartered it at Keesler AFB, Mississippi. Like the Technical Training Air Force which belonged to the command in the 1950s, AETC brought Second Air Force on line to provide oversight of its technical and basic military training programs. Second Air Force was first activated in Dec 40. During World War II,



it trained pilots and provided CONUS air defense. Between Nov 49 and Jan 75, Second Air Force reported to Strategic Air Command, and it deployed aircraft and crews for combat operations in Korea and Vietnam. The most recent commanders include:

LACKLAND AFB, TEXAS

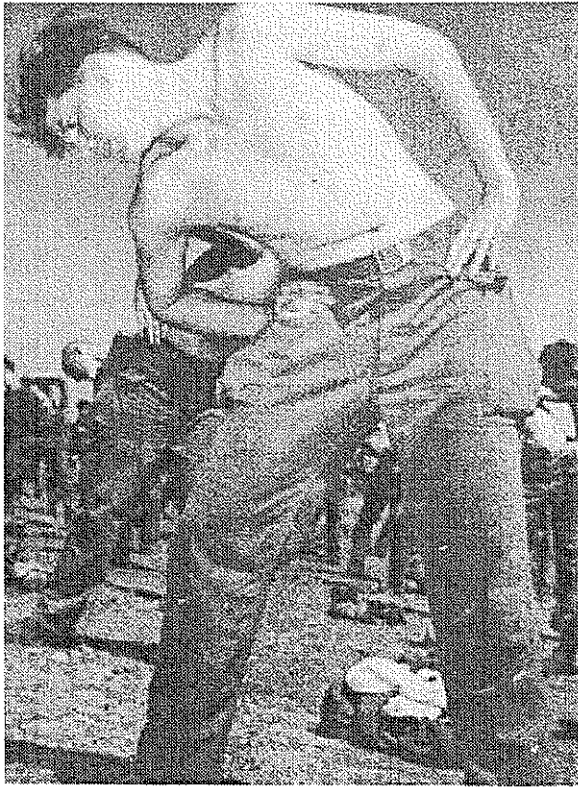


The installation that became Lackland AFB began its existence as part of Kelly Field's Advanced Flying School. On 26 Jun 42, the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center (SAACC), which included a classification center and preflight school, separated from Kelly Field and was assigned to Army Air Forces Flying Command. The War Department activated it as a station on 14 Jul 42. The SAACC transferred to AAF Personnel Distribution Command on 30 Jun 45, but less than a year later, on 1 Feb 46, it returned to the Army Air Forces Training Command redesignated as the Army Air Forces Military

Training Center. The War Department redesignated the installation as Lackland Air Base on 11 Jul 47 and then Lackland AFB on 13 Jan 48. It was named in honor of Brig Gen Frank D. Lackland, who was active in military aviation from 1917 until his retirement in 1942. For a time, General Lackland served as Commandant of the Advanced Flying School at Kelly. The center went through a variety of name changes over the next 48 years and then was replaced by the 37th Training Wing on 1 Jul 93.

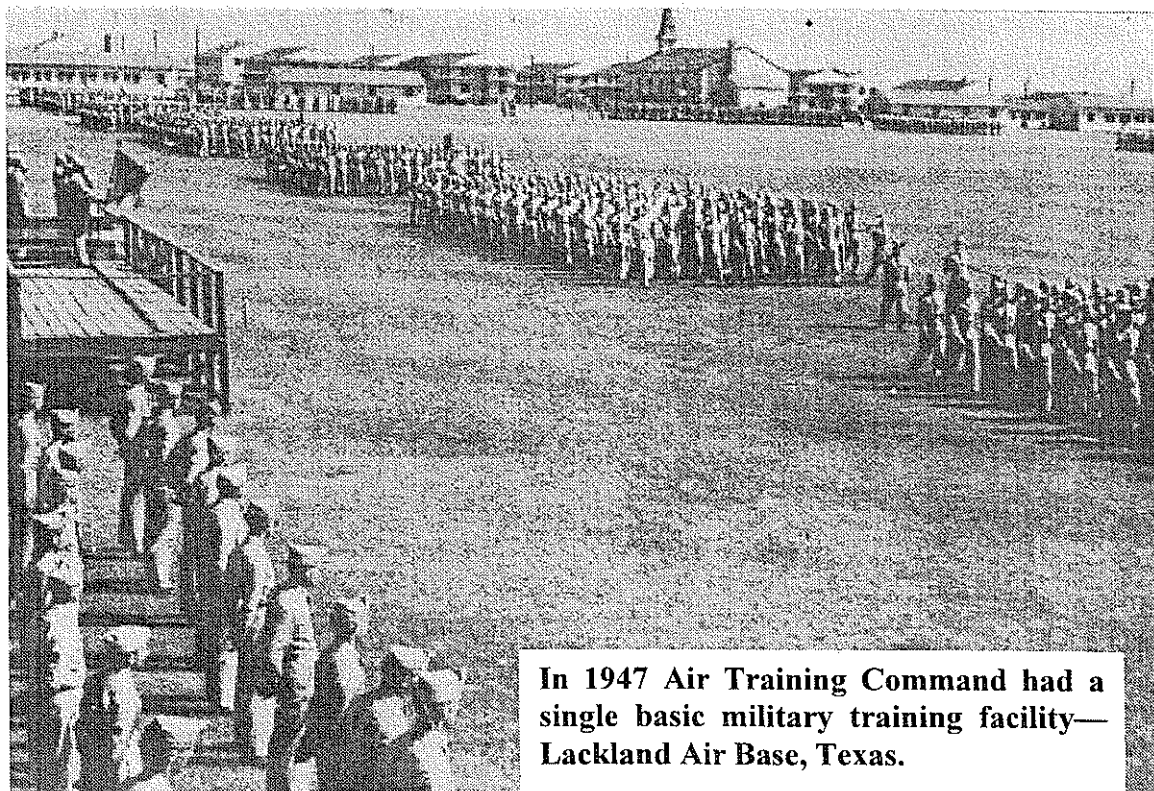

LAUGHLIN AFB, TEXAS

The War Department activated the advanced flying training base on 26 Sep 42 after assigning it to AAF Training Command on 2 Jul 42. The installation was first designated as Laughlin Army Air Field on 3 Mar 43 and then as Laughlin Field on 11 Nov 43. It was named in honor of 1st Lt Jack T. Laughlin, the first resident of nearby Del Rio, Texas, to die in World War II on 29 Jan 42. The field was transferred to Air Materiel Command and placed in inactive status on 30 Sep 45. It transferred to ATC on 10 Oct 51 and was activated and redesignated as Laughlin AFB on 1 May 52. On 1 Apr 57, Laughlin transferred to Strategic Air Command. The base returned to ATC



control on 1 Apr 62. Various flying and pilot training wings served as host unit until 1 Sep 72 when ATC activated its current host unit, the 47th Flying Training Wing.

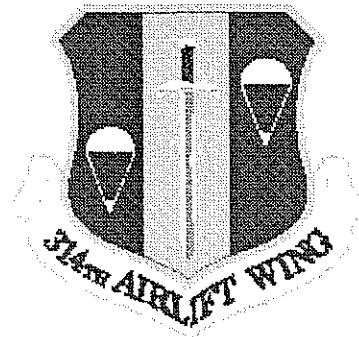

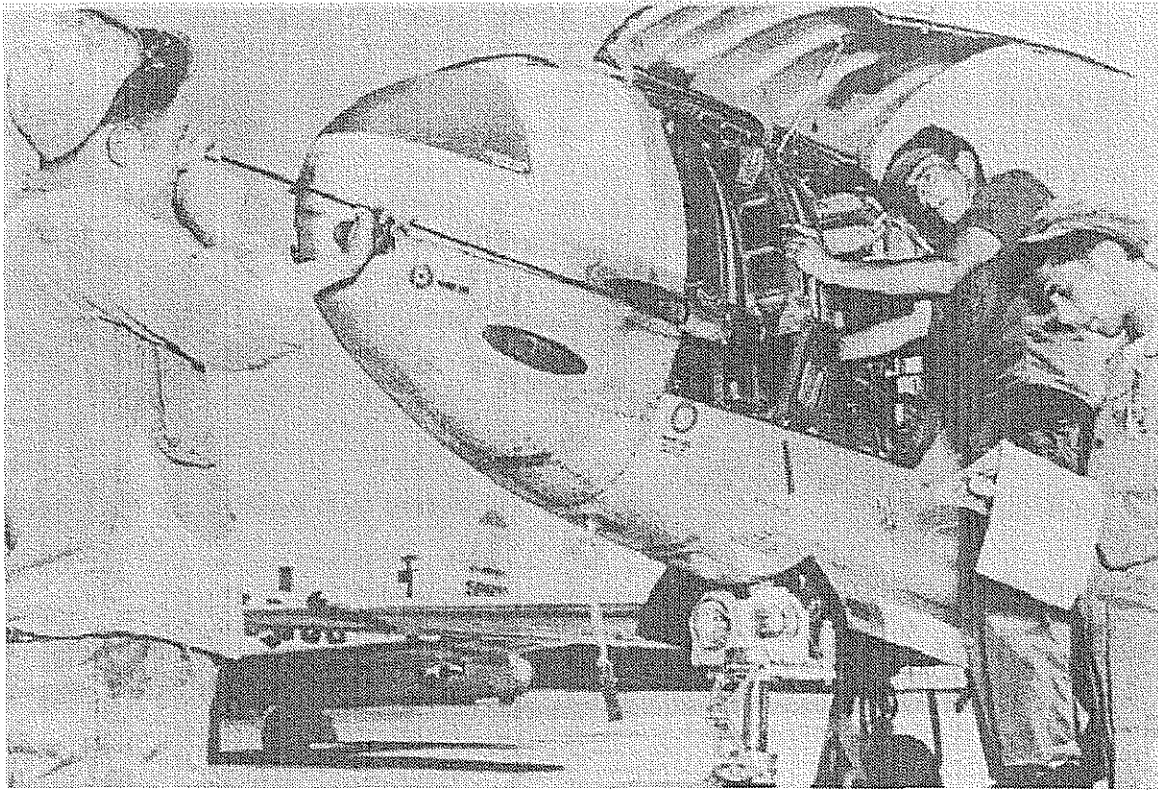

LUKE AFB, ARIZONA

On 15 Feb 41, the War Department activated Litchfield Park Air Base as a site for flying training. It was redesignated Luke Field on 6 Jun 41. The field was named in honor of 2d Lt Frank Luke, Jr., posthumous Medal of Honor recipient and the number two US ace in World War I. On 23 Jan 42, the field was assigned to Air Corps Flying Training Command. Luke Field was inactivated on 31 Oct 46. It transferred to the Corps of Engineers on 1 Sep 47 and was redesignated Luke AFB on 10 Jun 49. The Air Force activated and assigned Luke AFB to ATC on 1 Jun 51, and the command conducted combat crew training there until 1 Jul 58 when the base transferred to Tactical Air Command. On 1 Jul 93, HQ USAF reassigned the 58th Fighter Wing and Luke AFB from Air Combat Command to AETC. Then on 1 Apr 94, HQ USAF reassigned the 58th Fighter Wing to Kirtland AFB, New Mexico, but only the unit designation moved. Personnel and equipment remained at Luke to outfit the 56th Fighter Wing, whose designation moved from MacDill AFB, Florida.

MAXWELL AFB, ALABAMA

The Army established the Engine and Repair Depot on 9 Apr 18 at the same area the Wright Brothers used for a temporary civilian flying school in 1910. It was assigned to the Division of Military Aeronautics on 27 Apr 18 and then the Army Air Service on 27 Aug 18. After several name changes, the installation became the Montgomery Air Intermediate Depot in Jan 21 and Maxwell Field on 8 Nov 22. The field was named in honor of 2d Lt William C. Maxwell, a native of Ardmore, Alabama, who died in the Philippines in 1920. It was assigned to the 4th Division Air Service



between 24 Mar 23 (later redesignated 4th Division Aviation) and May 29 and 4th Corps Area between May 29 and Jul 31. The field then was assigned to the Air Corps Tactical School on 15 Jul 31, the Southeast Air Corps Training Center on 1 Sep 40 (designated Army Air Forces Southeast Training Center, 29 Oct 42), and the Air Corps Flying Training Center on 23 Jan 1942. Maxwell was then assigned to the Army Air Forces School on 29 Nov 45. The War Department redesignated the school as Air University on 12 Mar 46. The field was renamed Maxwell AFB on 13 Jan 48. Maxwell became an ATC base when Air University became a part of Air Training Command on 15 May 78. The base went under Air University again when it returned to major command status on 1 Jul

83. Ten years later, on 1 Jul 93, Maxwell became one of AETC's new bases when Air University merged with the redesignated command. On 1 Oct 94, the host unit, the 502d Air Base Wing, inactivated. Activated in its place was the 42d Air Base Wing.

the Tactical School and reduced its staff and faculty. In the summer of 1941, this small section moved to Washington, D.C., and finally was discontinued on 9 Oct 42. However, on 16 Oct 42, the Army Air Forces activated the Army Air Forces School of Applied Tactics at Orlando Field, Florida. A year later, 8 Oct 43, the Army Air Forces Tactical Center was established with the School of Applied Tactics as a subordinate unit. Due to a major reorganization on 1 Jun 45, the School of Applied Tactics was redesignated the Army

Air Forces School. On 29 Nov 45, the Army Air Forces moved the school to Maxwell Field and designated it as a major command. On 12 Mar 46, its name changed again, this time to Air University. Air University remained a major command until 15 May 78 when it became a part of ATC, but it returned to major command status on 1 Jul 83. Ten years later, on 1 Jul 93, Air University became a part of the newly redesignated Air Education and Training Command. During its two assignments to AETC, commanders included:

RANDOLPH AFB, TEXAS



On 18 Aug 28, the Army activated Aviation Field, San Antonio, redesignating it as Randolph Field on 27 Sep 28. The field was named in honor of Capt William M. Randolph, who died on 17 Feb 28 when his AT- crashed on takeoff at Gorman, Texas. Almost 20 years later, on 13 Jan 48, it was redesignated Randolph AFB. Like the command's other flying training installation, Randolph's host unit changed from a support squadron to an Army Air Forces base unit in 1944 and then to a four-digit training wing in 1948. In 1972 ATC inactivated most of its flying training wings, replacing them

with two-digit organizations, and the 12th Flying Training Wing has been Randolph's host unit ever since.

Air Education and Training Command.

