

QUARTERLY STATUS REPORT



COMPACT GOAL

The five-year, \$697.5 million compact with the Kingdom of Morocco seeks to reduce poverty and stimulate economic growth through investments in five projects. These strategic investments will increase productivity and improve employment in high growth potential sectors such as fruit tree productivity, small-scale fisheries, and artisan crafts. Small business creation and economic growth will also be complemented by investments in financial services and enterprise support.

Fruit Tree Productivity Project

Stimulate the agricultural sector and reduce production volatility by rehabilitating existing olive trees and expanding production of olive, almond and fig trees; moving small farms from high wateruse, lower-value cereal grains to low water-use, higher-value fruit trees in certain terraced areas; and supporting increased irrigation efficiency and productivity.



49,860 farmers trained; 583 agribusinesses assisted. 62,074 new hectares are under production with MCC support, as well as agricultural production worth \$129.5 million.


PROGRESS TO DATE

The first series of works contracts in rain-fed (9,000 ha) and irrigated (25,480 ha) areas is complete. Over 50,000 ha have been planted. Improved soil and water conservation measures on 28,500 ha of rain-fed areas have been installed. Nearly 20,000 farmers, including 6,500 young farmers, have been trained, as well as 108 olive and date processors assisted. Four proposals to fund producer-owned olive oil processing plants have been approved.

PROJECT ACHIEVEMENTS

More than 13,000 ha, of a total of 20,000 ha of rain-fed orchards funded by the Government of Morocco, have been planted. Fourteen pilot projects, which are testing innovative ways to integrate women more fully into the olive and date value chains, are underway. Project-funded practical research to improve smallholder agriculture is advancing.

In the spring of 2010, the Government of Morocco requested a modification of the Artisan and Fez Medina Project, and the Makina component of the project was subsequently removed. In the fall of 2010, the Government of Morocco requested a modification of the Fruit Tree Productivity Project, reducing the number of new planting in rain-fed areas from 120,000 ha to 62,000 ha. Rain-fed rehabilitation and area affected by the two irrigated Project activities did not change.

The Agence du Partenariat pour le Progrès (APP) is the entity implementing the Moroccan Compact.

In July of 2011, MCC approved the reallocation of \$21.2 million from the Artisan and Fez Medina Project to the Fruit Tree Productivity Project for creation of a new project activity. The activity, called the "Catalyst Fund," aims to stimulate private sector investment in the olive oil value chain.

In May of 2012, MCC decided not to proceed with the training scale-up of the Enterprise Support Project. MCC determined that while the pilot phase met its implementation targets, there was insufficient quantitative evidence and an Economic Rate of Return below the hurdle rate, as required by the Morocco Compact, to justify scaling up to the second phase of the project.

Expenditures are the sum of cash outlays and quarterly accruals for work completed but not yet paid or invoiced.
