Statement from Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell In Observance of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day

WASHINGTON, DC – Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (AL-07) released the following statement today in recognition of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day which will be observed on Monday, January 21.

It is befitting that on this day we also celebrate the second inauguration of President Obama. It reminds us that Dr. King's legacy was not just a part of black history, but an integral part to the very fabric of American history.

Dr. King challenged us to embrace our shared humanity through public service, civic engagement and volunteerism. In honor of Dr. King, we should rededicate ourselves to public service this holiday. In times like these, volunteerism and civic engagement connect our communities and reaffirm the strength, humanity and determination of the American people."

Representative Sewell and Senator Donnelly Place Friendly Wager on the BCS National Championship

[#1 Notre Dame vs. #2 Alabama] (2012)

January 7, 2013

Washington, DC –U.S. Representative Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) and newly-elected Senator Joe Donnelly (D-IN) have decided to place a friendly wager on the outcome of the 2012 Bowl Championship Series (BCS) National Championship Game, which features two of the most storied programs in college football history: #1 Notre Dame vs. #2 Alabama.

Should the Alabama Crimson Tide secure victory, Senator Donnelly has agreed to wear a University of Alabama tie and deliver an assortment of South Bend Company chocolates to Rep. Sewell's office.

Should the Fighting Irish win, Congresswoman Sewell has agreed to wear a Notre Dame necklace and deliver Tuscaloosa's own Dreamland ribs to Sen. Donnelly's office.

"Tonight my Crimson Tide takes on the Fighting Irish in Miami for the BCS National Championship determined to win back to back championships for the first time in the BCS era," said. Rep. Sewell. "I look forward to Senator Donnelly delivering some South Bend Chocolates to my office while wearing a University of Alabama tie. However, if Fighting Irish manage to prevail, I will deliver Dreamland ribs and wear a Notre Dame necklace. Alabama looks forward to keeping the BCS trophy in its rightful home. Roll Tide!!!"

"It has been a great season for Notre Dame Football," said Senator Donnelly. "I know the Crimson Tide will give them a tough fight tonight, but I look forward to eating Alabama ribs after an Irish victory."

Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell Sworn into Office as 113th Congress Begins

Joins Financial Services Committee

January 4, 2013

WASHINGTON, DC- U.S. Representative Terri Sewell (D-AL) today was sworn into office for her second term in the U.S. House of Representatives on the opening day of the 113th Congress.

"I am deeply honored to represent the people of Alabama's 7th Congressional District for a second term," Rep. Sewell said. "There is still much work to do and I remain committed to working with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle and President Obama to reduce our deficit, strengthen our economy and create American jobs.

Rep. Sewell was selected to serve on the Financial Services Committee which has jurisdiction over the financial services and housing sectors, including banking, securities, insurance, real estate, public and assisted housing. In the 7th District, Birmingham ranks as one of the most important business centers in the Southeastern United States and is also one of the largest banking centers in the United States.

"I am honored to join the Financial Services Committee," said Rep. Sewell. "I look forward to using my 15 years of experience as a finance attorney to promote economic development in my district, strengthen consumer protections and ensure adequate regulation within the banking industry."

Statement from Congresswoman Sewell in Response to Status of Inpatient Services at Cooper Green Hospital

January 4, 2013

I am committed to protecting the health and well-being of our community and ensuring that everyone has access to quality affordable healthcare. On October 26, 2012, I hosted a community forum at the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church about the future of Cooper Green Hospital and inpatient services in Jefferson County. The purpose of the forum was to provide our community with an opportunity to discuss the future of Cooper Green and to gain a better understanding about the concerns and needs of those who depend on its services. We also brought national attention to the issue and hosted Rev. Al Sharpton, President of the National Action Network and host of 'PoliticsNation' on MSNBC at our forum.

The central issues raised at the forum were that the community needs clear, concise and regular communication about the future plans for Cooper Green. Citizens want an opportunity to provide their input in developing the plan for the future of Cooper Green Hospital and in-patient services for the indigent in Jefferson County.

On November 19, 2012, I sent a letter to all of the Jefferson County Commissioners and Jefferson County Manager Tony Petelos sharing the concerns that were raised at the forum. I asked the county to consider participating in a forum with me that will seek to address the community's concerns and outline the transition to ensure that there is input, transparency and clear communication during this critical time. It is imperative that the next steps involved with the transition of inpatient services at Cooper Green are highlighted and that we hear suggestions and take questions about where patients will go to receive inpatient care and clinical services. My staff and I have been in touch with my constituents affected by the closure of Cooper Green. My staff attends weekly community meetings about this issue and are in touch with several of the County Commissioners, Jefferson County Manager Petelos and Otis Story, the County's consultant, about this ongoing issue.

We stand on the shoulders of giants who fought, bled and died for our basic civil rights. It is our charge to preserve, respect and honor that legacy by working collectively and in a bipartisan manner to ensure that everyone has access to quality affordable healthcare.

Join President Obama in a National Day of Service

On January 21, 2013, our nation will celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day (MLK Day), a national holiday during which we honor the legacy of the civil rights leader Dr. King through a day of service and volunteering.

Saturday, January 19. Earlier today, the Presidential Inaugural Committee announced that it will host a wide range of volunteering events in Washington, DC and around the country. Additionally, the Committee is encouraging people to pledge a commitment to serve after MLK Day throughout 2013.

President Obama has been deeply committed to engaging more Americans in service since taking office four years ago. He expanded AmeriCorps through measures such as signing the Edward M. Kennedy Serve America Act in 2009 and creating the FEMA Corps program last year. He launched the Serve.gov platform to make it easier for Americans to find and post local volunteer opportunities.