The War Department established the Air Corps Flying Training Command on 23 Jan 42 and gave it responsibility to oversee the great expansion of flying training after American entry in WWII. Its original headquarters was in the Maritime Building in Washington, D.C. The War Department redesignated the command as Army Air Forces Flying Training Command, effective 15 Mar 42, and moved it to the Texas and Pacific Railway building in Fort Worth, Texas, in Jul 42. On 31 Jul 43, the command was redesignated as the Army Air Forces Training Command. At the same time, it picked up responsibility for basic and technical training, missions that had belonged to Army Air Forces Technical Training Command before the War Department inactivated it on 31 Jul 43. On 28 Feb 46, AAF Training Command completed the move of its headquarters to Barksdale Field, Louisiana. The command was redesignated Air Training Command on 1 Jul 46. On 17 Oct 49, the headquarters moved to Scott AFB, Illinois. In Mar 52, ATC regained the crew training mission it had lost at the end of World War II. This lasted only until 1957 when the responsibility returned to operational commands. Its final relocation was completed on 30 Sep 57 when the headquarters staff moved to Randolph AFB, Texas. On 15 May 78, ATC gained an education mission when it assumed command of Air University, only to lose it on 1 Jul 83 when Air University returned to major command status. On 1 Jul 93, the command was redesignated Air Education and Training Command, regaining both the education and combat crew training missions it had previously lost.*

Nineteenth Air Force. On 1 Jul 93, AETC activated Nineteenth Air Force and headquartered it at Randolph AFB, Texas. Like the earlier Flying Training Air Force, which the command stood up in the 1950s, Nineteenth Air Force managed AETC's flying training program. When first activated in Jul 55, Nineteenth Air Force existed for the purpose of providing Tactical Air Command with a composite strike force. Between 1955 and its inactivation in Jul 73, Nineteenth Air Force participated in more than 100 deployments, including

Lebanon in 1958, the Cuban missile crisis in 1962, and the Pueblo crisis in 1968. The most recent commanders included:

Air Force Recruiting Service. When the Air Force became a separate service on 18 Sep 47, its recruiting function remained under Army control. It wasn't until Jan 54

that the Department of Defense finally agreed the Air Force could take operational control of its recruiting forces. On 10 Apr 54, ATC activated the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio.* Five years later, on 8 Jul 59, ATC inactivated the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing. The Air Force wanted to elevate the importance of its recruiting mission, so it replaced the wing with the USAF Recruiting Service. Air Training Command activated the new organization on 8 Jul 59. Like the 3500th, the USAF Recruiting Service operated from Wright-Patterson AFB; however, on 1 Jul 65, it moved its headquarters to Randolph AFB, Texas. On 1 Mar 72, the ATC commander dual-hatted the Recruiting Service commander as DCS/Recruiting Service. Then on

1 Apr 94, HQ USAF redesignated USAF Recruiting Service as Air Force Recruiting Service. Commanders included:

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS

The War Department activated a school at Wichita Falls, Texas, on 11 Feb 41 for the purpose of providing basic military, technical, flying, and glider pilot training. The school was redesignated as Sheppard Field on 14 Apr 41. It was named for Morris E. Sheppard, a US senator from Texas who helped lead the fight for military preparedness before Pearl Harbor. Senator Sheppard died on 9 Apr 41. Originally assigned to the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command, the base became a part of Army Air Forces Training Command on 31 Jul 43. Sheppard was inactivated on 31 Aug 46 but was redesignated Sheppard AFB and activated again on 1 Aug 48. It soon became a thriving aircraft mechanics school. Air Training Command activated the 3750th Indoctrination Wing on 26 Aug 48, replacing it with the 3750th Technical Training Wing on 1 Apr 49. The command redesignated it as the Sheppard Technical Training Center on 1 Jan 59 and the Sheppard Training Center on 1 Feb 92 before inactivating it on 1 Jul 93. On that same day, AETC activated the 82d Training Wing and stationed it at Sheppard.

In 1974 the wing began training students from other nations under the security assistance program. 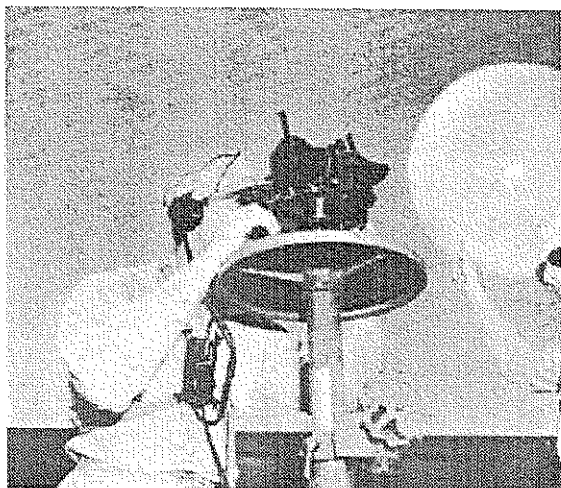
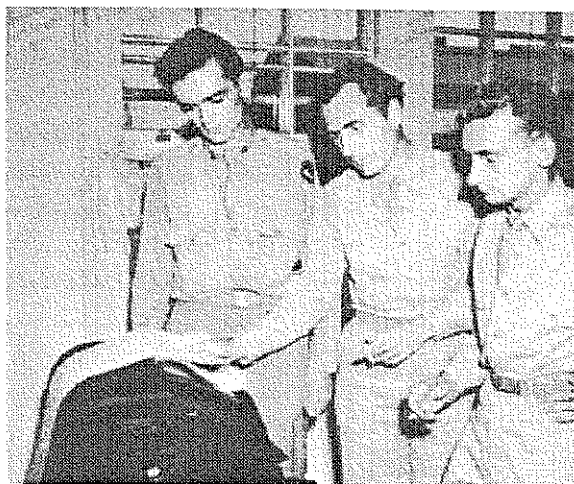

TYNDALL AFB, FLORIDA

The War Department established Tyndall Field on 16 Jun 41. It was named in honor of 1st Lt Frank B. Tyndall, a World War I pilot and Silver Star recipient, who was killed on 15 Jul 30 in a crash of a P-1. The Army Air Forces conducted flexible gunnery and flying training there. On 23 Jan 42, the field was assigned to Air Corps Flying Training Command until it transferred to Continental Air Forces on 28 Feb 46. It then transferred to Tactical Air Command on 21 Mar 46 and to Air University on 15 May 46. The field was redesignated Tyndall AFB on 13 Jan 48 and transferred to ATC on 1 Sep 50. It then transferred to Air Defense Command on 1 Jul 57 and to Tactical Air Command on 1 Oct 79. Tyndall AFB and its 325th Fighter Wing transferred again, this time to AETC, on 1 Jul 93.

VANCE AFB, OKLAHOMA

The War Department activated Enid Field on 20 Sep 41 and redesignated it as Enid Army Air Field on 7 May 43. Field personnel conducted flying training until Army Air Forces Training Command inactivated Enid on 31 Jan 47. The War Department redesignated the field as Enid AFB and activated it on 1 Aug 48. HQ USAF redesignated Enid AFB as Vance AFB on 9 Jul 49. The change was made to honor Lt Col Leon R. Vance, Jr., a native of Enid, who was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for gallantry in action over France on 5 Jun 44. Like the other flying training bases, the host unit progressed from a support squadron in 1941 to an Army Air Forces base unit in 1944, then to a four-digit flying wing in 1948, and finally a two-digit flying training wing in 1972. Except for the 19 months it was inactive, Vance has belonged to AETC or its predecessors since 23 Jan 42.

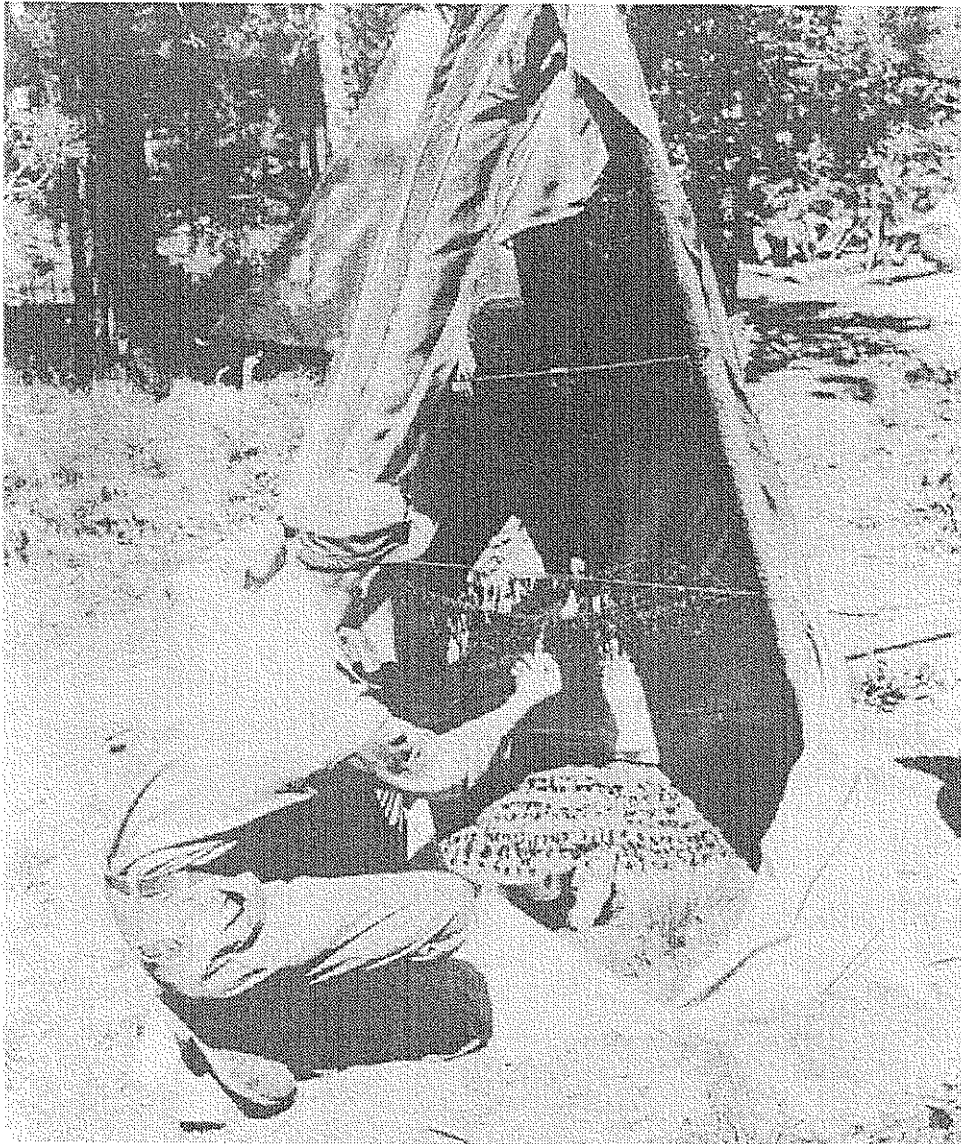
336TH TRAINING GROUP

In 1966 Air Training Command transferred its survival training program from Stead AFB, Nevada, to Fairchild AFB, Washington. On 1 Mar 66, the command activated the 3636th Combat Crew Training Group (Survival) at Fairchild. Three months later the transfer was complete, and on 15 Jun 66, ATC inactivated Stead AFB, Nevada, and its 3637th Combat Crew Training Squadron (Survival and Special Training). Over the years, the 3636th went from a group to a wing, and back to a group. On 1 Jul 93, AETC assigned the group to Nineteenth Air Force. Less than a year later, on 1 Apr 94, HQ USAF redesignated the 3636th as the 336th Training Group.

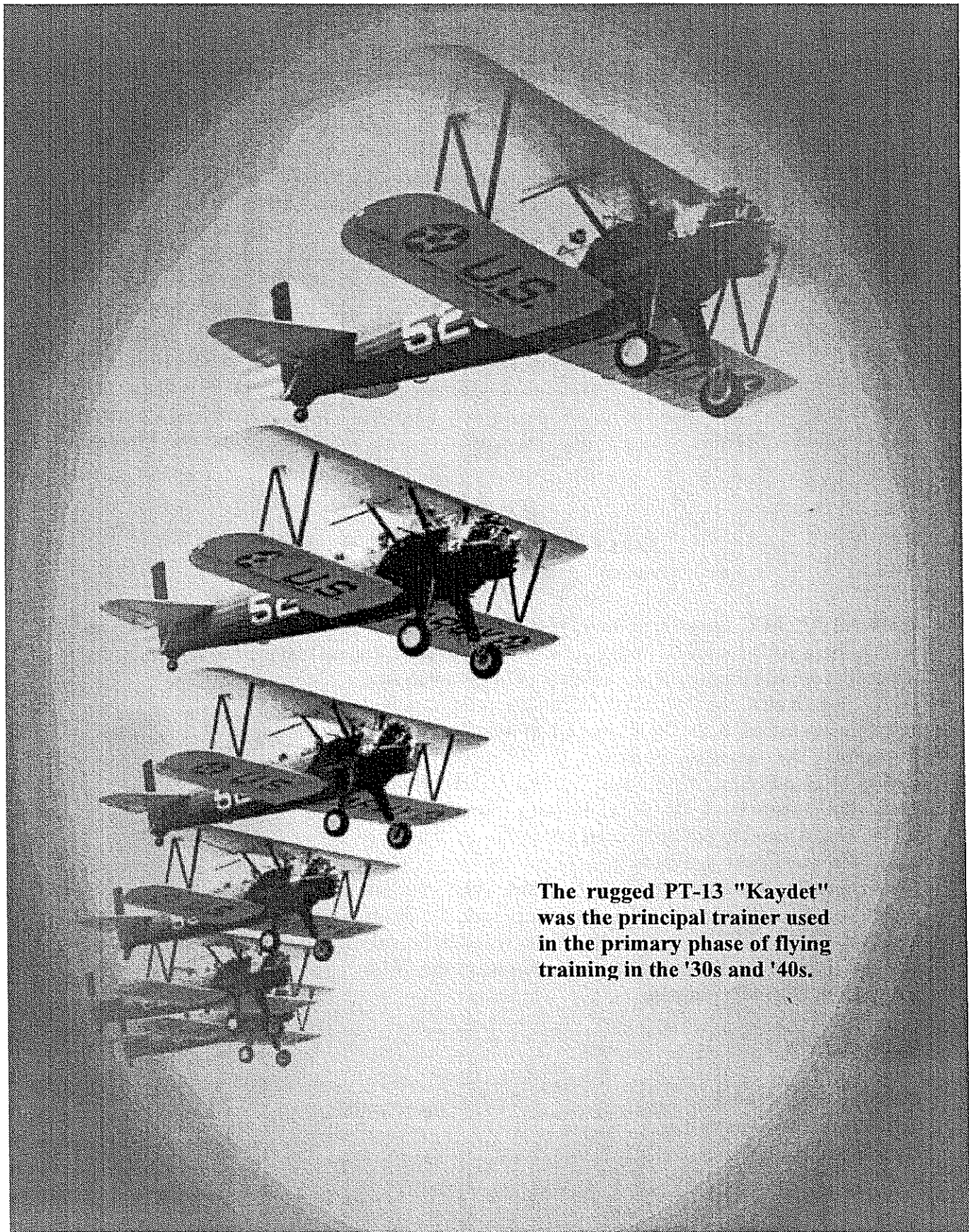
381ST TRAINING GROUP
Vandenberg AFB, California (AFSPC)

On 1 Jul 93, ACC transferred its 4315th Combat Crew Training Squadron (Missile) at Vandenberg AFB to AETC as the newly redesignated command began consolidating its space and missile training at a single site. On the same day, AETC inactivated the 4315th and used its personnel and resources to establish the 392d Space and Missile Training Squadron. The squadron belonged to the 17th Training Group at Goodfellow. On 1 Apr 94, HQ USAF redesignated the squadron as the 392d Training Squadron, and AETC reassigned the unit to Second Air Force. At the same time, the command activated the 381st Training Group (Provisional) at Vandenberg. That group was inactivated on 1 Oct 94, and AETC activated a permanent unit, the 381st Training Group. AETC assigned the 392d Training Squadron and three other newly activated squadrons to the 381st for space and missile training.

