





Fact Sheet on U.S. – Turkish Economic and Commercial Cooperation 2011 - 2012

Key Facts

- In 2011, U.S. Turkish bilateral trade grew to nearly \$ 20 billion a new record;
- This trade volume reflected a 34% increase over 2010;
- 2011 Turkish exports to the United States exceeded \$ 5 billion, a 24% increase over 2010 and faster than Turkish export growth to the rest of the world;
- U.S. exports to Turkey approached \$ 15 billion, a 38% increase over 2010;
- U.S. direct investment in Turkey in 2011 doubled to \$1.4 billion. The U.S. Department of Commerce has identified Turkey as one of several priority markets for U.S. business development – the only country in Europe with such a designation;
- The Framework for Strategic Economic and Commercial Cooperation, chaired by Deputy Prime Minister Ali Babacan, Minister of Economy Zafer Çağlayan, U.S. Commerce Acting Secretary Rebecca Blank and U.S. Trade Representative Ambassador Ron Kirk, is a high level mechanism to discuss concrete ways to grow our bilateral Trade and Investment. The Economic Partnership Commission, the Trade and Investment Framework Agreement, and the Energy Working Group also continue to our bilateral economic dialogue;
- The U.S. Turkish Business Council, comprised of over one dozen American and Turkish companies, provides recommendations to both governments on ways to increase bilateral trade and investment;
- Turkey is the third fastest growing market for American agricultural products over the last 10 years, behind only China and Vietnam;
- Turkey is tenth largest market for American agricultural products, especially cotton (\$1 billion in 2011); a significant percentage of American agricultural inputs is used to make high-value Turkish exports to Europe, the Middle East and the United States;
- The U.S. Export Import Bank maintains a \$4.1 billion portfolio in Turkey;

- The U.S. Trade and Development Agency has focused on energy, information and communication technologies, and transportation in Turkey. The flagship Germencik geothermal power plant in Aydin-Germencik produces 48 megawatts of electricity, enough for nearly 48,000 homes;
- The Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC) has a \$2.8 billion historical portfolio in Turkey, focused on SME development, renewable energy, and infrastructure. OPIC recently announced a \$400 million line to Garanti Bank to provide credit to Turkish small and medium size business, especially women-owned firms, and has nineteen active projects in Turkey worth over \$503 million;
- The U.S. Department of Energy, in cooperation with the Izmir Ataturk Organized Industrial Zone, is implementing the Near Zero Zone project to improve industrial efficiency and protect the environment;
- The U.S. Mission's Commercial Service, with offices in Ankara, Istanbul and Izmir, is leading seven Turkish trade delegations to the United States and Europe in 2012, and is hosting our U.S. Department of Commerce Executive Led Defense and Aerospace Trade Mission to Turkey in December 2012, with 15-20 American company participants;
- The U.S. Department of State's Global Entrepreneurship Program (GEP) is a public/private partnership with the Economic Policy Research Institute of Turkey (TEPAV) with funding from the U.S. and Turkish governments. The GEP Turkey Entrepreneur-in-Residence is responsible for overseeing U.S.-Turkey efforts in entrepreneurship training, outreach, development, and education;
- Partners for a New Beginning (PNB) is a public-private partnership committed to broadening and deepening engagement between the United States and Turkey in entrepreneurship, science and technology, education, and exchanges. Turkey was the first country in which PNB established a chapter, and in December 2011 in Istanbul, the PNB Turkey chapter hosted the first PNB Global Chapters Meeting.