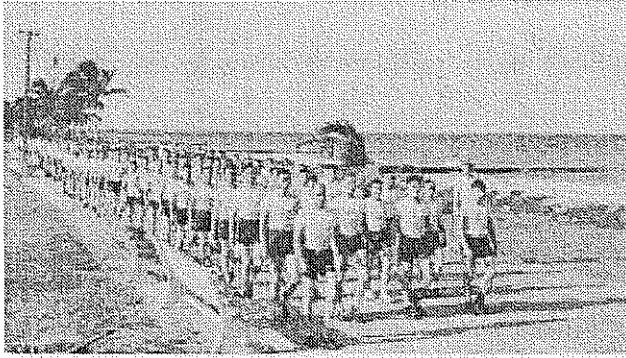


The rugged PT-13 "Kaydet" was the principal trainer used in the primary phase of flying training in the '30s and '40s.

CHRONOLOGY OF ORGANIZATIONAL CHANGES IN THE FIELD

- 23 Jan 42 The War Department established Army Air Corps Flying Training Command and put its headquarters in Washington, D.C. Not long after, the headquarters moved to Fort Worth, Texas. Assigned to it were the three centers that managed flying training: the Gulf Coast Air Corps Training Center at Randolph Field, Texas; the Southeast Air Corps Training Center at Maxwell Field, Alabama; and the West Coast Air Corps Training Center at Moffett Field, California.
- ca 15 Mar 42 The command and its subordinate units all were redesignated. Instead of Army Air Corps, they became Army Air Forces organizations.
- 26 Jun 42 The San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center separated from Kelly Field. On 4 Jul 42, the center became the newest station assigned to the AAF Gulf Coast Training Center and Army Air Forces Flying Training Command (AAFFTC).
- 31 Jul 43 The War Department transferred the bases and resources of AAF Technical Training Command to AAFFTC. At the same time, to represent the additions of technical and basic military training, AAFFTC was redesignated as Army Air Force Training Command (AAFTC). Its three flying training centers became the Eastern, Central, and Western Flying Training Commands. By the end of August, AAFTC had replaced the technical training districts with three subordinate technical training commands: Eastern, headquartered at Greensboro, North Carolina; Central at St Louis, Missouri; and Western at Denver, Colorado. Also as a part of the merger, AAF Training Command acquired the Officer Candidate School (OCS) for non-rated officers which had operated at Miami Beach, Florida, since 21 Feb 42. Army Air Forces Technical Training Command disbanded on 31 Aug 43.
- 1 Mar 44 Because of a reduction in technical training requirements, AAF Training Command discontinued the Central Technical Training Command at St Louis and moved Eastern from Greensboro to Scott Field.
- Apr 44 The command disbanded all of its support units (except bands) and reorganized each base under an AAF base unit concept. At Keesler, for example, the 3704th AAF Base Unit became responsible for all administration, training, operations, supply, and maintenance duties.
- Jun 44 Officer Candidate School moved from Miami Beach to the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center.

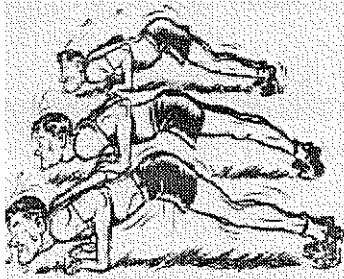
- Oct 44 The AAF closed preflight schools at Santa Ana Army Air Field, California, and Maxwell Field. All aircrew trainees would go through the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center.
- 31 Dec 44 With the war drawing to a close, AAFTC reduced its basic training centers to four: Amarillo and Sheppard Fields in Texas, Buckley Field in Colorado, and Keesler Field in Mississippi.
- Jun 45 OCS moved from the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center to Maxwell Field. At about the same time, the preflight school also moved from San Antonio to Maxwell.
- 30 Jun 45 The San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center transferred from AAF Training Command to the AAF Personnel Distribution Command.
- ca 15 Oct 45 AAF Training Command inactivated Western Technical Training Command and redesignated Eastern Technical Training Command as Technical Training Command. The headquarters stayed at Scott Field.
- 1 Nov 45 Central Flying Training Command became a part of Western Flying Training Command.
- 15 Dec 45 Western Flying Training Command absorbed Eastern Flying Training Command.
- 31 Dec 45 The number of bases under AAFTC jurisdiction had fallen from a high of 170 in 1944 to 34 at the end of calendar year 1945.
- 1 Jan 46 Western Flying Training Command was redesignated as Flying Training Command, headquartered at Randolph Field, Texas.
- 1 Feb 46 The War Department redesignated the San Antonio District, Army Air Forces Personnel Distribution Command (previously known as the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center), as the Army Air Forces Military Training Center and assigned it to AAF Training Command.
- OCS and the AAF Preflight School moved from Maxwell to San Antonio. At the same time, Army Air Forces Training Command assigned both schools to the AAF Military Training Center.
- 19-28 Feb 46 AAFTC moved its headquarters to Barksdale Field, Louisiana.
- 1 Apr 46 The School of Aviation Medicine transferred from AAFTC to AU.
- 1 Jul 46 The War Department redesignated Army Air Forces Training Command as Air Training Command (ATC).

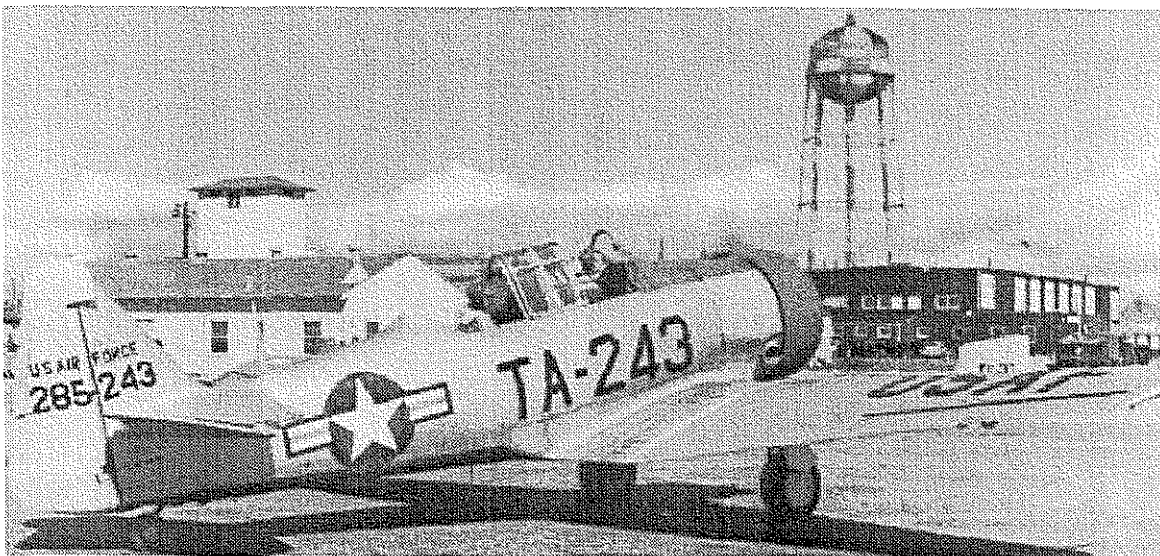

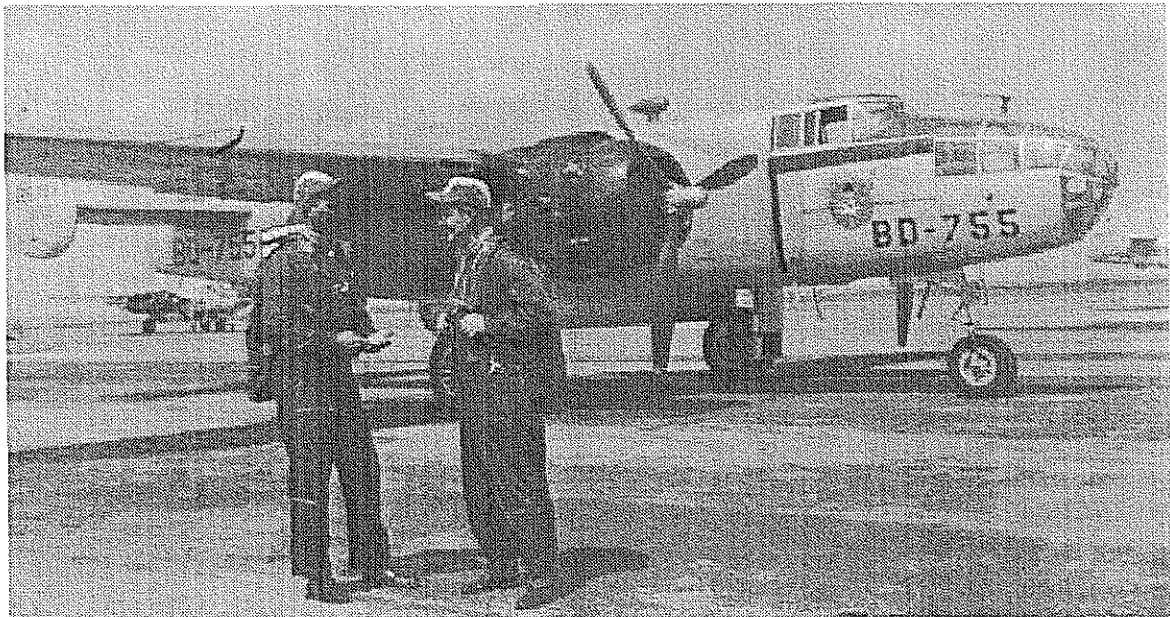

- 1 Jul 46 (cont'd) ATC moved all of its enlisted basic military training to the AAF Military Training Center.
- Nov 46 The AAF activated the Air Reserve Officer Training Corps (forerunner of the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps) and placed it under ATC supervision. In November control passed to Air Defense Command.
- 1 Nov 46 As the AAF began to interpret the word "command" to mean a major air command, ATC changed the names of its sub-commands to the Flying Training and Technical Training Divisions. In addition, the AAF Military Training Center became the Indoctrination Division.
- 31 Dec 46 ATC had 14 bases assigned: Williams in Arizona; Mather in California; Lowry in Colorado; Boca Raton in Florida; Chanute and Scott in Illinois; Barksdale in Louisiana; Keesler in Mississippi; Enid in Oklahoma; Goodfellow, Lackland, Randolph, and San Marcos in Texas; and Geiger in Washington.
- Air Training Command inactivated Las Vegas Field, Nevada. The base had conducted flying training since Dec 41, first under the control of the West Coast Air Corps Training Center and then as part of ATC.
- 31 Jan 47 Enid Field, Oklahoma, closed. It had conducted flying training since Sep 41.
- 1 Jun 47 ATC gained another technical training base, Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyoming. In 1949 the Air Force redesignated it as F. E. Warren AFB.

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- 11 Jul 47 The installation that was home to the AAF Military Training Center became Lackland Air Base.

 - 15 Sep 47 Geiger Field, Washington, transferred to Strategic Air Command. Training courses moved to F. E. Warren.

 - Dec 47 The command closed Boca Raton Field and moved the radar school to Keesler. In October two hurricanes had destroyed the Florida base.

 - 13 Jan 48 The Air Force redesignated most of its fields as air force bases.

 - 1 Apr 48 Air Training Command activated two flying training installations: Las Vegas AFB, Nevada, and Perrin AFB, Texas.

 - Aug 48 Air Training Command replaced its base units organization with a base-wing setup. By year's end, ATC had one bombardment training wing, eight pilot training wings, five technical training wings, and two basic training wings. All of the wings reported directly to HQ ATC.

 - 1 Aug 48 The command activated three bases: Sheppard and Waco in Texas and Enid in Oklahoma.

 - 31 Mar 49 Ellington AFB, Texas, opened as a navigator school.

 - The command inactivated San Marcos AFB, Texas.

- 10 Jun 49 The Air Force redesignated Waco AFB as Connally AFB. Two years later, on 8 Jan 51, it became James Connally AFB.
- 9 Jul 49 Another redesignation changed Enid AFB to Vance AFB.
- 1 Aug 49 The command activated Lubbock AFB, Texas. On 29 Nov 49, HQ USAF redesignated it as Reese AFB.
- 17 Oct 49 The ATC headquarters moved from Barksdale to Scott AFB, Illinois.
- 1 Nov 49 Air Training Command inactivated the Indoctrination Division and realigned responsibility for basic military training to the headquarters.
- 14 Nov 49 The command inactivated its Flying and Technical Divisions and moved responsibility for both functions into the headquarters.
- Mid-1950 Not long after the start of the Korean War, Air Training Command gained responsibility for most combat crew training.
- 30 Apr 50 The Air Force redesignated Las Vegas AFB as Nellis AFB.
- 2 Aug 50 To alleviate the severe overcrowding at Lackland AFB, Texas, ATC began sending new recruits to Sheppard AFB, Texas, for basic training. This training continued at Sheppard until 12 May 52.
- 1 Sep 50 Air University transferred control of Tyndall AFB, Florida, and Craig AFB, Alabama, to ATC.

- 1 Jan 51 Air Training Command activated Luke AFB, Arizona, as a fighter-bomber training base.

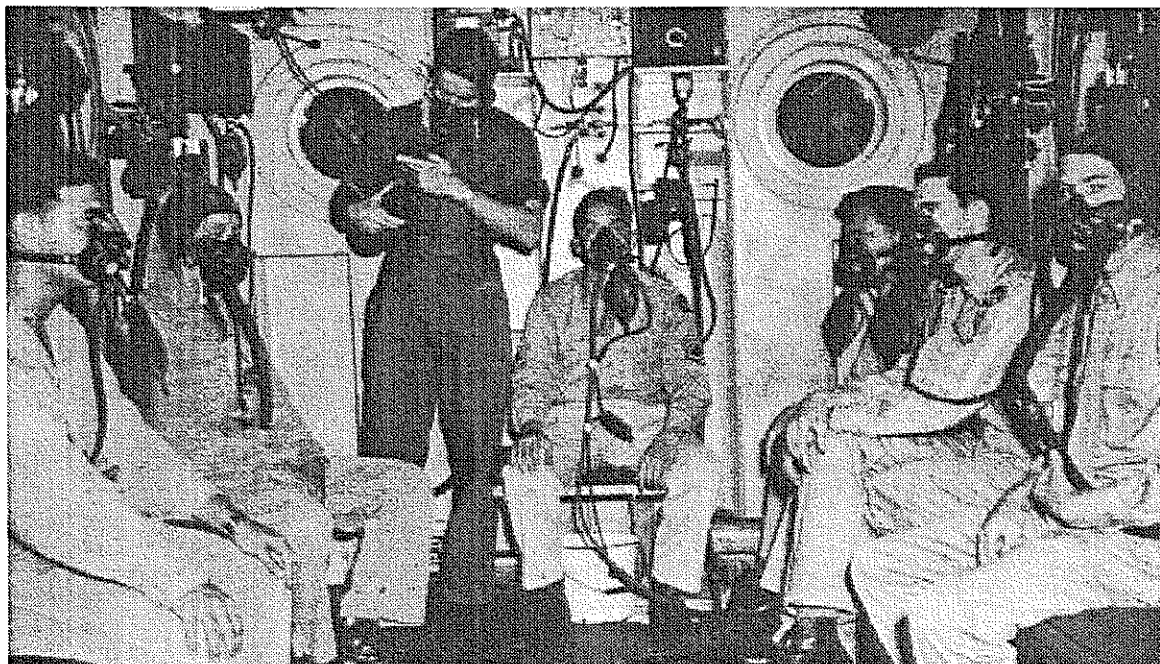
- 15 Jan 51 The command activated San Marcos. On 10 May 53, HQ USAF redesignated it as Gary AFB. It became Edward Gary AFB on 1 Sep 55.

- Feb 51 The first group of recruits arrived at Sampson AFB, New York. ATC opened this second basic military training center to handle the influx of recruits for the Korean War. Basic training at Sampson ended on 1 Jul 56.

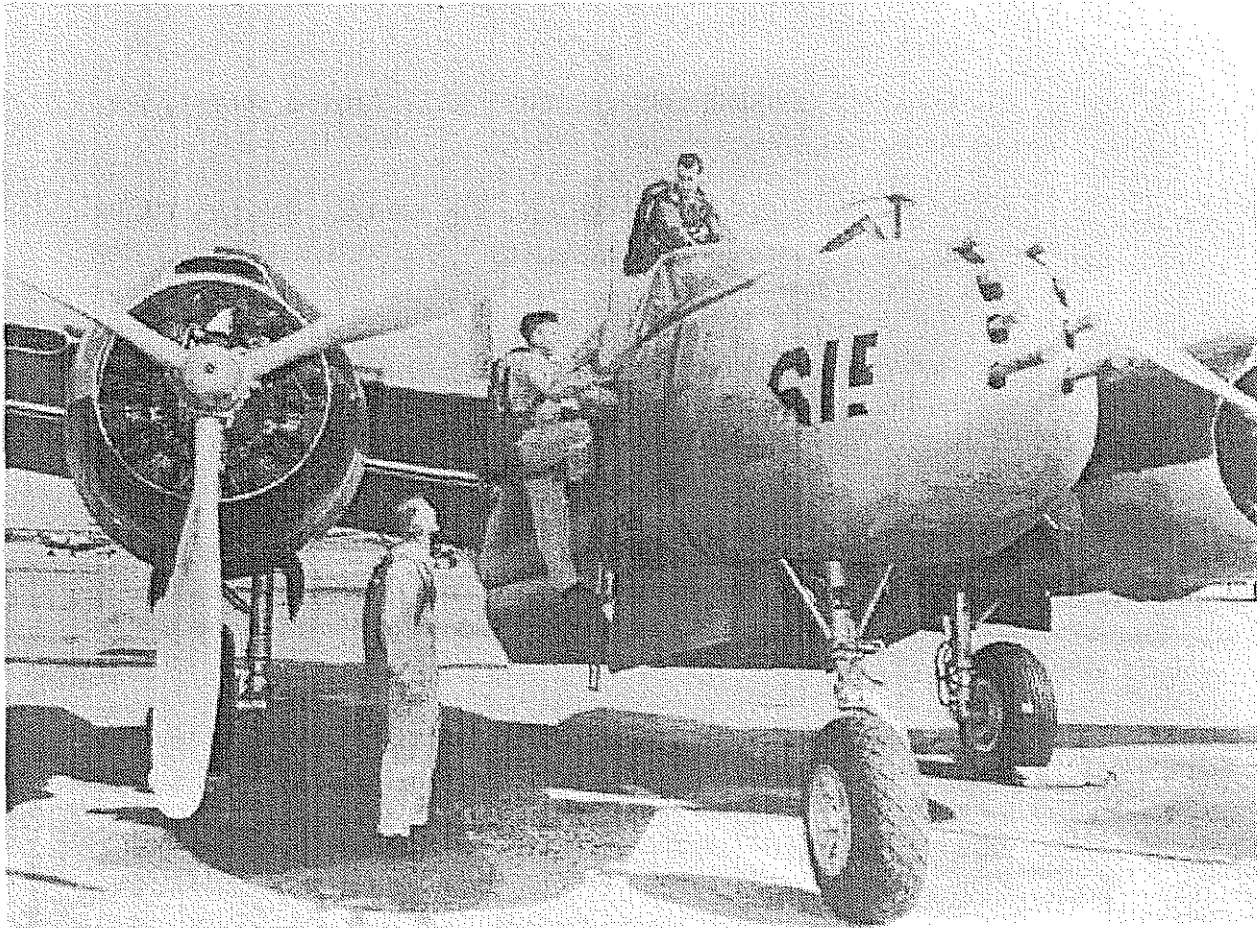
- 25 Feb 51 Air Training Command organized the 3300th Training Publications Unit at Scott AFB, Illinois. It reported directly to the headquarters. A few months later, on 1 Sep 51, the unit was redesignated as the 3300th Training Publications Squadron.

- 1 Mar 51 The command activated Amarillo AFB, Texas, as a technical training facility.

- 1 May 51 With the increase of training requirements caused by the Korean War, ATC established the Flying Training Air Force, headquartered at Waco, Texas, near James Connally AFB.



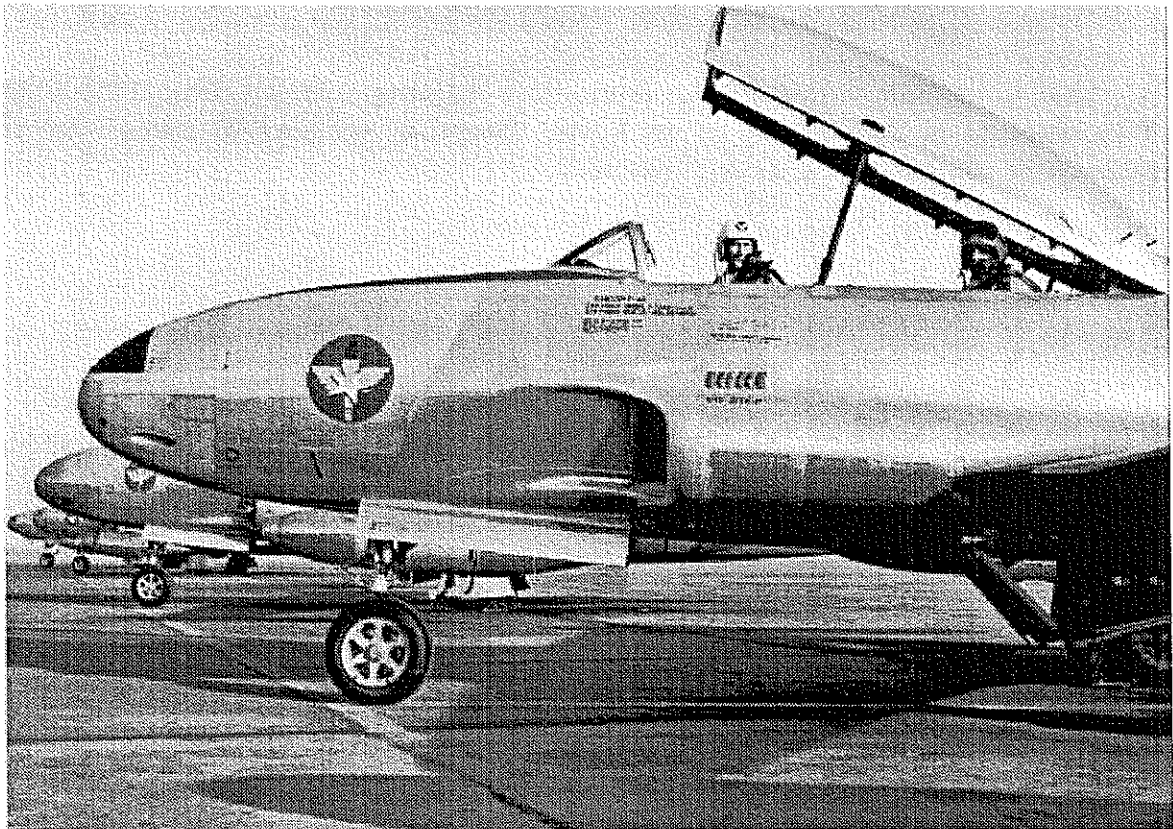
Tyndall instructors show students inside the altitude chamber the correct way to regulate air pressure.

- 7 Jun 51 The command activated Wichita AFB, Kansas, as a combat crew training facility. HQ USAF redesignated the installation as McConnell AFB on 12 Apr 54. Air Training Command assumed most crew training responsibilities shortly after the Korean War began on 25 Jun 50 to relieve the operational commands of much of their training burden.
- 1 Jul 51 Another pilot training installation activated in the command, Bryan AFB, Texas.
- 16 Jul 51 Likewise, ATC established the Technical Training Air Force, headquartered at the Gulf Coast Military Academy, Gulfport, Mississippi, near Keesler AFB.
- 1 Sep 51 Moody AFB, Georgia, transferred from SAC to ATC. It provided the command with interceptor training.

- 10 Sep 51 The command activated Pinecastle AFB, Florida, in preparation for more combat crew training.
- Dec 51 By year's end, ATC had activated nine bases for the purpose of conducting contract flying training: Greenville and Columbus, Mississippi; Spence, Georgia; Bainbridge and Bastow, Florida; Hondo, Texas; Malden, Missouri; Marana, Arizona; and Kinston (later, Stallings), North Carolina.
- 1 Jan 52 Big Spring AFB, Texas, activated as a pilot training base. The Air Force redesignated the installation as Webb AFB on 18 May 52.
- Mar 52 ATC opened another basic military training center at Parks AFB, California. Training temporarily ended in Sep 53 only to open again on 7 Sep 54. ATC finally ended training at Parks on 21 Nov 56.
- 16 Mar 52 ATC established Crew Training Air Force with headquarters at Randolph AFB, Texas.

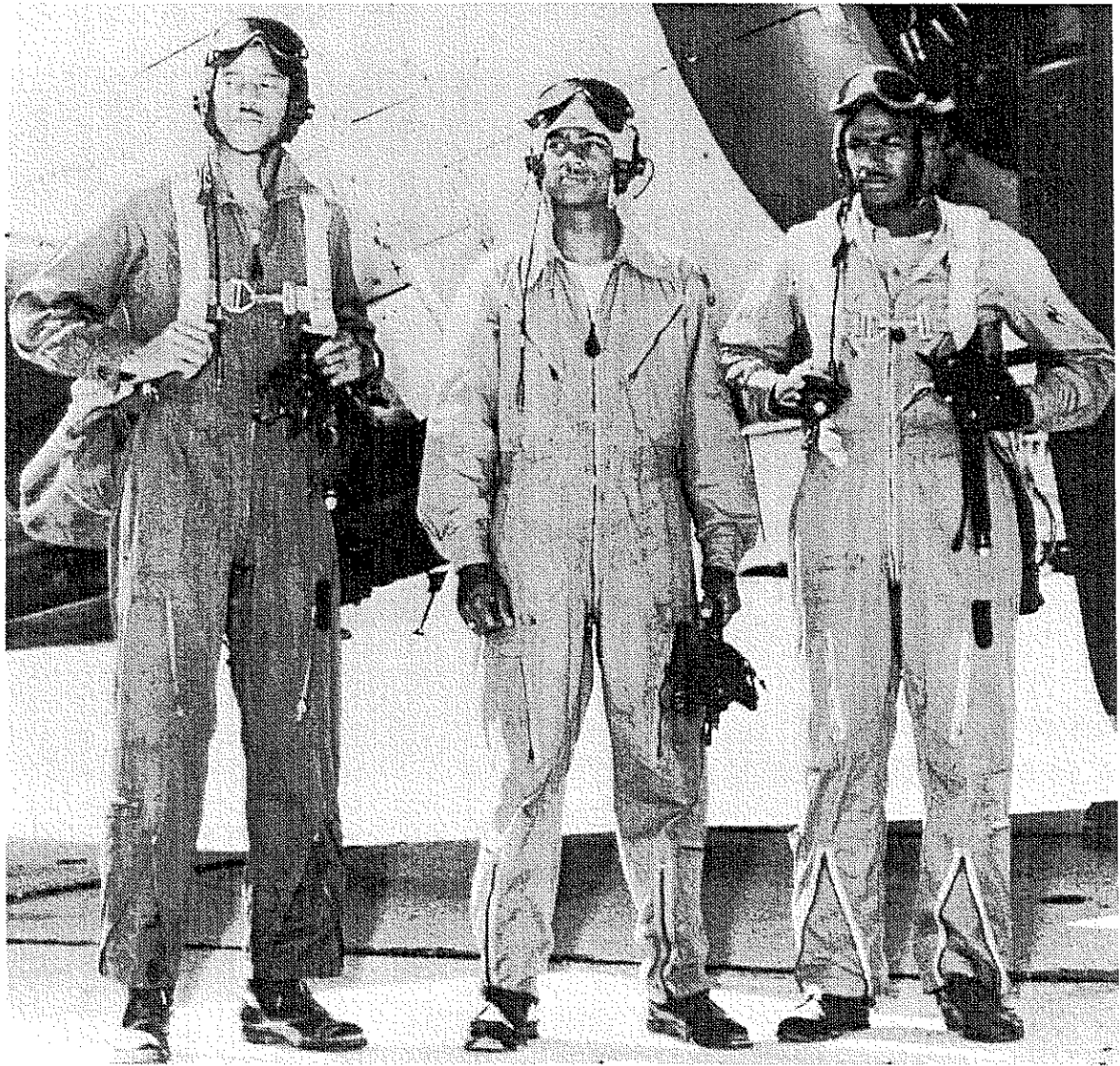

- 1 Apr 52 Air Training Command activated two new pilot training installations in Texas: Harlingen and Laredo.
 - 1 May 52 Laughlin AFB, Texas, joined the growing number of pilot training facilities activated in ATC as a result of the Korean War.
 - Jun 52 ATC redesignated some of its wings as it reorganized its flying training program under the Flying Training and Crew Training Air Forces.
 - 1 Sep 52 ATC activated Foster AFB, Texas, as a pilot training base.
 - 6 Jan 53 Technical Training Air Force redesignated its basic training organizations at Lackland, Sampson, and Parks as military training wings.
 - 27 Jan 53 Greenville AFB, Mississippi, became a pilot training school rather than a contract flying training operation. The contract training transferred to the newly activated Graham Air Base in Florida.

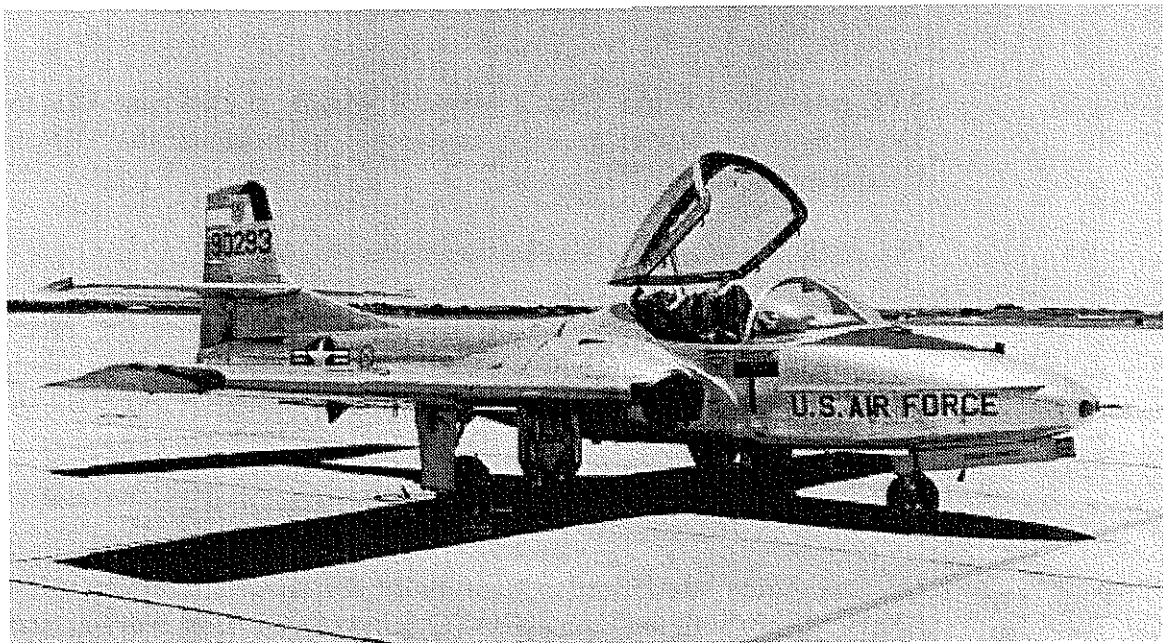

- 1 Jun 58 ATC inactivated the Technical Training Air Force and reassigned the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing to the headquarters.
- 1 Jul 58 Air Training Command ended contract flying training at Hondo. At the same time, ATC took its first step toward getting out of the crew training business when it transferred McConnell, Williams, Luke, and Nellis to Tactical Air Command.
- 15 Jul 58 Air Training Command renamed the 3635th Combat Crew Training Wing at Stead as the 3635th Flying Training Wing (Advanced). That was because the wing no longer provided survival training only. The helicopter pilot training mission at Randolph had transferred to Stead.
- 1 Oct 58 ATC transferred control of Goodfellow AFB, Texas, to the USAF Security Service.
- 1 Jan 59 Air Training Command renamed its military training wing and all five of its technical training wings as centers: the 3700th Military Training Wing became the Lackland Military Training Center; while the 3320th Technical Training Wing was redesignated as Amarillo Technical Training Center; the 3345th, Chanute Technical Training Center; the 3380th, Keesler Technical Training Center; the 3415th, the Lowry Technical Training Center; and the 3750th, Sheppard Technical Training Center.

1 Aug 53 ATC established USAF Officer Military Schools at Lackland AFB to consolidate its officer training activities. It included the Officer Candidate School (OCS).

1 Jan 54 Pinecastle and McConnell AFBs transferred to SAC.

10 Apr 54 As a first step in separating Air Force recruiting from the Army recruiting program, ATC activated the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. The Air Force became responsible for its own recruiting on 1 Jul 54.

1 Jul 54 Foster AFB transferred to Tactical Air Command.

1 Sep 54 The Air Force transferred responsibility for survival training from SAC to ATC. With that transfer, ATC gained Stead AFB, Nevada, and the command activated a wing to conduct survival training.

1 Apr 55 Columbus AFB, Mississippi, transferred to SAC after ATC had moved contract flying training from Columbus to Moore Air Base, Texas.

1 Jan 56 ATC reassigned the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing from the headquarters to Technical Training Air Force because of a new program that integrated basic military training and basic technical training.

5 Jul 56 Air Training Command discontinued the 3300th Training Publications Squadron.

14 Dec 56 Air Training Command inactivated Edward Gary AFB, Texas.

1 Apr 57 Laughlin AFB transferred to SAC.

1 Jul 57 Tyndall AFB transferred to Air Defense Command.

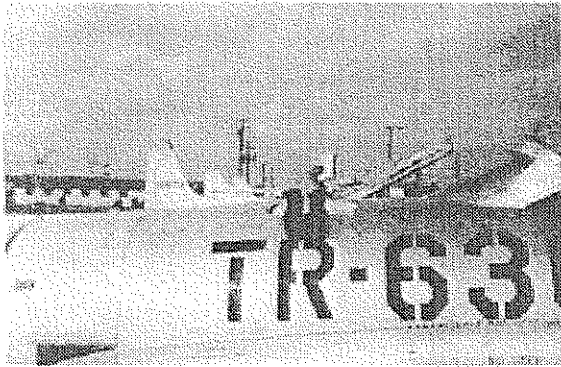

30 Sep 57 Headquarters ATC completed its move from Scott AFB, Illinois, to Randolph AFB, Texas.

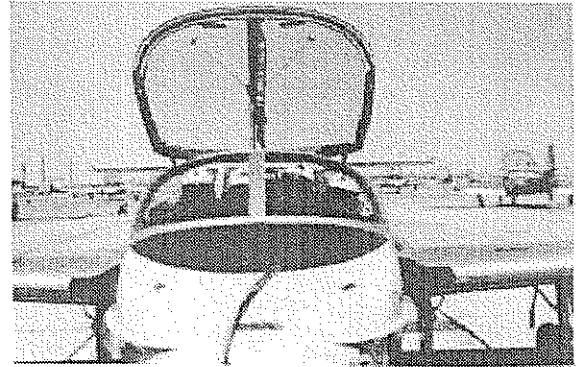

- 1 Jul 59 In addition to OCS, the preflight training school, and the officer basic military training courses, the Officer Military Schools added an additional organization, the USAF Officer Training School (OTS). While OCS was a six-month program and required only two years of college for entrance, OTS lasted only three months but required a four-year degree.

- 8 Jul 59 Air Training Command discontinued the 3500th USAF Recruiting Wing and activated the USAF Recruiting Service. The organization remained at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio.

- 1 Oct 59 Brooks AFB, Texas, was transferred to ATC, and the command activated the USAF Aerospace Medical Center at Brooks. Concurrently, AU reassigned the School of Aviation Medicine at Brooks to ATC.

- 1 Jan 60 ATC established the USAF Language School at Lackland to provide English language instruction to foreign students coming to the United States for training under the Military Assistance Program. It was assigned to the USAF Officer Military Schools.

- 1 Apr 60 Bryan AFB, Texas, transferred to Air Materiel Command.

- May 60 At Lackland AFB, Texas, ATC graduated its final pilot and navigator preflight students.

- 29 Jun 60 The command graduated its last contract primary class at Malden Air Base, Missouri.

- 1 Jul 60 ATC discontinued its pilot and navigator preflight schools at Lackland. Pilot preflight training became the responsibility of the primary training schools, and navigator preflight moved to the navigator schools.

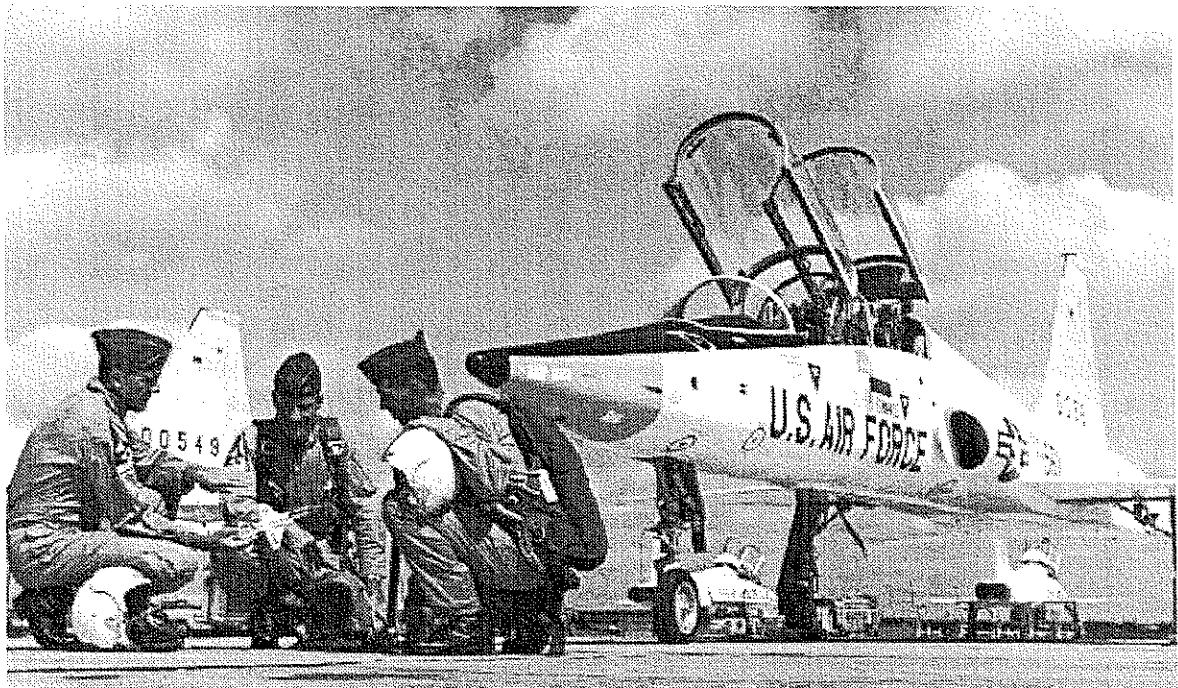
- 1 Oct 60 Williams AFB, Arizona, transferred from TAC to ATC.

- Dec 60 Air Training Command stopped training at the contract primary bases

- 8 May 61 The School of Aviation Medicine at Brooks was renamed the School of Aerospace Medicine.

- 1 Nov 61 ATC transferred Brooks AFB and the USAF Aerospace Medical Center and its subordinate organizations to Air Force Systems Command.

- 1 Apr 62 Strategic Air Command transferred jurisdiction of Laughlin AFB, Texas, to ATC.

30 Jun 62 OTS completed its move from Lackland to Medina Annex.

1 Jul 62 ATC discontinued the Officer Military Schools at Lackland.

With the transfer of Perrin AFB, Texas, to Air Defense Command, ATC was completely out of the crew training business.

ATC discontinued its 3610th Navigator Training Wing and subordinate units at Harlingen AFB, Texas, and placed the base on inactive status.

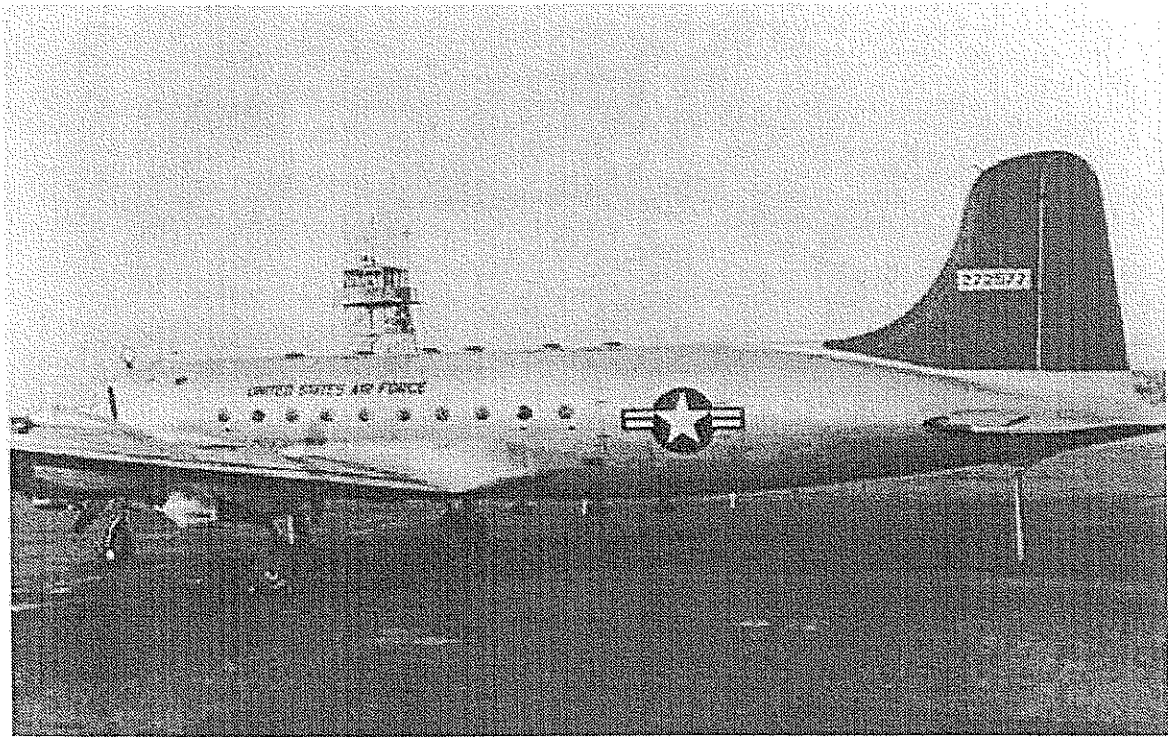


In Jul 65, ATC revised its flying training to including a flight screening program. Contractors provided 27 days of instruction and 30 hours of flying in the T-41.

1 Jul 63 After 21 years of operation, OCS was phased out.

ATC established the Armed Forces Air Intelligence Training Center at Lowry AFB, Colorado, consolidating all intelligence training at a single base.

1 Apr 65 ATC inactivated Greenville AFB, Mississippi, and its 3505th Technical Training Group, assigning the base to Keesler in caretaker status until it returned to civilian control on 27 Oct 66.



ATC used the Douglas TC-54D as a navigator trainer before it was phased out in 1966 by the T-29. The TC-54D could accommodate up to 21 students, and its equipment included radio compasses, loran sets, seven astrodomes, and the usual dead reckoning instruments.

- 1 Jul 65 USAF Recruiting Service moved from Wright-Patterson AFB to Randolph.
- 1 Oct 65 The command activated the 3637th Flying Training Squadron (Helicopter) at Sheppard to assume helicopter training for the upcoming closure of Stead AFB, Nevada.
- 10 Dec 65 ATC designated and organized the 3630th Flying Training Wing at Sheppard AFB to conduct the undergraduate pilot training program for the German Air Force.
- 1 Jan 66 ATC transferred James Connally AFB, Texas, and its 3565th Navigator Training Wing to TAC.
- 17 Feb 66 Because of crowded conditions at Lackland and an outbreak of meningitis, ATC opened a second basic military training school at Amarillo AFB, Texas. It graduated its last group of basic trainees on 11 Dec 68.
- 15 Mar 66 ATC activated the 3636th Combat Crew Training Group (Survival) as a tenant unit on Fairchild AFB, Washington. This was all in preparation for the transfer of survival training from Stead to Fairchild.

- 3 Jun 66 Headquarters, Medical Service School, USAF closed at Gunter AFS, Alabama, opening the following day at Sheppard. The last medical training class ended at Gunter on 31 Mar 67.
- 15 Jun 66 ATC inactivated Stead AFB, Nevada, and its 3635th Flying Training Wing (Advanced). Its helicopter training mission moved to Sheppard AFB, Texas, and survival training transferred to Fairchild AFB.
- 1 Jul 66 ATC discontinued the USAF Language School on Lackland when responsibility for that school came under the Army-operated Defense Language Institute.
- 16 May 67 To meet the pilot production needs in Vietnam, Randolph AFB's instructor pilot training and T-28 programs shifted to other bases, and Randolph began primary training again.

- 1 Oct 67 The command activated the 3253d Pilot Training Squadron at Peterson AFB, Colorado, to conduct a light plane training program for Air Force Academy cadets. The squadron reported directly to HQ ATC.
- 31 Dec 68 ATC discontinued the Amarillo Technical Training Center headquarters and supporting units and placed the base on inactive status the next day. Technical training at Amarillo ended on 27 Oct 68 while basic military training ended on 11 Dec, leaving Lackland as the Air Force's only basic training center.
- 1 Jul 69 SAC transferred Columbus AFB, Mississippi, to ATC, and it became the command's tenth undergraduate pilot training base. Training began on 17 Jul 69.
- 11 Oct 70 In Dec 69, Congress directed that the Army train all Air Force and Navy rotary wing pilots. The first Air Force students entered Army-provided helicopter training on this date.
- 1 Apr 71 The Air Staff restructured the 3636th Combat Crew Training Group as a wing for operational and administrative control of all survival training.
- 1 Dec 71 In connection with the Vietnam drawdown, ATC activated the 3301st School Squadron (USAF Skills Center) at Forbes AFB, Kansas, a TAC installation, to prepare selected enlisted members for jobs in the civilian sector. It moved to Kirtland AFB, New Mexico, in 1973.
- 1 Jan 72 Air Training Command activated the 3302d Computer Services Squadron at Randolph to provide data automation services to headquarters and base functional managers.
- 1 Apr 72 Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) activated at Randolph AFB.
- May-Dec 72 ATC replaced its four-digit flying and pilot training wings with two-digit designations. The changes included:

- 1 Aug 72 Jurisdiction of OTS transferred from the Lackland Military Training Center to HQ ATC, and ATC redesignated OTS as the School of Military Sciences, Officer.
- 1 Nov 72 Air Training Command activated the 3303d Procurement Squadron at Randolph and put it under the control of DCS/Logistics.
- 1 Jan 73 ATC redesignated the Lackland Military Training Center as the Air Force Military Training Center.
- 5 Jan 73 For years senior leadership had wanted to establish an ATC NCO academy. The command accomplished that goal with the activation of the 3304th School Squadron (ATC NCO Academy) at Lackland. The unit fell under the control of DCS/Personnel.
- Feb 73-Jan 74 ATC inactivated its remaining four-digit flying, navigator, and pilot training wings and replaced them with two- and three-digit wings.

- 17 May 73 ATC centralized light plane screening at Hondo Municipal Airport, Hondo, Texas. The new program fell under the jurisdiction of ATC's School of Military Science, Officer.
- 30 Sep 73 ATC inactivated Laredo AFB, Texas, and placed it in caretaker status.
- 1 Oct 73 Air Training Command activated the 3314th Management Engineering Squadron at Randolph.
- 17 Oct 73 The first class of the new First Sergeants Course began at Keesler AFB.
- 8 Apr 74 After almost two years, ATC began using the name Officer Training School rather than School of Military Sciences, Officer. The command also changed back to Basic Military Training School (instead of School of Military Science, Airman) at this time.
- 31 May 74 ATC inactivated the 3301st School Squadron (USAF Skills Center) when Congress cut off funding for the transition program.

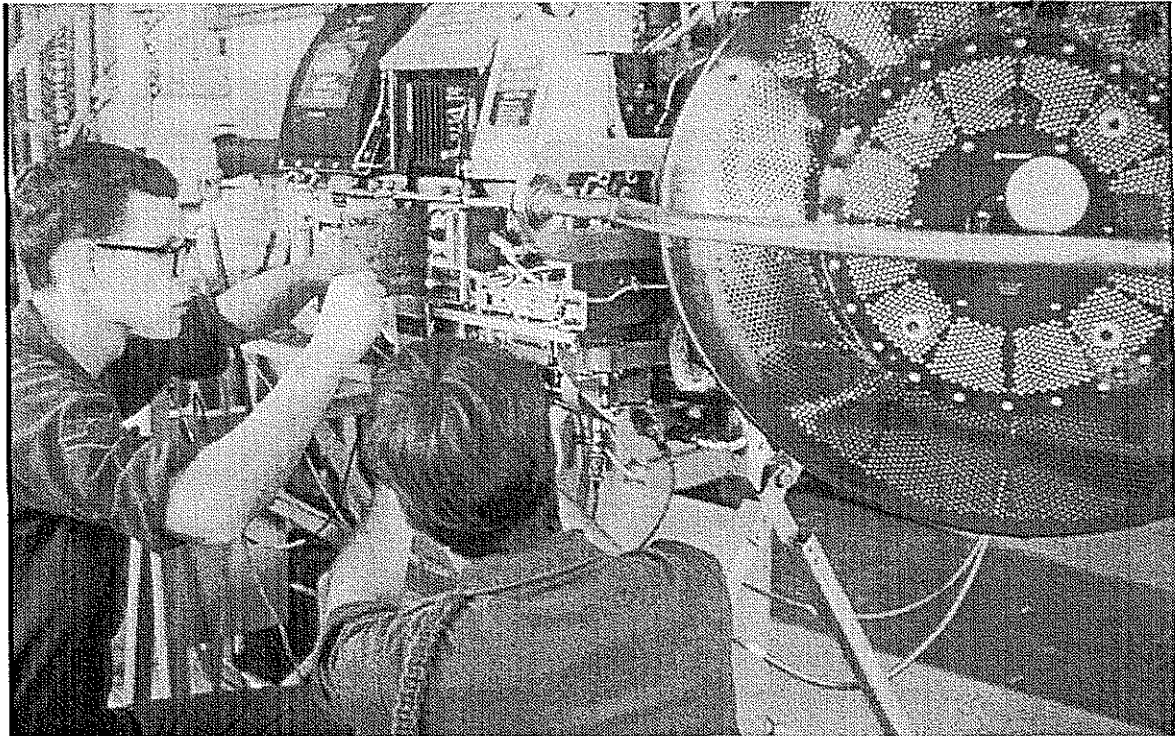

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- 15 Jul 74 ATC established the first three NCO Leadership Schools at Keesler, Williams and Chanute AFBs. By 1975, each of the command's bases had its own leadership school except Vance, whose enlisted personnel attended the school at Sheppard.
- 31 Jul 74 Air Training Command activated the 557th Flying Training Squadron at the US Air Force Academy. It replaced the 3253d Flying Training Squadron (previously, pilot training squadron), which had been active since Oct 67.
- 15 May 75 Air Training Command activated the 3306th Test and Evaluation Squadron at Edwards AFB, California.
- 1 Jul 75 The 3305th School Squadron (ISD) transferred from the 12th Flying Training Wing to HQ ATC. The unit reported to DCS/Operations.

- 28 Sep 75 The 3304th School Squadron (ATC NCO Academy) moved from Lackland AFB to Medina Annex. At the same time, ATC transferred the squadron to the Officer Training School (OTS).
- 1 Dec 75 ATC transferred Moody AFB, Georgia, to TAC and inactivated the 38th Flying Training Wing.
- 15 Mar 76 Air Training Command reassigned the 3304th School Squadron to the headquarters vice OTS.
- 1 Apr 76 ATC activated the 3785th Field Training Group at Sheppard to operate a worldwide teaching program.
- 15 Aug 76 The command activated the 3307th School Squadron (ATC Technology Applications Center) at Lackland.
- 1 Oct 76 Executive control of the Defense Language Institute, English Language Center at Lackland AFB passed from the Army to the Air Force. ATC assigned the Air Force Military Training Center responsibility for the language school.
- 1 Jan 77 The San Antonio Procurement Center was established with responsibility for all base procurement functions at Randolph, Brooks, Kelly, and Lackland AFBs.



Craig Field, Alabama, was activated in Aug 40 and operated as an advanced single-engine school through Dec 45. It transferred to Air University in Feb 46 and then to ATC four years later. ATC conducted flying training at Craig AFB, Alabama, between Sep 50 and Aug 77.

- 30 Sep 77 Air Training Command inactivated the 29th Flying Training Wing at Craig AFB, Alabama.
- 1 Oct 77 Craig AFB, Alabama, was placed in caretaker status.
- 1 May 78 The USAF Occupational Measurement Center moved from the Lackland Training Annex to Randolph AFB.
- 15 May 78 Headquarters USAF realigned AU under ATC, placing all of its education and training programs under a single command.
- 30 Jun 78 Air Training Command inactivated the Instrument Flight Center at Randolph AFB, concluding over 30 years of instrument flying related activities.
- 1 Jul 78 ATC gained jurisdiction of Goodfellow AFB, Texas, and activated the 3480th Technical Training Wing (Cryptological Training Center) as the host unit.
- 1 Oct 78 The San Antonio Real Property Maintenance Agency (SARMPA) became operational, consolidating real property maintenance activities at the four Air Force and one Army installations in San Antonio.

1 Oct 78 (cont'd) The San Antonio Contracting Center, formerly the San Antonio Procurement Center, moved to the San Antonio Air Force Station to collocate it with SARPMA.

Air Training Command redesignated the 3303d Procurement Squadron as the 3303d Contracting Squadron.

ATC transferred its Instructor Training School from Randolph to Maxwell, merging it with AU's Academic Instructor School.

1 Jan 79 Headquarters ATC inactivated the 3300th Support Squadron, transferring its functions to the Headquarters Squadron Section.

2 Jan 79 The 3307th School Squadron inactivated.

1 Mar 79 Air Training Command transferred the 3507th Airman Classification Squadron from Recruiting Service to the headquarters.

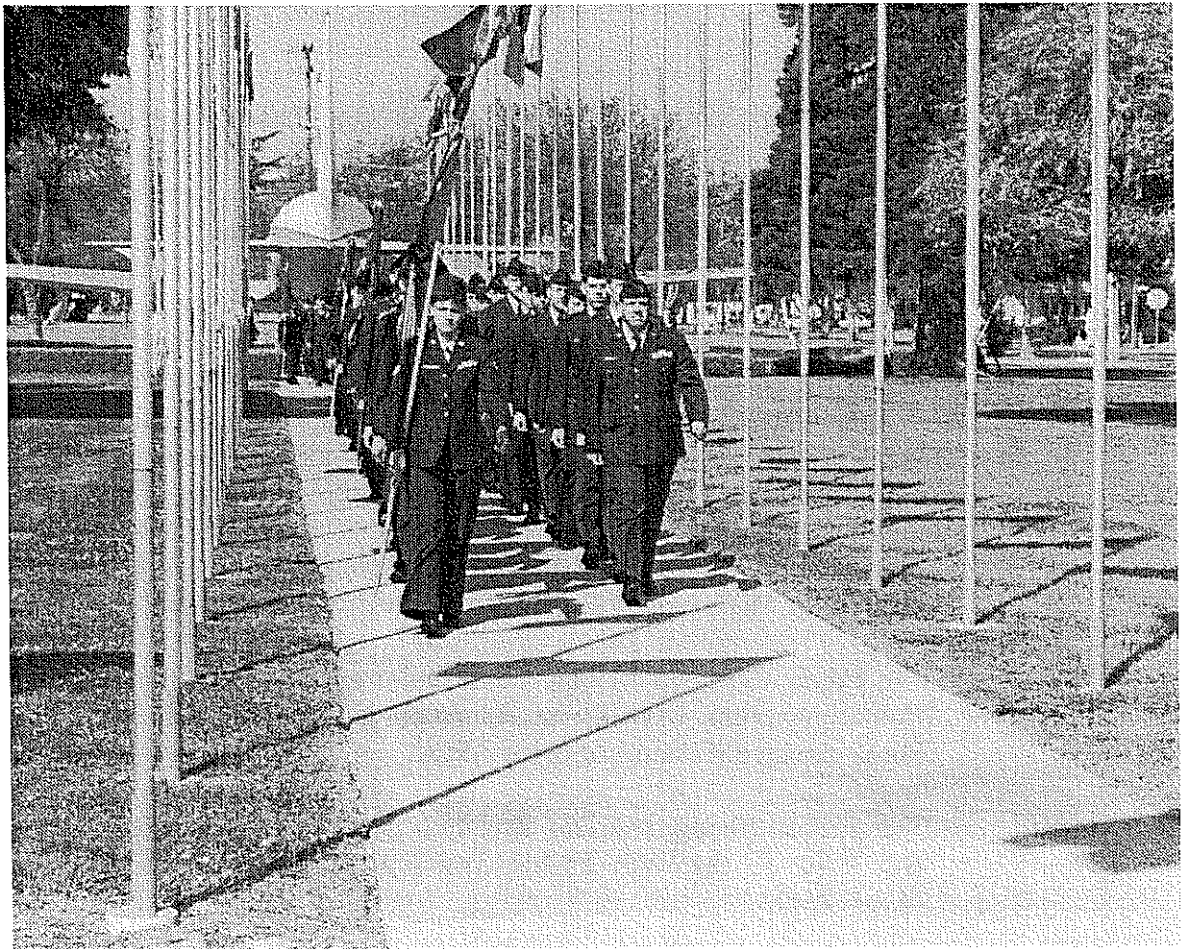
1 Jun 79 The Community College of the Air Force, first located on Randolph AFB and then in 1977 on Lackland Training Annex, moved to Maxwell AFB, Alabama.

- 31 Jan 80 ATC activated the 3588th Flying Training Squadron (Helicopters) to monitor the training and provide administrative support to Air Force students undergoing helicopter training at Fort Rucker, Alabama.
- 1 Oct 81 The Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training program began when Class 83-01 entered flying training at Sheppard.
- 1 Oct 82 Responsibility for the 557th Flying Training Squadron transferred from HQ ATC to the US Air Force Academy.
- 15 Nov 82 Air Training Command activated the 3307th Test and Evaluation Squadron (Acquisition Management) to look after the command's interest in T-46 acquisition.
- 3 Jan 83 Air University established the Center for Aerospace Doctrine, Research, and Education as a subordinate unit.
- 1 Jul 83 Air University regained its major command status. Two primary education functions remained under ATC— Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps and the Community College of the Air Force.
- 1 Oct 83 HQ USAF reestablished the USAF Instrument Flight Center at Randolph.
- 1 Apr 84 ATC activated the 3308th Technical Training Squadron (Advisory) at Randolph, combining all of its training technology and technical training advisory services under a single organization.
- 1 Jul 84 The command activated the 3309th Training Readiness Squadron at Randolph to manage the readiness program. The squadron also served as the command's intelligence function.
- ATC redesignated the 3785th Field Training Group as the 3785th Field Training Wing with four field training squadrons.
- 1 Mar 85 ATC redesignated the 3480th Technical Training Wing as Goodfellow Technical Training Center and consolidated all intelligence training within the center.
- 1 Jan 86 The command established the ATC Operations Center at Randolph. At the same time, it inactivated the 3309th Training Readiness Squadron and assigned its responsibilities to the operations center.
- With the activation of Air Force Communications Command's (AFCC) Air Training Information Systems Division at Randolph, ATC inactivated its 3302d Computer Services Squadron.

- 1 Aug 86 AU merged the Leadership and Management Development Center and the Education Development Center to form the AU Center for Professional Development.
- 14 Nov 86 ATC reassigned OTS from the headquarters to the Air Force Military Training Center.
- 15 Jan 87 HQ USAF reassigned Wilford Hall Medical Center from Air Force Systems Command to ATC for establishment of the San Antonio-Joint Military Medical Command.
- 1 Mar 87 Air Training Command activated the 3313th Medical Services Squadron at Randolph to assist with headquarters management of the newly established San Antonio-Joint Military Medical Command.
- 8 Aug 87 HQ USAF redesignated the AU Center for Professional Development as the Ira C. Eaker Center for Professional Development.
- 1 Oct 87 Air Training Command activated the Civilian Automated Training Office at Lackland to centralize all civilian training activities in the command.
- 1 Jul 88 Air Training Command replaced the Systems Support Activity, in operation at Keesler since 1985, with the newly activated 3302d Technical Training Squadron. On 1 Nov 88, ATC reassigned the squadron from the Keesler Technical Training Center to HQ ATC, believing it would be easier for the squadron to provide computer-based instruction assistance to all the centers.
- 29 Dec 88 The Commission on Base Realignment and Closure recommended closing Mather AFB, one of 86 installations suggested for closure by 1 Oct 93.
- 1 Apr 89 The San Antonio Contracting Center, originally named the San Antonio Procurement Center, was inactivated.
- 1 May 89 The command inactivated the 3306th Test and Evaluation Squadron at Edwards and activated the 3306th Training Development and Evaluation Squadron in its place. Senior officials believed the name was more indicative of the squadron's mission.
- 1 Oct 89 The San Antonio Real Property Maintenance Agency was inactivated.
- 1 Oct 90 ATC established the DOD Military Working Dog Agency at Lackland AFB, picking up logistics support for the program from the San Antonio Air Logistics Center.



On 27 Apr 93, Class 93-05 graduated from specialized undergraduate navigator training at Mather AFB, California. It was the last class to complete training before Mather closed on 1 Oct 93.



On 13 May 93, the last T-43 departed from Mather AFB for Randolph.

1 Oct 90 (cont'd) Air Training Command activated the 3300th Training Support Group at Randolph. The 3300th gained responsibility for numerous units that had reported directly to the headquarters. Included were the 3302d Technical Training Squadron, the 3303d Contracting Squadron, the 3304th School Squadron (ATC NCO Academy), the 3305th School Squadron, the 3306th Training Development and Evaluation Squadron, the 3307th Test and Evaluation Squadron (Acquisition Management), the 3308th Technical Training Squadron (Advisory), the 3507th Airman Classification Squadron, and the USAF Occupational Measurement Center. At the same time, two redesignations took place. The 3306th became a training development squadron, and the occupational measurement center became the Air Force Occupational Measurement Squadron. Two more units, the 3313th Medical Services Squadron and the 3314th Management Engineering Squadron, inactivated.

Air Force Communications Command transferred its Air Training Communications Division at Randolph to ATC as part of an Air Force-directed reorganization of AFCC.

The 3588th Flying Training Squadron (Helicopters) transferred from HQ ATC to the 14th Flying Training Wing at Columbus AFB, Mississippi.

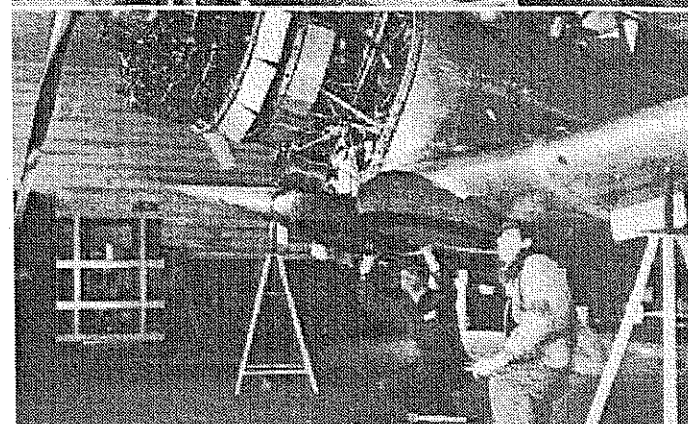
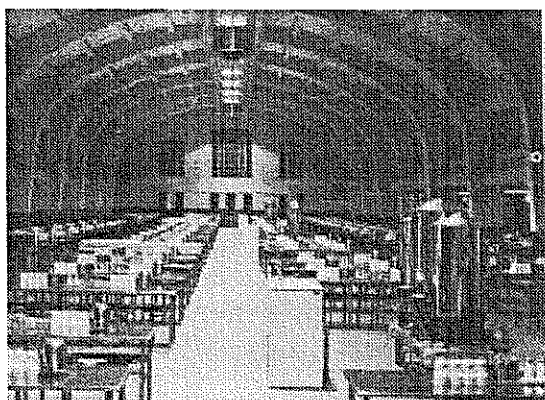
- 1 Jan 91 At the direction of HQ ATC, the 3308th Technical Training Squadron inactivated.
- 1 Apr 91 The 1924th Computer Systems Squadron at Randolph transferred from Air Training Communications Division to the 3300th Training Support Group. At the same time, the 1924th was redesignated as the 3324th Computer Systems Squadron.
- 1 May 91 ATC transferred control of the 3307th Test and Evaluation Squadron (Acquisition Management) from the 3300th Training Support Group to the 12th Flying Training Wing. Concurrently, the unit was redesignated as the 3307th Test and Evaluation Squadron. The reassignment took place because the ATC commander, Lt Gen Joseph W. Ashy, had not wanted a flying unit assigned to a training support organization.
- 1 Jul 91 The Defense Base Realignment and Closure Commission recommended closing Lowry AFB, Colorado, and Williams AFB, Arizona, and moving navigator training from Mather to Randolph.
- 1 Oct 91 Air Force leadership schools were established at each of the command's bases. The schools replaced two-week NCO preparatory courses and four-week NCO leadership schools, incorporating the best from each course into the new, four-week schools.

1 Oct 91 (cont'd) When the San Antonio Joint Military Medical Command inactivated, Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center was assigned to HQ ATC.

Air Training Command inactivated the Air Training Communications Division, a last step in integrating the communications and computer systems functions into the command.

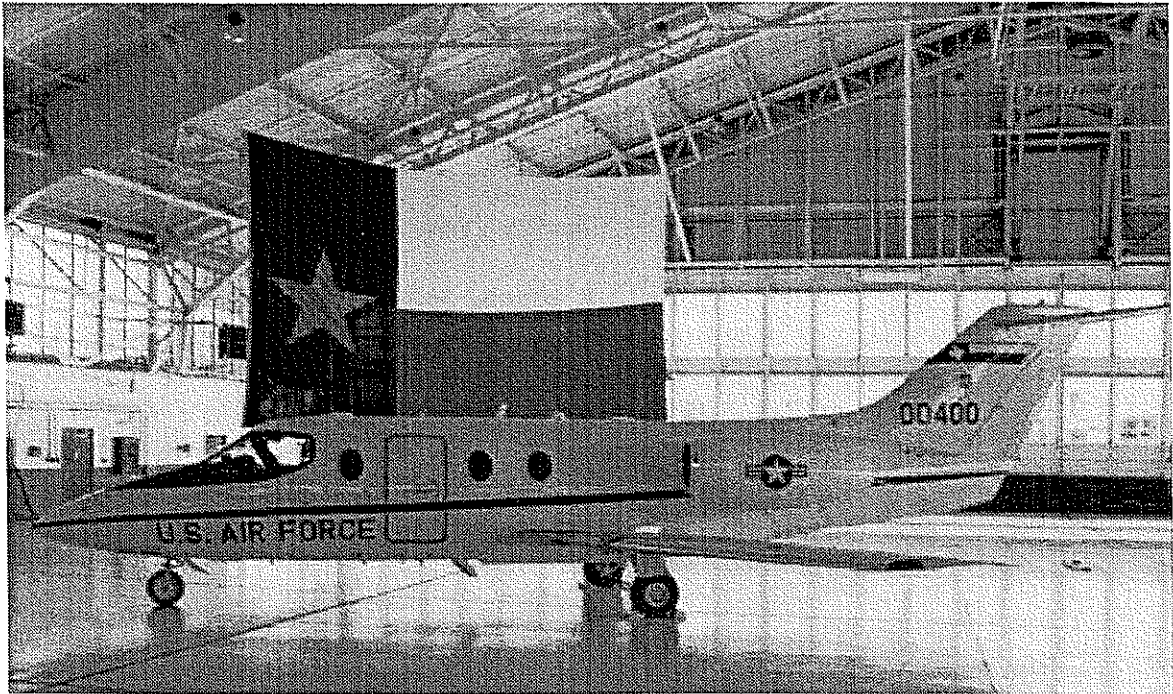
The 3305th School Squadron (ISD) at Randolph, a subordinate unit of the 3305th Training Support Group, was redesignated as the 3305th Operations Training Squadron.

15 Dec 91 Air Training Command implemented the objective wing structure at its flying training wings.



Chanute AFB, Illinois, was first activated in May 17 as a flying training base. In 1921 it began conducting technical training, a mission it continued until its activation on 1 Oct 93. - 15 Dec 91 (cont'd) The ATC Band transferred from the control of the Air Force Military Training Center to the 3300th Training Support Group.
- 1 Feb 92 The command turned its technical training centers into objective training centers.
- HQ USAF redesignated four of the six centers in ATC. The Air Force Military Training Center became the Lackland Training Center, and the Goodfellow, Sheppard, and Lowry Technical Training Centers were redesignated as training centers. Because it was scheduled to close in Sep 93, Chanute Technical Training Center was not redesignated.
- 14 Feb 92 HQ USAF redesignated the Keesler Technical Training Center as the Keesler Training Center.
- The 3302d Technical Training Squadron (Systems Support Activity) at Keesler, a subordinate unit of the 3300th Training Support Group, inactivated. Its assets transferred to the communications squadron assigned to the Keesler Training Center. At the same time, the 3300th also lost the 3304th School Squadron (ATC NCO Academy) and the 3507th Airman Classification Squadron when ATC inactivated them.
- 1 May 92 The USAF Instrument Flight Center transferred from Air Training Command to the Air Force Flight Standards Agency.
- 9 Jun 92 The command switched from four-digit to three-digit units.
- 15 Jul 92 Air Training Command transferred control of the ATC Band from the 3300th Training Support Group to the Lackland Training Center.
- 15 Sep 92 HQ USAF redesignated the 3300th Training Support Group as the 338th Training Support Group. Three of its squadrons also were redesignated: the 3300th Contracting Squadron became the 338th Contracting Squadron, the 3305th Operations Training Squadron became the 338th Operations Training Squadron, and the 3324th Computer Systems Squadron became the 338th Computer Systems Squadron.
- The Air Force Security Assistance Training Group was redesignated as a squadron.
- 15 Dec 92 ATC activated the 558th Flying Training Squadron at Randolph, assigning it to the 12th Flying Training Wing to conduct specialized undergraduate navigator training in preparation for the closure of Mather AFB.



The first T-1A "Jayhawk" arrived at Reese AFB, Texas, on 18 Jan 92. The 64th Flying Training Wing used the T-1 in the airlift-tanker track of specialized undergraduate pilot training.

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- 1 Jan 93 HQ USAF consolidated the 3636th Combat Crew Training Wing with the 336th Air Refueling Wing. Four weeks later, on 28 Jan, HQ USAF redesignated the wing as the 336th Crew Training Group.

 - 31 Mar 93 The 82d Flying Training Wing at Williams inactivated. The 82d Operations Group took up host unit duties.

 - 1 May 93 Air Combat Command transferred the Inter-American Air Forces Academy to AETC and the Lackland Training Center.

 - 30 Jun 93 Chanute AFB's technical training mission ended with the inactivation of the 3300th Technical Training Wing.

 - 1 Jul 93 Once again, AU became a subordinate part of the redesignated Air Education and Training Command (AETC).

AETC activated the Second Air Force at Keesler AFB, Mississippi, to manage all technical training units and the Nineteenth Air Force at Randolph to supervise flying training activities.

The command inactivated training centers at Goodfellow, Lackland, Keesler, and Sheppard. On the same date, HQ USAF redesignated the 17th Reconnaissance Wing as the 17th Training Wing, the 37th

Fighter Wing as the 37th Training Wing, the 81st Tactical Fighter Wing, and the 81st Training Wing, and the 82d Flying Training Wing as the 82d Training Wing. The four centers were succeeded by the 17th, 37th, 81st, and 82d Training Wings, respectively.

HQ USAF consolidated Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center at Lackland with the 59th Tactical Fighter Wing and redesignated the combined organization as the 59th Medical Wing.

When AU merged with AETC, HQ USAF reassigned the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps, the 301st Officer Training Squadron, Community College of the Air Force, and the First Sergeant's Academy from AETC to AU.

AETC assumed responsibility for much of the USAF crew training mission. With the mission came the acquisition of the 542d Crew Training Wing at Kirtland AFB, New Mexico, reassigned from AMC; the 325th Fighter Wing and Tyndall AFB in Florida, and the 58th Fighter Wing and Luke AFB in Arizona, reassigned from ACC; and the 97th Air Mobility Wing and Altus AFB in Oklahoma, reassigned from AMC. All of these wings reported to Nineteenth Air Force.

HQ USAF consolidated the 338th Operations Training Squadron with the 419th Technical Training Squadron and redesignated the unit as the 419th Operations Training Squadron. AETC then transferred the 419th from the 338th Training Support Group to Nineteenth Air Force.

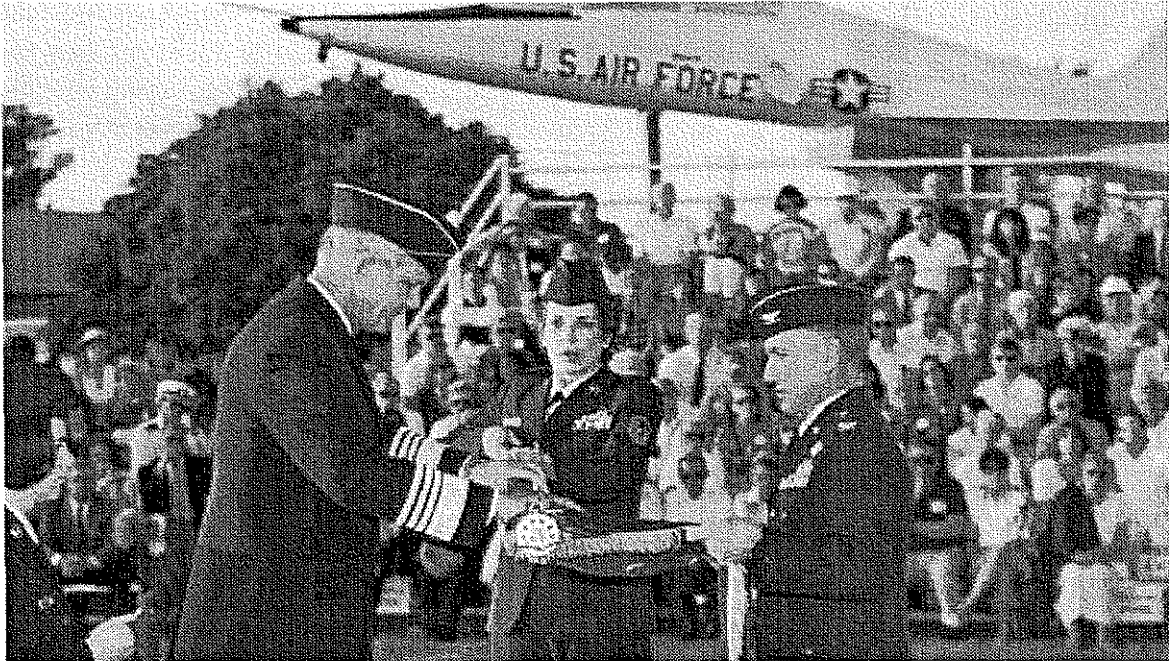
The command inactivated the Air Training Command Civilian Automated Training Office.

30 Sep 93 The Chanute Technical Training Center, the 82d Operations Group at Williams, and the 323d Flying Training Wing at Mather inactivated.

1 Oct 93 HQ USAF redesignated the 301st Officer Training Squadron as the Officer Training School; OTS moved from Medina Annex to Maxwell AFB.

Chanute AFB, Illinois; Mather AFB, California; and Williams AFB, Arizona closed.

HQ USAF redesignated three AU organizations: the Ira C. Eaker Center for Professional Development became the Ira C. Eaker College for Professional Development; the Air University Center for Aerospace Doctrine, Research, and Education became the College of Aerospace Doctrine, Research, and Education; and the Air Force Quality Center became the Air Force Quality Institute.

15 Dec 93 To consolidate all USAF enlisted professional education under a single manager, AETC activated the College for Enlisted Professional Military Education as an AU subordinate unit, with the Air Force Senior NCO Academy and stateside NCO academies as subordinate units.

18 Feb 94 The 338th Training Support Group inactivated. Its subordinate units were assigned to HQ AETC. At the same time, HQ USAF redesignated each of the units. The 338th Contracting and 338th Computer Systems Squadrons became the Air Education and Training Command Contracting and Air Education and Training Command Computer Systems Squadrons, and the USAF Occupational Measurement Squadron became the Air Force Occupational Measurement Squadron.

The Air Education and Training Command Civil Engineer Flight was activated at Randolph, assigned to the headquarters.

31 Mar 94 The 21st Test and Evaluation Squadron transferred from the 12th Flying Training Wing to HQ AETC, and HQ USAF redesignated the squadron as the Air Education and Training Command Studies and Analysis Flight.

- 1 Apr 94 HQ AETC inactivated the 542d Crew Training Wing, and the 58th Fighter Wing moved to Kirtland AFB from Luke AFB in Arizona and was redesignated as the 58th Special Operations Wing, taking over the mission of the 542d. The 56th Fighter Wing was reassigned from ACC to AETC and took over the mission at Luke that previously belonged to the 58th Fighter Wing.
- The 336th Crew Training Group was redesignated as the 336th Training Group, and its crew training squadrons became training squadrons.
- HQ USAF redesignated the USAF Recruiting Service as Air Force Recruiting Service.
- 15 Apr 94 The command activated another field operating unit, the Air Education and Training Command Management Engineering Flight.
- 1 Jul 94 HQ USAF redesignated the Air Training Command Operations Center as the Air Education and Training Command Air Operations Squadron.
- 30 Sep 94 AETC inactivated the Lowry Technical Training Center.
- 1 Oct 94 Lowry AFB, Colorado, closed.
- In place of the 502d Air Base Wing at Maxwell AFB, AETC activated the 42d Air Base Wing as the host unit and assigned it to AU.
- AETC activated the 381st Training Group at Vandenberg AFB, California.
- The command activated the Air Education and Training Command Training Support Squadron at Hill AFB, Utah.
- 15 Feb 95 Air University inactivated its Extension Course Institute.
- 22 Jun 95 The 1995 BRAC recommended (among other things) closing Reese AFB. Another recommendation was to close the San Antonio Air Logistics Center and realign that portion of Kelly AFB west of the runway to adjoining Lackland AFB.
- 23 Jun 95 The Air Education and Training Command Program Management Flight activated and reported directly to HQ AETC.
- 1 Oct 96 Air University inactivated Air University Library. On the same date, AU activated the Air University Academic Support Office.

- 15 Dec 96 HQ USAF redesignated Air Education and Training Command Management Engineering Flight as the Air Education and Training Command Quality and Management Innovation Flight.
- 14 Feb 97 HQ AETC activated the Air Force Officer Accession and Training Schools (AFOATS) at Maxwell and assigned it to Air University. The Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps and the Officer Training School became subordinate to AFOATS.



The T-6 "Texan II" was designed to be used in joint primary training with the Navy. On 29 Jun 99, AETC's first T-6 arrived at Randolph for an extensive test and evaluation.

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- 1 Apr 97 After reorganizing the Air Force's C-130 forces, HQ USAF reassigned the 314th Airlift Wing and Little Rock AFB, Arkansas, from ACC to AETC and Nineteenth Air Force.
- HQ USAF redesignated the AETC Studies and Analysis Flight as a squadron.
- The AETC Training Support Squadron moved from Hill AFB, Utah, to Randolph.

- 12 Sep 97 HQ AETC activated the Air and Space Basic Course and assigned it to Air University.
- 30 Sep 97 The 64th Flying Training Wing at Reese AFB was inactivated. Its aircraft, manpower authorizations, and flying hours were redistributed to Columbus AFB in Mississippi, Laughlin AFB in Texas, and Vance AFB in Oklahoma.
- 1 Oct 97 Reese AFB, victim of the 1995 BRAC, closed.
- 1 Sep 99 The AETC Quality and Management Innovation Flight was redesignated as the AETC Manpower and Innovation Flight.
- 1 Oct 99 The Air Force took another step toward becoming an expeditionary force after officially opening "Warrior Week," a new course of instruction during basic military training.
- 9 Oct 99 AETC officially dropped the T-3A, replacing the enhanced flight screening program with an expanded introductory flight training program run by private contractors.

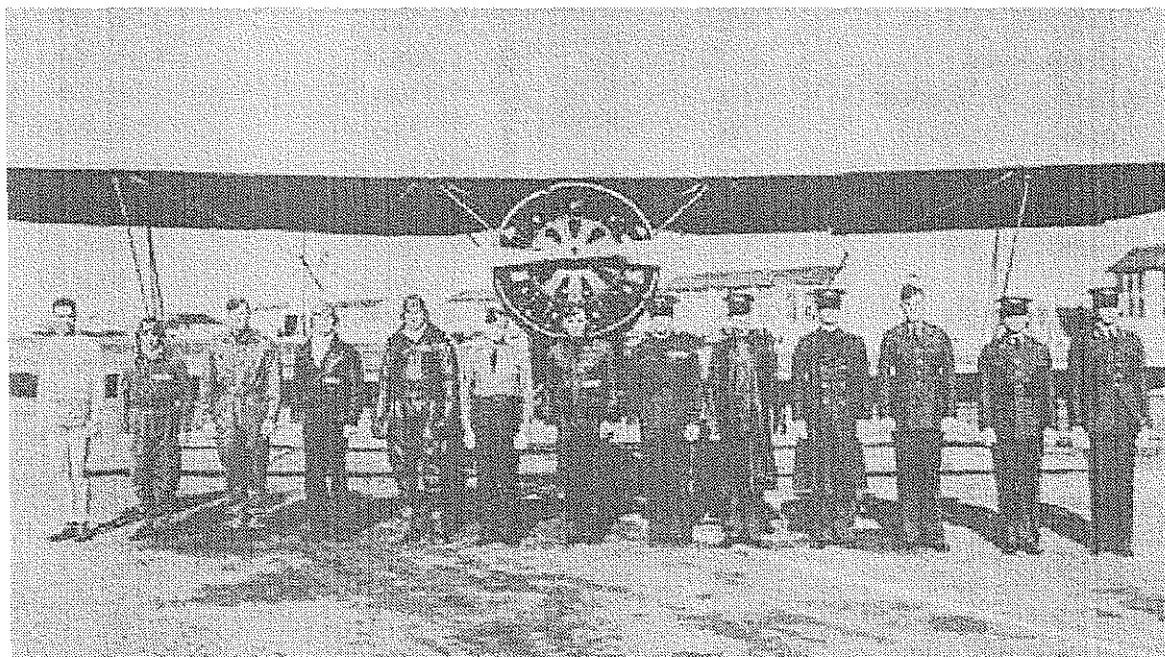
From Jan 52 through Sep 77, Webb AFB, Texas, functioned as a flying training facility. The base originally activated on 26 Jun 42 as Big Spring Army Air Field. It conducted bombardier, flying, and glider training until its inactivation on 30 Nov 45. The Air Force redesignated it as Webb AFB on 18 May 52.

STATUS OF TRAINING INSTALLATIONS WITHIN AETC AND PREDECESSOR COMMANDS

The Army established many of the training bases listed prior to activation of the Army Air Corps (later Army Air Forces) Flying Training Command and the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command. On 31 Jul 43, the War Department inactivated the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command and transferred responsibility for technical training to the Army Air Forces Flying Training Command. At the same time, the War Department redesignated the command as the Army Air Forces Training Command (AAFTC). All training installations came under AAFTC control on that date. Abbreviations used include the following: AB - air base, AFB - Air Force base, AFS - Air Force station, AAB - Army air base, AAC - Army air center, and AAF - Army air field.

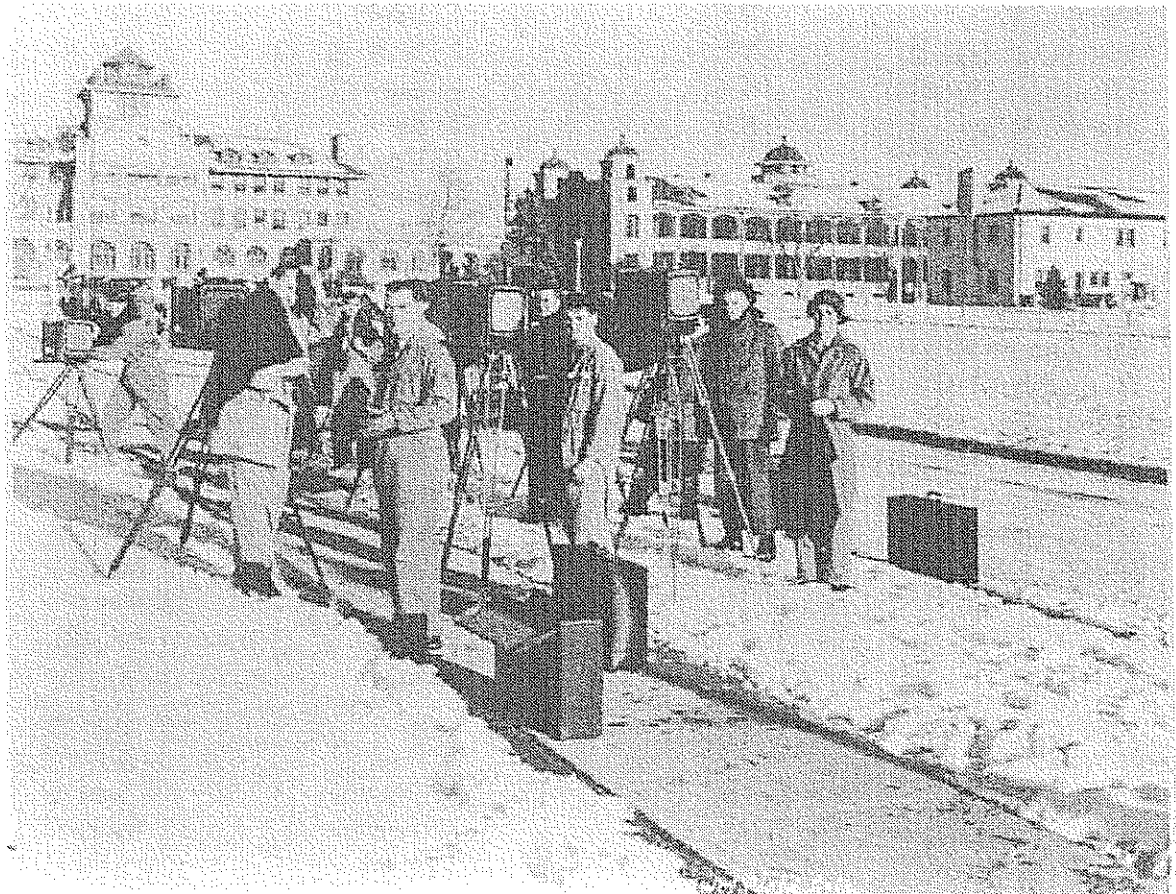
